MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

Minutes of Meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of New York, Held Wednesday, December 11, 1912, at 10 o'clock A. M.

Bellevue and Allied Hospitals.

A meeting of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals was held on Tuesday, January 7, 1913, at 3.30 p. m. Present: Dr. Brannan, the President, in the chair; and Messrs. Farley, O'Keefe, Paulding, Sachs, and Stern, Trustees. Excused: Messrs. Drummond and Robbins. The minutes of the meeting of December 27 were approved.

Bills, amounting to \$11,341.56, were approved and forwarded to the Comptroller for payment.

Dr. George O'Hanlon, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

A communication has been received from Dr. M. S. Gregory, Resident Alienist, calling attention to the present difficulty in meeting the demands made upon the hospital for the transfer of alleged insane persons to the psychopathic wards. The law requires that these patients be sent for, and at present there is only one ambulance for this purpose. The necessity of operating this ambulance day and night accounts for its being frequently out of order, when we are dependent upon the horse and electric ambulances for this work. The Assistant Corporation Counsel who has charge of the legal work of the psychopathic department has rendered an opinion that the law also necessitates sending a physician with this ambulance when a request is made by the friends. With the present working staff, this is impossible. Dr. Gregory also calls attention to a number of cases coming to the observation ward where it would seem desirable to have some other means of transportation than an ordinary ambulance, and suggests that for these cases we have a second car, of a type other than that of an ambulance. In the Departmental Estimate for 1913, a request was made for several motor ambulances, two of which were allowed. If it is the wish of the Board to provide these facilities, which the law seems to make it necessary to do, revenue bonds will have to be requested in the following amounts:

Two motor cars at \$4,000, \$8,000; one assistant physician, \$1,500; two chauffeurs at \$900, \$1,800; two nurses at \$600, \$1,200—total, \$12,000.

It was resolved, To request only one motor car for the use of the psychopathic department at the present time, and to ask the Board of Aldermen to issue revenue bonds to an amount not exceeding \$7,000, to provide for one motor car at \$4,000, and the salaries of one assistant physician at \$1,500, one chauffeur at \$900, and one nurse at \$600.

The General Medical Superintendent presented a list of special Nurses, who had been authorized at Bellevue Hospital from December 26 to January 7. The appointment of these Nurses was approved.

The General Medical Superintendent presented a list of changes in the help at Bellevue Hospital for the week ending December 21. The changes were approved.

Reports of Committees.

The Building Committee reported that they had examined the plans of the proposed extension of the hospital building and helps' quarters at Fordham Hospital, and recommended that they be referred to Dr. Goldwater for his approval. On motion this report was approved.

Further consideration was given to the bids submitted at last meeting for the construction, heating and ventilating, and plumbing and gas-fitting of the new ward wing at Harlem Hospital, and inasmuch as no reply has been received from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to the request for a transfer of corporate stock, on motion.

It was resolved, To reject all bids received for this work.

The President submitted a list of bids received on December 26, for engineers' supplies for 1913, on motion.

It was resolved, To accept the lowest bid with the exception of lines 401, 402, 403, and 404, action upon which was deferred.

Consideration was given to the bids received on December 26, for coal, and a communication dated January 7, from the Contract Clerk and Auditor was presented, recommending that these bids be rejected and purchases made in the open market until March 31, 1913. This recommendation was adopted.

The Building Committee submitted a report on the estimates received for repairs, building materials, etc., on open market orders during the three weeks ending January 4, and upon the recommendation of that Committee, the acceptance of the bids was approved.

Communications.

A communication from the Commissioners of Accounts, enclosing copy of a report filed with the Mayor regarding the award of the contract for the construction of the nurses' residence at Harlem Hospital, together with an opinion from the

Corporation Counsel dated December 28, relative to the opening of bids. A communication from the Mayor dated January 6, in regard thereto was also presented. On motion, the President, the Chairman of the Building Committee, and the Secretary were appointed a committee to prepare a reply to the report of the Commissioners of Accounts, and, pending further information from the Corporation Counsel, it was resolved, To comply with the new opinion requiring a quorum of the Board at the opening of all bids.

