

REGULATIONS ESTABLISHING A SCALE OF WATER RENTS AND RULES GOVERNING THE USE OF WATER, FOR THE CITY OF NEW YORK, BY ORDER OF JOHN NEWTON, COM-MISSIONER OF PUBLIC WORKS.

UNDER CHAPTER 410, LAWS 1882, SECTIONS 350, 357, 352 and 353, and as amended by chapter 559, Laws 1887, as follows:

 SODA, MINERAL WATER and ROOT BEER FOUNTAINS shall be charged five dollars per annum each.

The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and un-warrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this ob-ject can only be accomplished by enforcing , ayment for the water wasted. Under the law all charges for water supplied througn meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises re-sponsible for the amount of water used or wasted. Notice is therefore r. Iven to all householders that, in all further applications for reduction of waste of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occu-pants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have o curred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings. Mouse-owners are further notified that whenever their premises become wacant, and are likely to reman vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that uests this requirement is complied with no deductions in extra water rents will be allowed for any portion of one year.
