Approved Papers for the Week Ending May 10, 1902.

No. 187.

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and he hereby is authorized, requested and empowered to pay the bills of the New York and New Jersey Telephone Company for telephone service in the office of the Deputy City Clerk, in the Borough of Queens, amounting to one hundred and eighteen dollars and twenty cents (\$118.20), viz.: Ninety-nine dollars and fifty cents (\$99.50) for service in the year 1900, and eighteen dollars and seventy cents (\$18.70) for service in the year 1901, and charge the same to the appropriations for the respective years, entitled "City Contingencies."

No. 188.

Resolved, That the assessment erroneously laid, the details of which are more particularly set forth in the several papers hereto attached, for flagging the sidewalk in front of the property of Mrs. Susan J. Jones, No. 170 Elton street, and known as Lot No. 10, Block 318, in the Twenty-sixth Ward, Borough of Brooklyn, be and the same is hereby canceled and vacated, and the Board of Assessors is hereby authorized to transfer the assessment against Lot No. 10 to Lot No. 8, and add the same to the assessment already laid against said Lot No. 8.

Tobin, being payment in full for furnishing to "the Board of Aldermen copies of all bills, documents and printed matter introduced in the Legislature of the State, particularly affecting public interests in The City of New York, etc." in accordance with the provisions of a resolution adopted by the Board of Aldermen February 11, 1902, and approved by his Honor the Mayor February 25, 1902, the said expense to be paid out of the appropriation for "City Contingencies, 1902."

No. 190.

Whereas, The following preamble and resolution was adopted by the Board of Aldermen November 19, 1901, concurred in by the Council December 17, 1901, and received from his Honor the Mayor, December 31, 1901, without his approval or disapproval thereof:

"Whereas, The following resolution was duly adopted by the Board of Aldermen and the Council and was approved by his Honor, the Mayor, October 16, 1901: 'Resolved, That the Commissioner of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies be and he is hereby requested and authorized to procure for the use of the several members of the Municipal Assembly copies of the 'Compilation of Maps of Greater New York, showing Political Divisions,' under the recently amended Charter, said maps to be and remain the property of the City;' and

Whereas, Under date of November 6, 1901, the Commissioner of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies has advised the Board of Aldermen, in response to a request by resolution of said Board as to how soon and when he will supply the members of the Municipal Assembly with said Compilation of Maps, etc., 'that, owing to the fact the appropriation of this Department for supplies and repairs this year is exhausted, it will be impossible to honor the requisition for these maps;' therefore, be it

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and hereby is respectfully requested to appropriate the sum of eight hundred and ninety dollars (\$890), so that the Commissioner of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies may be enabled to comply with the provisions of the resolution aforesaid; and

Whereas, The said Compilations of Maps are now ready and can be delivered at once; therefore,

Resolved, That the request set forth in the foregoing preamble and resolution be and the same is hereby renewed, and when the Board of Estimate and Apportionment shall have complied therewith the City Clerk is hereby authorized and requested to deliver a set of the said maps to each member of the Board of Aldermen and the heads of the several departments of The City of New York.

No. 191.

Resolved, That upon the recommendation of the Local Board, First District, Borough of Richmond, permission be and the same is hereby given to the Automobile Club of America to conduct speed trials for automobiles on the Southside boulevard, in the Fourth Ward of the Borough of Richmond, on Saturday, May 31, 1902, between the hours of 11 o'clock a. m. and 4 o'clock p. m., or in case the day be stormy, on the first clear week-day thereafter between the same hours, and that during said hours on said day a speed of greater than eight miles per hour may be attained, to which end any and all ordinances regulating the speed of vehicles is hereby suspended, such suspensions to continue, however, only for the day and place on which the privilege herein mentioned and conveyed is exercised; and, provided further, that the said Automobile Club of America furnish all proper police protection over that part of the Southside boulevard over which the said speed trials are to be conducted.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to William C. Baker to place, erect and maintain a bridge approach and a bridge on the Queens County side of Hook creek, running between Nassau County and Queens County, as shown upon the accompanying diagram, the work to be done at his own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Bridges, this consent being granted on the express stipulation that proper consents be also obtained as necessary from the War Department of the United States and from the Supervisors of the County of Nassau.

Whereas, The increase in the price of meat throughout the City of New York, by

what is known as the "Beef Trust" is working great hardship among the toiling masses of the city, and

Whereas, Beef and mutton are an absolute necessity for the proper sustenance of life and strength, and to be deprived of them by exorbitant prices, simply to enrich greedy corporations, would ultimately tend to weaken the strength of the workingman and make him less able to perform his labor.

