## MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

Municipal Civil Service Commission,  
No. 61 Elm Street,  
New York, December 3, 1904.

A meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission was held at the Commission's offices, No. 61 Elm street, on Saturday, December 3, 1904, at three o'clock.

There were present—President Coler and Commissioners Appleton and Talley.

A public hearing was held on the request of the Fire Commissioner, that the office of Chaplain in his Department be classified in the exempt class. Deputy Commissioner Churchill addressed the Commission in behalf of the request. There was no opposition. The hearing then closed.

A public hearing was held, on the request of the President of the Borough of Manhattan, that the position of Confidential Inspector be included in the exempt class of positions in his Department. Mr. Bernard F. Downing, Secretary of the Department, addressed the Commission in behalf of the request. Elliott H. Goodwin, Esq., Secretary of the Civil Service Reform Association, appeared in opposition to the proposed exemption, and the Secretary stated that Mr. John Tregaskis had requested to be placed on record as opposing the exemption on behalf of the Association of Civil Employees of the State of New York. The hearing then closed, and the Commission went into regular session.

On motion, further consideration of the proposed amendments to the classification was postponed until a later meeting.

The Committee on Transfers recommended that the following requests for transfer be granted:

Daniel J. Lynch, from the position of Stationary Engineman in the Department of Parks, Borough of The Bronx, to a similar position in the Department of Bridges;

Patrick C. Curry, from the position of Stationary Engineman in the Department of Parks, Borough of Brooklyn, to a similar position in the Department of Correction;

Harold Spielberg, from the position of Interpreter in the Fourth District Municipal Court of The City of New York, to a similar position in the City Magistrates' Courts of the First Division of The City of New York;

Thomas H. Dibbins, from the position of Stationary Engineman in the office of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, to a similar position in the Department of Education;

William E. O'Connor, from the position of Watchman in the Department of Docks and Ferries, to a similar position in the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

On motion, the recommendation of the Committee on Transfers was adopted.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the Secretary be and hereby is instructed to hold a special examination for the position of Apiarist, under the provisions of Rule VI., paragraph 6, it appearing that the duties required in such position are of a peculiar and unusual character to which no classified title is applicable; and further

Resolved, That, pending the establishment of the eligible list for the position of Apiarist, the Commissioner of Parks, Borough of The Bronx, be and is authorized to appoint temporarily to such position.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That Miss May R. Connelly, residing at No. 30 East Twenty-second street, Borough of Manhattan, be and hereby is appointed to the position of Stenographer and Typewriter in the Municipal Civil Service Commission, with salary of the rate of \$1,200 per annum, taking effect December 1, 1904.

The Secretary presented a communication from the President of the Borough of The Bronx, dated November 11, stating that he had rescinded his action of December 3, 1903, dismissing George T. Sherwood, Inspector of Regulating, Grading and Paving, on charges, and had reinstated him in his Department. On motion, the action of the President was recognized.

Commissioner Talley reported in reference to the recommendation of the Labor Clerk that the original and preferred eligible lists for Foreman of Laborers be subdivided into three parts, as follows:

Foreman of Laborers, common.

Foreman of Laborers, Department of Parks.

Foreman of Laborers, Department of Docks and Ferries.

It appearing that the division proposed by the Labor Clerk is in accordance with the Classification of Laborers, as set forth in Part I of the Labor Class, on motion, the recommendation was adopted.

The Secretary presented a letter from the Tenement House Commissioner, with further reference to the reinstatement of Mr. John E. Anderson in the position of Inspector of Tenements in his Department, which request for reinstatement the Civil Service Commission denied at its meeting of October 22, 1904, for the reason that the year of eligibility in Mr. Anderson's case had expired three days before the request was received. The Commissioner stated that he had reinstated Mr. Anderson in the Department before the year had expired, but through an error on the part of one of the employees of his Department, the letter requesting the approval of the Commission was not written until several days after, for the reason that Labor Day and the preceding Saturday and Sunday intervened, and the Department was closed. It appearing that the Commissioner accepted the full responsibility for the delay and neglect of his Department in failing to transmit to this Department his request for the approval of the Commission within the proper time, on motion, the action of the Commission taken October 22, disapproving the reinstatement was rescinded, and the reinstatement was approved.

