The Committee on Finance respectfully reports that the Board of Education has the financial ability to make the appropriation mentioned in the foregoing resolution.

Whereas, In the latter part of 1905 John D. Lofquist, Draughtsman in the Bureau of Buildings, went to Europe for the purpose of prosecuting the study of architectural designing; and

Whereas, Mr. Lofquist has made application for reinstatement in his former position; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Municipal Civil Service Commission be and it is hereby requested to approve the reinstatement of John D. Lofquist in the position of Draughtsman in the Department of Education; and that, upon the receipt of a certificate of such approval, John D. Lofquist be reinstated in said position at a rate of compensation of \$40 per week.

Whereas, There are in the by-laws of the Board of Education sundry references to sections renumbered by the action of the Board taken on February 28, 1906 (see Journal, page 393); therefore be it

Resolved, That the necessary changes be made in the numerical designations of all sections so referred to wherever such references occur, and that such changes be considered as in effect from and after February 28, 1906.

Amending subdivision 2 of section 25 of the By-Laws of the Board of Education, in the first and second lines, by striking out the words "Executive Committee" and substituting therefor the word "Board."

Amending subdivision 6 of section 32 of the By-Laws, in the second and third lines, by striking out the words "Executive Committee" and substituting therefor the word "Board."

Whereas, An application has been received from the Boys' Athletic Association of the Flushing High School, located in Public School Building 20, Borough of Queens, for the use of the assembly hall, gymnasium and four classrooms in said building for the purpose of giving a dramatic entertainment, the proceeds of which are to be used for the benefit of the Athletic Association, and also to give a reception to the athletic teams; and

Whereas, Said application has been approved by the Principal of the Flushing High School, who states that it was customary for many years, both before consolidation and also under the Borough School Board, for such use to be made of the school building, and further states that similar applications were always cheerfully granted, and that the athletic teams have won a high reputation and deserve a generous support; and

Whereas, Said application was also approved at a meeting of the Local School Board of District No. 43, held February 14, 1906; therefore be it

Resolved, That permission be granted to the Boys' Athletic Association of the Flushing High School to use the assembly hall, gymnasium and four classrooms in Public School 20, Borough of Queens, for the purposes above mentioned, on the evening of Monday, April 2, 1906.

Report of a Special Committee.

Mr. Barrett presented the following:

To the Board of Education:

Once again within the brief space that has elapsed since the beginning of the current year we are called upon to note with sorrow the invasion of our ranks by death. Commissioner Henry Schmitt, after an illness of some duration, which yet at times held out the hope of recovery, passed away from the scene of his labors on March 13, at an age lacking still a decade and a half of the Psalmist's span.

Our dead colleague had been long identified with school affairs, the beginning of his service as a Commissioner antedating that of all those now serving in the Board of Education, with a single exception. Appointed a member of the Board of Education of the old City of New York in 1883 by Mayor Edson, he was continued in office by Mayor Grace. During his incumbency, which covered the years from 1884 to 1889, inclusive, he served as Chairman of the Committee on By-Laws and of the Auditing Committee, as well as on several other committees of the Board. He was appointed a member of the Board of Education for the Greater City on December 5, 1904, and since that time served on the Committees on By-Laws and Legislation, Care of Buildings and Elementary Schools, and on the Executive Committee of the Normal College. His service on committees was marked by a conscientious assiduity which his failing health latterly forced him somewhat to remit, and the counsels drawn from his experience of years before aided materially the determinations of his colleagues. To the deliberations of the present Board he furnished an active and critical element which had its due weight with his fellow Commissioners, and he left upon all the impression that he was faithful, able and untiring in his zeal for the interests of the public schools.

Nurtured in the traditions of a faith assuring immortality, death came to him not as a gaoler, but as an emancipator, opening to him the treasures of a life beyond the grave. With the hope that the same confident trust may soften somewhat the heavy stroke of bereavement to his sorrowing family, his colleagues take their farewell here of an industrious and capable public servant and of an earnest and kindly spirit.

Resolved, That the foregoing minute be spread upon the records of the Board, and that a copy of the same be transmitted to the bereaved family.



Booth, President, and Henry Guttin, Engineer, copy of which is annexed hereto and made a part of this grant.

Sec. 2. The grant of this franchise, right and privilege is subject to the following conditions:

First—The said franchise, right and privilege to lay one conduit line in each of the streets, avenues or highways, and between the limits as hereinbefore described, and the franchise, right and privilege to maintain and operate the same shall be held and enjoyed by the said Company, its lessee or successors, for a term of fifteen years from the date of the signing of this contract, with the privilege of renewal of said grant for a further period of ten years, upon a fair revaluation of said franchise, right and privilege.