Resolved, That the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York strongly condemn the inhuman action of the combination known as the "Beef Trust" in increasing the price of meat, and demand the intervention of the proper authorities, and the State authorities, to immediately stop the unlawful conspiracy for private gain in a food which is an absolute necessity for the working classes of this city, and be it further

Resolved, That a copy of this resolution be sent to the President of the United States, the Attorney-General of the United States, the Governor of the State of New York, and the Attorney-General of the State of New York.

No. 194.

Whereas, James H. McInnes has been duly elected Vice-Chairman of the Board of Aldermen, and

Whereas, Under the provisions of the Charter the Vice-Chairman of the Board of Aldermen shall possess the powers and perform the duties of the President of the Board of Aldermen, when the President is sick, absent or under suspension, or while the President of the Board of Aldermen is acting as Mayor, or when a vacancy occurs in said office, and who shall, during such time be a member of every Board of which the President of said Board of Aldermen is a member by virtue of his office,

namely, a member of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, a member of the Board of Sinking Fund Commissioners and a member of the Armory Commission, and

Whereas, It is from time to time necessary for the Vice-Chairman of the Board of Aldermen to preside at meetings of the Board, and

Whereas, The position of Vice-Chairman is not only one of honor, but also responsibility; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and is hereby respectfully requested, in pursuance of the provisions of section 56 of the amended Greater New York Charter, to fix the salary of the Vice-Chairman of the Board of Aldermen at the rate of \$2,500 per year.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen April 22, 1902.

Received from his Honor the Mayor May 6, 1902, without his approval or disapproval thereof; therefore, as provided in section 40 of the Greater New York Charter, the same took effect as if he had approved it.

No. 195.

Whereas, There is a widespread and growing demand for an East Side branch of the Rapid Transit subway, a demand naturally created by the needs of the thickly populated East Side section of the city and the rapidly growing districts of Harlem and The Bronx; and

Whereas, With the West Side route rapidly nearing completion, and with the Brooklyn extension assured, the present is the opportune time to consider and act upon this important matter, in order that the actual work on such an East Side subway may begin without unnecessary and consequently dangerous delay; and

Whereas, Both prudence and economy demand early action for the reasons set forth; therefore

Resolved, That the Board of Rapid Transit Commissioners be and it is hereby earnestly requested and urged to heed the appeal of the many thousands who are demanding the same transit facilities on the East Side that are being accorded to the residents of the West Side of Manhattan and to Brooklyn;

Resolved, further, That our Committee on Railroads be and it is hereby instructed to hold public hearings, to obtain a consensus of opinion of all interested persons and taxpayers, and to recommend to this Board such local or State legislation as may be necessary to aid in the furtherance of this much desired branch of the Rapid Transit system.

No. 196.

Resolved, That the ordinance relating to the discharge of fireworks in The City of New York be and the same is hereby suspended so as to permit of a display of fireworks in front of St. Michael's Church, Tillary and Lawrence streets, Borough of Brooklyn, on May 8, 1902, such suspension to continue only for the date mentioned.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen April 22, 1902.

Received from his Honor the Mayor May 6, 1902, without his approval or disapproval thereof; therefore, as provided in section 40 of the Greater New York Charter, the same took effect as if he had approved it.

No. 197.

Resolved, That the ordinance relating to the discharge of fireworks be and the same is hereby suspended so far as the same may apply to the parade of the Societa Italiana di Mutuo Soccorso St. Giorgio Albanese in the Second Assembly District, New York County, Borough of Manhattan, on Monday, May 12, 1902, such suspension of said ordinance to continue only for the day and date mentioned.

Received from his Honor the Mayor May 6, 1902, without his approval or disapproval thereof; therefore, as provided in section 40 of the Greater New York Charter, the same took effect as if he had approved it.

No. 198.

Resolved, That his Honor the Mayor be and he is hereby respectfully requested to direct the Board of Education to take immediate steps to relieve the deplorable condition of the public schools, resulting from overcrowding, on the lower East Side of the Borough of Manhattan, and more especially to call the attention of the said Board to the urgent necessity of erecting school buildings on lands, the titles to which have been acquired by the City, and known as lands to be used for the purpose of erecting thereon annex buildings to the schools situated at Rivington street, near Pitt street, and Ridge street, near Broome street, and other lands acquired for the same purpose in other sections of the city adjoining the school district; the amount to be appropriated for public schools having practically been determined.

No. 199.

Resolved, That it is recommended to the President of the Borough of Manhattan that proceedings be begun to repave with asphalt, using as a foundation therefor the present pavement of the carriageway on each side of the tunnel in Forty-second street, between Second avenue and Ryan Park, in the Borough of Manhattan.

