The Budget is as follows

BUDGET FOR 1901.

[PUBLISHED AS REQUIRED BY SECTION 226 OF THE GREATER NEW YORK CHARTER.]

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of sec. 1226 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, by the affirmative vote of all the members thereof, makes this the Budget of The City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and one, being: First, the amounts estimated to be required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business of said city for the said year; secondly, the amounts estimated to be required to pay the State taxes and charges and expenses of the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, for the said year, and, thirdly, the amount audited pursuant to the provisions of chapter 525 of the Laws of 1897, and which, according to the provisions of said act, is to be raised by taxation levied upon the taxable property in the Thirty-second Ward of the Borough of Brooklyn, amounting in the aggregate to the sum of ninety-eight million one hundred thousand four hundred and thirteen dollars and forty-three cents (\$98,100,413.43).

CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS.

All such appropriations being made subject to the following conditions:
1. The accounts of all charitable institutions receiving public moneys shall be kept as to show the receipts of and disbursements from public moneys separately from the other funds of such institutions, and all institutions shall keep an exact record, to be corrected from time to time, in a form to be approved by the Comptroller, showing the addresses of the parents, guardians, or nearest relatives of inmates, and other information designed to facilitate inquiry into their financial ability to provide for such inmates.

1. Moneys received from the City Treasury shall be used by such institutions only for recurring expenses of "care, support and maintenance."

2. All institutions receiving public moneys shall be at all reasonable times open to the visitation and inspection of duly authorized representatives of the Department of Public Charities and the Department of Finance.

3. Upon it appearing to the satisfaction of the Comptroller that it would be to the public interests to withhold payments to any charitable institution for which an appropriation has been made, he shall give written notice to such institution of his intention to apply to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for authority to so withhold such payments, and upon the determination of said Board that such payments should terminate, the right of any such institution to receive payment for services rendered thereafter shall thereupon cease.

4. Except where appropriations are made in bulk and not upon a per capita basis, no payment shall be made for inmates of private charitable institutions unless the same shall have been accepted by the proper Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities as a proper charge against the City, and, except in emergency cases, Commissioners of Charities shall not accept as proper charges against the City inmates capable of paying for their own support or for whose care adequate provision can be made in public institutions. The City shall not become liable for any payment to a charitable institution in excess of the appropriation which may have been made to such institution, notwithstanding any per capita rates of payment that may have been fixed for the inmates thereof.

5. The rates of payments to private charitable institutions, unless otherwise specially provided for, are fixed for the various classes of inmates as follows:

LAYING OUT ST. FRANCIS PLACE, BROOKLYN.

In the matter of the proposed laying out of St. Francis place, from Degraw street to St. John's place, in the Borough of Brooklyn, the report of the Secretary was read, showing that the matter had been duly advertised for a hearing, as required by law.

Nobody appearing in opposition to the proposed laying out, the following resolution was adopted:

Whereas, At a meeting of this Board held on the 24th day of October, 1900, resolutions were adopted, proposing to alter the map or plan of The City of New York by laying out St. Francis place, from Degraw street to St. John's place, in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, and for a meeting of this Board to be held in the office of this Board on the 14th day of November, 1900, at 2 o'clock P. M., at which meeting such proposed laying out would be considered by this Board, and for a notice to all persons affected thereby of the aforesaid time and place at which such proposed laying out would be considered, to be published in the CITY RECORD and the corporation newspapers for at least ten days continuously, exclusive of Sundays and legal holidays, prior to the 14th day of November, 1900; and

Whereas, It appears from the affidavit of the Supervisor of the City Record and of the publishers of the corporation newspapers that the aforesaid resolutions and notice have been published in the CITY RECORD and the corporation newspapers for ten days continuously, Sundays and legal holidays excepted, prior to the 14th day of November, 1900; and

Whereas, At the aforesaid time and place a public hearing was given to all persons affected by such proposed laying out who have appeared, and such proposed laying out was duly considered by this Board; now therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 436 of chapter 378, Laws of 1897, deeming it for the public interest so to do, proposes to alter the map or plan of The City of New York by laying out St. Francis place, from Degraw street to St. John's place, in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, does hereby favor and approve of the same so as to lay out the aforesaid place as follows:

Beginning at the southwest house corner of St. Francis place and St. John's place, distant 181.0± feet easterly from the southeast house corner of Franklin avenue and St. John's place;

1st. Thence southerly and parallel to the eastern house-line of Franklin avenue along the western house-line of St. Francis place, to its intersection with the northern house-line of Degraw street;

2d. The eastern house-line of St. Francis place is sixty-five feet from and parallel to the previous course.

