MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

Minutes of Meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of New York, Held Wednesday, March 29, 1916, at 10:30 o'clock A. M.

Present—Dr. Henry Moskowitz, President; Darwin R. James, Jr., and Alexander Keogh, Commissioners.

The President presided. A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the Municipal Civil Service classification by including in the Labor Class, Part 3, the following: Tailor; Cutter; Painter. There were no appearances.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the Municipal Civil Service classification (requested by the General Medical Superintendent of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, in a communication dated March 22), by including in the Non-competitive Class, under the heading "Positions in the Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, at compensations not exceeding the amounts set forth below," under the sub-heading "Without Maintenance," the title "Senior Hospital Artisan, \$780 per annum," and under the sub-heading "With Maintenance," the title "Senior Hospital Artisan, \$540 per annum." Dr. George O'Hanlon, General Medical Superintendent of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, appeared in favor of the proposed amendment. There were no other appearances and the Chair declared the hearing closed.

A report dated March 22 was presented from the Acting Chief Examiner; also a report dated March 22 from Miss Upshaw, Assistant Chief Examiner, relative to Samuel M. Kurtz and Henry A. Riebeschl, candidates nominated by the Commissioner of Public Charities for non-competitive examination for appointment as Laboratory Assistants in the Pathological Laboratories under clause 3 of Rule XII, who failed therein. After consideration of the matter, the Commission directed that Henry A. Riebeschl be given a rating of seventy per cent. both on his mental examination and on his experience, he being a graduate of the Brooklyn College of Pharmacy and his work as a drug clerk being at least the equivalent of the two and one-half months pathological experience which he appeared to have lacked to qualify him for non-competitive appointment, and that Samuel B. Kurtz be instructed to submit a new blank giving a full account of his experience, it appearing that he had not stated his experience fully in the original blank.

A report dated March 25 was presented from the Acting Chief Examiner transmitting the request of the Commissioner of the Department of Licenses that the examination for promotion to Clerk, Second Grade, in his department be deferred until after April 7, 1916, for the reason that but one Clerk was eligible for the examination, while on April 7 two more would become eligible. The Secretary was instructed to inform the Commissioner of Licenses that the examination would not be held until after April 7 and to request that the applications of the clerks referred to be filed at once.

A report dated March 25 was presented from the Acting Chief Examiner, transmitting an anonymous communication to the effect that candidates in the examination for change of title from Laborer to Auto Truck Driver in the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity should be given an eyesight test. The Commission disapproved the recommendation of the Acting Chief Examiner that all candidates be summoned for a physical examination who had been given examinations for change of title to Auto Truck Driver and who had not been appointed, and approved his recommendation that in future when requests are received for transfers in the Labor Class, if the position to which transfer is sought appears to be in a different physical group from that in which the candidate is employed or if the physical examination is different, a qualifying physical examination be given before a certificate of transfer is issued by the Commission.

Upon the recommendation of the Advisory Board in a report dated March 27, it was

Resolved, that the Secretary be and he hereby is instructed to proceed with an open competitive examination for the position of Laboratory Assistant (Bacteriological Laboratory).

Upon the recommendation of the Advisory Board in the same report, the following form of advertisement for the examination for Laboratory Assistant (Bacteriological Laboratory) was approved:

The subjects and weights of the examination are: Duties, 6; 70% required. Experience, 4; 70% general average required.

A qualifying physical examination will precede the mental.

Applications for this examination must be filed on a special blank, Form B. Candidate should have some acquaintance with the routine work of Bacteriological Laboratories and be familiar with the making of slides, preparation of vaccines, the preparation of media and the care of various laboratory equipment. Previous employment in similar laboratories or evidences of academic training along such lines will be required.

Candidates must be at least 18 years of age on the closing date for the receipt of applications.

The usual salary is \$600 per annum. Vacancies occur frequently in the Department of Health.

The requirement of paragraph 12 of Rule VII, that no person who has entered any examination for appointment to a competitive position and failed, or who has withdrawn from an examination, shall be admitted within nine months from the date of such examination to a new examination for the same position, is waived for this examination.

