Hon. WILLIAM H. WICKHAM,
Mayor, etc.:

SIR—Pursuant to the requirements of section 27 of chapter 335 of the Laws of 1873, this report of the operations and action of the Department, for the quarter ending this date, is respectfully submitted.

The books of annual record of assessments, upon real and personal property, have remained open in this Department, in compliance with the law, since the 11th of January.

The Commissioners are striving assiduously to sift the unpaid assessments upon personal property, so as to reduce to a minimum the loss to be sustained by the city upon such uncollected assessments. This process is fraught with difficulties, some of which are quite insuperable by any means within the control of this Board; but a cordial co-operation on the part of the Bureau for the Collection of Arrears of Personal Taxes is relied upon to supplement the investigations by this Department, from which results in some degree satisfactory may be anticipated.

The Court of Appeals has, within a few days, affirmed the decision of the General Term of the Supreme Court, which held that the action of the Commissioners of Taxes in refusing to deduct the debts due, from the sum which they had fixed as the actual value of the shares of several of the city railroad companies, was in conformity to law.

Pursuant to the provisions of chapter 329 of the Laws of 1874, the assessment list for the third instalment for the opening and widening of Third avenue, in the town of Morrisania, amounting to twenty-one thousand three hundred and eighty-eight dollars and forty-nine cents (\$21,388.49), has been completed, and forwarded to the Finance Department for collection.

POLICE NOTICE.—SEALED PROPOSALS WILL be received at the Central Department of Police, until 10 o'clock, A. M., of the 10th day of April, 1875, at which time and place such proposals will be publicly opened and

read, for the purchase from this Department of Street Sweepings classified as Manure, by the Superintendent of Street Cleaning.

The proposal to state the price per cart-load to be paid to the Department for the Manure. The Manure to be delivered at the Dumps of the Street Cleaning Bureau by the Department. The purchaser to keep proper scows and vessels to carry such manure, at the Dumps at all times, from 7 o'clock A. M. to 6 o'clock P. M., Sundays excepted, sufficient to receive all the manure delivered, and remove the same out of the city daily, and as often as they are filled.

PROPOSALS FOR ASHES AND STREET DIRT.

POLICE NOTICE.—SEALED PROPOSALS WILL be received at the Central Department of Police until 10 o'clock A. M. of the 10th day of April, 1875, at which time and place such proposals will be publicly opened and read, for the purchase from this Department of Ashes and Street Dirt other than manure, collected by the Bureau of Street Cleaning, stating a price per cubic yard, to be measured on the scow.

The Department will deliver the material on scows at any point in the harbor, or on East or North rivers, distant not exceeding fifteen miles from the Battery; but such points of delivery must be safely and conveniently accessible by water of sufficient depth at low tide to float the scows and steam tugs by which they are towed. Payment to be made by the purchaser to the Treasurer of the Board of Police, at such intervals as shall be required by the Department.

The scows are to be unloaded by the purchaser, within the first twelve hours after they arrive at and are towed into the place of delivery.