Resolved, That the foregoing resolution, approving of the above-named proposed change in the map or plan of The City of New York by laying out St. Francis place, adopted by this Board, together with a statement of its reason therefor, be transmitted to the Municipal Assembly for its action thereon.

Resolved, That the Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 436 of chapter 378, Laws of 1897, deeming it for the public interest to alter the map or plan of The City of New York by laying out St. Francis place, from Degraw street to St. John's place, in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, does hereby favor and approve of the same so as to lay out the aforesaid place as follows:

Beginning at the southwest house corner of St. Francis place and St. John's place, distant 181.0± feet easterly from the southeast house corner of Franklin avenue and St. John's place;

1st. Thence southerly and parallel to the eastern house-line of Franklin avenue along the western house-line of St. Francis place to its intersection with the northern house-line of Degraw street;

2d. The eastern house-line of St. Francis place is sixty-five feet from and parallel to the previous course.

LAYING OUT PUBLIC PARK AT BERRY STREET, ETC., BROOKLYN.

In the matter of the proposed laying out as a public park the territory bounded by Berry street, Nassau avenue, Lorimer street, Driggs avenue, Manhattan avenue, Leonard street, Bayard street, Union avenue and North Twelfth street, in the Borough of Brooklyn, the report of the Secretary was read, showing that the matter had been duly advertised for a hearing, as required by law.

Nobody appearing in opposition, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the resolution adopted by this Board on the 10th day of October, 1900, for the laying out as a public park the territory bounded by Berry street, Nassau street, Lorimer street, Driggs avenue, Manhattan avenue, Leonard street, Bayard street, Union avenue and North Twelfth street, in the Fourteenth, Fifteenth and Seventeenth Wards, Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, be and the same is hereby rescinded.

Affirmative—Comptroller, Commissioner of Water Supply, Commissioner of Sewers, Commissioner of Bridges and President of the Board.

Negative—None.

The following amended resolution was then adopted:

Whereas, At the aforesaid time and place a public hearing was given to all persons affected by such proposed laying out who have appeared, and such proposed laying out was duly considered by this Board; now therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 436 of chapter 378, Laws of 1897, deeming it for the public interest to alter the map or plan of The City of New York by laying out a public park on the land bounded by Edgecombe road, West One Hundred and Sixtieth street, Jumel terrace and West One Hundred and Sixty-second street, in the Twelfth Ward, Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, does hereby favor and approve of the same so as to lay out a public park on the aforesaid land as follows:

Beginning at a point the southeasterly corner of West One Hundred and Sixty-second street and Jumel terrace, said point being distant 1,768.6± feet northerly from the southerly line of One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street and distant 447.15 feet easterly from the easterly line of Amsterdam avenue;

1st. Thence easterly and along the southerly line of West One Hundred and Sixty-second street to the westerly line of Edgecombe road for 168.74 feet;

2d. Thence southerly and deflecting to the right at an angle of 82 degrees 12 minutes 6 seconds for 159.36 feet;

3d. Thence southerly and westerly and deflecting to the right on an arc of a circle whose tangent is the preceding course and whose radius is 291.81 feet for 115.96 feet;

4th. Thence southerly and tangent to the preceding course for 89.41 feet to the northerly line of West One Hundred and Sixtieth street;

5th. Thence westerly and along the northerly line of West One Hundred and Sixtieth street to the easterly line of Jumel terrace for 172.85 feet;

REPORTS FROM COMMISSIONER OF WATER SUPPLY.

The following communication from the Commissioner of Water Supply was read:

DEPARTMENT OF WATER SUPPLY, November 14, 1900.