The term of the eligibility of the list resulting from this examination is fixed at not less than one year nor more than four years.

A qualifying physical examination will be given. Candidates failing to qualify in the physical examination will not be summoned for the mental examination.

Applications for this examination are to be filed on a special blank, Form C.

Requirements: Candidates must have had at least three years' experience as mechanics in general automobile repair work.

Duties: The duties of Garage Foreman are to take full charge of the floor and shops of the garage; to direct the work of repairing automobiles and to supervise the work of the garage mechanics and chauffeurs.

There is one vacancy in the Department of Bridges. Compensation, \$1,380 per annum.

Candidates must be at least 21 years of age on the closing date for the receipt of applications.

The term of the eligibility of the list resulting from this examination is fixed at not less than one year nor more than four years.

Forester.

Applicants must be citizens of the United States and residents of the State of New York.

The subjects and weights of the examination are: Experience, 5; 70% required. Technical, 5; 75% required.

A qualifying physical examination will be given. Candidates failing to pass the physical test will not be summoned for the mental test.

Applications for this examination must be filed on a special blank, Form C.

Duties: The duties of a Forester are to plan and supervise the work of planting, pruning, spraying and protecting trees and plants in public parks and streets.

Requirements: Candidates must present evidence of at least two years' experience in the practice of forestry and of such training in forestry as is evidenced by a degree granted on the completion of a standard course of instruction in a forestry school of recognized standing, or training recognized by the Commission as equivalent thereto.

Candidates must be at least 21 years of age on the closing date for the receipt of applications.

The salary is \$2,280 per annum, and there is one vacancy in the Department of Parks, Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond.

The term of the eligibility of the list resulting from this examination is fixed at not less than one year nor more than four years.

Upon the recommendation of the Examiner in Charge of the Bureau of Investigation in a report dated March 24, the Secretary was instructed to mark Marcel Rion and Joseph W. Hornbuckle, candidates in the examination for Carriage-body Maker, Fire Department, "Qualified," and, on motion, it was

Resolved, That the eligible list of Carriage-body Maker, Fire Department, be and the same hereby is promulgated, effective as of April 1, 1916.

DUTIES.

The present duties of this position are: (1) to supervise (under the direction of the Director of the Bureau of Contract Supervision) the force engaged in carrying to completion the preparation of standard specifications governing the purchase of all classes of supplies and materials by the City of New York, and in currently revising specifications already adopted; and (2) to assist in developing plans for centralizing the purchase, distribution and control of all supplies for the City of New York.

FRANCHISE MATTERS.

PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION, April 17, 1916.
To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York:

The Public Service Commission for the First District herewith transmits for the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment the following certificates to Hudson and Manhattan Railroad Company:

Form of certificate modifying the certificate of May 4, 1909, for extension to the Grand Central Station.

Form of certificate modifying the certificate of February 2, 1905, to New York and Jersey Railroad Company for Thirty-third Street Extension.

Form of certificate modifying the certificate of November 24, 1903, for Cortlandt and Fulton street tunnels.

The situation in respect of these modifications is as follows:

Extension to Grand Central Station—Under date of May 4, 1909, the Commission granted a certificate to Hudson and Manhattan Railroad Company authorizing it to extend its line from its then authorized terminus at 6th avenue and 33d street under 6th avenue, Bryant Park and 42d street to a terminal station between Vanderbilt and Lexington avenues. The Railroad Company secured the necessary consents and approvals, but did not begin the construction of the line within the period prescribed by the certificate. The Railroad Company some time ago applied for an extension of two years, but the matter of a long extension was held in abeyance pending the development of the plans for certain of the municipal railroads to be operated under contracts Nos. 3 and 4 so that the precise effect of their construction upon the Hudson and Manhattan Line and vice versa could more definitely be ascertained. In lieu of the long extension applied for by the Company short extensions of time have been granted by the Commission and the time of the Railroad Company to begin construction now expires on May 1, 1916.

