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COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at a Meeting Held in Room 16, City Hall, at 2 o'clock p. m., on Monday, July 8, 1907.

Present at Roll Call—George B. McClellan, Mayor; Herman A. Metz, Comptroller; John H. Campbell, Deputy and Acting Chamberlain; John R. Davies, Chairman, Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen.

Patrick F. McGowan, President of the Board of Aldermen, arrived later. See note.

The minutes of the meeting held June 26, 1907, were approved as printed.

The Comptroller brought up the matter of the proposed hearing relative to the recommendation of the Commissioner of Docks, that the Board approve of an agreement to be entered into between his department and the owners of property between the centre line of Twenty-eighth street prolonged, the southerly line of Thirty-sixth street prolonged, the westerly line of Second avenue and the pierhead line; also the property between the centre line of Fifty-ninth street prolonged, the westerly line of First avenue, the centre line of Sixty-first street prolonged and the pierhead line, Borough of Brooklyn, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 372 of the Laws of 1907.

At the last meeting the chair fixed the hearing for 2 o'clock p. m., on Monday, July 8, 1907, at Room 16, City Hall, Borough of Manhattan, as the time and place for the hearing on this matter.

Chapter 372 of the Laws of 1907 provides, however, that such public hearing shall be published in the CITY RECORD for six consecutive days, not less than seven nor more than thirty days before said public hearing. An insufficient time having elapsed to comply with the law, the matter was laid over sine die.

The Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution relative to a lease of premises on the Grand Boulevard and Concourse, about 200 feet north of One Hundred and Eighty-fourth street, Borough of The Bronx, for the use of the President of the Borough of The Bronx:

SIR—Hon. Louis F. Haffen, President of the Borough of The Bronx, in a communication addressed to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, under date of June 29, 1907, requests that a lease be entered into of the premises on the easterly side of the Grand Boulevard and Concourse, about 200 feet north of One Hundred and Eighty-fourth street, Borough of The Bronx, for a period of one year from August 1, 1907, with the privilege of renewal for an additional year upon the same

terms and conditions, at an annual rental of \$360. The lessor to pay for water; the City to furnish light, heat and janitor service.

The premises in question are to take the place of those now occupied by the Engineer of Highways, located on the west side of the Grand Boulevard and Concourse, north of Kingsbridge road, and consist of a store and three living rooms and bath in the rear of the same.

The rent asked, \$30 a month, is in my opinion reasonable, and I would therefore respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorize a lease of the store and three living rooms and bath in the rear of the same, located in the three-story brick building on the easterly side of the Grand Boulevard and Concourse, about 200 feet north of One Hundred and Eighty-fourth street, Borough of The Bronx, for a period of one year from August 1, 1907, with the privilege of renewal for an additional year upon the same terms and conditions, at an annual rental of \$360, payable monthly; the lessor to pay for water; the City to furnish light, heat and janitor service. Lessor, Mrs. Katharine Hauck.

SIR—Mr. Eugene W. Scheffer, Secretary of the Department of Health, in a communication addressed to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund under date of June 25, 1907, requests that a lease be made of the three-story and cellar brick dwelling No. 368 Hawthorne street, Borough of Brooklyn, for a period of one year from the date of occupation, with the privilege of renewal for an additional year on the same terms and conditions, at an annual rental of \$450, payable quarterly, the house being required as dormitories for the help employed at the Kingston Avenue Hospital. Owner, Norman G. Cooper, No. 189 Montague street, Borough of Brooklyn.

After an examination of the premises it appears that this is a comparatively new three-story and cellar, swell front, brick dwelling, 19 feet 4 inches by 52 feet, on a lot 19 feet 4 inches by 106 feet. The house has nine rooms and bath, water and gas, and is heated by furnace. The owner will put the house in first-class condition and pay for the water used on the premises; the City to pay for heat, light and janitor service.