The Secretary stated that the competitive list for the position of Inspector of Tenements and also the appropriate list of Inspector of Plumbing had been certified to the Tenement House Commissioner to fill temporary vacancies in the position of Inspector of Tenements. These lists having been exhausted, the Secretary stated that he had directed the Chief Examiner to hold a non-competitive examination in order to qualify a sufficient number of persons to fill the temporary vacancies.

On motion, the action of the Secretary was approved.

Commissioner Talley presented a report on the application of Mr. Henry K. Spaulding for reinstatement in the position of Examiner in this Department, Mr. Spaulding having been dismissed from such position on April 14, 1904. In view of the fact that the Corporation Counsel has repeatedly advised the Commission that the head of a Department has not the legal right to review the action of his predecessor, on motion, the request was denied for lack of power.

The Commission then adjourned to meet Tuesday, December 6, 1904, at 4 P. M.

## BELLEVUE AND ALLIED HOSPITALS.

## Report for the Quarter ending June 30, 1904.

NEW YORK, July 1, 1904.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor:

SIR—The Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals has the honor to present the following report of the administration of the hospitals entrusted to its care during the quarter just closed:

## THE DEPARTMENT AS A WHOLE.

The most important event affecting the Department as a whole during the past quarter was unquestionably the resignation of Dr. William Mabon, Superintendent of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, due to his appointment by the Governor to the honorable position of President of the State Commission in Lunacy. Dr. Mabon's resignation was dated April 14, and took effect immediately. He had occupied the position of Superintendent from the 1st of January, 1903, only, but he had accomplished within that short period great reforms and improvements in the service. His resignation was received with regret not merely by the Board of Trustees, but by the Doctors, Nurses, subordinate officials and employees of the Department generally. The feeling of the Board of Trustees is expressed in the following resolution passed by the Board upon receipt of his resignation:

Resolved, That the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals learns with the greatest regret of Dr. Mabon's resignation as Superintendent of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, and that it desires to place on record its sense of the high efficiency which he has shown in the administration of the hospitals committed to his charge, as well as of the personal qualities which have rendered so easy and agreeable the relations between Superintendent and Trustees;

Resolved, further, That the Board of Trustees wishes him all success in the honorable position to which he has been appointed by the Governor, and congratulates the State upon its securing the services of so able and devoted a public officer.

After the careful consideration, on the part of the Trustees, of various candidates for the place, Dr. William P. Spratling, Superintendent of Craig Colony for Epileptics, at Sonyea, Livingston County, was elected Superintendent of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, at the meeting of May 13, subject to the approval of his transfer from the State to the Municipal Civil Service by the State and Municipal Civil Service Commissioners. Pending the action of these bodies upon his appointment, Mr. Michael J. Rickard, Assistant Superintendent, has been Acting Superintendent of the Department.

## INCREASED CENSUS.

In our report for the last quarter we had occasion to refer to the largely increased census of patients in the hospitals of this Department over all previous years. The figures for this increase during the first quarter of the past three years in all the hospitals are as follows:

1902.....	884
1903.....	1,017
1904.....	1,108

This increase has been maintained during the past quarter and points strongly to the wisdom of making increased provision, by the erection of a new Bellevue, for the rapidly advancing needs of the City.

## SALARIES.

The salary list, as recommended by the Board of Trustees, was approved by the Board of Aldermen at their meeting of April 5. It advances the salaries of all the men helpers in the Department to \$20 a month in addition to board and lodging, while most of the women employees are paid \$15. The need for this advance from the old rates which succeeded the unpaid prison help system has been insisted upon repeatedly in these reports.

## MISCELLANEOUS MATTERS.

In recognition of his services to the Board of Trustees in connection with the engineering problems involved in the extension of the bulkhead-lines at Bellevue, Mr. John A. Bense, Engineer-in-Chief to the Department of Docks, was appointed Consulting Engineer to this Department, without salary.

