CITY PRISON (TOMBS), October 1, 1892.

Quarterly Report of Work Done by Paid and Unpaid Labor ending September 30, 1892.

Painters—Painted windows, doors and closets in office; shed at cellar; windows, skylights, partitions and walls of dining-room in female prison; walls, ceilings and iron railings in office of prison; 8 windows and iron bars and iron doors on cells, first, second, third and fourth tiers, old prison; also wainscoting at stairs from first to fourth tiers of old prison; walls of three cells in boys' prison; two cells in new prison; three storm-houses and wooden fence in yard; calcimined ceilings of two cells and halls in boys' prison; ceilings four rooms in Magdalen; ceilings at entrance to male and female prisons and of laundry and kitchen.

Plumbers—Repaired 12 water-closets in old and new prison, and water-pipes in new prison and cellar; placed 19 faucets in water-pipes in male and female prisons.

Carpenters—Built sky-light on Magdalen and old prison; built sheds at cellar female prison and new prison; repaired storm-house; built partition in Magdalen, new floor in hospital cell and window in carpenter shop.

Masons—Built doorway and window in cell, first tier; plastered two rooms and ceilings in Magdalen; filled in around 290 water-closets in cells of male and female prisons.

Tinsmiths—Placed new bottoms in seven tin boilers for kitchen, made two lamps and reflectors for yard.

Blacksmiths—Repaired range in Magdalen, boiler in kitchen and boilers in cellars; placed wire screens on 4 windows in boys' prison.

Roofers—Repaired roofs Magdalen and storm-house.

SIR—Following please find detailed statement of the amount and description of mechanical and miscellaneous labor performed by the inmates of this institution for the three (3) months ending September 30, ultimo.

Appended will also be found a tabulated statement of the movements of the population of the institution for the quarter, as well as the location and numbers remaining at other institutions at the close of business September 30, 1892.

Carpenters—Built a passengers' waiting room at foot East Seventy-eighth street, 19 feet by 8 feet by 10 feet; erected shed 16 feet by 10 feet and shed 22 feet by 6 feet 6 inches. Put up 1,300 square feet white pine ceiling and 1,300 square feet 2 inches by 3 inches yellow pine flooring, and new casing to ten windows in Male Hospital Ward. Made 400 tallies, 4 doors, 33 tool handles, 78 peels, 28 dough boxes, 2 cutting boards, 1 roller, 1 window frame, 36 feet shelving, 2 seats, 1 box, 6 hand hawks, 1 desk, 2 air-shafts. Laid 400 square feet flooring. Repaired 1 ferryboat, 2 dumb-waiters, 1 floor, 1 ox cart, 1 water-closet, 138 windows, 10 benches, 4 steam horses, 5 tables, 1 chest.

The Carpenters were employed in laying new yellow pine flooring in boat house, new flooring in bath room of Ward 3, in making 6 wheelbarrows, 20 window screens, 3 new bodies for coal carts, new shafts for cart, putting in 26 new sash cords in windows, 8 new locks on doors, new post under gas tank frame, repairing locks and fitting keys in doors and closets, repairing large boat and attending to general small repairs in the wards and sleeping rooms; built a new shed 30 by 40 for storing timber, made new door for basement and put up two partitions in men's dormitory. The following repairs were made to the float at Harlem dock: new flooring and beams, new posts and sides and new gangway.

The Painters have painted gas tank, two boats, the iron work of boilers in kitchen, keepers' dining room, staff doctors' dining room and 5 nurses' sleeping rooms, stained and shellacked floor of House Physician's bedroom, painted, grained and varnished stair-casing in main building and put in 28 new panes of glass.

The Plasterers have lathed and plastered 4 new rooms in men's dormitory and put new ceiling in Medical Superintendent's sleeping room.

The Workhouse male help have been employed as helpers in the kitchen, boiler rooms and gas house, as stablemen and laborers on the farm and in keeping the grounds and roads in order.

The Workhouse women have been at work in the laundry, kitchen, and dining rooms, and at scrubbing and cleaning throughout the building.