No. 200.

Whereas, The tunnel in Forty-second street, between First and Second avenues,



in the Borough of Manhattan, because of increased traffic, both by vehicles and pedestrians, on account of the ferry established at the foot of East Forty-second street, has become a congested thoroughfare and at night is apt to become a dangerous point, therefore

Resolved, That it is recommended to the Commissioner of Police that there be detailed at the said tunnel in Forty-second street, between First and Second avenues, in the Borough of Manhattan, an officer, or officers, so that protection to the public may be better safeguarded at said locality.

No. 201.

AN ORDINANCE providing for an issue of Corporate Stock in the amount of one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000), the proceeds whereof to be used for the construction of buildings of the Department of Public Charities.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. The Board of Aldermen hereby approves of and concurs in the following resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment April 18, 1902, authorizing the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York to the amount and for the purposes therein specified.

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 47 of the amended Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the issue of bonds to an amount not exceeding one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000) to provide for the construction of buildings of the Department of Public Charities, and that when authority therefor shall have been obtained from the Board of Aldermen the Comptroller is authorized to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York, in the manner provided by section 169 of the amended Greater New York Charter, to the amount of one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000), the proceeds whereof shall be applied to the purposes aforesaid.

No. 202.

AN ORDINANCE providing for an issue of Corporate Stock in the sum of three million dollars (\$3,000,000), the proceeds to be used for the construction, equipment and improvement of school buildings and additions thereto and the acquisition of sites therefor, in The City of New York,

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. The Board of Aldermen hereby approves of and concurs in the following resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment April 18, 1902, authorizing the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York to the amount and for the purposes therein specified.

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 47 of the amended Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the issue of Corporate Stock to an amount not exceeding three million dollars (\$3,000,000) for the purpose of providing means for the construction, equipment and improvement of school buildings and additions thereto, and the acquisition of sites therefor in The City of New York, and that when authority therefor shall have been obtained from the Board of Aldermen the Comptroller is authorized to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York in the manner provided by section 169 of the amended Greater New York Charter, to an amount not exceeding three million dollars (\$3,000,000), the proceeds whereof shall be applied to the purposes aforesaid.

No. 203.

AN ORDINANCE in relation to car transfers in The City of New York.

Be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. Every surface road or street railway company owning, operating, managing, running or controlling street railway cars in the streets or highways of The City of New York, shall cause to be placed in a conspicuous place upon the outside of each and every one of said cars so operated, on leaving company's depot or on reaching end of its route or destination, a signboard or placard upon which shall appear the name of the destination or point to which said car is to be run. Every company as aforesaid is and shall be, on and after the passage of this ordinance, obliged to carry for a single fare upon such car without change therefrom each and every passenger so desiring to the destination so indicated upon the said signboard or placard; and for every violation of the ordinance there shall be recoverable against the said company so offending a penalty of one hundred dollars, and the action to recover such penalty shall be brought in the name of The City of New York.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall not be deemed to affect, prohibit or apply to transfers to any other line, or leased line, going in another direction from that in which such car may be going, nor shall any such company as aforesaid be deemed to have violated the provisions of this ordinance where, through any accident, compliance with the said ordinance is rendered impossible.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

I beg to submit the following estimate of the amount of work involved in this improvement, and the cost:

4,800 cubic yards of grading;

3,280 linear feet of curbing;

5,540 square yards granite block pavement, on concrete foundation with tar and gravel joints;

15,000 square feet of cement sidewalk;

Total estimate cost, \$26,700.

The approximate assessed value of the land within one-half block on each side of the street is \$131,700. There is no record to indicate that Meserole street has ever been properly opened, though proceedings are now under way to open Waterbury street, rule maps for which have been requested.

There is a private sewer in Waterbury street, between Stagg and Scholes streets, while sewers in the remainder of both streets are under contract. No water mains have been laid, or authorized in either street and gas mains have been laid only on Meserole street for 210 feet east of Waterbury street. I append hereto a statement giving this information in convenient form, for use when this matter is considered by the Local Board. In reporting upon this petition, I beg to suggest that trap block is a somewhat difficult material to get, as the supply is small, and on contracts where we have used this stone we have been obliged to wait. The difference in price between trap block and granite is so slight, probably not exceeding 10 cents per square yard, that I think it would save time and be at least as satisfactory to substitute granite. The estimated amount of work and the cost of the improvement are as follows:

250 cubic yards of grading.

360 linear feet of curbing.

600 square yards of granite block or trap block pavement.

4,000 square feet of cement sidewalk.

Total estimated cost, \$2,000.