The construction of the Hudson and Manhattan Line affects and is affected by the construction of the City's Broadway Line at the intersection of Broadway, 6th avenue and 33d street and the construction of the City's Steinway Tunnel Line in 42d st. In order to safeguard the Broadway Line against the future construction of a subway under it at the 33d street intersection, a special floor design was developed whereby the floor of the City subway would also act as the roof of the future subway. This would require the extension of the third track in the Thirty-third street station a short distance further north than would otherwise be necessary and some changes in levels.

The plans for the Steinway Tunnel Line have not been developed to a point where a precise location can now be given for the Hudson and Manhattan Line in 42d street. The certificate of May 4, 1909, provides "The tunnels of the Railroad, but not including the stations thereof, where the same shall be in 42d street shall be located south of the center line of said street unless the Commission shall expressly authorize the location of the tunnels elsewhere in the said street." The certificate also locates the terminal station in 42d street between Vanderbilt and Lexington avenues. Both these locations are apt to conflict with the location of the Steinway Tunnel Line and one of the provisions of the proposed certificate is to place control of the entire situation in the Commission so that it may precisely locate the portion of the Hudson and Manhattan Line in 42d street so as to accommodate it to the location of the Steinway Tunnel.

Following the development of the special floor design for the Broadway Line at the 33d street intersection, application was made to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for an appropriation to meet the increased expense due to the adoption of such a design which was estimated at Seventy-five Thousand Dollars (\$75,000). This matter was before the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for some time and after several conferences between the representatives of the Commission and the Comptroller and the President of the Board of Aldermen an understanding was reached that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment would appropriate the amount requisitioned for the special floor design, but the Hudson and Manhattan Railroad Company should agree to reimburse the City for this expenditure if it extended its line and should generally agree to such relocation of its line as might be necessary to accommodate it to the construction of the City railroads, and that if these conditions were complied that an extension of two years to begin construction might be granted.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment appropriated the sum of Seventy-five Thousand Dollars (\$75,000) for the special floor design at the 33d street intersection and the proposed certificate carries out the rest of the understanding. The amount to be repaid by the Hudson and Manhattan Company to the City when the Company begins the construction of its line is Seventy-five Thousand Dollars (\$75,000) with interest at six per centum (6%) per annum from the first day of June, 1916. By this modifying certificate the certificate of May 4, 1909, is further revised so as to include provisions for the responsibility of the Hudson and Manhattan Company for any damages that may be caused by it to the City rapid transit railroads. The extension of time proposed to be granted by this modifying certificate is up to and including the first day of March, 1918.

Thirty-third Street Extension—The certificate of February 2, 1905, to New York and Jersey Railroad Company (of which the Hudson and Manhattan Railroad Company is the successor) authorized the construction of a railroad from the intersection of Greenwich, West 10th and Christopher streets in the Borough of Manhattan under Christopher street to 6th avenue, thence with one branch under 6th avenue to a terminal station at or near the intersection of 6th avenue and 33d street, and with another branch crossing diagonally under 6th avenue to 9th street, and thence easterly under 9th street to a terminal station at or near the intersection of 4th avenue and 9th street. The 6th avenue branch provided for in such certificate has been constructed and put in operation, but the construction of the 9th street Branch has never been begun. Under the certificate as heretofore modified the time of the Company to construct the 9th street Branch begins to run from the time the Commission establishes certain levels. These levels have not been established.