With the approval of the Municipal Civil Service Commission, Messrs. Michael J. Rickard, Philip Smith and John P. Fawcett were appointed Departmental Board of Examiners for positions in the non-competitive class in the Department.

## BELLEVUE HOSPITAL.

The daily average census at Bellevue for the first quarter of this year was 922 patients, as compared with 846 for the corresponding period of 1903, and 730 1-3 for that of 1902. During the quarter just closed it has fallen off to some extent as is to be expected at this season of the year, but has averaged for the quarter 854, a higher figure than that for the heavy winter quarter of 1903. In detail the figures have shown for April a daily average of 913 patients, for May one of 846, and for June one of 805.

Worse, perhaps, than anywhere else, has been the overcrowding in the men's prison ward, where, on April 17, there were twenty-two patients to ten beds. Six of these patients had to be cared for temporarily in the psychopathic ward. These cases are brought to the hospital from the courts and station-houses and constitute a class by



themselves whom it is not desirable to disperse about the other wards. When this is done a Policeman must be assigned to each case, which materially increases the cost of maintenance by the City.

Nor is the overcrowding confined to the patients. Attention has been called before to the cramped quarters of the House Staff, some of the rooms being occupied by four or even five young doctors. The rebuilding of the old Bellevue Medical College Building has made possible the setting aside of a room there for the House Surgeon and his two assistants, and this has done something to relieve the condition complained of. Space is still sadly needed in case of sickness among the doctors. This was demonstrated anew in April last, when Dr. Macdonald, House Surgeon on the Fourth Division, and Dr. Whitbeck, Ambulance Surgeon, were taken ill in the performance of their duty, and quarters had to be found for the other doctors of their division while the room they occupied was being fumigated and repainted. Dr. Whitbeck, who had acquired tuberculosis while in the service of the hospital, was granted a special certificate for his term, his work having been eminently satisfactory.

The attention of the Medical Board was called by the Trustees in May to the number of tuberculosis patients distributed about the general wards, where these cases are not intended to be received. This is a matter very difficult to regulate, as the phthisis ward of the hospital is small and nearly always full. Patients present themselves too ill to be refused, and several days sometimes elapse before they are well enough to be transferred either to the phthisis ward or to the Metropolitan Hospital on Blackwell's Island, where ample provision is made for them. Doctors and Nurses, however, are exerting the greatest care, and the evil is reduced to a minimum.

The regulations against dry sweeping and against smoking in the wards have been made more stringent, and patients have had to be forbidden smoking on the verandas on account of the danger of fire from the wooden floors.

Among the improvements made during the quarter have been the rearrangement of the rooms formerly occupied by the Bookkeeper and his Clerks into a special dining room for the Ambulance Drivers and Clerks; the preparation of a new bath-room for the employees, and the transformation of the room formerly used as the doctors' laundry into a diet kitchen for the training schools.

Dr. Albertus A. Moore was appointed Assistant Visiting Obstetrician to the Emergency Hospital.

The Medical Board appointed a committee of its members to assist with their advice in the preparation of the plans for the new Bellevue.

#### Out-Patient Department.

Dr. James Alexander Miller was appointed Director of the Tuberculosis Division, Out-Patient Department, of Bellevue Hospital, and Dr. Frederick L. Keays, Visiting Physician to this same class from the Second Medical Division. The tent on the river bank for the use of men patients sent there from the clinic for observation and treatment, has been in use since the early part of May, and a new tent for the use of children during the summer months is in process of erection, together with service kitchen, with which the necessary water, gas and sewer connections will be made, the cost of the whole not to exceed \$500.

The work of the Out-Patient Department as a whole has continued satisfactory.

#### GOUVERNEUR HOSPITAL.

The census at Gouverneur Hospital has continued very high throughout the past quarter, the monthly average being for April 101 patients, for May 105 and for June 99—an average of 102 for all three months. This is practically the capacity of the present hospital, everything over 100 requiring speedy transfer and special arrangements for accommodation. Fortunately for the needs of the sick in this section of the City, the work of constructing the new wing to the hospital has been begun, and rapid progress

is expected from this time on. The Board's request for the appointment of an Inspector of Construction has not been acted upon and this has devolved upon the architect a burden that belongs of right to the City.

