The Budget is as follows

BUDGET FOR 1901.

[Published as Required by Section 226 of the Greater New York Charter.]

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of sees. 1 226 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, by the affirmative vote of all the members thereof, makes this the Budget of The City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and one, being: First, the amounts estimated to be required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business of said city for the said year; secondly, the amounts estimated to be required to pay the State taxes and charges and expenses of the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, for the said year, and, thirdly, the amount audited pursuant to the provisions of charter 525 of the Laws of 1897, and which, according to the provisions of said act, is to be raised by taxation levied upon the taxable property in the Thirty-second Ward of the Bosough of Brooklyn, amounting in the aggregate to the sum of ninety-eight million one handred thousand four hundred and thirteen dollars and forty-three cents (\$98,100,413.43).

DEAR SIR—I have the honor to inclose herewith, for the information and consideration of your Board, a copy of an opinion given me by the Corporation Counsel under date of 1sts ultimo, and a copy of an opinion given by him to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, under date of July 18 ultimo, both on the subject of the necessary procedure to acquire the property and plant of the Flatbush Water Works Company for the public water service of the City.

It will be found that under both of these opinions it is necessary that the action of your Board it is meeting on July 25, 1900, by which the Corporation Counsel was requested to take the necessary condemnation proceedings for acquiring the franchises and property of the Flatbush Water Works Company, will have to be supplemented by concurrent action of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Municipal Assembly, after which the Commissioner of Water Supply may transmit to the Corporation Counsel the maps of the property to be taken, and may request him to institute the necessary legal poxeedings.

It is now for the Board to determine whether, in accordance with the Corporation Counsel's opinion, it will take action to bring the subject before the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Municipal Assembly.

I have until now deferred placing it before the Board in its present status at the request of the Brooklyn affice of the Department, which desired further investigation by its engineers and opportunity to report thereon.

In this connection I also inclose a copy of my letter of April 25, 1900, to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment requesting the authorization of a bond issue to the amount of \$750,000, to be applied to the payment of such award as might be made by legal proceedings for the acquisition of the property of the company, and I call attention to that part of the opinion of the Corporation Counsel given to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment which says i

"If, however, any funds shall be needed for any of the necessary expenses entailed by the acquisition of this plant, the authority of the Municipal Assembly and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment must be abtained for the issue of bonds for the amount necessary to meet such expenses."

DEAR Six—By the provisions of the Act under which the Town of Flatbush became amexed to the City of Brecklyn, and under paragraph 4 of the contract between the Flatbush Water Works Company and the City of Brooklyn, dated June 2, 1895, the right is specifically conferred on the City to acquire the franchises and property of the company youndemnation processings at any time. The contract referred to expires on December 31, 1902, and the present City administration must, without further delay, decide whether a new contract is to be made with the company, or whether the company's franchises and property are to be acquired, as provided by law and in the present contract. Preference for acquisition of the company's property last been manifested from many quarters. The first sep toward the company's property will be the authorization of a band issue to provide the moneys to pay for the same, as any proceeding to acquire it by condemnation, even in its hillistory steps, would tend to create a liability which the City must meet.

I do not attempt in this communication to present a definite estimate of the value of the property to the City, as I take the view that it might operate adversely to the City's interests, to present a definite ostimate on advance of proceedings by condemnation and approximant of the property by agreement, without condemnation proceedings, if authority for its acquisition in that manner should be granted.

There can be no objection, however, to the authorization by your Board of the bond issued to a certain amount, as a preliminary to the condemnation of the property by either was or the other of the two methods, such bond issue to be used only as occasion requires.

The said party of the first part further covenants and agrees with the said party of the second part contracting, in in own behalf and in behalf of those of the inhabitants of said Cray of New York residing in the territory now known as the Twenty-ninth Ward of the Borough of Brooklyn, and formerly known as the Town of Flatbunh, that it will supply water to the said inhabitants of said ward at a rate not to exceed the regular rates charged by The City of New York, and at that time prevailing, for the supply of water to those persons residing in the other wards of the said city, together with such extra and special rates as are charged by said rity in the territory aforesaid, it being expressly understood and agreed that the party of the first part in determining such rates shall not include or consider any vacant land, rither uninclosed or inclused with any building, but shall regard only the building and the land upon which it stands to the width thereor.

Sir.—In reply to the action taken by the Board of Public Improvements referring for report a communication from the President of the Borough of Brooklyn in relation to a petition of Mr. William Jenkins of No. 56 Barbey street, for the regulating and paying of Barbey street, between Jamaica avenue and Highland Boulevard, in the Borough of Brooklyn, also transmitting a letter from the Deputy Commissioner of Highways, Borough of Brooklyn, in which he suggests a different line for Barbey street, I beg to submit a map entitled "Plan and Profile showing the locating and hyling out of the grades of Barbey street, from Jamaica avenue to Highland Boulevard, in the Twenty-stath Ward, Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York."

The difference in elevation between Sunnyside avenue, which is the street next to Jamaica avenue and Highland Boulevard, is too great to admit of obtaining a reasonable grade on the lines of Barbey street as the same is laid out on the official maps.

The salumited map proposes that Barbey street take in the street laid out as Laurel street to Ridgewood Park, and that connection be made along Ridgewood Park from Laurel Park to Highland Boulevard. The former junction of Barbey street, at the Highland Boulevard, will be used by pedestrians only. It is also proposed to make the street 60 feet wide.

The general gradient of the new street will be about to feet per 100 feet.

Dear Siz.—Referring to a letter dated June 21, 1809, from the Secretary of the Board, transmitting, for investigation and report, a resolution adopted by the Local Board of the Twenty-first District, Borough of The Broox, recommending that Washington avenue be paved, I have the hence to report that upon investigation I find that the title to this avenue is vested in the City, and that a sewer has been laid throughout the entire length of the roadway.

Authority has also been granted by resolution of the Board of Public Improvements, and by ordinance of the Mancipal Assembly, to regulate and grade the avenue, and a contract for this improvement will soon be entered into. There is therefore no obstacle to the adoption of a resolution and ordinance for paving the avenue, as this work will not be begun until the regulating and grading work is finished.

Under these circumstances, I recommend that Washington avenue, from Third avenue and One Hundred and Fifty-minth street to Pelham avenue, be paved with asphalt on contracte foundation, and that the contractor be required to give a guarantee of maintenance for five years. The estimated cost of the work is \$192,000, and the assessed value of the real estate within the probable area of assessment is \$3,338,833.

In regard to the disposal works, my opinion is that the Board of Health would not allow the erection of one in this locality.