Under the certificate of February 2, 1905, the City has the right to recapture either the 6th avenue Branch or the 9th street Branch or both after the expiration of twenty-five years from the date of beginning operation of any part upon paying an amount, based upon cost, to be ascertained as provided in the certificate. As a basis for this ascertainment the certificate provides that within a certain period after the completion of the 6th avenue Branch and the 9th street Branch the Company should file a statement of cost which, if agreed upon, should be the amount to be paid by the City upon recapture, and if not agreed upon the cost should be determined by arbitration. It seems advisable that this statement of cost of the 6th avenue Branch which is constructed and in operation should be furnished while the facts in regard to its construction are comparatively fresh in the minds of those connected with the work, and when evidence, documentary and otherwise, in regard thereto can be secured, and that this examination should not be deferred on account of the 9th street Branch, the construction of which is problematical. The second of the proposed certificates modifies the certificate of February 2, 1905, so as to provide that the statements of cost of the 6th avenue Branch shall be submitted by the Hudson and Manhattan Company within ninety days after the Commission shall notify it in writing to present such statement.

Cortlandt and Fulton Street Tunnels—Under date of November 24, 1903, the former Rapid Transit Board authorized the Hudson and Manhattan Company to construct the portion of the Cortlandt and Fulton street tunnels within the State of New York. In connection with the authorization of the terminal station the Company was authorized to construct a passageway

for foot passengers under Dey street from the terminal station to a connection with the present rapid transit railroad in Broadway. This passageway was never constructed and the purpose which it was intended to serve will be met by the construction of the new City subway in Church street. Although the time of the Hudson and Manhattan Company to construct this passageway has expired and the Commission by following the procedure set forth in the certificate, i. e., giving three months' notice, might declare the authorization in respect thereto vacated, it would seem to be preferable to eliminate the provision for this passageway by agreement. This is the province of the third of the modifying agreements transmitted herewith which provides for eliminating from the certificate of November 24, 1903, the provision for the construction of the Dey Street passageway.

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby consents to certain modifications in the terms and conditions of the said contract of June 15, 1915, such modified terms and conditions being fully set forth and described in the following form of proposed contract for the grant thereof, embodying such terms and conditions as modify or alter said contract of June 15, 1915, which said contract otherwise remains unchanged as to all the other terms and conditions expressed therein, and

that the Mayor of The City of New York be and he hereby is authorized to execute and deliver such contract in the name and on behalf of The City of New York, as follows, to wit:

PROPOSED FORM OF CONTRACT.

This contract, made and executed in duplicate this day of , 1916, by and between The City of New York (hereinafter called the City), party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City (hereinafter called the Board), and the FAR ROCKAWAY TRANSPORTATION COMPANY, INC. (hereinafter called the Company), party of the second part, WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, By contract dated June 15, 1915, the City granted to the Company the right and privilege to maintain and operate stage or omnibus routes, for public use, on three routes in the Borough of Queens in the City of New York; and

WHEREAS, the Company has, by a petition dated January 20, 1916, applied to the Board for an amendment of said contract by being relieved from operating all or some of its routes during certain months of the year;

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained, the parties hereto do hereby covenant and agree as follows:

SECTION 1. The parties hereto hereby consent, subject to the provisions and conditions hereinafter set forth, to certain modifications and amendments in and to the said contract of June 15, 1915, such modifications and amendments to be as follows:

1. So much of Section 2, First, of said contract of June 15, 1915, reading as follows:

"Such right and privilege shall be valued as if the Company had not exercised the same for the said period of ten (10) years, and no allowance shall be made to the Company in such valuation by reason of such exercise."

is hereby stricken out.

2. So much of Section 2, Second, of said contract of June 15, 1915, reading as follows:

(b) "During the succeeding term of four (4) years, an annual sum which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, but which sum shall not be less than Fifteen Hundred Dollars (\$1,500)."

"During the remaining term of five (5) years, an annual sum which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, but which sum shall not be less than Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000)."

"The gross annual receipts mentioned above shall be the gross receipts of the Company from all sources within the limits of the City, and for the purpose of determining such gross annual receipts, the Company shall keep accurate accounts of all fares collected within the limits of the City."

is hereby stricken out, and the following substituted therefor:

(b) "During the succeeding term of four (4) years, an annual sum which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, but which sum shall not be less than Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000)."

"During the remaining term of five (5) years, an annual sum which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, but which shall not be less than Two Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$2,500)."

