Hon. JOHN W. KELLER, President, Department of Public Charities, City of New York:

MY DEAR MR. KELLER:—Inclosed herewith you will please find the report of this Bureau for the quarter ending March 31, 1900, in duplicate.

You will observe that there were 204 enforced discharges, 149 by reason of age limitation and the rest upon reinvestigation of the families having committed children, showing a saving to the City of \$408 per week, thus proving the value of reinvestigating the circumstances of the families of children in the various institutions, as, if there had been no reinvestigation made, these children would in all probability have remained public charges for years to come.

Transportation has been afforded to two hundred and eighteen (218) sick and destitute persons to reach their homes, thereby preventing their becoming a charge upon the County.

There have also been four hundred and twelve (412) insane, sick and destitute persons committed to the State Almshouse, at Flatbush, Kings County, N. Y., to be cared for by the State Board of Charities, thus relieving this Department of their care and maintenance.

There have been no alien paupers sent to their homes in Europe through the State Board of Charities.

Ward 38—Repaired hot water faucet in kitchen; put in flush pipe for urinal; repaired hot water faucet and valve of closet cistern; cleared water-closet.

Ward 39—Repaired leak at waste pipe of bath-tub. Cleared waste pipe of basin and repaired two hot water faucets. Repaired hot water faucets at sink.

Ward 40—Put new tip and pillar on gas fixture; put in 2 feet 6 inches 3/4-inch lead pipe in Nurses' room basin. Cleared water-closet.

Ward 41—Packing valve of hot water pipe. Repaired hot water faucet.

Ward 43—Cleared water-closet. Repaired six faucets in bath rooms.

Female Prison Ward—Repaired hot water faucet, and faucet in bath-tub. Cleared waste pipe of sink and bath-tub.

Male Prison Ward—Repaired hot water faucet and valve of closet cistern, and that at sink, also hall cock at cistern.

Amphitheatre—Cleared waste pipe of basin in crane room. Taking water from gas fixtures in hall. Put five gas tips and pillars on gas fixtures. Cleared cesspool of crane room.

Mills Training School—Put new faucet in kitchen sink. Cleared water-closet on fifth floor. Put in new common overflow basin bowl, and 2 new gas tips and pillars. Cleared waste pipe of second floor urinals. Repaired hot water faucets of second floor bath tub. Repaired leaks at bath tub and sink. Repaired burst in hot water pipe in basement; also faucet in butler's pantry sink. Put 2 wash tray faucets in laundry and repaired 4 faucets. Put in 1 3/4-inch and 1 2-inch pipe covers on trap on fifth floor, and repaired leak at basin in basement.

Doctors' Rooms—Repaired leak of gas in room, and put new 14 1/2-inch by 17 1/2-inch iron enamel patent overflow basin bowl in Room 1. Repaired two hot and two cold water faucets in Room 17.

Morgue—Cleared waste pipe of basin in Undertaker's room; also waste pipe of sink in autopsy room.

Dock—Cleared water-closet of prisoners' dormitory; also one in ladies' toilet in Central Office. Thawing soil-pipe of water-closets of Central Office. Put in new 14 1/2-inch by 17 1/2-inch basin-bowl and new patent overflow basin-plug in Out-door Poor Department. Repaired and cleared waste-pipe of sink in men's dormitory on dock. Put in new 14 1/2-inch by 17 1/2-inch basin-bowl in Central Office toilet-room.

Stable—Cleared waste-pipe of sink. Thawing water-pipes of closets. Cleared cess-pools twice. Repaired valve at horse-trough. Cleared water-closet.

Emergency Hospital—Put in 5 feet 5/8-inch galvanized iron pipe in overflow of tank. Repaired leak at hot-water boiler in kitchen, and 4 feet 1-inch galvanized iron pipe; 1-inch union.

Gouverneur Hospital—Repaired hot-water faucet in operating room. Cleared waste-pipe of basin in dispensary, and that of tube in laundry. Put 2-light gas-fixture in Nurses' room. Repaired burst in water-pipe of dispensary, and leak; also cold-water pipe in dispensary.

Harlem Hospital—Repaired leak in hot-water pipe in laundry. Cleared water-closet on third floor and repaired hall cock of cistern. Cleared waste pipe of sink in kitchen and repaired two faucets. Repaired 2 closet cisterns in dispensary on dock, also leak at closet on second floor, also leak back of laundry tub. Cleared water-closet on second floor.

Outdoor Poor Dispensary—Put in new cistern, new hall cock and ball and 18 feet galvanized iron pipe; also 1 1/2-inch galvanized iron elbow in ladies' toilet.