Carpenter—New work: Erected a partition in Ward 1, 450 square feet, and plaster partition in Nurses' Dining Room, 180 square feet; made two flights of six steps with platforms for Dormitory 6 and Pavilion A; relaid 60 square feet ash flooring at Infants' Hospital; made closet 2 by 1 by 7 feet high; also glass case for surgical instruments, 2 feet 8 inches wide by 5 feet long, for Ward 16; put up 350 square feet wood partition in Male Workhouse Dormitory for a dining room; made door for same, also 3 clothes-horses and 1 step-ladder; cased and hung door and made sash, 2½ by 3 feet, in Nurses' Dining Room; put up partition 160 square feet, also shelving as compartments for old registers and record boxes; made ladder to roof, 13 feet long, for Ward 18; put up 340 square feet partition, made and put in 2 sashes 3 feet by 6 inches square, and changed the location of two doors in Ward 13; made stand 3 feet high for water heater; put in 2 seats and clothes-hangers in bathing-house; made closet 7 feet high by 5 feet wide, for dishes in Nurses' Dining Room; also 6 clothes-horses for wards; made derrick for slaughtering, 12 feet high by 6 feet wide, and clothes-closet for Male Workhouse Dormitory; partitioned 14 rooms in Laundry Building for Assistant Nurses; put up plaster partitions for 5 rooms and bath-room in Penitentiary Building; made 2 boxes, 2 feet 6 inches by 16 by 16 inches, for retiring physician; 35 crutches; flight of 5 steps with platform to Barber Shop; also partition 192 square feet, and renewed door at Barber Shop; made bandage roller for retiring physician; put up door jams and casings for 5 doors at Penitentiary Building; extended hot-house 25 feet by 12 feet; made step-ladder for Pavilion L; also 5 clothes-boxes 2 by 2 feet 6 inches by 4 feet long; encased 1 water-closet off Ward 17; 150 square feet of partition; laid 256 square feet yellow pine flooring, and made and put up 175 feet of base-board for same; made 1 box 4 feet square by 5 feet deep with cover for gas-main.

Repairs—Repaired 300 feet railing around grounds; new lock on Drug Store; re-topped 2 large tables; fitted 15 keys and repaired 32 locks; repaired and bottomed 19 chairs; general repairs to bathing-house; repaired 9 window sashes and renewed 70 sash cords; repaired 15 drying-room horses; repairs to 4 carts, 9 new oak standards, re-boxed 3 with about 70 feet 1½ inch spruce boards; renewed 10 beams and shored up floor in bath-room at Ward 17, and repaired 4 refrigerators.

Bricklayer—Repaired sewer at Female Charity; range in Diet Kitchen taken down and re-set in Nurses' Dining Room; built walls for 2 cells, about 1,500 brick; repaired brick walks and curbs; built shower bath 4 by 6 feet by 2 feet high, faced with Portland cement, in new bath room for Ward 17, and laid coping stone on same, 12 feet; cut down doorway in Ward 17 leading to bath room, and built 8 stone piers 2 feet high under beams; in Penitentiary Building cut out doorway 2 feet 6 inches by 6 feet, and faced up same.

Painter—Painted outside of Pavilion C, 25 by 50 feet; Nurses' Kitchen and Dining Room, 2 coats; 2 newly partitioned rooms in Ward 13; Dining Room, Ward 17, 2 coats; grained same in oak; partition in Ward 1, also Chaplain's bath-tub; 14 sleeping rooms for Assistant Nurses, 2 coats; stairs at Barber Shop; new bath-room in Ward 17, 2 coats, inside and outside; graining and varnishing bath-room and Barber Shop throughout; painted, grained and varnished 4 refrigerators; painted 5 large clothes-boxes, 2 coats, and primed hot-house extension; put in 130 lights of glass, and general jobbing.

Tinsmith—Made 12 large milk cans for kitchen use; 15 large dippers for same; repaired 35 tin pails; relined 5 refrigerators; set grates and linings in 4 ranges and renewed 130 feet 6 inches stove-pipe; made 8 large kitchen mess pans, 4 large coffee pots, 3 strainers, 2 collenders, 2 large vegetable cans, and 2 large garbage cans; repaired 15 dripping pans and relined 2 meat boxes; repaired roofs of Pavilions C, D and E; repainted roof of Pavilion D; renewed leaders (30 feet), in Male Charity Hospital and Female Charity Hospital; renewed 65 feet 6 inches stove pipe in Ward 18, and 54 feet 4½ inches stove-pipe in Pavilion C; also cleaned and repaired stoves and stove pipe in Pavilion A and Dormitory 6, and renewed 35 feet leader pipe on F. M. School; put up stove in Boat-house and relaid 8 sheets of galvanized iron in front of ranges in various wards; made 3 water kettles and 1 tin box for kitchen.

LABOR REPORT.

Of the male patients, a daily average of 78 have been employed as follows: in kitchen, 20; in the laundry, 5; in the engine room, 3; in the carpenter shop, 1; in pavilions, 10; working on sea wall, on the farm, repairing roads, carrying coal to engine house and pavilions, removing freight from dock, grading, whitewashing, removing and burying swill, carting furniture, etc., from pavilions on "Hill," opened trench and closed same and keeping grounds around the pavilions clean, 38.

Of the female patients, a daily average of 427 have been employed in the following manner: Housework, sewing and knitting, 348; in the laundry, 68; at out-door scrubbing, 8; as help for medical staff and officers, 9.

126,733 pieces have been laundered during the quarter.

