

ARTICLE 30.—NAUTICAL SCHOOL. SECTION 154. There shall be appointed annually by the President an Executive Committee for the Care, Government, and Management of the Nautical School; said Committee to consist of at least three members.

Section 155. The Nautical School, "for the education and training of pupils in the science and practice of navigation," established by authority of the Act of the Legislature passed April 24, 1873, shall be conducted, until otherwise ordered, on board the ship "St. Marys," loaned to this Board by the government of the United States, for the purposes of a Nautical School.

The officers in charge of said ship, and conducting said Nautical School, shall be designated as follows: Superintendent, Executive Officer, Surgeon, and Instructors, to hold their respective offices during the pleasure of this Board. The Superintendent shall have the charge and control of the school and ship, and be accountable for the

of the school and ship, and be accountable for the management of both, and for the safe keeping of the property entrusted to his care.

The Executive Officer shall, subject to the direc-

tions of the Superintendent, have immediate charge of the crew, and shall be held responsible for the cleanliness and good order of the ship; he shall also instruct in the professional branches.

The Surgeon shall examine all candidates for admission to the school, have the care of the sick, and surgest to the Superintendent and the Care

and suggest to the Superintendent and the Committee such sanitary measures as he may at any time deem advisable for the health of the pupils and crew; he shall also act as Instructor of the pupils in the prescribed studies, etc., whenever required so to do.

The Instructors shall perform, under the direction of the Superintendent, such duties in this capacity as the dicipline of the school may require.

The crew employed for the ship shall not exd in number twenty o all rates, who shall. subject to the directions of the Executive Commit-tee on Nautical Schools, be under the immediate control of the Superintendent of the Nautical

SECTION 156. The Executive Committee on Nautical School shall have power to appoint, subject to the authority of the Board of Education, the officers named in section 155 of these By-Laws, and any others requisite to properly conduct said Nautical School, whose compensation shall be fixed by this Board; and shall also have power to ship the crew of the vessel in which the Nautical School is or may be conducted, not to exceed in number twenty men (20) of all "rates," at an average expense for said crew not exceeding the sum of six hundred and fifty dollars per month in the aggregate.

Said committee shall cause to be furnished, subject to the rules of this Board, all suitable supplies, food, fuel, etc., for the use of the pupils of said school and the crew of the ship; and the "books, apparatus, stationery, and other things necessary or expedient to enable said school to be properly

and successfully conducted." The books, maps, stationery, etc., for the pupils, and the fuel, shall be obtained through the Depository and the Committee on Supplies on the orders of the Superintendent of the school, countersigned by the Chairman of the Executive Committee. The bills and monthly pay-rolls incurred in accordance with the By-Laws and rules of this Board shall be paid on the approval of the committee.

The Executive Committee on Nautical School may obtain by purchase such tackle, chains, boats, sails, or other material needed for the vessel upon which the Nautical needed for the vessel upon which the Nautical-School is or may be conducted, and may cause all necessary repairs to be made when the cost of such material or repairs shall not exceed at any one time the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200).

SECTION 158. The Rules for the admission of boys shall be as follows:

RULES FOR THE ADMISSION OF BOYS.

RULES FOR THE ADMISSION OF BOYS.

1. Applications for admission into the New York Nautical School, on board the ship St. Mary's, may be made by parents or guardians of boys, or the boys themselves, in person or by letter, to the Chairman of the Executive Committee on Nautical School of the Board of Education, No. 146 Grand street, New York City.

2. All applicants should be at least fifteen years of age; should have the written consent of their parents or guardians to their becoming pupils of the school (Form 1); and should produce written testimonials of good character and health, and also satisfactory evidence that they have never been convicted of any crime (Form Two). (See Act of Congress, passed in 1874, "To encourage the establishment of public marine schools.")

3. The Executive Committee, or its duly ap-

3. The Executive Committee, or its duly appointed representatives, being satisfied that the requirements of section 2 have been fulfilled, the applicant will be examined physically. The Examining Surgeon will be careful to recommend none but boys who give promise of good physical development. He will reject any one who has the slightest defect in sight, hearing, or limbs, who is liable to any disease, or who is in any respect constitutionally unfit for the hardships and changes incident to a sea life.

4. Having passed the necessary physical examination, the applicant will be required to show that he is able to spell with a fair degree of accuracy, to read with tolerable correctness and ease, to write legibly, and to answer questions upon the multiplication table.

Natural intelligence and animation will receive their proper weight in cases where the applicants do not appear to have had the benefit of suitable instruction.

instruction.

do not appear to have had the benefit of suitable instruction.

5. If found qualified in all respects, the applicant will receive a permit to report on board the ship (Form 4). Enclosed with the permit will be the originals of the certificates of parents or guardians, and of the report of the Examining Surgeon (Form 3), which papers are to be presented to and will be carefully preserved by the Superintendent.

6. After being received on board the ship the boy will be placed on probation for a period of two weeks, when, if no reason to the contrary shall appear, he will be admitted permanently and entered on the records of the school.

7. After admission each boy will be furnished with the necessary articles of bedding and clothing appropriate to the season, the cost of which he will be required to defray; and such of his old clothing as is not suitable for ship's wear will be given to him to send home, if possible; otherwise it will be retained and given to him upon his first vacation, or upon his final leaving of the school. All articles belonging to scholars will be marked with the owner's name.

8. The boys will be carefully instructed, under the direction of the Superintendent of the school.

8. The boys will be carefully instructed, under the direction of the Superintendent of the school, in reading, spelling, writing, arithmetic, geography, and English grammar, and in all the duties of a seaman; they will be examined from time to time, and those who show a lack of aptitude for a sea life, or develop any physical disqualification, will be presented to their parents or guardians for withdrawal from the school.

9. After a sufficient trial the vicious or incorrigibly bad will be peremptorily dismissed.

10. The Course of Instruction will cover a period of two years, during which time every boy will be allowed such vacations as the School Committee may hereafter determine; the general character and progress of the scholar being carefully considered. At the end of the two years' term, every boy who has passed thuough the Course successfully will receive a certificate showing his character and qualifications, which certificate, with such aid as the Committee will always. cate, with such aid as the Committee will always gladly render, will enable him to obtain a suitable position on board a good merchant ship.

11. Boys who have enjoyed the advantages of a good common school education, and who are otherwise sufficiently advanced, will be instructed in practical navigation and in such other branches pertaining to the higher duties of a seaman as may be found necessary and convenient.

SECTION 159. The Course of Instruction in the Nautical School shall be as follows:

School Course.—Reading, writing, spelling, English grammar, geography, and arithmetic.

II. Seamanship.—I. Making all knots, splices, hitches, bends, clinches, etc., used on board ship; worming, parcelling, and serving ropes; turning in dead-eyes, securing lanyards, and rattling down rigging.

Learning the names of all spars, blocks, running and standing rigging, and their uses.
 Learning the names of the different parts of a sail, loosing, furling, reefing and bending sails.
 Rowing, sculling, and steering boats, and handling them under sail.

5. Boxing compass, steering by compass, and taking compass bearings.
6. Marking log and lead lines, heaving the lead, and calling out soundings correctly.
7. Using palm and needle, sewing a seam and working an eyelet-hole.
8. Swimping.

9. The colors and arrangement of running lights.