The approximate assessed value of the land within one-half block on each side of the street is \$18,900.

While this street was declared open by the Common Council of the City of Brooklyn on October 3, 1892, there is no record of any regular opening proceeding. ## DEPARTMENT OF TAXES AND ASSESSMENTS.

Report for Quarter Ending March 31, 1902.

Hon. SETH LOW, Mayor of The City of New York:

Sir—In accordance with the requirements of section 1544 of the Greater New York Charter, we make the following report of the Department of Taxes and Assessments for the three months ending March 31, 1902:

Under the provisions of the revised Charter, sections 892 and 893, the Books of Annual Record of the Assessed Valuation of Real and Personal Estate were open in the several boroughs for public inspection, examination and correction from the second Monday of January until the 1st day of April, 1902, and public notice was given thereof, as required by law.

The reduction of one month in the period allowed for filing applications for reduction of assessed valuation of real estate and for the correction of personal assessments brought no appreciable inconvenience to the Department or to the persons assessed, as ample time was found for a careful examination of all grievances brought to the attention of the Commissioners and for the filing of applications on which hearings may be had during the months of April and May.

The act of 1901, chapter 448, providing for the reduction of the organization tax of certain corporations incorporated under the laws of this State bids fair to add materially to the revenue derived from personal taxation. Of the new corporations thus organized nearly seven hundred of them are located in the boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn.

Under chapter 132, Laws of 1901, certain trust companies liable to a franchise tax under said law are exempted from assessments and taxation for all other purposes, if all taxes due and payable under chapter 132 have been paid by them. As this exemption is conditional on the payment of the franchise tax, it is necessary to make an assessment on our books against these trust companies and then to cancel the assessment upon proof of payment of the State tax.

The practical operation of the law not only places unnecessary labor on the trust companies and on this Department, but, in case of failure of the companies to furnish proof of the payment of the State tax, results in the assessment against such companies being returned to the State Comptroller in the total assessed valuation of the city and the payment by the city to the State of the tax on such valuation.

As the law imposes a heavy penalty for failure to pay the franchise tax, it is very doubtful whether the city can collect the amount of the tax paid the State on the assessment made against such defaulting companies.

With the usual remedy for collection in the hands of the State, it would appear that an amendment to the law removing the necessity of entering these corporations upon the assessment books of this Department would be in the interest of the public service.

The amendment made by the last Legislature, in section 897 of the Charter, extending the time within which the Board of Taxes and Assessments is authorized to remit or reduce, under certain conditions, a tax imposed on real or personal property, from six months to a year, will enable the Board to grant relief in many deserving cases.

## SURVEYOR'S OFFICE.

The following summary, by boroughs, shows the character and amount of work done by the office during the quarter ending March 31, 1902:

The work is divided into two parts:

I.—The necessary alterations of tax maps.

II.—The preparation of tax block assessment maps.

I.—The necessary alterations of tax maps—

Tax maps are altered for the following reasons:

1. Subdivision of ownership of farms and large tracts of land.
2. Erection of buildings having dimensions differing from lot dimensions shown on tax maps.
3. Transfers of narrow strips of land for party walls or for the purpose of clearing title on account of encroachments.
4. The consolidation of small plots for the erection of large buildings.
5. Lands acquired for public purposes, such as streets, avenues, parks, parkways, aqueducts, reservoirs, schools, engine houses, bridge approaches and water-front improvements, either by condemnation proceedings or by cession to the City.
6. Changes in street system due to acts of Legislature and of municipal boards; also changes in street names due to city ordinances.
7. The construction of new piers and bulkheads, and the alteration and extension of piers; the granting of lands under water by the State of New York.

## BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN.

Alterations were made affecting 390 lots in the 37 volumes of block tax assessment maps; the copies used by the Deputy Commissioners were also altered. The copies of the block tax assessment maps in the Bureau of Arrears, consisting of 37 volumes, and in the office of the Water Register, consisting of 36 volumes, were corrected during the quarter for all alterations made in the year 1901; the number of lots affected in both copies was 15,996.

## BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

Alterations were made affecting 353 lots in the 31 volumes of block tax assessment maps and in the 6 volumes of tentative maps; the copies used by the Deputy Commissioners were also altered. The copies of the block tax assessment maps in the Bureau of Arrears and in the Water Register's office, each consisting of 31 volumes, were corrected during the quarter for all alterations made during the year 1901. The number of lots affected in both cases was 9,224.

## BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN.

Alterations were made affecting 559 lots in the 16 volumes of block tax assessment maps and in the 56 volumes of tentative maps; the copies used by the Deputy Commissioners, consisting of 42 volumes, were also altered.