Medical Baths—Repaired clamp of hose on douche table.

Miscellaneous—Cleared water-closet in fourth floor tower. Cleared hot-water pipe and gas pipe in Male Lodging House. Repaired hot-water faucet in Cook House and same in Doctor's Kitchen. Repaired cold-water faucet and put in new hot-water faucet in Doctor's Kitchen. Cleared waste pipe of sink in General Drug Department. Repaired valve of closet in tower of Superintendent's Office. Cleared waste pipe of ice in Milk Hall. Repaired leak in Croton pipe in fifth floor tower. Cleared hot-water pipe in Deputy Superintendent's apartments; cleared waste-pipe of sink in same. Repaired gas leak in Butcher Shop. Cleared water-closet and repaired hot and cold water faucets in fifth floor tower. Ward 6—Put in 2 panes of glass 12 by 18. Painted ceiling, walls, woodwork of ward, 2 coats; Bathrooms, 2 coats; Kitchen, 2 coats; Nurses' Room, 2 coats. Painted 23 beds, 22 stands, 6 screens, 3 back rests, 2 coats; 2 bath tubs, 4 radiators, 2 coats; 10 stools, 1 ice-box, 5 closets, 3 tables, 3 coats; 1 chair, 4 coats; 2 screens, 2 coats.

Ward 7—Painted 1 Operating Table, 3 coats. Put in pane of glass, 12 by 18. Painted 11 chairs and 2 stools, 2 coats; dressing case, 3 coats.

Wards 8 and 9—Painted 1 screen, 2 coats. Lettered 8 salution bowls and 4 pitchers. Painted 1 screen, 1 ice-box, 1 operating table, 2 coats; 1 screen, 1 stool; ceiling, walls, woodwork, Operating Room, 2 coats; walls, ceiling and woodwork of Kitchen, 2 coats.

Ward 10—Painted 4 screens, 2 bath tubs, 2 coats. Put in 2 panes of glass 10 by 12, 14 by 20.

Ward 11—Put in 5 panes of glass, two 3 1/2 by 3 feet 9 1/2 inches; one 16 by 20; two 20 by 24. Painted ceiling, walls and woodwork of Bath Room, 2 coats; Kitchen, 2 coats; Linen Room, 2 coats. Painted 16 stands, 4 screens, 1 ice-box, 1 closet, 3 bath tubs, 2 coats.

Ward 12—Put in 2 panes of glass, 12 by 18.

Ward 13—Painted 1 screen, 1 chair basket, 2 closets, 2 coats; 2 tables, 18 stands, 3 stools, 2 coats; ceiling, walls and woodwork of Kitchen, 2 coats. Put in pane of glass, 20 by 24. Painted ceiling, walls, woodwork of Operating Room, 3 coats; 1 ice-box, 3 coats. Put in pane of glass, 12 by 18.

Ward 21—Put in 8 panes of plate glass, 14 by 20, in Medicine Closet; 1 pane of glass, 12 by 18.

Ward 22—Painted 19 numbers for beds. Put in 9 pieces of glass, 14 by 20, in medicine closet. Painted 3 screens, 3 closets, 2 coats; ceiling and walls, woodwork of kitchen, 2 coats; ceiling and walls, woodwork of nurses' room, 2 coats. Put in 3 panes of glass, two 18 by 22, one 12 by 14. Painted bedstead, 3 coats; 1 medicine closet.

Ward 23—Put in 2 panes of glass, one 12 by 18, one 14 by 24. Painted 1 screen, 2 coats.

Ward 24—Painted 21 numbers for beds. Put in 1 pane of glass, 12 by 20.

Ward 25—Put in 2 panes of glass, 12 by 18. Painted 32 numbers for beds; 3 stools, 2 screens, 2 coats. Put in 3 panes of glass, 14 by 20.

Closed up cellar window, using 2 square feet yellow pine, ¾-inch; repaired medicine closet lock in Ward 6, repaired a table and bench in Wards 9 and 10, using 3 square feet ¾-inch pine, 2 square feet 2-inch pine and 2 dozen screws, and fitted 1 key to lock; repaired 2 chairs and 2 stools.

Renewed 24 panes glass.

Glazing.

Whitewashed cellar of Ward 6.

Painting.

Plumbing.

Cleaned out gas-pipes in Nurses' room, repaired radiator, using 4 2-inch R. & L. close nipples and 1 1¼-inch K. & L. nipple 6 inches long; repaired steam pipe in cellar, using 9 inches of 1½-inch pipe; cleaned out gas-pipes in bathroom.

SOUTH HOSPITAL.