Hon. MAURICE F. HOLAHAN, President, Board of Public Improvements:

DEAR SIR—I have the honor to inclose herewith, for the information and consideration of your Board, a copy of an opinion given me by the Corporation Counsel under date of 31st ultimo, and a copy of an opinion given by him to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, under date of July 18 ultimo, both on the subject of the necessary procedure to acquire the property and plant of the Flatbush Water Works Company for the public water service of the City.

It will be found that under both of these opinions it is necessary that the action of your Board at its meeting on July 25, 1900, by which the Corporation Counsel was requested to take the necessary condemnation proceedings for acquiring the franchises and property of the Flatbush Water Works Company, will have to be supplemented by concurrent action of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Municipal Assembly, after which the Commissioner of Water Supply may transmit to the Corporation Counsel the maps of the property to be taken, and may request him to institute the necessary legal proceedings.

It is now for the Board to determine whether, in accordance with the Corporation Counsel's opinion, it will take action to bring the subject before the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Municipal Assembly.

I have until now deferred placing it before the Board in its present status at the request of the Brooklyn office of the Department, which desired further investigation by its engineers and opportunity to report thereon.

In this connection I also inclose a copy of my letter of April 26, 1900, to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment requesting the authorization of a bond issue to the amount of \$750,000, to be applied to the payment of such award as might be made by legal proceedings for the acquisition of the property of the company, and I call attention to that part of the opinion of the Corporation Counsel given to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment which says:

"If, however, any funds shall be needed for any of the necessary expenses entailed by the acquisition of this plant, the authority of the Municipal Assembly and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment must be obtained for the issue of bonds for the amount necessary to meet such expenses."

Should your Board decide upon immediate action, the resolutions calling for action by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Municipal Assembly should embody a request for the issue of bonds, say to the amount of \$10,000, to meet legal and other expenses in the prosecution of proceedings for the acquisition of the property.

Hon. WILLIAM DALTON, Commissioner of Water Supply:

SIR—I have received your communication of October 25, 1900, which reads as follows:

"Acting on my communication of July 16, ult., the Board of Public Improvements has passed a resolution approving the acquisition of the property of the Flatbush Water Works Company by the City by legal proceedings, under section 486 of the City Charter, also approving the map showing said property, and instructing me to transmit the same to you, with the request that you will institute the necessary proceedings in the premises. In the meantime the Board of Estimate and Apportionment has not yet made any appropriation or authorization of bond issue for this purpose, and that is the reason that the maps have not yet been transmitted to you. I was recently informed, however, by Deputy Comptroller Levy, that you have rendered an opinion to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, under which proceedings could be begun in advance of action by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

"I would be pleased to have from you, as promptly as possible, a copy of that opinion, and that you will advise me whether under the opinion it is proper for me to make the formal request on you for the commencement of proceedings for the acquisition of the property."

In conformity with your request, I herewith send you copy of opinion delivered to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on the 18th day of July, 1900. You will see that I there advised the said Board that it was not necessary that the issue of bonds should be authorized before the condemnation proceedings were instituted, as it will be impossible at that time to know what amount will be necessary to meet the expenses of the proceeding. I also advised that, under the various provisions of law referred to in that opinion, the proper course of procedure in the present instance would be "that under section 472 of the Charter, the approval of the Board of Public Improvements and of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, together with the authority of the Municipal Assembly expressed by its resolution or ordinance should first be obtained for the acquisition of the plant of the Flatbush Water Works, and that upon such approval and authority having been obtained, the Commissioner may proceed with the condemnation proceedings."

Until these conditions are complied with, it would not be proper for you to make the formal request to me to begin proceedings for the acquisition of this property.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

GENTLEMEN—I have received, through your Secretary, a copy of a resolution adopted by your Honorable Board at a meeting held June 27, 1900, which reads as follows:

"Resolved, That the Corporation Counsel be and hereby is requested to advise this Board whether it is necessary to authorize the issue of bonds as requested by the Commissioner of Water Supply for the acquisition of the plant of the Flatbush Water Works prior to the institution of condemnation proceedings therefor."

