The old party wall, which is intended to be increased in height, is a good and substantial wall, well built in lime mortar and perfectly safe to be built upon. The old wall, which is 12 inches thick, 47 feet above foundation wall in height, is proposed to be increased 8 feet 3 inches in height, over its present height.

To omit the lining of old party wall on first story.

To save room on first story, and also to save the unnecessary expense by having the lining omitted.

It is desired that the Superintendent of Buildings persist in this appellation. Said building has been an apartment hotel for a long time, and is intended to be used as an apartment hotel. It is purposed to alter this building from an arrangement having five apartments on a floor to one with seven apartments. The new arrangement adds two additional rooms on each story. Present bathrooms taken off present non-fireproof shafts and arranged to open on new fireproof vent shafts. Present non-fireproof freight elevator shaft replaced by new fireproof shaft. To extend building in rear is impossible as there is only four feet of ground between the building and rear line of lot, and the extension in front would be impractical in the way the present building is constructed, and removing piazza and change stair hall will be more expensive to the owner.

The following facts are submitted for your consideration in our appeal to you from the denial by the Superintendent of Buildings of the Borough of Brooklyn of our application to repair and alter the premises known as Nos. 62 and 64 Montague street, Brooklyn.

This building is in fact a very handsome apartment hotel overlooking New York harbor, with one of the most attractive outlooks in the Greater City. For many years it has been used strictly as an apartment hotel, no matter what its technical designation may have been. It was built about 1887 and was then technically designated as a tenement house, as we are now advised by the Superintendent of Buildings.

The present owners of the building knew nothing of this until they were so advised by Mr. Moore. It has never been a tenement in any way other than in a strictly technical sense.

We are now advised that in 1899 changes were made in the building, but what the character of these changes were we do not know, excepting that from the records it seems that a dining room was placed on the first floor to accommodate those occupants of apartments who wished to use it. Other changes were probably made at this time, but what they were we do not know. At all events, every change has been for the better. It has been continually improved in character as a high grade apartment hotel.

The present owners purchased the property in 1906 and had no idea that the building was anything other than an apartment hotel and registered as such with the Superintendent of Buildings.

There has been a violation filed by the Building Department claiming that it was an apartment hotel, and the present owners had no idea that it was anything else.

We now learn that in the year 1905, the former owners had had some controversy as to whether or not it was under the Tenement House Department or the Building Department, and the Tenement House Department relinquished jurisdiction and turned it over to the Building Department, which sent their Inspectors to examine it, and such Inspectors declared it to be an apartment hotel. The record of such inspection is submitted herewith.

We now learn that formerly there were four apartments so arranged for independent housekeeping, and we understand that this makes the building technically a tenement house. However, we also are advised that only two of these were really used, i. e., the restaurant and the janitor's quarters. The other two prepared for the use of tenants in suites were not actually used. The Tenement House Department records show that it is a fact that these two apartments were not so used for independent housekeeping, and on that account their counsel recommended that they should turn the building over to the Building Department.

As a matter of fact, the two kitchenettes connected with tenant suites which caused this trouble were removed a long time ago.

On September 9, 1907, the inside of the building was partially destroyed by fire and water, and the owners now wish to repair it with certain improvements as to its beauty, utility and safety, without substantially changing the character of the building. That is to say:

The present plans have for their purpose the changing of the inside of the building only in immaterial matters. The building as repaired will have no facilities for independent housekeeping, except the restaurant and janitor's quarters; the building will be greatly improved in beauty and fireproofing.

In other words, the repairs and slight alterations will not change the character of the building in any respect. It will, however, be far handsomer and far more nearly fireproof than heretofore. In other words, the owners seek to improve and not to make it less desirable.

The owners find themselves now between Scylla and Charybdis. The Tenement House Department say that it does not belong to them, and the Building Department, which has actually exercised jurisdiction for a long time, sending their Inspectors to examine it and make reports and to make orders in relation to fire escapes, etc., now say that an examination of the records shows a technical tenement house, and the Building Department, like the Tenement House Department, says that it has no jurisdiction, and suggests that the matter should be referred to the Board of Examiners for their determination.

The owners understand that the Building Department would not be averse to continue to assume jurisdiction over this building, if they have the Board of Examiners' consent for so doing, and in view of the wide discretion granted by sections 410 and 411 of the Charter, even to modifying the law, we ask that the Board of Examiners will grant their approval of the plans submitted to the architect.

In view of the fact that we do not ask any actual change in the character of the building; that we seek only to make improvements and to better its condition in every way, and that we are only asking what has been done in other buildings, we respectfully request that the petition be granted.

We call attention to the building Nos. 101 and 103 Montague street, nearly across the street from The Arlington, and yet not so favorably situated in this, Brooklyn's more exclusive residence district, which building was changed in substantially the way asked for in this petition. We call attention to the records of the Building Department, B. 113, 1885, filed March 18, 1885, and Alt. 1178, 1901, filed August 8, 1901.

To sum the whole matter up, The Arlington is as a matter of fact a very handsome apartment hotel in one of Brooklyn's most exclusive residence quarters. To denominate it a tenement would be seriously to injure the building. The owners purchased it as an apartment hotel, and had no idea that it was not under the jurisdiction of the Building Department, and the owners of the building should not suffer from the conflicting claims of the Tenement House Department and the Building Department, which seem to have been settled long ago, and now break out afresh on this application to file plans for the improvement of the building.

This appeal is made to determine this matter conclusively, and we ask that the Examiners will not allow any technicality to interfere with any substantial benefit accruing not only to the owners, but to the tenants, by having the property remain under the jurisdiction of the Building Department.

Mr. Goldner appeared before the Board and requested that this appeal be laid over for one week; which was, on motion, granted. The Chairman presented and read an acknowledgement from the Charter Revision Commission of the communication forwarded to them by the Board under date of the 6th inst., which was, on motion, ordered on file.

The building being apparently intended for occupancy as a hotel or lodging house, should be made fireproof and comply with section 105 of the Code.

The rules and regulations and the provisions of law do not apply.

Whether these buildings to be altered must be made entirely fireproof, a requirement in this case prohibitory and practically impossible of accomplishment.

The buildings are neither a hotel or lodging house nor are they intended as such. The first story the owner has leased to the United States Government for Post Office purposes, subject to alterations proposed, and the three stories above will be as at present, bachelor apartments.

There is no classification in the Building Law which applies to this case, and we desire to be permitted to make the alterations proposed, with the following provisions: The Post Office ceiling under the apartments shall be made fireproof with plastered metal lath or other method approved by the Board; the stairways leading through the first story will be encased in fireproof tile partitions; the 12-inch fire wall between the two middle houses will remain unpierced, and the two other brick party walls will be pierced only by doorways, which will be provided with fire doors if the Board so directs.

Appearances: Messrs. Miller, Ludlow and Moore.

On motion, Approved on condition that the entire ceiling over the basement, and also that of the first story be made of double galvanized wire lath and plaster, with an intermediate air space.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department, at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