#### HARLEM HOSPITAL.

Work has proceeded satisfactorily during the past quarter upon the new hospital, which promises to be a very fine building. In the meanwhile a new lease has been taken of the building at No. 518 East One Hundred and Twentieth street, now used as a home for the women employees of the hospital, while a better system of plumbing and ventilation in the hospital proper has improved the temporary quarters at present in use. A reform in the method of keeping the clinical records has been effected, consisting, among other things, in the introduction of a more scientific nomenclature.

#### FORDHAM HOSPITAL.

Bids have not yet been received for the work of constructing the new hospital in the Borough of The Bronx, but advertisements will soon be inserted in the CITY RECORD and, provided they meet with satisfactory response, the contracts will be awarded and the work commenced before the summer is far advanced.

At the present hospital nothing has occurred during the past three months requiring comment here, except that the work of widening the road in the rear of the hospital building, by removing the rock, has been carried out, thus removing the danger occasioned by an exceedingly sharp turn.

## BOARD OF ALDERMEN.

AN ORDINANCE granting to the Bush Terminal Railroad Company the right or franchise to construct and operate a street surface railway in, upon and along certain streets, avenues and highways of The City of New York.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. The Board of Aldermen of The City of New York hereby grants to the Bush Terminal Railroad Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the franchise, right and privilege to construct and operate a double-track surface railway, with all connections, turnouts, crossovers and suitable stands necessary for the accommodation and operation of said railway, by the overhead system of electricity, or any other motive power which may be lawfully employed upon the same, excepting locomotive steam power or horse power, in, upon and along the following-named streets, avenues and highways, all situated in the Borough of Brooklyn, City and State of New York, namely:

Commencing at a point where the centre line of Twenty-eighth street, if extended, would meet the centre line of Second avenue, if extended; running thence southerly upon and along Second avenue, if extended, to the former tide-water line just north of Thirty-eighth street; thence southerly upon and along Second avenue to Forty-first street; thence westerly upon and along Forty-first street to First avenue, and thence southerly upon and along First avenue to the southerly side of Sixty-fifth street.

Together with the necessary connections, switches, sidings, turn-tables, turnouts, crossovers and suitable stands for the convenient operation of said surface railway, and for the accommodation of the cars of the said Bush Terminal Railroad Company, which may be run over said railway tracks by the said Bush Terminal Railroad Company, its successor or assigns, as may be subsequently permitted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment or its successor in authority.

The said route with switches, turnouts and spurs is illustratively shown upon the plan and profile herewith attached, entitled "Map showing plan of tracks of Bush Terminal Railroad Company on application for franchise from City of New York." Dated July, 1904, and signed by Irving T. Bush, President, and E. P. Goodrich, Engineer, which plan and profile are to be deemed a part of this franchise and to be construed with the text hereof, and are to be substantially followed: Provided that deviations therefrom and additional switches, crossovers and spurs which are consistent with the foregoing description and the other provisions of this franchise, may be permitted by resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Section 2. The grant of this franchise is subject to the following conditions:

First—The consent in writing of the owners of half in value of the property bounded on said streets, avenues and highways to the construction and operation of said railway shall be obtained by the grantee, or in the event that such consent cannot be obtained the grantee shall obtain the favorable determination, confirmed by the Court, of three Commissioners, appointed by the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court, in the manner provided by the Railroad Law, before said railway is built or operated.

