CORRESPONDENCE WITH REGARD TO FIFTH AVENUE STATION ON PROPOSED EXTENSION OF McADOO SUBWAY ON 42d STREET

The Secretary presented the following communications from Herman A. Metz, Comptroller of the City of New York, and W. G. McAdoo, President of the Hudson and Manhattan Railroad Company:

HON. WILLIAM R. WILLCOX, Chairman, Public Service Commission for the First District, 154 Nassau Street, New York City:

DEAR SIR:—The special committee of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment had a hearing yesterday on the certificate for connection granted by your Commission to the Hudson and Manhattan Railroad Company, dated May 4, 1909. The certificate provided for the construction of a double-track railroad, and locates that part of the line under 42d Street within the southerly half thereof.

The certificate also provides for a station at 42d Street and Fifth Avenue, and reserves to your Commission the power to permit the location and construction of a portion of this station within the northerly half of 42d Street.

Objection has been raised to the certificate on the ground that your Commission may exercise this power in such way as to prevent the construction of another subway in the northerly half of 42d Street.

The Hudson and Manhattan Railroad Company stated at the hearing that it was not the intention or desire of that company to locate or construct any part of said station or structures at Fifth Avenue and 42d Street in such a way as to interfere with the use of the northerly half of 42d Street for another subway.

The committee is apparently ready to report to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in favor of the approval of said certificate of May 4, 1909, if the committee were assured that your Commission does not intend and will not permit the location and construction of any part of the tunnels or stations of the Hudson and Manhattan Railroad Company at or near 42d Street and Fifth Avenue, in such way as to interfere with the construction and operation of any other subway than the space north of the center line of 42d Street, which you have reserved for another subway line. If the committee receives from you an expression on this point I believe a report can be made for the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for next Friday's meeting, if we can have your reply in time to get the report on the calendar.

Public Service Commission for the First District, 154 Nassau Street, New York City:

DEAR SIR:—At the hearing before the special committee of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held Thursday last (Comptroller Metz presiding) upon the certificate granted by your Board to the Hudson and Manhattan Railroad Company on May 4, 1909, objection was raised by Mr. Hedley, on behalf of the Interborough Rapid Transit Company, to the provision on page 28 restricting the tunnels of this company to the southerly half of 42d Street, upon the ground that such restriction did not also include the proposed station at the corner of 42d Street and Fifth Avenue. He claimed that under this certificate such station could be located by your Board upon the northerly half of said street, in such a way as to interfere with the construction of another subway in the northerly half of said street. We stated to the committee that it was the purpose of your Commission to reserve the northerly half of 42d Street so that the same could be used for another subway, and that this company had no purpose or desire to locate said station in such a way as to interfere with any such subway, and was prepared to make a stipulation to that effect. The committee stated that, in other respects, they were in favor of approving the certificate granted by your Board, and that if the committee of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment was advised that you would not locate or approve plans for the location of the said station at the corner of 42d Street and Fifth Avenue in such a way as to interfere with another subway in the northerly half of said street, they would, upon receipt of such a letter, report in favor of the approval of said certificate by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. They have adjourned the meeting of said committee until Wednesday next, June 2d, for the purpose of permitting us to procure and file with them such a letter from you.

We respectfully request that your Board write to the special committee of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in relation to this matter, in such form as you deem proper.

HON. HERMAN A. METZ, Chairman, Special Committee of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, 280 Broadway, New York City:

DEAR SIR:—We are in receipt of your communication of May 28, 1909, stating that your committee desires certain information from this Commission relative to one point in the Hudson and Manhattan franchise. This point is whether the Commission intends to allow the station upon the Hudson and Manhattan subway at the corner of 42d Street and Fifth Avenue to be located or constructed in such a way as to interfere with another subway in the northerly half of 42d Street upon the same level.

In reply we invite your attention to certain statements made in our communication to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, dated May 4, 1909, which showed the attitude of the Commission upon that date and indicates its present attitude and the attitude it will continue to take in the future:

“The Commission has taken extreme care to see that the proposed extension, so far as possible, shall be so constructed that it will not interfere * * * with any proper extension or modification of the present Interborough subway, nor with the construction of any independent rapid transit lines to be built by the city or by private companies. The Commission has considered this essential, for no subway route should be approved or located in such a way that it may prevent the construction of other lines to accommodate the public, or that may interfere with the building and operation of a broad, comprehensive system of passenger and freight transportation, not only in Manhattan but in all the other boroughs.

* * * * *

“In 42d Street the tunnel is to be built upon the south side of the street, so that it will be possible to build two more tracks upon the same level north of it, which tracks may be used * * * as a continuation of the Steinway tunnel or by an entirely independent company.”