## BOROUGH OF QUEENS.

Alterations were made affecting 488 lots in the 31 volumes of tentative maps; the copies used by the Deputy Commissioners were also altered.

## BOROUGH OF RICHMOND.

Alterations were made affecting 194 lots in the 13 volumes of tentative maps; the copies used by the Deputy Tax Commissioners were also altered.

The total number of lots affected by alteration during the quarter, inclusive of duplicates, is 29,185.

II.—The preparation of block tax assessment maps:

Chapter 542, Laws of 1892, provides that two copies of the block tax assessment maps shall be prepared for use in the Department of Taxes and Assessments, one copy for the Bureau of Arrears, in the Comptroller's office, and one copy for the Water Register, in the Department of Water Supply. The Board of Taxes and Assessments not only prepares the maps for three Departments, but also alters and corrects the maps, as stated in the first portion of this report.

Block tax assessment maps have been completed and are now in use for the entire Borough of Manhattan, for so much of the Borough of The Bronx as lies west of the Bronx river, and for sections 1 to 4 of the Borough of Brooklyn. Sections 5 to 8 of the Borough of Brooklyn, consisting of sixteen volumes of maps, were in progress during the quarter; the four copies thereof comprise sixty-four volumes, which will soon be completed, and can be used as a basis for the preparation of field and record books for the tax of 1903.

The entire Borough of Brooklyn is subdivided into twenty-five sections.

## BUREAU OF INFORMATION.

The work of this Bureau is of a variable character, relating largely to the examination of records of the Surrogate's office, County Clerk's and Register's office;



the record of real estate conveyances and leases, mortuary lists, and such other reliable sources of information in the several boroughs as may be of service to the Real Estate and Personal Bureaus of the Department. The result of these examinations is tabulated and placed in record form, so as to be readily accessible for present and future use.

Hon. WILLIAM E. STILLINGS, Chairman, Change of Grade Damage Commission:

Dear Sir—I am in receipt of a number of communications from the heads of Departments during the last few weeks wherein my attention has been directed to the lack of system and want of economy shown in the present method of paying the weekly payroll of Laborers and others.

In some few of such communications the head of the Department has prepared an estimate of the actual pecuniary loss to the City caused by taking the men from their work to concentrate at the given place selected by the Paymaster.

This question has resolved itself into a very important matter, and the fact that men are diverted from their work for any considerable portion of the day is a subject for consideration and the subsequent application of a proper remedy.

For the purpose of obtaining statistical information as to the actual loss sustained by the City in continuing the present method of the payment of weekly salaries for Laborers and others I would thank you to inform me at your early convenience as to the approximate monetary loss sustained by your Department weekly by reason of pursuing the plan of concentrating the Laborers and others in your employ at the time of payment of their salaries.

I should be pleased also to have from you any criticism of the present system or suggestions for improvement.

Third.—That the limits of our assessment for benefit include all those lands, tenements and hereditaments and premises situate, lying and being in the Borough of The Bronx, in The City of New York, which, taken together, are bounded and described as follows, viz.:

Beginning at a point formed by the intersection of a line parallel to and distant 100 feet southerly from the southerly line of West Two Hundred and Fifty-sixth street with a line parallel to and distant 100 feet westerly from the westerly line of Netherland avenue; running thence northerly along last mentioned parallel line to its intersection with the westerly prolongation of the middle line of the block between West Two Hundred and Sixtieth street and West Two Hundred and Sixty-first street; thence easterly along said westerly prolongation, middle line and its easterly prolongation to its intersection with a line parallel to and distant 100 feet easterly from the easterly line of Broadway; thence southerly along said parallel line to its intersection with the southwesterly line of Moshulu avenue; thence westerly in a straight line to the point formed by the intersection of the westerly line of Newton avenue with a line parallel to and distant 100 feet southwesterly from the southwesterly line of Faraday avenue; thence northwesterly, westerly and southwesterly along said parallel line to its intersection with the easterly prolongation of a line parallel to and distant 100 feet southerly from the southerly line of West Two Hundred and Fifty-sixth street; thence westerly along said easterly prolongation and parallel line to the point or place of beginning; as such streets are shown upon the final maps and profiles of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards of The City of New York, excepting from said area all streets, avenues and roads or portions thereof heretofore legally opened as such area is shown upon our benefit maps deposited as aforesaid.

Fourth.—That our report herein will be presented for confirmation to the Supreme Court of the State of New York, First Department, at a special term thereof, Part I., to be held in the County Courthouse, in the Borough of Manhattan, in The City of New York, on the 11th day of July, 1902, at the opening of the court on that day.
