

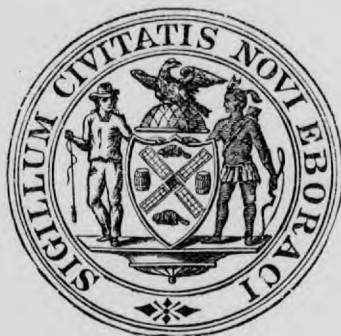

DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At a meeting of the Board of Docks of the City of New York, held at the office of the Board, Pier "A," Battery place, Thursday, January 22, 1891.

Present—President Post.

Commissioner Cram.

Absent—Commissioner Matthews.

The minutes of the meetings held the 13th and 15th instant were read and approved.

Stephen A. Walker, attorney in fact of the owners of wharf property between Twenty-fifth and Twenty-sixth streets, North river, appeared before the Board respecting the preambles and resolution adopted December 11, 1890, and requested that the time to comply with the terms of said resolution be further extended until February 5, 1891.

On motion, request granted, and the attorney notified to submit a written proposition for the lease of the bulkhead.

H. L. Herbert appeared respecting the proposed building of a pier foot of Twentieth street, East river.

President Post, to whom was referred, on the 15th instant, the matter of building the proposed new pier, foot of Twentieth street, East river, in accordance with the unanimous resolution adopted November 13, 1890, reported that, in his opinion, action thereon should be deferred, for the reason that there is no urgent necessity at the present time for a pier being built thereat; which report was approved and accepted, and the work of building said pier postponed. The Secretary directed to notify the Engineer-in-Chief.

Commissioner Cram gave notice that at the next meeting of the Board he would offer for adoption a resolution providing for the building of a pier by the force of the Department by day's work, at the foot of Twenty-fifth street, East river.

On motion of Commissioner Cram, the Secretary was directed to request the Department of Street Cleaning to remove their dumping-board now located on Pier 44 to the Pier foot of Jackson street, East river.

The following communications were received, read, and,

Upon motion, tabled:

From the National Line of Steamships, lessees of Pier, new 39, North river—In reference to the extension of said pier out to the pier-head line of 1890, and desiring to be informed upon what terms a renewal of their present lease can be obtained. Referred to the President to examine and report as to the power of the Board to cancel the existing lease of said pier and in lieu thereof grant said company a new lease for a term of fifteen years, the lease to commence at the time of the completion of the proposed addition or extension to said pier.

From Dock Master Coye—Respecting the complaint of the New England Terminal Company that canal boats are obstructing the slip between Piers 44 and 45, East river. Referred to the President with power.

The following communications were received, read, and

On motion, ordered to be placed on file, viz.:

From the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund—Advising the Department that at a meeting of said Board held December 11, 1890, the Comptroller was authorized to prepare and issue Dock Bonds to the amount of one million dollars for the uses and purposes of the Department of Docks.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to spread the preambles and resolution in full on the minutes as follows:

Whereas, The Board of Commissioners of Docks adopted a resolution on November 26, requesting this Board to authorize the issue of one million dollars Dock Bonds for the uses and purposes of the Department of Docks; and

Whereas, A requisition was made by the Department of Docks for the issue of bonds to the amount of three million dollars (\$3,000,000), under a resolution adopted March 20, 1890, of which bonds for two million dollars (\$2,000,000) were authorized April 23, 1890, to be issued;

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 143 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, the Comptroller be and he is hereby authorized and directed to prepare and issue, from time to time, as may be required, for the uses and purposes of the Department of Docks, at a rate of interest not exceeding three per cent. per annum, Dock Bonds of the City of New York, to the amount of one million dollars (\$1,000,000), under a resolution adopted March 20, 1890, by the Commissioners of Docks, making requisition for the issue of bonds for three million dollars, said bonds to be exempt from taxation by the City and County of New York, in pursuance of provisions of section 137 of said Consolidation Act, and an ordinance of the Common Council passed October 2, 1880, and as hereby authorized and directed.

From the Finance Department:

1st. Requesting the Department to notify the owners of the bulkhead at One Hundred and Twentieth street, East river, to repair the same before the renewal of the lease thereof by the Department of Public Charities and Correction. The action of the President in replying thereto approved.

2d. Returning the proposal of the Atlantic Dredging Company for dredging between Piers 10 and 12, East river, under Contract No. 363, with the approval of the adequacy and sufficiency of the sureties thereto.

From the Department of Street Cleaning—Relative to the sinking of their scow at One Hundred and Ninth street, Harlem river.

From the Counsel to the Corporation—Approving specifications and form of contract for building a new pier on the site of Pier 43, East river.

From D. C. Newell & Sons—Requesting permission to construct a bridge or platform on piers, between Eighteenth and Twentieth streets, North river. Referred to the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report.