If the Company shall determine to exercise its privilege of renewal, it shall make application to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, or to any authority which shall be authorized by law to act for the City in place of the said Board. Such application shall be made at any time not earlier than two years and not later than one year before the expiration of the original term of this grant. The determination of the revaluation shall be sufficient, if agreed to in writing by the Company and by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or by such other authority in its place. If the Company and the Board, or such other authority in its place for the City, shall not reach such agreement on or before the day one year before the expiration of the original term of this grant, then the annual rate of compensation for such succeeding ten years shall be reasonable, and either the City (by the Board or by such other authority in its place)

or the Company shall be bound upon request of the other to enter into a written agreement with such other authority, fixing the rate of such compensation at such amount as shall be reasonable; and if the parties shall not forthwith agree upon what is reasonable, then the parties shall enter into a written agreement fixing such annual rate at such amount as shall be determined by three disinterested freeholders selected in the following manner:

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successors in authority; one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Company; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder, and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the valuations aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six months prior to the expiration of the contract, and their report shall be filed with the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successors in authority, within three months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine the books of the Company and its officers under oath. The valuations so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties, but shall not in any event be less than the minimum amount fixed as the sum to be paid annually for the last year of this original grant. If in any case the annual rate shall not be fixed prior to the termination of the original term of this grant then the Company shall pay the annual rate theretofore prevailing until the new rate shall be determined, and shall then make up to the City the amount of any excess of the annual rate then determined over the previous annual rate. The compensation and expenses of the said appraisers shall be borne jointly by the City and the Company, each paying one-half thereof.

Second—Upon the termination of this contract, or if the same be renewed, then at the termination of the said renewal term, or upon the termination of the rights hereby granted for any other cause, all conduit lines and appurtenances thereto, constructed pursuant to this contract, shall be and become the property of The City of New York, without compensation therefor, and the same may be used by the City for any purpose whatsoever. If, however, at the termination of this grant, as above, the City by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successors in authority, shall so order by resolution, the said Company shall remove, at its own expense, said conduit line and all appurtenances thereto, and shall restore the streets and pavements to their original condition.

Third—The Company, its successors or assigns, shall pay for this privilege to The City of New York the following sums of money, to wit:

1. Five thousand dollars (\$5,000) in cash within thirty (30) days after the signing of the contract.

2. During the first five years of this contract an annual sum which shall in no case be less than eight hundred and fifty dollars (\$850), and which shall be equal to 4 per cent. of the gross receipts of the Company, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of eight hundred and fifty dollars (\$850).

Booth, President, and Henry Guttin, Engineer, copy of which is annexed hereto and made a part of this grant.

Sec. 2. The grant of this franchise, right and privilege is subject to the following conditions:

First—The said franchise, right and privilege to lay one conduit line in each of the streets, avenues or highways, and between the limits as hereinbefore described, and the franchise, right and privilege to maintain and operate the same shall be held and enjoyed by the said Company, its lessee or successors, for a term of fifteen years from the date of the signing of this contract, with the privilege of renewal of said grant for a further period of ten years, upon a fair revaluation of said franchise, right and privilege.

or the Company shall be bound upon request of the other to enter into a written agreement with such other authority, fixing the rate of such compensation at such amount as shall be reasonable; and if the parties shall not forthwith agree upon what is reasonable, then the parties shall enter into a written agreement fixing such annual rate at such amount as shall be determined by three disinterested freeholders selected in the following manner:

Eighth—All construction which shall be made under this grant shall be done in a manner solely upon the terms and conditions hereafter to be imposed by the President of the Borough of Brooklyn and the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, or their respective successors in authority. The said Company shall submit a working plan of construction to the said President and to the said Commissioner, which shall include and show in detail the method of construction of said conduit line, connections, manholes and other appurtenances, and the mode of protection of all subsurface construction under the streets, avenues and highways described in the routes.