Second—The said right, privilege and franchise to construct and operate said railway shall be held and enjoyed by said railroad company, its lessee or successors, for the term of twenty-five years from the date when this ordinance is signed by the Mayor, with the privilege of renewal of said grant for a further period of twenty-five years, upon a fair revaluation of said right, privilege and franchise, but such renewal shall not provide for any further renewal. Such revaluation shall be of the right, privilege and franchise to maintain and operate said railway by itself, and not to include any valuation derived from the ownership, operation or control of any other railway by the grantee, its successor or assigns. It shall be in the following manner:

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successor in authority; one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the railroad company; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder, and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluations aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least one year prior to the expiration of the grant, and their report shall be filed with the Comptroller or his successor in authority, within three months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers, and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience, and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine the books of the railroad company. The valuations as ascertained, fixed and determined, shall be conclusive upon both parties, but shall not in any event be less than the minimum amounts fixed as the sum to be paid annually for the last five years of the original franchise.

Third—Upon the termination of the said franchise, right or privilege hereby granted, whether original or renewal, if the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, or its successors in authority shall so desire, there shall be a fair valuation of the plant and property of the grantee necessary for traction purposes upon the streets, avenues and highways, including power-house, equipment, tracks and appurtenances, which plant and property shall be and become the property of The City of New York, at the option of the said Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successor in authority, on the termination of this grant and the payment to the grantee of such valuation. Such payment shall be at a fair valuation of the said plant as property, excluding any value derived from the franchise, and such value shall be determined by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successor in authority.

Fourth—The Bush Terminal Railroad Company, its successor or assigns, shall pay for this franchise to The City of New York the following sums of money: During the first term of five years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than \$250, and which shall be equal to three per cent. of its gross annual receipts, derived from all sources in any way connected with the passenger service, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of \$250; during the remaining twenty years of the term, an annual sum which shall not be less than \$500, and which shall be equal to five per cent. of its gross annual receipts as above, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of \$500.

In computing the amount of the gross receipts derived from passenger traffic and above referred to, the route hereinbefore mentioned shall be considered, and the persons who are upon the cars of the company at any point upon such route shall be deemed to have paid the fare provided to be paid by the ordinance granting the franchise aforesaid, whether they enter or leave the car upon such route or upon any other route upon which the grantee, its successor or assigns, operate its cars.

From the date of commencement of the operation of any portion of the railway until the end of the first ten years of this grant, an additional sum of fifteen (15) cents per annum for each linear foot of single track, including switches, crossovers and spurs laid in any street, avenue or highway; and for the succeeding fifteen years an additional sum of thirty (30) cents per linear foot per annum, in lieu of said sum of fifteen (15) cents; provided that if The City of New York shall at any time during the term of this franchise, acquire or otherwise come into possession of any of the streets or avenues shown on the map attached, upon which the Bush Terminal Railroad Company now proposes to construct and operate a railroad, and which streets or avenues are not now legally opened, no compensation shall be awarded in any proceeding instituted to acquire title to the said streets, and the grantee shall, when such streets are required, pay to The City of New York the same rates per linear foot of single track provided for above.

Such sums shall be paid into the Treasury of The City of New York on November 1 in each year, provided, however, that the first payments shall only be for that proportion of the above sums as the time of the signing of this ordinance by the Mayor to September 30 next preceding said date of payment, shall bear to the whole of one year.

The fiscal year shall end on September 30 next preceding said date of payment, and the provisions of the Railroad Law as it now exists, or as it may hereafter be amended, relating to the manner of payments and statements of percentages of gross receipts of street railway companies shall be strictly followed. The intention of this paragraph is to fix an annual charge to be paid by the grantee, its successor or assigns, to The City of New York for the rights and franchise hereby granted, and it shall not be construed as providing for the payment by the grantee, its successor or assigns, of a percentage of gross receipts within the meaning of any general or special statute.

Fifth—The said annual charge or payments shall continue throughout the whole term of the franchise hereby granted, whether original or renewal, notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other railway company providing for payments for street railway rights or franchises at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or sub-lease of the rights or franchise hereby granted, whether original or renewal, or of any part thereof, or any of the routes mentioned herein, or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sub-lease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions of this grant, and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said conditions as to payments, anything in any statute or the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof, or otherwise, exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this grant.

