Resolutions.

That the permits granted for the removal of bodies from the cemeteries in Sixth avenue, between Forty-fifth and Forty-sixth streets, and Eighty-ninth street, between Madison and Fifth avenues, on or before May 1st, are extended to May 15, 1875.

That J. G. Dudley, Edward J. Gallagher, and Lewis Morris be appointed Clerks to this Board, at a salary of \$1,200 per annum from the 15th inst.

That leave of absence of one week be granted to the Sanitary Superintendent.

That the Secretary be directed to notify applicants for the position of Assistant Sanitary Inspectors to appear at this office for examination.

That a copy of the petition of citizens, in respect to the sanitary condition of building near Fordham Depot, protesting against its occupancy by Police and Civil Courts, and the report of the Sanitary Superintendent thereon, be forwarded to his Honor the Mayor.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending April 10, 1875. The number of inspections made by the Inspectors was 1,842, as follows:

1 public building, 710 tenement houses, 179 private dwellings, 154 other dwellings, 18 manufacturing and workshops, 9 stores and warehouses, 90 stables, 50 slaughter-houses, 2 roadways, 2 fat-rendering establishments, 1 market, 2 public sewers and drains, 1 dumping-ground, 1 ice-pond, 84 sunken and vacant lots, 133 yards, courts, and areas, 52 cellars and basements, 84 waste-pipes and drains, 112 privies and water-

closets, 30 street-gutters and sidewalks, 9 dangerous stairways, 2 cisterns and cesspools, 6 dangerous and smoky chimneys, 85 visits of the Inspectors to contagious diseases.

The number of reports received thereon from the Inspectors was 627.

During the past week 93 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Inspectors for investigation and report.

72 permits were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer.

177 permits were granted scavengers to disinfect, empty, and clean privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 69 dwellings where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 59 houses, 59 privy-sinks, clothing, etc.

43 cases of small-pox were removed to the Hospital, and 4 dead bodies to the Morgue, by the Ambulance Corps.

The following number of cases of contagious diseases was reported during the week ending April 10, 1875:

Typhus fever, 4; typhoid fever, 10; scarlet fever, 39; measles, 3; diphtheria, 78; small-pox, 73; and cerebro-spinal meningitis.

3,927 cans were removed by the scavengers from the privy-vaults of the city.

The following amount of meat and fish was condemned by the officers as unfit for human food: Cattle, 1 carcass; calves (bob), 50 carcasses; hog, 1 carcass; beef, 113 pounds; veal, 90 pounds; game, 200 pounds; and fish, 3,800 pounds.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

During the week ending April 10, 1875, there were issued from this Bureau 572 burial permits for city deaths, 31 for bodies *in transitu*, and 34 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 572 deaths, 220 marriages, 445 births, 34 still-births, 31 applications for transit permits, and 56 returns from Coroners. There were 19 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths, and 2 transcripts of birth-record, 2 of marriage, and 21 of death were issued from this Bureau; 2 cases of deaths were referred to Coroners.

To the Secretary of the Board of Health:

SIR—There were 572 deaths reported in this city during the week that ended on Saturday, the 10th instant. There were 545 deaths verified for the week ending on the 3d instant. For the first time since the beginning of the year the actual number of deaths in the city has fallen below the number in corresponding weeks in the average of the past five years. The death-rate for the week ending on the 3d instant was equal to 27.25 annually in the 1,000 inhabitants, and in the week ending on the 10th instant it was slightly increased by a few causes which added to the number that died of chronic diseases. There was no increase of diphtheria, croup, scarlatina and fevers.

The decrease in fatal pneumonia and bronchitis, and the course of diphtheria, croup and scarlatina during the past six weeks is shown, as follows:

The course of diphtheria in different districts of the city continues to present the fact, that while it is persistent in the localities where its mortality has been greatest steadily for two years past (in a portion of the Nineteenth, Twentieth, and Twenty-second Wards), its prevalence in other districts is less persistent, though, in particular houses, exceedingly fatal. The records for the past four weeks show what has been the relative fatality of this malady in the nine wards which have suffered most:

There were 209 deaths by diphtheria in the city during these four weeks, and all except 57 of them were in these nine wards, and 53 of them were in the Nineteenth, Twentieth and Twenty-second, where the disease has been persistent for two years and upwards.

ORDINANCES.

ORDINANCE Relating to Hackney Coaches or Carriages.

Rates and Prices of Fares.

AN ORDINANCE amending the Ordinances entitled "Ordinances for the Government of Hackney Coaches in the City of New York," passed October 7, 1874.

The Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York, in Common Council convened, do ordain as follows:

The Title Third of said Ordinances shall be amended so as to read as follows:

TITLE THIRD OF THE RATES AND PRICES OF FARES:

The prices or rates of fares to be taken by or paid to the owners or drivers of hackney coaches or carriages, shall be as follows:

1st. For conveying a passenger any distance not exceeding one mile, fifty cents; for conveying two passengers the same distance, seventy-five cents, or thirty-seven and a half cents each; and for every additional passenger, thirty-seven and a half cents.

2d. For conveying a passenger any distance exceeding a mile, and within two miles, seventy-five cents; and for every additional passenger, thirty-seven and a half cents.

3d. For the use of a hackney coach or carriage by the hour, with one or more passengers, with the privilege of going from place to place, and stopping as often as may be required, one dollar an hour.

4th. In all cases where the hiring of a hackney coach or carriage is not at the time thereof specified to be by the day or hour, it shall be deemed to be by the mile.

5th. For children between two and fourteen years of age, half price is only to be charged; and for children under two years of age, no charge is to be made.

6th. Whenever a hackney coach or carriage shall be detained, excepting as aforesaid, the owner or driver shall be allowed after the rate of seventy-five cents an hour.