All of the work already done by the Commission would be lost if it permitted any station or any approach thereto to be constructed in such a way as to bar other lines, especially after it has required the Hudson and Manhattan Company to make many changes in its plans in order that they should interfere in no wise with other lines. When the Hudson and Manhattan Company comes to the Commission for the approval of its plans, as it must under the franchise, this Commission will see that these plans do not interfere in any way with any other subway which may be planned or constructed north of the center line of 42d Street, such space being reserved for another subway.

SIRS:—The Public Service Commission for the First District, in pursuance of a resolution of the said Commission, transmits to you herewith two requisitions for the authorization by you of bonds of the City of New York sufficient to meet the requirements of extra work in the lengthening of stations upon the Manhattan-Bronx rapid transit railroad and upon the Brooklyn-Manhattan rapid transit railroad under the contracts for the construction of the said railroads, respectively, with John B. McDonald, bearing date February 21, 1900, and with Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company, bearing date July 21, 1902.

It is estimated that the cost of this extra work of lengthening stations upon the Manhattan-Bronx rapid transit railroad will be and will not exceed the sum of one million one hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$1,150,000.00), and that the cost of lengthening such stations in the case of the Brooklyn-Manhattan rapid transit railroad will be and will not exceed the sum of three hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$350,000.00), making the estimated cost of this extra work in the case of the two rapid transit railroads, constituting the present subway, one million five hundred thousand dollars (\$1,500,000.00). The Commission has caused tentative drawings to be made showing, as to the stations, the work which it is proposed shall be executed and an estimate of the expense necessary to be incurred for the lengthening of these stations. The estimate as to this expense is agreed upon as being proper and necessary by Mr. George H. Pegram, Chief Engineer of the contractors, and by Mr. Henry B. Seaman, Chief Engineer of this Commission.

A set of these tentative plans and a copy of these estimates is herewith transmitted for your information.

The lengthening of these platforms is necessary for the relief of congestion in transportation in the City of New York. The rapid transit subway railroad was designed originally to carry 400,000 passengers a day. The principal reason to be urged in favor of lengthening the station platforms is that it will increase the service and capacity of the subway as much as twenty-five per cent. The increase of traffic in the City of New York is limited only by the means to carry it. Yet even if no more passengers were carried the increased comfort to passengers now carried, it is submitted, would justify the increase in capacity. At present eight-car express trains and five-car local trains are being operated, but after the lengthening of the stations it is proposed that ten-car express trains and six-car local trains shall be operated.

Designed, as above stated, to carry 400,000 passengers a day, it appears that the average number of passengers carried per day in April, 1909, was 752,133, and on heavy days, as upon April 5, 1909, there were carried 874,103, and upon April 12th, 893,023.

The total number of passengers carried in the subway for the years 1905, 1906, 1907 and 1908 were as follows:

The population of the city in 1905 was 4,014,000 people and the traveling population 1,231,000,000. It is estimated that the population of the city at the present rate is doubling every thirty to thirty-two years, and that the traveling population is doubling every twelve years. It is manifest that the present accommodations cannot keep pace with this increase, and it is considered that the investment of the amount now requested in the lengthening of the stations is a proper and necessary increase in the cost of the subway for the relief of the congested condition and in order to increase the service and capacity of the subway.

The cost of the execution of this construction as extra work will be added to the cost of the subway and be a part of the amount upon which interest and sinking fund charges are required to be paid by the contractor in the case of each contract.

Plans more in detail, showing the work to be performed in the lengthening of each station, are necessary to be prepared, the expense of preparing which, measured by the pay-roll of the engineering force to be engaged thereon, will amount to a considerable sum, estimated to be as much as \$10,000.00, and will require some six weeks for their completion.

The Commission therefore transmits these requisitions to the end that the appropriation requested may be made and that the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment may be given to the preparation of these detailed plans and to the execution of this work so that the construction work in the case of some of the stations may be begun at the earliest possible moment.

CONTINUOUS TRANSIT SECURITIES COMPANY—OFFER TO BID ON MOVING PLATFORM ROUTES

The Secretary presented the following communication from the Continuous Transit Securities Company, which was referred to the Committee of the Whole:

HON. WILLIAM R. WILLCOX, Chairman, Public Service Commission for the First District, Tribune Building, New York:

DEAR SIR:—In view of the several amendments of the Rapid Transit Act, recently enacted by the New York Legislature, we hereby withdraw our proposition, dated February 23, 1909, and in place thereof submit the following:

If your Honorable Commission will prepare a certificate and advertise for proposals for a franchise in accordance with paragraph No. 22 of said act, under which your Commission is authorized to contract with private capital for the construction, maintenance and operation of rapid transit roads, this company will become a bidder for a franchise covering the construction of the following route and equip and operate the same with the continuous train or moving platform, to wit:—

A subway (Route No. 4 on map), beginning with a loop at or near the express station of the present subway, at the intersection of Fourth Avenue and 14th Street and extending thence north on Broadway and terminating in a loop at or near the local station of the present subway at Times Square. It is the proposition of this company to construct this subway, wherever practicable, in the form of an arcade, with the continuous train in the center, promenades on each side and frequent entrances and exits from and to buildings and intersecting streets. But if, in the opinion of your Honorable Commission, it is not desirable to make the arcade feature obligatory upon the contractor, this company will construct said subway purely as a transportation subway and introduce the arcade feature only at such points where the city may authorize said improvement.