Sixth—The rights and franchises granted hereby shall not be assigned either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall title thereto or right, interest or property therein pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the Bush Terminal Railroad Company, its successors or assigns, or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations, or otherwise, without the consent of The City of New York, acting by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successor in authority, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in anywise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

No passenger cars of any railway company other than the Bush Terminal Railroad Company shall be permitted to operate upon the route hereby granted without the consent of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and under such terms as it may prescribe.

Seventh—That said railway company may be operated by overhead electrical power, substantially similar to the system of overhead electrical tra-



tion, now in use by the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company, or by any other motive power, except locomotive steam power or horse power, which may be approved by the Board of Railroad Commissioners and consented to by the owners of property in accordance with the provisions of the Railroad Law; and provided further that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successor in authority, upon giving the grantee, its successor or assigns, one year's notice in writing, may require it or them to operate its railroad upon the whole or upon any portion of its route, by underground electrical power substantially similar to that now in use by the Metropolitan Street Railway Company in the Borough of Manhattan, and thereupon to discontinue the use of the overhead trolley system, and to remove its poles, wires and other structures used by it for that purpose, from the streets, avenues and highways in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York. Such change in system shall be made wholly at the cost and expense of the grantee.

Eighth—The said railway shall be constructed, maintained and operated subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of the City of New York, who have jurisdiction in such matters under the Charter of the City.

Ninth—The said railway company shall be constructed and operated in the latest improved manner of street railway construction and operation, and solely upon the terms and according to the lines and surveys and of the character of the rails and other parts of the construction approved by the President of the Borough of Brooklyn. Such railway of the railroad company, its successor or assigns, shall be maintained in good condition throughout the term of this grant.

Tenth—The rate of fare for any passenger upon said railway for a continuous ride from any point of the route hereby granted to any other point on said route shall not exceed two (2) cents.

Provided, however, that, if by a traffic arrangement with any other transportation company, free transfers are given enabling a passenger paying one fare on the route hereby granted to reach the Borough of Manhattan or the Brooklyn Borough Hall, when traveling in a northerly direction, and Coney Island when traveling in a southerly direction; then the rate of fare shall not exceed five (5) cents.

The rates for the carrying of property upon the cars of the grantee shall in all cases be reasonable in amount, and shall be subject to the control of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successor in authority, and may be fixed by such Board, after notice and hearing to the grantee, and when so fixed such rate shall be binding upon said grantee, its successors or assigns, and no greater sums shall be charged for such services than provided for by it.

Eleventh—The passenger cars on the said route as aforesaid shall run at intervals of not more than thirty minutes, both day and night, and as much oftener as the reasonable convenience of the public may require, or as may be directed by the City ordinances, or by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment; provided, however, that said railroad company during the first five years of this franchise shall not be required to operate its cars on any part of the aforesaid between the hours of 11 o'clock P. M. and 5 o'clock A. M. each day, unless the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City shall determine after a hearing had thereon that public convenience requires the operation of its cars during said hours.

Twelfth—The said railroad company shall apply to each passenger and motor car run over said railway a proper fender and wheelguard in conformity to such laws and ordinances as are now in force or may hereafter be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities.

Thirteenth—All passenger cars on said railway shall be heated through the cold weather in conformity to such laws and ordinances as are now in force, or may hereafter be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities, and any failure to keep the temperature of any of the passenger cars of the company above fifty degrees Fahrenheit shall make the company liable for a penalty of fifty (50) dollars per car per day for each offense. Each car shall be well lighted either by Pintsch gas system or by electricity, or by some system of lighting equally efficient.

Fourteenth—The number of freight cars in any train operated upon the railway shall be limited to seven (7), including the motor car, and the speed of such motors or trains shall not exceed six (6) miles per hour. No motors or cars shall be permitted to remain stationary within the lines of any street, avenue or highway, whether on the main track or any spur, and no freight shall be loaded upon or unloaded from such cars while within the lines of any such street. Failure to comply with any of the above provisions shall make the company liable for a penalty of fifty dollars (\$50) for each offense.