The rent asked, \$450 a year, is in my opinion reasonable, and I would therefore respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorize a lease of the premises No. 368 Hawthorne street, Borough of Brooklyn, for a period of one year from the date of occupation, with the privilege of renewal for another year upon the same terms and conditions, at an annual rental of \$450, payable quarterly; the lessor to put the house in good tenable condition and pay for the water used; the lessee to pay for heat, light and janitor service. SIR—Hon. Joseph Bermel, President of the Borough of Queens, in a communication addressed to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund under date of May 20, 1907, requests that a lease be entered into with Mr. August Bellon, of No. 12 North Division avenue, Rockaway Beach, of the premises in North Division avenue shown on the blueprint herewith, for a period of three years from the date of occupation, at an annual rental of \$400, payable quarterly, with the privilege of renewal for an additional term of three years upon the same terms and conditions; the owner to pay for alterations and repairs and for heat, light, water and janitor service, this property being required as a corporation yard for the storing of road building material, stones, sewer pipes and tools.

After an examination of the premises it appears that this is a vacant plot of land on the east side of North Division avenue, 481 feet north of the Boulevard. Stevenson, Commissioner of the Department of Bridges, in a communication addressed to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, under date of June 17, 1907, requests that a lease be made of the store premises No. 63 West One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, Borough of Manhattan, consisting of the ground floor of said building, having an area of about 504 square feet, at an annual rental of \$420, for a period of one year from the date of occupancy, with the privilege of renewal for an additional year upon the same terms and conditions, the lessor to make the necessary repairs and to furnish steam heat, water and janitor service; the City to pay for the light used, the said premises being required for the use of the Engineer in charge of bridge construction on the Harlem river.

Whereas, The President of the Borough of The Bronx has requested the sale of all buildings, parts of buildings, fences, etc., now standing upon property owned by The City of New York, acquired by it for street opening purposes, said buildings, etc., being situated upon land more particularly described as follows:

Being all those certain buildings, parts of buildings, fences, etc., on Briggs avenue (called Olin avenue and called Gun Hill road), between the Bronx river and White Plains road and near Baychester avenue in the Twenty-fourth Ward of the Borough of The Bronx, and which are more particularly described on a certain map on file in the office of the Collector of City Revenue, Department of Finance, Room 141, No. 280 Broadway, Borough of Manhattan.

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, by virtue of the powers vested in them by law, hereby authorize and order the sale at public auction at the highest marketable price of all the buildings, parts of buildings, fences, etc., upon the following terms and conditions:

It being understood that the purchasers at the time of the auction sale, when the said bid is accepted by the City, shall execute a contract with The City of New York for the proper compliance with these terms and conditions, which contract shall provide for liquidated damages at so much per day for each and every day the removal of the buildings, etc., remains incomplete after the expiration of sixty days from the day of sale. A copy of said contract is on file in the office of the Collector of City Revenue, Department of Finance, Room 141, No. 280 Broadway, Borough of Manhattan.

The buildings and appurtenances thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay immediately cash or a certified check drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must either give a cash bond or an approved bond of a surety company in the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale and of the contract. Said bond must be filed within forty-eight hours after the sale.

All the buildings, structures and parts thereof, their fixtures and foundations of every class and description within the described area are to be torn down to a level two feet below the existing curb, and structures which may exist within any of the buildings, such as engine beds, boiler setting, etc., and all stoops and area walls shall be torn down to the same level. All partitions, sheds and fences shall be removed from the premises. All brick laid in mortar, all floor beams, joists, studdings, flooring, ceiling, roofing, boards and woodwork of every description, and all gas, water, steam and soil piping shall be removed from the premises. All combustible matter, such as tar and felt roofing, broken laths and fragments of timber, chips, splinters, etc., which are of no value, shall be gathered together by the contractor and burned or carried away. The purchaser at the sale shall also shut off and cap all water pipes at the main pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

Failure to remove said buildings and appurtenances, or any portion thereof, within sixty days from the day of sale, will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings or appurtenances or portion as shall then be left standing, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and the said City of New York will without notice to the purchaser cause the same to be removed and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner and must be completed within sixty days from the day of sale, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials of labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damages and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of the said buildings by the said successful bidder.