Side walls and shelves of clothes room painted in two coats, using 15 pounds white lead, 1 gallon turpentine, $\frac{1}{2}$ gallon oil and $\frac{1}{2}$ pint dryers.

Glazing.

Renewed 41 panes of glass in windows of laundry, 5 panes in kitchen, 11 panes in boiler-room and 3 panes in female helpers' dormitory.

Plumbing.

Renewed water-pipe in laundry, using 10 feet of $\frac{1}{2}$ -inch pipe. Renewed steam supply to radiator in laundry, using 10 feet of $\frac{3}{4}$ -inch pipe and 3 $\frac{3}{4}$ -inch elbows.

Bricklayer.

Broke through brick wall and made doorway between blanket-room and new addition to linen-room, door-jamb and arch built, 8 feet high, 12 inches deep and 18 inches wide. Old brick, 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ barrels cement and 3 barrels of sand used. Repaired air-shaft in laundry, door-jamb and arch built 4 feet high 12 inches wide and 8 inches thick. 2 ventilators bricked up. Brick wall and arch in front of air shaft in Laundry broken down and wall repaired. Door jambs built up, 4 feet high 12 inches wide and 8 inches thick. 2 ventilators in air shaft closed and foundation wall built up. Old cement floor in Laundry taken up and new brick and cement floor laid, 90 square feet, using old bricks, 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ barrels cement and 6 barrels sand. Foundation built and set in boiler house for pump, using 200 old bricks, $\frac{1}{4}$ barrel cement and $\frac{1}{2}$ barrel sand. Door jambs of Laundry built up and hole in chimney bricked up, 4 cubic feet.

Whereas, This Board did, in conformity with notice published, accord public hearing thereon, at which no person appeared in opposition thereto; and

Whereas, It is the opinion of this Board that compliance with said petition would be for the best interests of this City; therefore

Resolved, That recommendation be and is hereby made to the Board of Public Improvements, City of New York, that it give the subject-matter of the petition its prompt and favorable consideration and action.

Also,

Whereas, The President of the Borough of Queens, City of New York, did submit to this the Local Board of the borough aforementioned, at its meeting held March 30, 1900, a petition to legally open Bodine street, from Vernon avenue to Sherman street, or to Fourteenth street, if the plan of proposed system of streets for the First Ward of said borough and city extending said street thereto be adopted; and

Whereas, This Board did, in conformity with notice published, afford a public hearing thereon, at which no person appeared to oppose the application as made; and

Whereas, It appears to the satisfaction of this Board that compliance with the desires of the petitioners would be to the best interests of this City; therefore it is

Resolved, That recommendation be and is hereby made to the Board of Public Improvements, City of New York, that it give same its prompt and favorable action in causing the necessary proceedings to be instituted toward The City of New York acquiring title to said street for a public highway.

Also,

Whereas, Petition to grade, pave with asphalt, curb and flag Bodine street, from Vernon avenue to Sherman street or Fourteenth street, if such be therein extended, in First Ward, Borough of Queens, City of New York, was this 30th day of March, 1900, submitted by the President of aforementioned borough to this the Local Board of same place; and

Whereas, Public hearing was afforded to all who might be desirous of giving expression thereon, of which notice was published, but none appeared in opposition thereto; and

Whereas, It seems to this Board that the improvement of said street as petitioned for will be to the best interests of this City; therefore

DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH of the Department of Health, held May 16, 1900, the following amendment to section 104 of the Sanitary Code was adopted:

Resolved, That, under the power conferred by law upon the Board of Health of the Department of Health, the following additional amendment to the Sanitary Code for the security of life and health be and the same is hereby adopted and declared to form a portion of the Sanitary Code:

Sec. 104. Starting from the floors of public buildings and of railroad cars and of ferry-boats, and upon any stairs, platform or stairs of elevated railroads, is hereby forbidden, and officers in charge or control of all such buildings, cars, platforms, stairs and boats, shall keep posted permanently in each public building and each railroad car and on each station platform of elevated railroads, and in each ferry-boat, a sufficient number of notices forbidding spitting upon the floors and stairs of buildings, conductors of cars and conductors of ferry-boats and station platforms shall call the attention of all visitors of this ordinance or such notices.

And it shall be the duty of all persons or corporations manufacturing cigars or conducting the business of

printing, where ten or more persons are employed on the premises, in The City of New York, to provide, and they are hereby required to provide, proper receptacles for spitting, in proportion of one to every two persons employed by them, and that said receptacles be disinfected and cleaned at least once during each working day. That a copy of the second paragraph of this section be kept posted permanently in a conspicuous place in all cigar manufactories and in printing offices where ten or more persons are employed.