From Thomas P. Wicks, attorney for Charles B. Hillhouse—Requesting a hearing before any license or consent is granted by the Board to E. M. Van Tassel, lessee of the bulkhead near the foot of West Eleventh street, North river.

From the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company—Requesting information as to the repairs ordered to Pier 52, East river. The action of the Secretary in replying thereto approved.

From the Pennsylvania Railroad Company—Requesting permission to repair Piers 4 and 5, North river. The action of the President in issuing permits approved.

From D. V. Swanson, on behalf of the owners of Piers 10, 11 and 12, East river—Requesting to be informed to whom, and at what price, the contract for dredging thereat was awarded. The action of the Secretary in complying with said request approved.

From Dock Master Woods—Reporting the sinking of the canal boat "J. W. Morey," loaded with coal, at the bulkhead between Fiftieth and Fifty-first streets, North river, and stating that he had notified the owners to remove.

From Dock Master Kenney—Reporting that he had served notices on John Dorschell and Frederick Gagus to remove bath and boat-houses from the bulkhead between Eighty-first and Eighty-second streets, North river.

From Dock Master Ryan—Reporting that Pier 48, East river, requires cleaning. Request the Department of Street Cleaning to clean.

From the City Chamberlain—Requesting information respecting the purchase of wharf property from James Cruikshank and others, in the vicinity of Barclay Street Ferry and Vesey street, North river. The action of the President in replying thereto approved.

From E. A. Cruikshank & Co.—Desiring permission to rebuild the bulkhead for a distance of one hundred feet between Ninety-third and Ninety-fourth streets, East river. Permit granted.

From Oliver Bryan—As to the necessity of a pier foot of One Hundred and Fourteenth street, Harlem river, and requesting the removal of the fence erected across said street by John Dwight. Advise that the matter of building the proposed pier has been referred to the Engineer-in-Chief who has not as yet submitted his report; also state that if the fence referred to should be removed, the premises would become as formerly a dumping-ground and a nuisance. Request Mr. Bryan to name his objections to the said fence being allowed to remain.

From the Board of Engineers, Army Building—Enclosing copy of their report of December 23, 1890, recommending harbor lines for the East river, and stating that the maps as approved by the Secretary of War will be forwarded to the Department. The action of the Secretary in acknowledging receipt approved.

From the Homer Ramsdell Transportation Company, lessees—Requesting permission to sheath Pier, new 24, North river. Permit granted.

From T. & A. Walsh—Requesting a five years lease of the land under water between Ninety-ninth and One Hundredth streets, East river, for the purpose of establishing a timber basin thereat. Whereupon, on motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That license and consent be and hereby is granted to T. & A. Walsh to use and occupy during the will of the Board the land under water belonging to the City, in front of the northerly half of the block between Ninety-ninth and One Hundredth streets, East river, for the purpose of establishing a timber basin thereat, provided they agree to pay for the use of said land under water compensation at a rate to be fixed by the Treasurer of this Department.

From the Old Dominion Steamship Company—Accepting the terms and conditions of the resolution adopted January 8, 1891, authorizing the extension of Pier, new 26, North river.

On motion, the Engineer-in-Chief was directed to prepare plans, specifications and form of contract, for extending said pier out to the pier-head line of 1890.

From the Engineer-in-Chief:

1st. Report for the week ending January 17, 1891.

2d. Reporting that he had suspended Laborer Thomas Molloy and Dock Builder James Halton, and recommending that they be discharged.

On motion, said Thomas Molloy and James Halton were discharged.

3d. Reporting damage to the canal boat "W. H. Timmants" by the tug "Manhattan." The Treasurer authorized to settle said claim for damages for the sum of fifteen dollars, as recommended by the Engineer-in-Chief.

4th. Recommending that a portable fence seven feet high be placed at the outer end of Pier "A" for use during cold weather. Recommendation adopted.

5th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 10611, in relation to the report of Dock Master Martin as to the dredging required foot of Eighty-sixth street, East river. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to make requisition for dredging thereat as recommended in his report.

6th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 10582, transmitting a report relative to the proposed park at Rutgers Slip, East river. Send copy of said report to the Board of Street Opening and Improvement.

7th. Reporting the suspension of Laborer George Ballard, and recommending that he be discharged in consequence of the vile and abusive language he had used to other employees of the Department as more particularly set forth in the accompanying affidavits. Notify Frederick J. Boller, Assistant Engineer, together with the individuals who made the affidavits in said case, to appear before the Board Thursday, the 29th instant, at 11 o'clock A.M.; the said George Ballard being present, he was ordered to appear with his witnesses at the same hour and place, and the Secretary directed to transmit to him copies of the affidavits.

The application of Woodrow & Lewis, auctioneers, for permission to store about three hundred tons of wool in bales in front of New West Washington Market, was, upon motion, denied.

TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act: When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.