As an alternative, this company would also bid under the same section of the act for the construction, maintenance and operation of either one of the following two moving platform routes:

First.—(Route No. 1 on map) Beginning at the Brooklyn plaza of the Williamsburg Bridge, on an elevated structure, and crossing said bridge to the Manhattan plaza, thence in the subway through Delancey Street, crossing the Bowery and under private property to Centre Street, thence south on Centre Street to near the Manhattan end of the Brooklyn Bridge, thence along Park Row and south on Nassau Street to Broad Street, thence south on Broad Street to Beaver Street, thence west on Beaver Street to a connection with the present subway at Bowling Green. We respectfully suggest that, if found practicable and desirable, this route may be divided into sections and such section as you may designate constructed in advance of the others.

Second.—(Route No. 5 on map) A crosstown subway on 34th Street, extending from Second to Ninth Avenue.

For the details of construction we beg to refer you to the plans filed with your Chief Engineer in explanation of our proposition dated February 23d last.

Hon. FRANCIS K. PENDLETON, Corporation Counsel, City of New York:

DEAR SIR:—The Rapid Transit Act, being chapter 4 of the Laws of 1891, has been amended at the present session of the Legislature by chapter 498 of the Laws of 1909. Among the sections amended is section 62 of the Rapid Transit Act which has heretofore empowered commissioners of appraisal appointed in pursuance of the act to employ clerks, stenographers, etc. The authority for the employment of clerks, stenographers and surveyors has been repealed, and the amendment provides that the Corporation Counsel shall designate assistants to act as clerks to the commissioners of appraisal in all proceedings without compensation therefor other than their salaries, and shall furnish to the commissioners of appraisal in each proceeding suitable offices and all the assistance which they may require in conducting their proceedings and preparing their reports for presentation to the Supreme Court for confirmation.

We are advised by Counsel to the Commission that the authority of commissioners of appraisal to employ clerks, stenographers and surveyors has ceased upon the taking effect of this amendment on May 26, 1909, and we accordingly transmit to you herewith a copy of section 62 of the Rapid Transit Act as amended, with the request that you furnish in conformity therewith such conveniences and assistance hereafter as commissioners of appraisal may require, and that no expense for assistance after the taking effect of chapter 498 of the Laws of 1909 shall be hereafter allowed or approved.

SECOND AVENUE RAILROAD COMPANY ET AL.—WHEELGUARDS

An adjourned hearing was held at 2:30 P. M., Commissioner Maltbie presiding, in regard to specifications and drawings of wheelguards used on surface cars operated in the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx submitted by the Second Avenue Railroad Company and the Central Park, North and East River Railroad Company. Appearances: H. H. Whitman for the Commission; Dykman, Oeland and Kuhn, by Mr. Taylor, for the Central Park, North and East River Railroad Company; Brainerd Tolles for the Receiver of the Second Avenue Railroad Company. Mr. Taylor applied for an adjournment, which was refused, and also interposed an objection to the hearing. Mr. Tolles submitted some remarks on the question of burden of proof, but Commissioner Maltbie pointed out that the question was not one of burden of proof but of ascertaining the facts. George W. Linch, Receiver of the Second Avenue Railroad Company, called in its behalf, testified as to the use on the company's line of the Sterling non-automatic pilot wheelguard, substantially of the type described in the plans submitted for approval, the repair of cars by him, the repair, replacement and improvements made by him in the wheelguards, the construction and operation of this type of wheelguard, the operating conditions on the company's line, the number of cars operated and their equipment with such wheelguards, certain wheelguard tests made under his direction, compared the construction, operation and efficiency of types of automatic drop wheelguards with the Sterling non-automatic wheelguards, and expressed a view that properly maintained the Sterling non-automatic wheelguard was the most efficient for his line. J. Albert Stowe, president of a wheelguard manufacturing company, testified as to the general sale by the company of Sterling non-automatic wheelguards, the construction and operation of the wheelguard, compared it with other types of automatic drop wheelguards, and expressed a view that the proposed type of wheelguard would give the most efficient service on the Second Avenue line. Frank Parks, employed by the Receiver, testified as to his experience with the Sterling non-automatic wheelguard and other types of automatic drop wheelguards, the difficulties of maintaining automatic drop wheelguards in an efficient state in view of the operating conditions on the Second Avenue line, and also expressed a view favorable to the use of the Sterling non-automatic wheelguard. George W. Linch, General Manager of the Central Park, North and East River Railroad Company, recalled in its behalf, testified as to the use of the Sterling non-automatic pilot wheelguards on the 59th Street crosstown line, the number of cars operated, the conditions prevailing on the line, and the rental of the cars operated from the Metropolitan Street Railway Company, and said that the testimony presented as to the Second Avenue line applied also to the 59th Street line. Adjourned to June 7, 1909, at 9:30 A. M. [See Item No. 903.]