By chapter 356 of the Laws of 1894 the City of Brooklyn was given power to acquire at any time by condemnation for public use the property of the Flatbush Water Works Company, and the right thus given to the City of Brooklyn is now conferred upon The City of New York. Such condemnation, however, must be carried out in accordance with the provisions of the Greater New York Charter. Section 472 of that statute provides that "The commissioners of water supply shall have power with the approval of the board of public improvements to select and determine all sources of water supply that may be needed for the public water works of the city of New York and for the supply and distribution of water in said city, and that any sources of water so selected and determined by him shall be deemed necessary for the public use of the city of New York, and thereupon, with the approval of the board of public improvements and of the board of estimate and apportionment, together with the authority of the municipal assembly expressed by its resolution or ordinance, it shall be lawful for the city of New York to acquire by condemnation the property so determined upon."

By section 178, it is made the duty of the Comptroller, and "he is hereby authorized and directed when thereto authorized by the municipal assembly and the board of estimate and apportionment, on acquisition of the commissioner of water supply, to raise, from time to time, on the issue of corporate stock of the city of New York, amounts of money sufficient to pay the sums which may be necessary from time to time to be paid for the acquisition of any real estate, or for the extinguishment of any right, title or interest therein to be acquired or extinguished under the provisions of the laws relating to the supply of water to the city, together with all expenses necessarily incurred in surveying, locating and acquiring title to such real estate or extinguishing claims for damages thereon."

I am of the opinion that under these provisions of law the proper course of procedure in the present instance is that under section 472 of the Charter, the approval of the Board of Public Improvements and of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, together with the authority of the Municipal Assembly expressed by its resolution or ordinance, should first be obtained for the acquisition of the plant of the Flatbush Water Works, and that upon such approval and authority having been obtained the Commissioner may proceed with the condemnation proceedings. And that thereafter from time to time the Comptroller shall, under the provisions of section 178, issue the Corporate Stock of the City to such amount as may be necessary to meet the expense of such condemnation, authority thereto having been given by the Municipal Assembly and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

It is not necessary that the issue of bonds shall be authorized before the condemnation proceedings are instituted. It would be impossible at that time to know what amount may be necessary to meet the expenses of the proceedings. If, however, any funds shall be needed for any of the necessary expenses entailed by the acquisition of this plant, the authority of the Municipal Assembly and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment must be obtained for the issue of bonds for the amount necessary to meet such expenses.

Hon. ROBERT A. VAN WYCK, Chairman, Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

DEAR SIR—By the provisions of the Act under which the Town of Flatbush became annexed to the City of Brooklyn, and under paragraph 4 of the contract between the Flatbush Water Works Company and the City of Brooklyn, dated June 2, 1896, the right is specifically conferred on the City to acquire the franchises and property of the company by condemnation proceedings at any time. The contract referred to expires on December 31, 1901, and the present City administration must, without further delay, decide whether a new contract is to be made with the company, or whether the company's franchises and property are to be acquired, as provided by law and in the present contract. Preference for acquisition of the company's property has been manifested from many quarters. The first step toward the acquisition of the property will be the authorization of a bond issue to provide the moneys to pay for the same, as any proceeding to acquire it by condemnation, even in its initiatory steps, would tend to create a liability which the City must meet.

I do not attempt in this communication to present a definite estimate of the value of the property to the City, as I take the view that it might operate adversely to the City's interests to present a definite estimate in advance of proceedings by condemnation and appraisement of the property by Commissioners of Appraisal, or in advance of any possible negotiations to acquire the property by agreement, without condemnation proceedings, if authority for its acquisition in that manner should be granted.

There can be no objection, however, to the authorization by your Board of the bond issued to a certain amount, as a preliminary to the acquisition of the property by either one or the other of the two methods, such bond issue to be made only as occasion requires.

I therefore respectfully ask that your Board authorize the issue of bonds of the Corporate Stock of The City of New York to the amount of \$750,000, the proceeds thereof to be applied, as may become necessary, to the acquisition of the property and right of the Flatbush Water Works Company.

In connection with the foregoing I inclose herewith copies of my letters of November 1, 1899, and March 6 ultimo, to the Corporation Counsel, asking his advice and instructions on the questions of authority for and method of procedure to acquire the property of the Flatbush Water Works Company, and other private water companies, to which letters I am still awaiting reply.