Party walls and fences when existing against adjacent property not sold shall not be taken down, but all furrings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls, shall be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting without the aid of braces, the beamholes, etc., bricked up and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs of the adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made water-tight where they have been disturbed by the operation of the contractor.

The Comptroller of The City of New York reserves the right on the day of the sale to withdraw from sale any of the buildings or parts of buildings and machinery included in the foregoing parcel, or to reject any or all bids; and be it further

DEAR SIR—You will recall that I had a conversation with you some time ago in reference to the submission by the Board of Education of all leases to the Sinking Fund Commission for its approval. I then pointed out to you that a considerable number of the members of the Board of Education considered that under the decision of the Court of Appeals in the case of Gunnison against Board of Education, the Board had the right to execute leases without the approval of any other body. In view, however, of the desire of the Board of Education to maintain the most harmonious relations with all branches of the City service, it did not insist upon this right, but agreed to submit all proposed leases to the Sinking Fund Commission. I also pointed out that there might be delay on the part of the Sinking Fund Commission in acting on the leases, which delay would, under some circumstances, be very embarrassing to the Board. You assured me, however, that the Sinking Fund Commission would act promptly, and that the Board of Education need have no fear of any delay on the part of that Commission.

I beg to call your attention to the fact that no action has yet been taken by the Sinking Fund Commission regarding the leases of the following-named premises which were approved by the Board of Education on the dates specified, and the greater number of which have been in the hands of the Commission for nearly two months past:

Nos. 541 and 543 Leonard street, Borough of Brooklyn; approved by Board of Education April 24, 1907.

Nos. 63 and 65 New York avenue, Borough of Brooklyn; approved by Board of Education May 8, 1907.

May I ask you to let me know at the earliest opportunity whether or not the Sinking Fund Commission will express its approval of these leases?

You will please bear in mind that the schools reopen on September 9, and that nearly all of the above-mentioned premises are to be occupied for school purposes.

SIR—I beg to acknowledge the receipt of your communication of July 3, 1907, in the matter of leases, in which communication you state that a considerable number of the members of the Board of Education consider that under the decision of the Court of Appeals in the Gunnison case, the Board had a right to execute leases without the approval of any other body. You further state that in order to have harmonious relations with all branches of the City's service, the Board thought it better not to insist upon this right, but agreed to submit all proposed leases to the Sinking Fund Commission, and you further state that you had a conversation with me about the delay on the part of the Sinking Fund Commission in acting on the leases, which delay under some circumstances would be very embarrassing to the Board of Education; that I assured you, however, that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund would act promptly, and that the Board of Education need have no fear of any delay on the part of that Commission, and in the last paragraph you call my attention to the fact that you have transmitted to the Sinking Fund Commissioners sixteen propositions approved by the Board of Education, from the dates April 24 until June 26, in the matter of leasing by the Board of Education of school properties, and you desire to be informed at the earliest opportunity whether or not the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund will express their approval of these leases. For example, take the communication of June 13, 1907, addressed to the Secretary of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, which reads as follows:

"I have the honor to inform you that at a stated meeting of the Board of Education, held on June 12, 1907, the following resolutions were adopted:

"Resolved, That the Secretary be and he hereby is authorized to execute a renewal of the lease of the premises at No. 57 Nostrand avenue, Borough of Brooklyn," etc., etc.

—and this follows along through each and every one of the memoranda of leases which you name to me in your communication. This office received a form of lease entered into between Frances Gold and Frederick H. Johnson as Assistant Secretary of the Board, for the lease of premises No. 417 East Eighty-fifth street.

As I construed your communication, all your requests for leases were not requests for the privilege of entering into leases, but a notification to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund that by direction of the Board of Education, your Secretary, or some officer duly authorized by the Board, had entered into a lease.