M., Commissioner Eustis presiding, on the application of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company for permission to discontinue its 183d Street station in The Bronx. Appearances: H. M. Chamberlain for the Commission, Alexander S. Lyman for the company. Harry Cameron, Rutherford B. Washburn, Frederick Penny and Frank H. Friss, employees of the company, called in its behalf, testified as to obtaining signatures of numerous patrons of the Harlem division of the company's road to points north of 183d Street station to petitions in favor of the discontinuance of the 183d Street station, which petitions were received in evidence. Edward M. Freeborn, William T. Smith and John L. C. Davies, employees of the company, also called in its behalf, testified as to having called upon and interviewed many of the persons whose names were subscribed to the petitions, and gave in evidence their reports of their canvass. Counsel for the company reviewed the facts. Commissioner Eustis expressed the opinion that upon the disposition of this application depended in a great measure the future policy of the company in relation to all stations along the Harlem depression in New York City; that the principle involved was whether the company had the right, after the city had borne the expense of the depression and the company had established stations along that line, to deprive those who desired to use the stations from that benefit; that the contribution by certain adjoining property owners of one-half the expense of constructing the station created an equitable claim for its continuance; that with the inauguration of more frequent train service and a five-

cent fare the passenger traffic would greatly increase, and pointed out that suburban traffic was carried by other steam railroads at a profit. Counsel for the company having requested an opportunity of presenting argument before the whole Commission, the hearing was adjourned for that purpose subject to notice. [See Item No. 894.]

EAST RIVER TERMINAL RAILROAD—CERTIFICATE AS TO GRADE CROSSINGS AND CERTIFICATE OF APPROVAL

(c) One track beginning at the westerly side line of Kent Avenue; thence curving northerly and easterly across Kent Avenue and North 4th Street to the northerly side line of North 4th Street to a point about one hundred and ten (110) feet easterly from the easterly side line of Kent Avenue.

Resolved, That in view of the reports of Walter Bensel, M. D., Sanitary Superintendent of the Department of Health, relative to the failure of William Horie of No. 198 Seventh street, Elmhurst, Borough of Queens, referred to in a certain contract dated May 13, 1909, between The City of New York by the Department of Health, and said William Horie, contractor, for relaying sewer and appurtenances at Elizabeth avenue, Wavecrest avenue and Grand avenue boulevard, Arverne, in the Fifth Ward of the Borough of Queens, to perform the work under said contract in the manner prescribed therein; now, therefore, this Board is of the opinion, and so certifies in writing, that the work under said contract is unnecessarily and unreasonably delayed, and the said contractor is wilfully violating the conditions of the contract, and that the work is not being done or progressing according to the terms of the contract.

Resolved, That the contractor be notified to discontinue the work under said contract as provided in Clause L thereof, and thereupon the Board of Health in the manner prescribed by law, by contract or otherwise, place such and so many persons as it may deem advisable to work at and complete the work in said contract prescribed, in the manner in all respects as provided in said Clause L of the contract.

Resolved, That notice in the following form be sent to the said contractor and his sureties:

“WILLIAM HORIE and BANKERS SURETY COMPANY:

“Sirs—Take notice that as provided in Clause L of the contract dated May 13, 1909, between The City of New York, by the Department of Health, and William Horie, contractor for relaying sewer and appurtenances at Elizabeth avenue, Wavecrest avenue and Grand avenue boulevard, Arverne, in the Fifth Ward of the Borough of Queens, and in pursuance of a resolution adopted at a special meeting of the Board of Health held on the 13th day of July, 1909, the Board of Health is of the opinion, and so certifies in writing that the work under said contract is unnecessarily and unreasonably delayed, and the said contractor, to wit, William Horie, is wilfully violating the conditions and covenants of said contract, and is not executing the same in good faith, and that the work is not being done or progressing according to the terms of said contract.

“The said contractor, to wit, William Horie, is hereby notified to discontinue all work under said contract or any part of such work.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.