Resolved, That the Board of Public Improvements does hereby approve of the acquisition by The City of New York of the franchises and property of the Flatbush Water Works Company, situated in the Borough of Brooklyn; and be it further

Resolved, That this resolution be transmitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for its approval; and be it further

Resolved, That the Municipal Assembly be and is hereby requested to authorize, by resolution or ordinance, the condemnation and acquisition of such franchises and property.

Affirmative—Comptroller, Commissioner of Water Supply, Commissioner of Highways, Commissioner of Street Cleaning, Commissioner of Sewers, Commissioner of Bridges, President of the Borough of Brooklyn and President of the Board.

In connection with this subject the President of the Borough of Brooklyn submitted the following form of contract, which was referred to the Commissioner of Water Supply to be submitted to the Corporation Counsel for an opinion:

THIS AGREEMENT, made this day of nineteen hundred, between The Flatbush Water Works Company, a corporation duly organized and incorporated under the Laws of the State of New York, party of the first part, and The City of New York, a municipal corporation duly organized and incorporated under the Laws of the State of New York, party of the second part.

Whereas, The party of the first part is duly authorized to lay pipes and mains in the streets, avenues and highways of the Twenty-ninth Ward of the Borough of Brooklyn (formerly the Town of Flatbush), for the purpose of supplying water to the said ward and the inhabitants thereof; and

Whereas, The party of the first part has constructed its works and laid its pipes and mains in said streets, avenues and highways, and has supplied water for public purposes, and also to the inhabitants of said town and said ward; and

Whereas, The contract heretofore made between the said party of the second part and the City of Brooklyn, acting through its duly constituted authorities, for the supply of water for public purposes has expired, or will expire on December 31, 1900; and

Whereas, The party of the first part is desirous of renewing its contract with the party of the second part to supply water in said ward for public purposes, pending the completion of the condemnation proceedings which the City is about to commence; and

Whereas, The Commissioner of Water Supply of The City of New York, with the consent of the Mayor and Comptroller, has agreed with the said party of the first part as to the terms and conditions upon which the said party of the first part shall supply water for the purposes aforesaid; and

Whereas, Said terms and conditions and the proposed agreement to supply water were thereupon submitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York, who have approved and assented to the same and authorized this agreement to be made;

Now, therefore, in consideration of the premises and of the sum of one dollar each in hand to the other paid, the receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged, the parties hereto do agree as follows:

1. The said party of the first part will, during the entire time covered by this contract, keep all of the five and drinking hydrants in said ward which are now, or shall hereafter be, connected with its mains, in good order and repair, and will furnish a supply of water to extinguish fires and to flush the sewers in said ward, and will also supply with water all the public buildings now in the said ward, or hereafter during the term of this contract to be erected therein, and which buildings belong to the said party of the second part (except only those buildings which formerly belonged to the County of Kings, and which are under the control of the Board of Charities and Correction), and will at all times keep constantly in said mains and hydrants already laid and furnished, or to be hereafter laid and furnished, a sufficient supply of water for the purposes aforesaid.

2. The said party of the first part further covenants and agrees with the said party of the second part contracting, in its own behalf and in behalf of those of the inhabitants of said City of New York residing in the territory now known as the Twenty-ninth Ward of the Borough of Brooklyn, and formerly known as the Town of Flatbush, that it will supply water to the said inhabitants of said ward at a rate not to exceed the regular rates charged by The City of New York, and at that time prevailing, for the supply of water to those persons residing in the other wards of said city, together with such extra and special rates as are charged by said city in the territory aforesaid, it being expressly understood and agreed that the party of the first part in determining such rates shall not include or consider any vacant land, either uninclosed or inclosed with any building, but shall regard only the building and the land upon which it stands to the width thereof.

3. The said party of the second part will pay to the party of the first part, for the water so furnished to it as aforesaid, the sum of thirty thousand dollars annually, in equal quarterly payments of seventy-five hundred dollars each, on the thirty-first day of March, the thirtieth day of June, the thirtieth day of September and the thirty-first day of December in each year, during the continuance of this contract.

4. The party of the second part agrees to set, without additional cost to the City, fire-hydrants at proper distances upon the mains of the company, whenever extensions are made; and wherever the party of the first part supplies water to parties owning mains in the Thirty-first and Thirty-second Wards of the Borough of Brooklyn the parties owning the said mains will be allowed to erect upon them fire-hydrants, to be used for fire purposes only.