34,124 articles of clothing and bedding have been repaired, and 3,483 articles made.

The Engineer, Firemen and assistants connected water and steam pipes to injector; made connections to pumps, hot water pipe to Cottage, hot and cold water to sinks in Pavilion 2, steam pipes in tank for drinking purposes, cold water to sinks in Pavilions 3 and 4; cleared pipes from boilers in Laundry, sewers in Pavilion 4, hot water pipes and tank on "Hill," waste pipes in Pavilions 3, 4 and 5, locomotive boiler, cisterns and sinks in Pavilion 5; changed steam pipes in kitchen; removed old bathtubs and closets from Pavilion 3, steam connections from steam pumps and injector, hot water tanks, bathtubs and closets from "Hill"; moved cistern in Pavilion 4; put ball cock on tank of Laundry, lead traps under sinks; put in 8 new faucets, 12-inch earthen pipe in trench of steam pipes, new pump for drinking water, gasket in 6-inch steam pipe, hot and cold water supply in sinks in Pavilion 2, new sink in Pavilion 3, 20 feet 1-inch pipe and 1 1/4-inch valve in Pavilion 2, new water supply in Pavilions 1 and 2, 2 2-inch elbows and tees and new drip valves in steam trench; put new cover on cistern in Pavilion 3; got boilers ready for testing; tapped main water pipe; cut out broken length of main steam pipe; packed valves on locomotive boilers; worked on main steam pipes and made alterations to same; repaired hot and cold water pipes in Laundry, pipes on cocks in Laundry, also in Pavilion 4; hot water pipes in Pavilions C, 3 and 5; repaired summer steam pipes, valves for fire extinguishers on horizontal boiler, water supply to closets, water-closets in all pavilions, water-closet seats; altered and repaired water-closets in Pavilion 4 and connected same with cistern; repaired ball cocks in Pavilions 2 and 4, compression cocks in Pavilion 5, pump and hot water tanks on "Hill," sinks in all pavilions, sewer in drug store, kettles in kitchen, bathtubs in Pavilions 3 and 4, supply pipe in Pavilion 3, faucets in Pavilions 3 and 4, electric-light engine, electric-light pressure wires, and kept all wires and lights in repair.

The Carpenter and assistants built waiting room on dock, 22 feet long 9 feet wide, with 2 windows in front, 1 in back, 2 panel doors all sides, and ceiling sheathed with spruce and white pine sheathing; made landing float for boat, 24 feet long 8 feet wide, and gangway for same, with supporting hand-rail and rollers; made oak centre pole for double stone-truck, and iron mountings for same; made 6 ironing boards and 6 horses for Laundry; laid floor in Dead-house and put up stand for coffins; repaired door and put base-board around sill outside; made new frame for coal scales and put scales in working order; fixed up apartments for Matron; put in new window frame; put up partition shelves and brackets and made doorway; built 4 box stalls and floored over hay-loft for horses; made new covers for steam-pipes and water cisterns; laid floor in Bath-house; put in old sashes in windows and covered part of roof with tar paper; repaired 4 inside panel doors; put on 8 pass locks; put new hinges and catches on 16 pairs of outside blinds; put new cords in 22 windows; made and put up 6 shelves in Attendants' sleeping rooms; put on 18 cupboard locks and 10 drawer locks; put new bolts and lock on doors of Storeroom and closed up 3 unused doorways; made and put up backboards for water cisterns in Pavilion 4 and 4 towel rollers, 8 feet long; kept all furniture, etc., in repair.

The Painter has painted the fire-escapes of Pavilion 4, the platforms of wells and cisterns, ceilings and walls of access halls in Pavilion 3, ceilings, walls and woodwork of 6 cells in Pavilion 3, inside and outside of new Boat-house, the outside and trimmings of the Dead-house; painted and grained the entrance doors of Church; oiled floors in office; painted the outside of Pavilion I, and put in window lights where required.

The Stone Mason and assistants built 3,600 cubic feet of sea-wall; built furnace for burning swill, 12 feet by 8 feet by 7 feet; repaired plastering in Pavilion 3; built 2 fire-boxes in upright boilers; been building foundation for Baker's oven; moved oil-house 100 feet; been blasting and grading rocks, 185 yards of rock outside of new pavilion.

AUTHORITY FOR TRUST INVESTMENTS.

CHAPTER 65, LAWS OF 1889.

AN ACT authorizing the investment of trust funds in stocks or bonds of any of the cities of this State.

Approved by the Governor, March 14, 1889. Passed, three-fifths being present.

The people of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. It shall be lawful for executors, administrators, guardians and trustees and others holding trust funds for investment to invest the funds so held by them in trust in bonds or stocks of any of the cities of this State, issued pursuant to the authority of any law of this State.

Section 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT Act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.
