

At a meeting of the Board of Docks of the City of New York, held at the office of the Board, Pier "A," Battery place, Thursday, August 4, 1892, at 11 o'clock A. M.

The minutes of the meeting held on the 28th ultimo were read and approved.

The following communications were received, read, and,

On motion, ordered to be placed on file, viz.:

From the Counsel to the Corporation—Submitting an opinion as to the authority of the Department, under chapter 298 of the Laws of 1892, to grant permits for the erection of sheds on certain wharf property on the East river, the plans for which do not provide an upper story to be set apart

From the Finance Department—Returning the proposal of Barth. S. Cronin for repairing the bulkhead between West Tenth and Charles streets, North river, and for paving in the rear of same under Contract No. 416, and the proposal of the Atlantic Dredging Company for dredging at various places on the North and East rivers, under Contract No. 423 with the approval of the adequacy and sufficiency of the sureties.

From the Department of Public Charities and Correction-Renewing their request of May 26, 1892, for repairs to the Dock at Ward's Island. Advise that as soon as the force of the Department can undertake said work it will be commenced.

From the Department of Public Works-Requesting to be advised how far the jurisdiction of this Department extends at Twenty-fourth street west of Thirteenth avenue. The action of the President pro tem. in replying thereto, approved.

From the Long Island Railroad—Respecting the obstruction reported July 28, 1892, at Pier

From C. H. Mallory & Co. - Respecting the complaint of the Long Island Railroad Company of

From McDermott & Co.—Requesting permission to use and occupy during the pleasure of the Board the bulkhead between One Hundred and Twenty-ninth and One Hundred and Thir-

tieth streets, North river, when completed.

From the West Shore Railroad—Accepting the conditions of the resolution adopted on the 28th ultimo and stating that the permanent ferry buildings are under contract to be finished during the month of November, 1892.

From the New York, Lake Erie and Western Railroad Company—Requesting an extension of time in which to accept the terms of the permit granted on the 28th ultimo, for the use of the land under water on the north side of Pier, new 19, North river. Application granted.

From the Compagnie Generale Transatlantique—Requesting the Board to allow the said company to execute the lease of Pier, new 42, North river, without furnishing a bond. Application granted.

From John H. Starin—Reporting a collision on the 28th ultimo opposite Pier 11, East river, between the barge "Sumner" and a garbage scow. Referred to the Department of Street

From Dock Master Coye—Reporting that the bulkhead between Piers 43 and 44, East river, is endangered by large quantities of sand unloaded by Murray & Read thereat. Notify said parties that in case of a repetition of the offense a penalty will be imposed.

From Dock Master Monaghan-Reporting a hole on Pier 61, East river. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to repair if necessary.

From Dock Master Stack—Reporting that large sailing vessels are compelled to leave the Pier foot of Eighteenth street, East river, owing to an insufficient depth of water. The Engineer in-Chief directed to examine and report.

From Dock Master Walsh—Reporting that a fence has been erected between Eighty-third and Eighty-fourth streets, North river, without a permit. Notify the Dock Master that whoever erected said fence must apply to the Department for a permit.

The following reports of the Treasurer were approved and recommendations adopted :

1st. Recommending that the application of John L. Miller for permission to use and occupy bulkhead at Seventy-ninth street, North river, be denied.

2d. Recommending that a permit be granted William M. Montgomery & Co. to use and occupy Pier foot of One Hundred and Nineteenth street, Harlem river, during the pleasure of the Board, provided they agree to pay compensation at the rate of \$600 per annum, payable at the end of each quarter to the Treasurer of this Department, commencing June 15, 1892.

3d. Recommending that permit be granted the Columbia Yacht Club for boat-houses and floats at Eighty-sixth street, North river, and the Hudson River Yacht Club for boat-houses and floats at Ninety-second street, North river, provided they each agree to pay compensation at the rate of \$150 per annum, payable at the end of each month to the Dock Master of the District, commencing May 1, 1892.

Commissioners Post and Phelan, to whom was referred on April 28, 1892, the application of the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company for permission to erect a shed upon the platform between Piers 51 and 52, East river, submitted a report, which was approved, and the following resolution adopted:

following resolution adopted:

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted to the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company to construct a shed on the platform between Piers 51 and 52, East river, in accordance with the provisions of section 712 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, as amended by chapter 567 of the Laws of 1887, and sections 772 and 773 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, as amended by chapter 509 of the Laws of 1889, and chapter 298 of the Laws of 1892: the said shed to be erected in accordance with the laws and regulations in such cases made and provided, and in conformity with plans to be submitted to and approved by this Board, under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department; the said shed to remain thereat only during the pleasure of the Board, and to revert to and become the property of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York at the expiration or sooner termination of existing lease of the easterly half of Pier 51 and the westerly half of Pier 52, and the small pier between, sometimes called Pier 51½, and the bulkhead situated between the small pier and Pier 52, provided, however, that in accordance with the terms of sale of September 20, 1887, the said company shall agree to pay an additional rental of one hundred dollars per annum, payable quarterly in advance to the Treasurer of this Department, and shall file in this office within ten days from receipt hereof a written acceptance of the terms and conditions of this resolution.

5th. Reporting that the Union Railway Company have erected a retaining-wall one hundred and fifty feet long, three feet wide and eight feet high on the westerly side of the Bronx river at West Farms without a permit. Notify said company that they must make application to this Department for a permit.

Sec. 200.7 It shall be the duty of every undertaker having notice of the death of any person within the City of New York of smallpox, diphtheria, scarlet fever, yellow fever, typhus fever, Asiatuc cholora, measles, or any other contagious disease dangerous to the general health of the community, or of the bringing of the dead body of any person who has died of any such disease into such city, to give immediate notice thereof to this Department. And no undertaker shall retain or expose, or assist in the retention or exposure of the dead body of any such person except in a coffin or casket properly sealed; nor shall he allow any such body to be placed in any coffin or casket unless the body has been thoroughly disinfected and wrapped in a sheet saturated with a proper disinfecting solution and the coffin or casket be immediately and permanently sealed; nor shall he assist in the public or church fineral of any such person.