5. It is further understood and agreed that this contract is not to bar or in any manner affect the right of the party of the second part to acquire the franchises and property of said party of the first part, by condemnation proceedings, at any time, or to restrict its right, if any it has, to lay pipes or mains in said ward, to furnish water for its own use, or to confer any exclusive franchise upon the party of the first part, or to enhance the value or add to its franchises or assets, or to extend the territory or franchises of the company; but, on the contrary, the stock, assets and franchises of said company shall be valued in any such proceeding to condemn the same, without enhancement from any provision of this contract being considered or allowed, and the company expressly stipulates not to file any certificate, under any law of the State, to extend its franchise into other wards than that for which it now has a franchise, to wit, the Twenty-ninth Ward of the Borough of Brooklyn.

This contract is to commence on the first day of January, 1901, and to continue until the completion of the condemnation proceedings now about to be begun.

In Witness Whereof, the party of the first part hath hereunto caused its corporate seal to be affixed and these presents to be attested by its President and the party of the second part hath caused its corporate seal to be affixed and these presents to be executed by the Commissioner of Water Supply, the day and year first above written.

DEAR SIR—For a number of years past the high grounds in the northerly and westerly sections of the Borough of The Bronx, which are above the reach of the Croton water service and the Bronx and Byram river water service, have been supplied with water under a contract with the Water Commissioners of the City of Yonkers, in pursuance of section 474 of the City Charter and preceding acts. The present contract will expire on December 31 proximo, and as it will take at least two years to supersede this water service by a high-service supply from a pumping station, to be erected at the Jerome Park Reservoir, it is desirable and necessary that the present contract be renewed for one year, beginning January 1, 1901, the supply to be obtained not to exceed 60,000 cubic feet per day and to be paid for at the present rate of 13 cents per 100 cubic feet.

I therefore respectfully ask the adoption by your Board of the annexed resolution authorizing the execution of a new contract and also submit the draft of the proposed contract.

DEAR SIR—In a communication addressed to your Board by the President of the Borough of Queens, dated October 13th ultimo, was embodied a resolution of the Local Board of that borough, which calls for the laying of City water-mains on Hamilton street, from Webster avenue to Sanford avenue, in the First Ward of the borough.

From report which I now have from the Chief Engineer of this Department I find it necessary and proper that water-mains be laid in Hamilton street, from Webster avenue to Sanford avenue, and in Webster avenue, between Hamilton street and Vernon avenue, in the First Ward of the Borough of Queens. Distance 2,900 feet, with 50 houses requiring water supply and fire protection; estimated cost, \$4,000, to be paid from the appropriation for "Water-mains, Borough of Queens, for 1901."

I inclose herewith, for adoption by your Board, the draft of a resolution authorizing the laying of these mains, and recommend that a corresponding resolution or ordinance be transmitted to the Municipal Assembly for adoption.

Hon. MAURICE F. HOLAHAN, President, Board of Public Improvements:

DEAR SIR—Thomas J. McLoughlin, contractor for regulating and grading One Hundred and Seventy-eighth street, from Amsterdam avenue to Kingsbridge road, has applied to this Department for the remission of the overtime of 415 days, on the ground that he was delayed in the prosecution of said work to an extent equal to the overtime, by the construction of a sewer, by building material on the street and by a fence of the Juvenile Asylum which had not been removed.

Upon investigation I find that the contractor was delayed by the causes stated by him, as follows:

On account of sewer construction	150
On account of building material	25
On account of failure to remove the Juvenile Asylum fence	25
Making a total of	200

In addition to these causes of delay for which the contractor is not responsible, there is the debt limit question, and the Corporation Counsel has decided that in case of a suit against the City on that ground no substantial defense could be made.

I therefore recommend that authority be granted to cancel 405 days' overtime under the contract.