The minutes of the meeting of the Medical Board of Gouverneur Hospital held on January 2, were presented. On motion, and carried, the recommendation that the appointment of dentist to the dispensary was referred to Dr. H. L. Wheeler for consideration; the nomination of Dr. J. J. Goldstein and Dr. Jacob Kramer for the two salaried positions provided in the 1913 Budget for the tuberculosis clinic was approved.

The minutes of the meeting of the Board of Managers of the Training School held on November 23, were presented.

It was resolved, To request the Training School to assign an additional Nurse to each of the tuberculosis wards.

The minutes of the meeting of the Board of Managers of the Training School held on December 6, were presented.

The report in regard to providing a proper place to isolate erysipelas patients was referred to the General Medical Superintendent for such action as would relieve the condition complained of.

The minutes of the meeting of the Board of Managers of the Training School held on December 20, were presented.

A communication dated January 2, was presented from the Commissioner of the Department of Parks, stating that he will make application for funds for the improvement of the proposed park in Gouverneur Slip as soon as plans are prepared by the landscape architect.

A communication dated December 26, was presented from the Department of Finance, stating that the lease of the premises at 113 W. 136th st., will expire on April 1, 1913. The President reported that he had requested the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to renew this lease for one year. The action of the President was approved.

And it was further resolved, To request the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to renew the leases of the premises 115 and 117 W. 136th st., for one year from May 1, 1913, for use as dormitories for the Nurses employed at Harlem Hospital.

A resolution adopted by the Board of Aldermen on December 10, authorizing the purchase in the open market without public letting of an automobile ambulance for Fordham Hospital, at a cost not to exceed \$3,500 was received.

A communication dated December 31, was presented from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, transmitting amended specifications for forage. These specifications were approved and referred to the General Medical Superintendent for adoption.

A communication dated December 31, was presented from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, transmitting forms of proposals for bids, specifications, contracts, etc. These were referred to the General Medical Superintendent for adoption.

The minutes of the meeting of the Medical Board of Bellevue Hospital held on January 2, were presented. On motion, the award of diplomas to the retiring members of the house staff, named by the Medical Board was approved; the recommendations in regard to the erysipelas service were referred to the President and General Medical Superintendent; the report in regard to efficiency in the nursing service was referred to the Advisory Committee on Nursing for further consideration; action was deferred on the recommendation that one of the new gynecological operating rooms or wards be named after Dr. Polk; all recommendations for new appointments and promotions were referred to the Conference Committee; the resignation of Dr. T. Homer Coffen as Assistant Physician to Out Patients on the Second Division was accepted; reappointments for the year 1913 were approved.

The minutes of the meeting of the Medical Board of Harlem Hospital held on December 27, were presented.

No action was taken upon the recommendation that an assistant be appointed in the radiographic department to do type-writing and other work, inasmuch as no funds are available in the 1913 Budget for this purpose; the appointment of two additional internes was approved.

A motion to adjourn the meeting was seconded and carried.

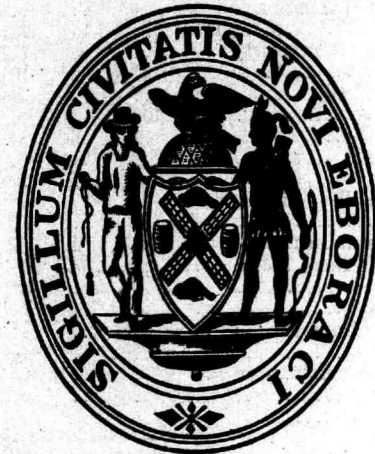

NOTICE TO BIDDERS AT SALES OF OLD BUILDINGS, ETC.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances between the time of the sale thereof and the time of delivering possession to the purchaser, after being properly vacated of all tenants. The sale and delivery to purchaser will be made as nearly together as the circumstance of vacating the structures of their tenants will permit.

All the material of the buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains, and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street, and the opening of the main sewer in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all person interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement, to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
