IN GENERAL. From January 13, 1896, lights have been put up and taken down daily over the various sewer trenches which were opened and left by the former contractors for the work under the late village

authorities. Preliminary studies, with a view of continuance of the Williamsbridge sewer system construction, under new plans and specifications, were commenced March 13, 1896, and are yet in progress; in this connection, grade elevations for nearly the entire sewer system are now established. Soundings along the proposed outlet line in Bronx Park were started March 26, 1896, and are progressing satisfactorily.