Fifteenth—The said railroad company, its successor or assigns, shall cause to be laid between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and two feet in width outside of its tracks, under the supervision of the municipal authorities having jurisdiction in such matters, upon and along the streets, avenues and highways covered by the route as aforesaid, and now unpaved, a granite block pavement upon a concrete foundation, with tar and gravel joints. The grantee shall pay the entire cost thereof, together with the cost of inspection, and no cars shall be operated under this franchise over any part of the route hereby granted until the said pavement is fully and completely laid.

Sixteenth—The said railroad company, as long as it shall continue to use any of the tracks upon said streets, avenues and highways, shall have and keep in permanent repair that portion of the surface of said streets, avenues and highways between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and two feet in width outside of its tracks, under the supervision of the proper local authorities, and whenever required by them to do so, and in such manner as they may prescribe. And the City of New York shall have the right to change the material or character of the pavement of any street, avenue and highway, and in that event the grantee, its successor or assigns, shall be bound to replace such pavements in the manner directed by the proper City officer, at its own expense, and the provision as to repairs herein contained shall apply to such renewal or altered pavement.

Seventeenth—The said railroad company, so long as it shall continue to use any of the tracks upon said streets, avenues and highways, shall cause to be watered the entire roadway of each of the above streets, avenues and highways at least three times in every twenty-four hours when the thermometer is above 35 degrees Fahrenheit, and shall provide for such purpose at least one tank car, to be propelled by electricity, the capacity of which shall warrant the watering of the streets in a satisfactory manner.

Eighteenth—The said railroad company shall at all times keep the streets between its tracks, the rails of its tracks, and for a distance of two feet in width outside of its tracks, free and clear from ice and snow; provided, however, the grantee shall, at the option of the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, enter into an agreement for each winter season, or part thereof, to clean an equivalent amount of street surface from house line to house line.

Nineteenth—The said railroad company shall, when so required by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, station flagmen at so many street crossings and during such hours as the said Board may deem necessary for the proper protection of the public, and shall also erect and maintain

gates and gatemen at such crossings where in the opinion of the said Board the protection afforded by a flagman alone is insufficient. For failure to comply with the requirements of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in stationing flagmen or erecting and maintaining gates, the company shall be liable for a penalty of fifty dollars (\$50) per day for each offense.

Twentieth—The said railroad company shall carry free within the limits of The City of New York during the existence of this grant or its renewal all letter carriers of the United States Government and members of the Police and Fire Departments of The City of New York, when such employees are in full uniform.

Twenty-first—In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained, this grant may be forfeited and avoided by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel on notice of ten days to the said railroad company.

Twenty-second—If any of the streets, avenues and highways above referred to or described shall not now be open or in use as public highways, no right or franchise shall vest in the grantee of this ordinance until after such streets, avenues and highways shall be legally opened as a public highway. Nothing in this ordinance contained shall be construed as an obligation on The City of New York in respect to the opening of such streets, avenues and highways.

Twenty-third—This grant is on the express condition and covenant that the railroad company will not object to the opening by The City of New York of any street, avenue or highway laid out or which may be hereafter laid out, upon, along, crossing or intersecting the route herein before described.

Sec. 3. This grant is also upon the further and express condition that the provisions of article 4 of the Railroad Law applicable thereto, and all laws or ordinances now in force or which may be adopted affecting the surface railways operating in The City of New York shall be strictly complied with.

Sec. 4. The grant of this privilege shall not affect in any way the right of The City of New York to grant a similar privilege upon the same or other terms and conditions to any other person or corporation, and is subject to whatever right, title or interest the owners of the abutting property may have in and to the streets, avenues and highways on the route hereinbefore described.