"The gross annual receipts mentioned above shall be the gross receipts of the Company from all sources within the limits of the City, and for the purpose of determining such gross annual receipts, the Company shall keep accurate accounts of all fares collected for rides within the limits of the City."

3. So much of Section 2, Fifth, of said contract of June 15, 1915, reading as follows:

"At the termination or forfeiture of this grant, the City, at the election of the Board, shall have the right to purchase all or any part of the property of the Company used for the purpose of the operation of the stage or omnibus system hereby authorized, at a sum equal to a fair valuation of such property, exclusive of any value which such property may have by reason of this contract."

"If the Company and the City cannot agree upon a fair valuation of such property, then the valuation thereof shall be determined and fixed by three arbitrators selected in the following manner."

is hereby stricken out, and the following substituted therefor:

"At the termination or forfeiture of this grant, the City, at the election of the Board, shall have the right to purchase all or any part of the property of the Company used for the purpose of the operation of the stage or omnibus system hereby authorized, at a sum equal to a fair valuation of such property and plant, exclusive of any value which such property and plant may have by reason of this contract. Such property and plant are to be valued as if the Company had not exercised the right and privilege granted by this franchise for the said period of ten (10) years, and no allowance shall be made to the Company in such valuation by reason of such exercise."

"If the Company and the City cannot agree upon a fair valuation of such property and plant, then the valuation thereof shall be determined and fixed by three arbitrators selected in the following manner."

4. All of Section 2, Nineteenth, of said contract of June 15, 1915, is hereby stricken out, and the following substituted therefor:

"Nineteenth: The rate of fare for a passenger upon any stage or omnibus route herein authorized shall not exceed ten cents (10c.), and the Company shall not charge any passenger more than ten cents (10c.) for one continuous ride from any point on any of the stage or omnibus routes hereby authorized to any other point on any of said routes. If vehicles are operated between any point on such routes and any point outside of the limits of the City, then a separate fare shall be collected for each ride within the City limits."

5. All of Section 2, Twentieth, of said contract of June 15, 1915, is hereby stricken out, and the following substituted therefor:

"Twentieth: Stages or omnibuses shall be run on said routes on each day, as required under the terms of this contract, at intervals of not more than thirty (30) minutes during the period between six o'clock a. m. and twelve o'clock midnight, and as much oftener as reasonable convenience of the public may require, or as may be directed by resolution of the Board; and stages or omnibuses shall be operated on such routes and at such intervals between the hours of twelve o'clock midnight and six o'clock a. m. as reasonable convenience of the public may require, or as may be directed by resolution of the Board."

6. Section 2 of said contract of June 15, 1915, is hereby further amended by adding at the end thereof the following additional clause numbered thirty-fourth:

"Thirty-fourth: The company shall operate its vehicles on all of the routes herein authorized from June 15, 1916, to October 1, 1916, inclusive, and shall operate its vehicles on such routes from May 28 to October 1, inclusive, each succeeding year during the remaining term of this contract. The Board, however, expressly reserves the right to and may in its own discretion, by resolution, at any time during the term of this contract, order and direct the Company to operate its vehicles on any or all of said routes or any part thereof during

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the day of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials of labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against any or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furnishings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be taken down permanently self-supporting, beam holes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the Contractor.

No buildings, parts of buildings, fixtures or machinery sold for removal under these terms and conditions shall in any case be re-located or re-erected within the lines of any proposed street or other public improvement, and if any such buildings, parts of buildings, fixtures or machinery, etc., shall be re-located or re-erected within the lines of any proposed street or other public improvement, title thereto shall thereupon be vested in The City of New York and a resale at public or private sale may be made in the same manner as if no prior sale thereof had been made.

The Comptroller of The City of New York reserves the right on the day of sale to withdraw from sale any of the buildings, parts of buildings and machinery included therein, or to reject any and all bids; and be it further

Resolved, That while the said sale is held under the supervision of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller is authorized to cause the sale to be advertised and to direct the sale thereof as financial officer of the City.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation of the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