As Comptroller of The City of New York, the Charter confers upon me certain privileges of stating whether in my opinion the rent is reasonable and just, and a mere notification that the Board of Education had entered into an agreement and lease under what you claim to be the Gunnison decision, precluding my forming an opinion as to whether the rent was reasonable or not, and according to your contention, precluded any further action on my part. You did not state in any of the leases whether the buildings to be occupied by the Board of Education were suitable for school purposes, some of which the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund have in the past found to be unsuitable, and will you now inform me what action the Sinking Fund Commissioners can take upon propositions already acted upon by the Board of Education and contracts already entered into for the carrying out of leases. Your right to do so is a legal proposition which I do not intend to pass upon, but my right to pay out the City's money on something about which I know nothing is certainly a proposition I reserve to myself.

We have had several requests from the owners of property which have been leased in this manner by the Board of Education, for the payment of rent, and until I have

been ordered by law to pay out this money, I shall absolutely refuse to pay one dollar for rent money for properties leased by the Board of Education under its own direction without first having had the consent and the authorization of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, in accordance with the provisions of the Charter.

In closing, I would like to ask you in regard to these sixteen propositions, whether, if the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund believed that the prices named therein were excessive and refused to consent to the leases, it would make any difference to the Board of Education, and whether the Board of Education would not continue in the future to enter into leases for school properties.

I am of the opinion that the best thing for all concerned is to have the matter tested in the courts.

After an examination of the premises, it appears that this is a comparatively new two-story, brick-filled, frame fire house building, 25 by 60 feet, with a one-story frame addition, 10 by 15 feet, on a lot 25 by 100 feet, located on the westerly side of Greenwood avenue, 100 feet north of Atlantic avenue, Borough of Queens. The building has double floors upstairs and down and a cellar under all. The first floor has two stalls with cemented floors. The building has water, gas and toilet and is heated by stoves. The second floor is one large room lighted by front and rear windows and two skylights. The building is in good repair. The rent asked, \$720 a year, is reasonable. I would therefore respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorize a lease of the premises on the westerly side of Greenwood avenue, 100 feet north of Atlantic avenue, at Clarenceville, Borough of Queens, for a period of one year from the date of occupation, with the privilege of renewal for another year upon the same terms and conditions, at an annual rental of \$720, payable monthly, the lessors to make outside repairs when necessary and to keep the roof in repair, the City to furnish heat, light, water and janitor service, the lease also to contain a clause giving the City the right to purchase the property for \$8,000 cash at any time during the life of said lease or renewal thereof, upon giving sixty days' notice of its intention so to do. Lessor, Clarenceville Athletic Club, Charles Waibel, President, Board of Trustees.

Resolved, That the Corporation Counsel be and is hereby requested to prepare a lease to the City from the Clarenceville Athletic Club, Charles Waibel, President, Board of Trustees, of the premises on the westerly side of Greenwood avenue, 100 feet north of Atlantic avenue, at Clarenceville, Borough of Queens, for use of the Fire Department, for a period of one year from the date of occupation, with the privilege of renewal for an additional year upon the same terms and conditions, at an annual rental of seven hundred and twenty dollars (\$720), payable monthly; the lessor to make outside repairs when necessary and to keep the roof in repair; the City to furnish heat, light, water and janitor service; the lease also to contain a clause giving the City the right to purchase the property for eight thousand dollars (\$8,000) cash at any time during the life of said lease or renewal thereof, upon giving sixty days' notice of its intention so to do; and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the said rent fair and reasonable and that it would be for the interests of the City that such lease be made, the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized and directed to execute the same, when prepared and approved by the Corporation Counsel, as provided by sections 149 and 217 of the Greater New York Charter.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution relative to the leasing of premises No. 220 East Fifty-ninth street, Borough of Manhattan, to the Volunteer Firemen's Association of The City of New York:

July 2, 1907.

