

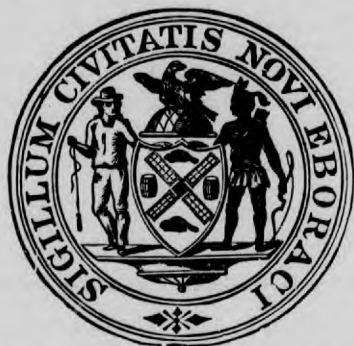

NEW YORK, January 21, 1879.

The Board of Health met this day.

Reports Received.

Resolved, That the Sanitary Superintendent be directed to cause an examination to be made early in the mornings of the air in sleeping rooms of tenement and lodging-houses, and of the air in public schools, while occupied by pupils, with particular reference to the quantity of carbonic acid gas.

Resolved, That the application of John C. May for permit to conduct the business of removing night-soil from privies, sinks, etc., be and is hereby denied.

Resolved, That notice in premises 249 Lexington avenue be and is hereby suspended until March 1, 1879.

Resolved, That a copy of the report of Assistant Sanitary Inspector Murtha, upon the filthy condition of Monroe street, between Catharine street and Market street, be forwarded to the Police Department for the necessary action.

Resolved, That the chiefs of the several bureaux prepare, without delay, for publication, their reports for the years 1876, 1877, and 1878, and transmit them to the Secretary of the Board.

Resolved, That no special permits be granted by the Sanitary Superintendents for driving cattle in the streets during the day time.

Resolved, That the plan of tenement-house on west side of Seventh avenue, near Fiftieth street, submitted by W. F. Mott of 83 Irving place, be and is hereby approved.

Resolved, That the explanation of cause of delay in forwarding certain death certificates made by Dr. J. N. MacKensie, Bellevue Hospital, and Dr. C. R. Eastabrook, Charity Hospital, be and is hereby accepted.

Resolved, That marriage certificates of the years 1869, 1870, and 1871 and 1872, forwarded to this Board by J. Prachensky, Chaplain of Ward Island, for registration be and are hereby rejected as they antedate the organization of the Board.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending January 18, 1879:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,469, as follows, viz.: 3 public buildings, 805 tenement-houses, 112 private dwellings, 61 other dwellings, 9 manufactories and workshops, 12 stores and warehouses, 39 stables, 41 slaughter-houses, 7 lodging-houses, 1 fertilizing works, 6 fat-rendering establishments, 1 lime kiln, 1 garbage dump, 10 manure dumps, 1 slip, 20 sunken and vacant lots, 2 smoke-houses, 1 lard-melting establishment, 25 yards, courts, and areas, 32 cellars and basements, 96 waste-pipes and drains, 65 privies and water-closets, 8 street-gutters and sinks, 3 dangerous stairways, 1 smoky chimney, 1 cesspool, 24 other nuisances, together with 82 visits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 362.

During the past week 83 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 67 vessels to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

33 permits were granted to scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 156 dwellings where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 133 houses, 133 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 558 births, 41 still-births, 145 marriages, and 632 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, January 18, 1879, this shows an increase of 8 births, and 63 deaths, and a decrease of 18 marriages and 1 still-birth, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1878, there was a decrease of 22 births and an increase of 10 still-births; 14 marriages, and 143 deaths, compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from croup decreased 7; puerperal diseases, 2; diarrhoeal diseases, 3; inanition 2; alcoholism, 3; heart diseases, 2; aneurism, 2; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 1; meningitis and encephalitis, 3; cyanosis and atelectasis, 4; premature and pretermatural births, 2; while the deaths from scarlatina increased 14; erysipelas, 6; cerebro-spinal fever, 3; malarial fevers, 4; cancer, 1; phthisis pulmonalis, 4; bronchitis, 14; pneumonia, 14; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 6; convulsions, 16; apoplexy, 5; diseases of the brain and nervous system, 17; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 2; enteritis, gastritis and peritonitis, 3; Bright's disease and nephritis, 1; and deaths by suicides, 3.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

The ages of 108 of the persons who died during the week were reported to be under one year; 161 under two years; 243 under five years, and 63, seventy years and over, which shows that the deaths of children under five years of age was 31 less than the number reported during last week, and represent 38.45 per cent. of the total weekly mortality.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 88 were in institutions, 334 in tenement-houses, 198 in houses containing 3 families or less, 9 in hotels and boarding-houses, 3 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 10 were on the basement floor, 132 on the first, 189 on the second, 120 on the third, 64 on the fourth, 24 on the fifth, 1 on the sixth. 631 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 1 non-resident. 80 were stated to be single, 169 married, 83 widowed, and the condition of 300 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 632; still-births, 41; bodies in transitu, 11; of the total burial permits issued for city deaths and still-births, 64 were upon certificates received from the Coroners. 558 births; 145 marriages; 41 still-births; 632 deaths, 11 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated. 38 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 6 transcripts of birth record, 4 of marriage, and 30 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending January 18, 1879, was 26.0 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer 29.989, the mean humidity 81, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind 888, and the total amount of rain-fall was 1.13 inches depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 578 deaths and still-births, or 85.88 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 6; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 247; City (pauper burial ground—undenominational), 65; Greenwood (undenominational), 66; Lutheran (undenominational), 84; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 29; Evergreen (undenominational), 41; Woodlawn (undenominational), 12; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 4; Union (Methodist Protestant), 1; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 6; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 2; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 4; Washington (undenominational), 11.

The distribution of deaths (actual mortality), for the week ending January 11, 1879, was in the following wards, viz.: First, 9; Second, 0; Third, 8; Fourth, 14; Fifth, 9; Sixth, 12; Seventh, 23; Eighth, 13; Ninth, 26; Tenth, 17; Eleventh, 32; Twelfth, 35; Thirteenth, 19; Fourteenth, 10; Fifteenth, 13; Sixteenth, 30; Seventeenth, 46; Eighteenth, 25; Nineteenth, 88; Twentieth, 42; Twenty-first, 38; Twenty-second, 59; Twenty-third, 13; Twenty-fourth, 4.

The actual mortality for the week ending January 11, 1879, was 585; this is 35 more than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1878, and 50.6 more than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 27.88 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,090,909.

The annual death-rate per 1,000 persons living, of the estimated or enumerated population, according to the most recent weekly returns, of Philadelphia was 22.37; Brooklyn, 20.63; St. Louis, 13; Baltimore, 23.08; Boston, 24.81; Cincinnati, 20.48; New Orleans, 30.70; Cleveland, 15.08; Richmond, 20.40; Charleston, 36.11; Dayton, 11.24; Lowell, 25.43; Worcester, 20.85; Cambridge, 17.24; Fall River, 33.33; Lynn, 26.08; Springfield, 16.55. SIR—There were 632 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, January 18, 1879, which is an increase of 63, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 143 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1878. The actual mortality for the week ending January 11, 1879, was 585, which is 50.6 above the average for the corresponding week of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 27.8 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,090,909.