Sec. 5. Said railroad company shall commence construction within six months from the date of the passage of this ordinance, and shall complete the construction of at least one and one-half miles of double-track railway on or before July 1, 1907; otherwise this grant shall be forfeited. If upon the route above described, or upon any portion thereof, there shall not be constructed and in actual operation by July 1, 1907, a railway properly equipped and operated as provided by this ordinance, the said route or portion thereof shall be conclusively taken to have been abandoned by the company, and so much of the rights and franchises hereby granted as pertain to such route or portion thereof, not so constructed from and after July 1, 1907, shall be thereupon forthwith and immediately forfeited, without judicial or other proceedings. Provided that such time may be extended under and for causes specified in section 90 of the Railroad Law, and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment may extend such time for a period or periods not exceeding one year if, in their discretion, it seems best so to do, and that the City officials or departments who or which shall at the time of such construction have authority over the said streets, avenues and highways, may extend such time for a period or periods not exceeding one year further, if reasonable, in their judgment, by reason of requirements as to the manner of construction imposed by the City officials.

Sec. 6. The grantee shall assume all liability by reason of the construction and operation of the railway, and the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property by reason of its construction or operation.

As a condition of this grant, the grantee, its successor or assigns, hereby agrees to repay to the City any damages which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or defaults of the railroad company, its successor or assigns.

Sec. 7. If for any reason the right or franchise of the grantee in any of the streets, avenues and highways above described shall cease, or if for a period of six successive months the railway tracks upon any of such streets, avenues and highways shall not be operated by the grantee, the Comptroller of The City of New York may require the grantee, its successor or assigns, to remove its tracks and other structures upon such streets, avenues and highways within thirty days after notice, and in default of their removal pursuant to such notice, the proper local authorities having jurisdiction may cause them to be removed and the City of New York may recover the cost and expense of such removal, either by deducting them from the fund deposited as hereinafter provided for or by action; and the rights and franchises of the grantee, its successor or assigns, in such portions of the streets, avenues and highways in case any such exist, shall forthwith and immediately cease upon the removal of such tracks or structures and without judicial or other proceedings.

Sec. 8. Any alterations may be required to the sewerage or drainage system, or to any subsurface structures, pipes, etc., laid in the streets, on account of the construction or operation of the railway, shall be made at the sole cost of the railroad company, and in such manner as the proper City officials may prescribe.

Sec. 9. The work of construction of the railway shall be done in such manner as shall not substantially interfere with the ordinary use of any streets as a public highway.

Sec. 10. Said railroad company shall file with the Comptroller of The City of New York on November 1 following the commencement of operation of any portion of the railway, a map or maps showing the number of tracks, including switches, crossovers and spurs and the number of linear feet of single track so laid in any street, avenue or highway up to September 30 next preceding.

All distances to be accurately determined from actual measurements made upon the ground, and the map or maps to be verified by an official of the company. On each succeeding November 1 a map shall be filed with the Comptroller showing all additional tracks laid during the year.

Sec. 11. This grant is upon the express condition that the Bush Terminal Railroad Company, within thirty days after the said Company has been duly authorized to operate its railway, and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred thereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of The City of New York the sum of five thousand dollars either in money or in securities to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance by such company of the terms and conditions of this grant, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charge for the franchise, the repairs of the street pavement and the removal of snow and ice, and the quality of construction of the railway, and in case of default in the performance by said company of such terms and conditions, The City of New York shall have the right to cause the work to be done and the materials to be furnished for the performance thereof after due notice, and shall collect the reasonable cost thereof from the said fund without legal proceedings; or after default in the payment of the annual charges shall collect

the same with interest from such fund after ten days' notice in writing to the said company. Or in case of failure to keep the said terms and conditions of this grant relating to the headway of cars, fender and wheel guards and the heating of the cars and the watering of the street pavement, the said company shall pay a penalty of \$50 a day for each day of violation, and the further sum of \$10 a day for each car which shall not properly be heated or supplied with fenders and wheel guards in case of the violation of the provisions relating to these matters. In case of any drafts so made upon the security fund, the said company shall, upon thirty days' notice in writing, pay to the Comptroller of The City of New York a sum of money sufficient to restore the said fund to the original amount of five thousand dollars, and in default thereof the grant hereby made may be cancelled and annulled at the option of the Comptroller of The City of New York, acting on behalf of said City. No action or proceeding or rights under the provisions of this section shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to The City of New York.

Sec. 12. Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him herein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits, thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures. Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