The Company, upon the application for refrigeration of any person or corporation located along the routes herein authorized, shall extend its conduit to such premises and furnish to said applicant refrigeration at the prices which are herein prescribed, or at which such prices may be hereafter fixed, in properly insulated compartments, under contracts containing fair and reasonable regulations for such service; otherwise this contract shall cease and determine at the option of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

It is mutually understood and agreed by and between the parties hereto that in the event of any dispute arising between the company and any consumer or user of its refrigeration, as to the fairness and reasonableness of the regulations contained in said contracts, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on the application of either said consumer, user or Seaboard Refrigeration Company shall have the power to pass upon and decide as to the fairness and reasonableness of such regulations, and said Seaboard Refrigeration Company hereby agrees to abide by such decision and conform such regulations thereto.

As a condition of this grant, the Company, its successor or assigns, hereby agrees to repay to The City any damages which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or defaults of the Company, its successor or assigns. Due notice of any such demand shall be given to the Company.

Sixteenth—In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained, this contract may be forfeited or avoided by The City of New York by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel, on notice of ten days to the said Company.

Seventeenth—If the Company has in position a conduit or pipe line in streets or avenues other than those herein described, then the Company shall remove such conduit or pipe line at its own expense, within one year from the date of signing this contract. If the Company owns a conduit or pipe line in the streets or avenues herein described, such conduit or pipe line shall be deemed to be a conduit line herein authorized, but no right is hereby given to lay or construct a conduit line in addition to that which the Company already has in such streets or avenues.

Eighteenth—The conduit line hereby authorized shall be used only by the Company and for no other purpose than for supplying refrigeration by the ammonia process or such other process as may be consented to by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Nineteenth—The Company hereby agrees not to issue stock or bonds other than have been heretofore issued, until a certificate of authority therefor has been issued by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or until such Board shall further certify in writing as to the amount of stock or bonds reasonably required for the purposes of the Company. The stock and bonds of the said Company shall not be issued in excess of the amount so certified.

The Company shall not increase its capital stock or its bonded indebtedness without the consent in writing of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment stating the amount of the authorized increase. For the purpose of making this determination as to the amount of stock and bonds to be issued, or the amount of the authorized increase of the capital stock and bonded indebtedness of the Company, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment may take and hear testimony under oath and examine the books and

papers of the Company, and require verified statements from the officers thereof, pertaining to the value of the property and of the franchise owned or operated by the Company. 8. The total amount of funded and floating debt;

9. The average rate per annum of interest on funded debt;

10. Statement of dividends paid during the year;

11. Number of feet of conduit now laid;

12. The total amount expended for same;

13. Amount, kind and capacity of machinery now in use and required for operation;

14. The total amount expended for same;

15. Number of tons of refrigeration furnished during the year;

16. Total receipts from refrigeration and the average price per ton received during the year;

17. Amounts paid by Company for damage to persons or property on account of construction and operation;

18. Total expenses for operation; including salaries;

19. An inventory of all the property of the Company.

— and such other information in regard to the business of the Company as may be required by the Board. For each failure to comply with the foregoing, the Company shall pay a penalty of one hundred dollars (\$100), which may be collected by the Comptroller without notice.

Twenty-first—The Company shall at all times keep accurate books of accounts of the gross earnings from the privileges granted under this contract. The Company shall, on or before November 1 in each year, make a verified report to the Comptroller of The City of New York, of the business done by the Company for the year ending September 30 next preceding, as he may prescribe. Such report shall contain the number of feet of conduit laid and the number of manholes constructed during the year, and also a statement of the gross receipts from all business of furnishing refrigeration to consumers, together with such other information and in such detail as the Comptroller may require. The Comptroller shall have access to all books of the Company for the purpose of ascertaining the correctness of its report and may examine its officers under oath.

Twenty-first—If the said Company, its successors or assigns, shall fail to give efficient public service at the rates herein fixed, or fails to maintain its structures in good condition throughout the full term of its occupancy of such streets, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York may give written notice to the said Company specifying any default on the part of said Company, and requiring said Company to remedy the same within a reasonable time, and upon the failure of the Company to remedy said default within a reasonable time, said Company shall for each day thereafter during which the default or defect remains, pay to The City of New York a sum of fifty dollars (\$50) as fixed or liquidated damages, or the said City, in case such structures which may affect the surface of the streets, shall not be put in good condition within a reasonable time after notice by the Board as aforesaid

Resolved, That the results of the inquiry made by this Board as to the money value of such franchise or right proposed to be granted, and the adequacy of the compensation proposed to be paid therefor are that the money value of such right or franchise proposed to be granted is the total amount of money which it is proposed, as provided in and by the form of proposed contract, for the grant of such franchise or right, as hereinbefore fully set forth, shall be paid for such franchise or right, and that such compensation is adequate therefor.