Hon. MAURICE F. HOLAHAN, President, Board of Public Improvements:

DEAR SIR—In compliance with the request conveyed to me by a letter dated March 16, 1900, from the Secretary of the Board, with a resolution adopted by the Local Board of the Twenty-first District, Borough of The Bronx, recommending that Prospect avenue, from Crotona Park, North, to East One Hundred and Eighty-ninth street, be regulated and graded, curbstones set, and sidewalks flagged a space four feet wide through the centre thereof, crosswalks laid, approaches built, and fences erected where necessary, trees planted on the sidewalks and the roadway paved with telford macadam, I beg to submit the following report:

Title to Prospect avenue has been acquired by the City, and for the greater part of its length the avenue is in poor condition for travel, and access to the property along the avenue is very imperfect. Inasmuch as Prospect avenue forms a direct connection between Crotona Park and the Zoological Gardens, it is very necessary to improve the roadway; but I am of opinion that a more substantial pavement than telford macadam should be laid. I therefore recommend that the matter be referred back to the Local Board of the district for recommendation and action.

The estimated cost of the work called for by the resolution of the Local Board, including six months' maintenance, is \$85,000, and the assessed value of the real estate within the probable area of assessment is \$562,327.

DEAR SIR—On March 3, 1900, the Secretary of the Board forwarded to this Department, for investigation and report, a resolution adopted by the Local Board of the Twenty-first District, Borough of The Bronx, recommending that Grote street (Kingsbridge road), between Belmont avenue and the Southern Boulevard, be regulated and graded, curbstones set and sidewalks flagged a space four feet wide through the centre thereof, crosswalks laid, approaches built and fences erected where necessary.

Upon investigation I find that proceedings for acquiring title to this street have been initiated and are well advanced, though no date has yet been fixed for the acquisition of title.

The improvement provided for in the resolution of the Local Board is desirable and necessary, and the awarding of a contract can be deferred until title to the street is vested in the City.

I therefore recommend that the improvement be authorized.

The estimated cost of the work, including six months' maintenance, is \$9,500, and the assessed value of the real estate within the probable area of assessment is \$58,300.

DEAR SIR—With a letter dated May 25, 1900, from the Secretary of the Board, I received, for investigation and report, a resolution adopted by the Local Board of the Twenty-first District, Borough of The Bronx, recommending that East One Hundred and Seventy-second street, between Third avenue and Fulton avenue, Borough of The Bronx, be regulated and graded, curbstones set and sidewalks flagged a space four feet wide through the centre thereof, crosswalks laid, approaches built and fences erected where necessary.

In reply, I beg to say that title to East One Hundred and Seventy-second street is vested in the City, and that the section west of Third avenue has already been regulated and graded. It is necessary that East One Hundred and Seventy-second street, between Third and Fulton avenues, be improved, as provided in the resolution of the Local Board, so that the residents west of Third avenue may have access to Crotona Park, which is situated east of Fulton avenue.

The estimated cost of the improvement, including six months' maintenance, is \$10,500, and the assessed value of the real estate within the probable area of assessment is \$30,400.

I recommend that the work be authorized.

DEAR SIR—In the matter of remittance of 10½ days' excess of inspection on the New street sewer contract, as requested by the contractor, Mr. Robert Brown, I respectfully report as follows:

The total number of days in which the Inspector was employed on the work was 24½ days, of which 14 days were consumed in actual construction, and 10½ days elapsed between the time the contract was ordered on and actual work commenced. The time named in the contract for the completion of the work is 15 days, making 9½ days excess of inspection, of which one day was caused by the action of the water company in refusing to allow the contractor to connect the flush-tank.

As this contract was ordered on by this Department immediately upon receipt of notice of its registration in the Finance Department, the contractor had little or no time in which to buy materials and get it on the ground; the specification limiting the length of the trench opened to 100 feet, the contractor could not proceed with the work of excavation to any extent.

In view of the above facts, I respectfully recommend that the contractor be allowed 8½ days in which to purchase material and get it on the ground, together with 1 day caused by the action of the water company, making a total of 9½ days.

The communication from the Holland Estate, requesting permission to construct a board walk at its property at Rockaway Beach, Jamaica Bay, Borough of Queens, was taken from the table and said application denied.

The following communications were referred to the Treasurer:

From the Manhattan Ice Company—Requesting permission to construct and maintain ice bridges on the North river foot of West Forty-eighth street, and on the piers foot of Pike Rutgers, Jefferson and East Fourth streets, East River.

From the Booker Contracting Company—Requesting permission to load stone in the vicinity of Seventy-ninth street, North river.