Hon. HERMAN A. METZ, Comptroller:

SIR—The Board of Estimate and Apportionment at a meeting held April 5, 1907, adopted the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby recommends to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund the authorization of the execution of a lease between The City of New York and the Volunteer Firemen's Association of The City of New York, of the premises now occupied by said association at No. 220 East Fifty-ninth street (known as the old police station), Borough of Manhattan, at a rental of one hundred and twenty dollars (\$120) per annum.

It appears that the Board of Aldermen on April 10, 1906, requested the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize an issue of Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of \$6,000 to provide for the repairs necessary to the building at No. 220 East Fifty-ninth street, known as the old police station and occupied by the Volunteer Firemen's Association of The City of New York, which resolution was presented to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on May 11, 1906, and referred to the Comptroller for consideration and report.

A similar resolution was adopted by the Board of Aldermen in 1904 and was presented to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on March 18, 1904. This resolution was laid over from time to time and finally referred to the Corporation Counsel for an opinion as to the legality of the proposed bond issue, and in reply thereto under date of July 21, 1904, the Corporation Counsel stated in part that the contemplated issue of Special Revenue Bonds would legally fall within the provisions of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, since "the money is thus to be used for the repairing of a public building belonging to The City of New York. It does not seem to be necessary to regard the proposed expenditure as for the benefit of the Volunteer Firemen's Association, but is an expenditure for the improvement and preservation of City property," it appearing at that time that the sum of \$6,000 was needed to make the building at No. 220 East Fifty-ninth street habitable and fit for occupancy, and also for the work necessary, including plumbing, plastering and mason work, as well as certain repairs to the roof.

At the time of the adoption of the resolution heretofore printed in full, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorized the issue of \$3,000 in Special Revenue Bonds redeemable from the tax levied on the year succeeding the year of their issue, to provide for the expense of making the necessary repairs to the building known as the old police station at No. 220 East Fifty-ninth street, now occupied by the Volunteer Firemen's Association.

In view of all the conditions, it would appear that a lease should be authorized for the building in question, and I would respectfully recommend that the Commis-

sioners of the Sinking Fund authorize the Comptroller, pursuant to the provisions of section 151 of the revised Charter, to enter into a lease with the Volunteer Firemen's Association of The City of New York for the premises now occupied by said association at No. 220 East Fifty-ninth street (known as the old police station), in the Borough of Manhattan, for a period of one month from the date of occupation, with the privilege of renewal from month to month, upon the same terms and conditions, for a period not exceeding two years, said period to terminate upon thirty days' notice in writing from either party, at an annual rental of \$120, payable monthly.

The following communication was received from the Commissioner of Docks requesting that he be authorized to make expenditures for repairs and for the purchase of new parts in connection with such repairs from time to time as may be necessary at a cost not to exceed \$5,000 in each case on all ferryboats and terminals which may be owned or operated by the City; also that the Commissioners adopt a resolution authorizing and empowering the Commissioner of Docks to secure and carry for the benefit of the City, fire, accident and collision insurance on the ferryboats and terminals and all ferries which may now or hereafter be operated by the City; also on all other floating property belonging to The City of New York under the jurisdiction of the Department of Docks and Ferries:

Hon. HERMAN A. METZ, Comptroller:

SIR—Referring to conversation of yesterday with you and Deputy Comptroller McCoey relative to the communication of the Commissioner of Docks, addressed to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for permission to make expenditures for repairs and for the purchase of new parts in connection with such repairs, from time to time, as may be necessary, at a cost not to exceed \$5,000 in each case, on all ferryboats and terminals which may be owned or operated by the City, in case of emergency; also the request of the Commissioner of Docks that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution authorizing and empowering the Commissioner of Docks to secure and carry for the benefit of the City, fire, accident and collision insurance on the ferryboats and terminals and all ferries which may now or hereafter be operated by the City; also on all other floating property belonging to The City of New York and under the jurisdiction of the Department of Docks and Ferries.

