Dr. S. T. Armstrong, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

Dr. S. T. Armstrong, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

From July 14 to July 20, inclusive, 41 operations were performed at Bellevue Hospital, 5 at Gouverneur Hospital, 12 at Harlem Hospital, and 11 at Fordham Hospital, at all of which the Attending Surgeons or their assistants were present.

In regard to the letter of the Committee on the Prevention of Tuberculosis and its willingness to pay a physician in charge of the children's tuberculosis clinic \$10 a week, there is no special children's tuberculosis clinic in any of the hospitals. In 1906, 3,297 patients were treated in the tuberculosis service is less attractive than the other services and occasionally there has been some difficulty in getting physicians for it. No provision has been made in the estimate for the payment of physicians in this service, and the question arises if the physicians who have the other services will not feel the discrimination.

To comply with the recent rule of the Board of Trustees, based on section 8, chapter 13 of the Charter, and in conformity with the recent opinion of the Corporation Counsel, is the sum of \$1.50 a day to be collected from all moneys in excess of \$50 that may be owned by patients admitted to any of the hospitals in the department? It is understood that this is the sum limited in the Department of Charities.

There is no clear rule governing leave of absence for assistant visiting and adjunct assistant visiting physicians, surgeons and gynaccologists, and it is recommended that rule 2, page 10, of the rules for the Medical Board of Bellevue Hospital, and rule 2, page 8, of the Medical Boards of Gouverneur, Harlem and Fordham Hospitals, be amended so as to provide that all leaves of absence of such physicians must be approved by the visiting physician, surgeon or gynaccologist on duty at the time leave is granted, before it is transmitted to the office of the General Medical Superintendent for action by the Board of Trustees. Instances have occurred where both the assistant and adjunct

It is recommended that the salaries of the Hospital Helpers, employed as Chief Carpenter and Chief Painter, be increased from \$50 to \$60 a month with main-

On motion, duly seconded, it was resolved that the matter of special tuberculosis clinics for children be referred to the Secretary and General Medical Superintendent for further information.

For Adjunct Assistant Visiting Physician, Surgeon or Gynaecologist, from men of not less than three years' professional experience.

Physician, Surgeon or Gynaecologist, from men of not less than three years' professional experience.

The Medical Board of the hospital should request the editors of the medical publications in New York City, the "New York Medical Journal" and the "New York Medical Record," to publish a notice that applications will be received for appointment to fill a vacancy to a date two weeks subsequent to the notice.

All applications when so received shall be transmitted to the Board of Trustees in compliance with the rule of June 25, 1906.



The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.
