person or persons, shall not have a right to sue at law or in equity for assessment of the value of the benefit and advantage of such improvement upon the respective owners, tenants, lessees, parties and persons respectively entitled to or interested in the lands and respective lands, tenements, hereditaments and premises not required for the purpose of opening, laying out and forming the same, but benefited thereby, and of ascertaining and defining the extent and boundaries of the respective tracts or parcels of land to be taken or to be assessed therefor, and of performing the

claim or demand on account thereof, are hereby required