I beg to request that a report be sent to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at their next meeting, stating that in accordance with section 180 of the Charter, and on account of the necessities of the case, recommending that a resolution empowering such expenditures should be passed.

SIR—I beg to request that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution authorizing the Commissioner of Docks to make expenditures for repairs and for the purchase of new parts, etc., in connection with such repairs, from time to time, as may be necessary, at a cost not to exceed five thousand dollars in each case, on all the ferryboats and terminals which may be owned or operated by the City.

It is absolutely necessary that this department have such authority. The ferryboats and terminals are, owing to the nature of their construction and operation, subject to unforeseen damage and in constant need of repairs. These repairs must be made immediately if the successful operation of the ferries is to be continued.

The preparation of contracts, the approval of the forms by the Corporation Counsel, advertising, awarding, attaching certificates and the approval of sureties by the Comptroller consumes about two months, and to have boats or terminals, or parts of terminals, lying idle during that time means a disarrangement of time tables and perhaps the total suspension of the ferry.

I also beg to request that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution authorizing and empowering the Commissioner of Docks to secure and carry, for the benefit of the City, fire, accident and collision insurance on the ferryboats and terminals on all ferries which may now or hereafter be operated by the City; also on all other floating property belonging to The City of New York under the jurisdiction of the Department of Docks and Ferries.

In connection therewith the Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution:

June 22, 1907.

Hon. HERMAN A. METZ, Comptroller:

SIR—Hon. J. A. Bense, Commissioner, Department of Docks and Ferries, in communication under date of June 11, 1907, requests the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to adopt a resolution authorizing the Commissioner of Docks and Ferries to make expenditures for repairs and for the purchase of new parts, etc., in connection with such repairs from time to time as may be necessary at a cost not to exceed five thousand dollars (\$5,000) in each case, on all the ferryboats and terminals which may be owned or operated by the City.

He also requests that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution authorizing and empowering the Commissioner of Docks to secure and carry, for the benefit of the City, fire, accident and collision insurance on the ferryboats and terminals on all ferries which may now or hereafter be operated by the City; also on all other floating property belonging to The City of New York under the jurisdiction of the Department of Docks and Ferries.

In relation to the first request I would report, that I am unable to find in the Charter anything giving the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund power to authorize the Dock Commissioner to make expenditures for repairs for more than \$1,000 on one job without public letting.

In relation to the second request I would report, that it is the general policy of the City not to carry insurance on City property, but that the Dock Department does carry insurance on its floating property under a resolution adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund April 26, 1906, as follows:

"Resolved, That it is the judgment of this Board that the Commissioner of Docks should carry marine, fire, accident and collision insurance on the ferryboats and other floating property belonging to The City of New York."

There is an argument in favor of carrying insurance on ferry and floating property which does not apply to other City property. Floating or terminal structures are liable to be suddenly damaged by fire, accident or collision, so as to seriously cripple the service and involving a large expense for repairs.

For the City to make these repairs it would be necessary to prepare and advertise contracts, involving a delay of perhaps two months. If, however, the prop-

erty is insured the repairs are made immediately at the insurance company's expense.

It would appear from the Dock Commissioner's request that he considers the above quoted resolution of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund more in the nature of expression of opinion, but that he desires a formal authorization to carry insurance.

I therefore suggest that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution authorizing and empowering the Commissioner of Docks and Ferries to secure and carry, for the benefit of the City, fire, accident and collision insurance on the ferryboats and terminals on all ferries which may now or hereafter be operated by the City; also on all other floating property belonging to The City of New York and under the jurisdiction of the Department of Docks and Ferries.

This matter was on the calendar of the last meeting and referred to the Comptroller and the Commissioner of Docks.

The Comptroller reported in favor of both propositions and in regard to the expenditures for repairs, etc., which may be necessary from time to time at a cost not to exceed \$5,000, he stated that he believed it to be absolutely necessary in the interests of the City that some provision be made in case of emergency.

