We supply our bands to a large number of corporations in this city, to manufacturers and merchants all over the country, as well as to certain branches of the United States Government, and we feel convinced that if we could get an opportunity to bid for those used in New York City we could not only furnish bands of a superior quality, but have no doubt but that we could save the City considerable money. We understand that the bands in use by the City for some years past have been of a red or maroon color. Although we make these when they are called for, we find that the demand in ninety-nine cases out of one hundred is for the gray or dark colored bands, which, having no coloring matter in them, last longer and give better service. Understanding that the matter of submitting bids comes under your notice, we have taken the liberty of calling your attention to the above facts, and would say that if we are given an opportunity to bid on next year's supply we will furnish samples that will, at least, bear most favorable comparison with what the City has been heretofore using, and will name prices that we think it will be to the City's advantage to consider. Contagious and infectious diseases show a slight decrease, the number of cases reported of diphtheria, measles, scarlet fever, typhoid fever and small-pox being respectively 152, 119, 60, 27 and 1, against 162, 112, 55, 39 and 0 for the previous week, a total of 359 against 368. The increase of diphtheria was mainly in the Eleventh, Twenty-second and Twenty-third Wards, and the decrease in the Seventh and Twentieth Wards. The increase of measles was most marked in the Nineteenth Ward, and the decrease in the Twentieth Ward. The increase of scarlet fever was chiefly in the Twenty-third Ward, and the decrease in the Twenty-fourth Ward. Eleven of the 27 cases of typhoid fever were above Fortieth street, and 8 were below Fourteenth street.