From the Dock Superintendent—Requesting information as to whether the Department intends to permit the placing of brick on the new-made land in the vicinity of West Seventy-ninth street, North river.

The communication from Henry Scholz, requesting permission to place a landing boat on the Elliott property at Livingston, Staten Island, was referred to the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report.

From the Department of Parks, advising that the matter of repairs necessary to the pavement at Battery Park at the approach to Pier "A," North river, will receive prompt attention.

From the Department of Public Charities—

1st. Requesting this Department to repair and reconstruct the pier at the storehouse on Blackwell's Island. Engineer-in-Chief directed to do the necessary work.

2d. Requesting that repairs be made to the landings at the foot of East Fifty-second and East Seventieth streets, and at Blackwell's Island. Engineer-in-Chief directed to make necessary repairs thereat.

From A. W. Welch, requesting that the permit granted J. T. Welch for the maintenance of an ice bridge on Pier 62, East river, and at No. 22 Wallabout place, Borough of Brooklyn, be transferred to A. W. Welch. Application granted.

From the Metropolitan Street Railway Company, advising that the new-made land between One Hundred and Thirty-first and One Hundred and Thirty-second streets, North river, will be vacated on November 1, 1900. Secretary directed to notify the Dock Master to report to the Board the date of the removal of the material from said premises.

From the Commissioners of the Land Office, transmitting copy of application of the Undine Fishing Club for a grant of land under water at Horse Island, Jamaica Bay, Borough of Queens.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Secretary be and hereby is directed to notify the Commissioners of the Land Office that this Department has examined into the application of the Undine Fishing Club for a grant of land under water at Horse Island, Jamaica Bay, Borough of Queens, and finds that the granting of same will conflict with the rights of the City under the provisions of chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897, and will be otherwise injurious to the public interests of the City of New York, and that therefore this Board protests against the granting of said application.

From the National Lead Company, submitting amended plans for the reconstruction of a shed on the Pier at Hudson avenue, Borough of Brooklyn.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted the National Lead Company to erect, on the pier near southerly of Hudson avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn, a shed, in accordance with plans and specifications to be hereafter approved by the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, all the work to be done under his direction and supervision; it being understood that this permit shall be of no force or effect unless the said National Lead Company shall file in this Department an agreement, in writing, containing a covenant that in case The City of New York shall at any time acquire, either by purchase or by the exercise of the right of eminent domain, for the improvement of the water-front, the pier on which the shed hereby permitted is erected, that then, and in that event, no additional item of value shall be claimed by or allowed to the National Lead Company, nor shall The City of New York be required to pay any additional value or compensation by reason of the erection of said shed upon said wharf property under the permission contained in this resolution.

From the Treasurer—

1st. Recommending that permission be granted the Yorkville Independent Hygeia Ice Company to construct a crib-bulkhead and platform in front of its property adjoining the northerly side of Eighty-second street, East river.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

DEAR SIR—Referring to a letter dated June 23, 1899, from the Secretary of the Board, transmitting, for investigation and report, a resolution adopted by the Local Board of the Twenty-first District, Borough of The Bronx, recommending that Washington avenue be paved, I have the honor to report that upon investigation I find that the title to this avenue is vested in the City, and that a sewer has been laid throughout the entire length of the roadway.

Authority has also been granted by resolution of the Board of Public Improvements, and by ordinance of the Municipal Assembly, to regulate and grade the avenue, and a contract for this improvement will soon be entered into. There is therefore no obstacle to the adoption of a resolution and ordinance for paving the avenue, as this work will not be begun until the regulating and grading work is finished.

Under these circumstances, I recommend that Washington avenue, from Third avenue and One Hundred and Fifty-ninth street to Pelham avenue, be paved with asphalt on concrete foundation, and that the contractor be required to give a guarantee of maintenance for five years. The estimated cost of the work is \$192,000, and the assessed value of the real estate within the probable area of assessment is \$3,238,835.

As to the system of outlet sewers devised for the district known as the Annexed District, east of the Bronx river, as far as my knowledge goes concerning this district, no system of sewerage has, as yet, been formulated.

In regard to the disposal works, my opinion is that the Board of Health would not allow the erection of one in this locality.