Discussion of the matter followed and the Dock Commissioner, who was present, was interrogated by members of the Board. The Dock Commissioner explained the necessity of action being taken and stated that if the Board would authorize the expenditures, he would, before availing himself of the authorization, should such an emergency take place, communicate with the Comptroller, and receive his permission to make whatever expenditures may be necessary. With this understanding of the matter the following resolutions were offered for adoption:

Resolved, That the Commissioner of Docks and Ferries is hereby authorized to make expenditures for repairs and for the purchase of new parts, etc., occasioned by damage by accidents, collisions or fire to any of the ferry boats and terminals, and on all ferries which now or hereafter may be operated by the City, at a cost not to exceed five thousand dollars (\$5,000) in each case.

Which resolution was unanimously adopted.

Resolved, That the Commissioner of Docks be and is hereby authorized and empowered to secure and carry for the benefit of the City, fire, accident and collision insurance on the ferry boats and terminals and on all ferries which may now or hereafter be operated by the City; also on all other floating property belonging to The City of New York and under the jurisdiction of the Department of Docks and Ferries.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, Comptroller, Deputy and Acting Chamberlain and the President of the Board of Aldermen.

Present and not voting—The Chairman of the Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen.

The following communication was received from the President of the Borough of Richmond in the matter of the proposed lease between The City of New York and the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railroad Company for the use of the foot bridge at St. George, connecting the ferry house with Jay street. This matter was considered by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at meeting held June 5, 1907, and the application denied:

June 19, 1907.

Hon. HERMAN A. METZ, Comptroller, No. 280 Broadway, New York City:

DEAR SIR—I beg to call your attention to a copy of a letter which I am inclosing from Mr. George H. Campbell, Vice-President of the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway Company, concerning the foot bridge from Jay street to the ferry terminal at St. George. The Sinking Fund Commission was asked to authorize the making of a lease between the City and the railway company for the use of this bridge; the rent to be nominal.

This bridge is used by a great number of people every day and its closing would be a great inconvenience. I feel that the bridge at the present time is perfectly safe and that the City would assume very little risk if it would authorize the lease asked for.

I beg to call your personal attention to this matter, and to ask if the report recently made by the engineer on the matter cannot be modified, so that the lease can be authorized.

MY DEAR MR. CROMWELL—Our counsel, Mr. Ryan, has sent me your letter to him, under date of June 8, in relation to a formal lease by the City of the foot bridge from Jay street to the ferry terminal at St. George.

I am personally familiar with the efforts you have made to have this foot bridge kept open for the accommodation of the public until the new viaduct of the City was built, and feel that you have left nothing undone on your part to bring about the desired results, but it would appear from the report of the Comptroller's Engineers that they do not favor the plan, and such being the case, I do not know of anything further that can be done either on your part or that of our company but to close the foot bridge and let the public reach the ferry by the way of South street. It is my understanding that something like 3,000 people use this foot bridge daily to reach the ferry, and, of course, when it is closed there is going to be very serious complaint on the part of the public as a result, but you are certainly not responsible for the situation, nor is this company, and I do not know of anything that can be done but leave the responsibility where it belongs. We have hesitated about taking any action, but as there seems to be no other alternative, and acting upon the advice of counsel, we shall be compelled to issue an order closing the bridge.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down, but all furrings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls, shall be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting without the aid of braces, the beam-holes, etc., bricked up and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain, and present a clean exterior. The roofs of the adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made water tight where they have been disturbed by the operation of the contractor.

The Comptroller of The City of New York reserves the right on the day of the sale to withdraw from sale any of the buildings or parts of buildings and machinery included in the foregoing parcel, or to reject any or all bids; and be it further

Resolved, That while said sale is held under the supervision of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller is authorized to cause the same to be advertised, and to direct the sale thereof, and the security bonds to be given by the purchasers at said sale shall contain such condition as to form and sufficiency thereof as he may approve as financial officer of the City.

Whereas, The Secretary of the Board of Education has requested the sale of all buildings, parts of buildings, etc., now standing upon property owned by The City of New York, located in the Borough of Manhattan, acquired by it for the proposed school site on Clinton street, between Water and Cherry streets, said buildings being situated upon land more particularly described as follows:

Being all those buildings, parts of buildings, etc., on the easterly side of Clinton street, between Water and Cherry streets, one hundred and sixteen feet one and one-

half inches front on Clinton street and extending easterly one hundred and eighty-one feet four inches respectively along the northerly side of Water street and the southerly side of Cherry street, Borough of Manhattan, and which are more particularly described on a certain map on file in the office of the Collector of City Revenue, Department of Finance, Room 141, No. 280 Broadway, Borough of Manhattan.

"Beginning at a point in the block bounded by Lewis street, Tompkins street, East Third and East Fourth streets, which point is formed by the intersection of the prolongation of Goerck street northerly with the grant of Robert Carnley and the grant of Henry Simmons, and which point is 13 feet 2 1/4 inches north of East Third street and 200 feet east of the intersection of East Third street with Lewis street, and running thence northerly along the westerly line of the space reserved for Goerck street 102 feet 10 inches to a point in the northerly line of the Van Waggenen grant, which point is 78 feet 3/4 inch southerly on the prolonged line from East Fourth street; running thence easterly along the northerly line of the Van Waggenen grant 60 feet to the easterly line of the space reserved for Goerck street; thence running southerly along said easterly line of the space so reserved 102 feet 10 inches to a point in the southerly line of the Carnley grant which is 20 feet 10 3/4 inches north of the northerly line of East Third street; running thence westerly along the southerly line of the Carnley grant 60 feet to the point or place of beginning, be the said several dimensions more or less,"

—at an upset price of twelve thousand dollars (\$12,000). The deed so delivered shall be in form a quit-claim deed, releasing the interests of The City of New York, subject to all encumbrances of any nature or kind whatsoever.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolutions to rescind resolution granting permission to the Town of Hempstead, Nassau County, New York, to open and construct a road to connect with Eagle avenue around the southwest corner of Hempstead Reservoir, and to reassign the property to the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity:

July 8, 1907.

Hon. HERMAN A. METZ, Comptroller:

SIR—At a meeting of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund held January 25, 1906, a petition was presented from Mr. Ephraim J. Jennings, dated January 19, 1906, requesting that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund grant permission to the Town of Hempstead, Nassau County, to open and construct a road to connect with Eagle avenue around the southwest corner of Hempstead Reservoir, located in the County of Nassau, State of New York.

There was also presented to the Commissioners at that meeting a communication from the Hon. Frank J. Goodwin, Deputy Commissioner of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, dated January 22, 1906, turning over to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, in accordance with the provisions of section 205 of the revised Greater New York Charter, as being no longer required by his department, that portion of the City's lands as described on a map which was annexed to his communication, for the purpose of assignment to the Town of Hempstead in order to permit of the construction of a road to connect with Eagle avenue, and for no other purpose.

There was also presented a report from this office in the matter, and the recommendation was made for the adoption of a resolution to carry out an agreement with the Town of Hempstead. The Town of Hempstead objected to the form of the resolution of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, and an examination of the Charter showed that the Commissioner of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity could, with the consent of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, enter into an agreement for the laying out and the opening of this road. Before the Commissioner of the Department of Water Supply can enter into an agreement with the Town of Hempstead, which agreement is to be approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, it will be necessary for the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to rescind all action taken by them at their meeting held January 25, 1906, in the matter of Eagle avenue, and reassign to the Commissioner of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity the property shown on map entitled "Location of Eagle avenue and proposed new road through property belonging to The City of New York, Town of Hempstead, Nassau County, New York, map or plate No. 3312, file D-7," and I so recommend.

Sir—Pursuant to section 27, chapter 230, of the Laws of 1898, I beg to submit the following report of the proceedings of my Bureau for the three months ending June 30, 1907:

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.
