Mr. JOSIAH A. BRIGGS, Chief Engineer of the Borough of The Bronx:

Sir—In accordance with your instructions, I have the honor to submit the following report of work done under my charge during the months of January, February and March, 1908.

The Topographical Bureau of the President of the Borough of The Bronx is charged with the following duties:

I. To make the topographical surveys, computations, maps or plans and profiles and reports in connection with the following three (3) divisions of work:

(a) The preparation of a design for the Street System in those parts of the Borough where a design is not adopted as yet, and the making of surveys, maps, etc., showing changes of adopted street system and grades; also the preparation of three copies for filing of all matters which have been adopted by the Local Boards or approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

(b) The actual demarcation on the ground by monument stones and copper bolts on the lines of adopted avenues, streets, public squares, places, etc., and the protection of the same when improvements are being made.

(c) The making of surveys, searches, maps, technical descriptions, profiles, etc., for the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessments in the matter of acquiring title by the City to avenues, streets and other public property.

II. To keep in custody the record and maps of all matters pertaining to work under the jurisdiction of the Topographical Bureau; also keeping in custody all maps filed in relation to the Borough of The Bronx under the Department of Public Parks, the Commissioner of Street Improvements of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards and the President of the Borough of The Bronx.

III. To make examinations, maps and reports on miscellaneous matters referred by the Chief Engineer of the Borough of The Bronx.

I-(a)—PREPARATION OF THE DESIGN OF A STREET SYSTEM, MAPS SHOWING CHANGES OF ADOPTED STREET SYSTEMS, ETC

Calculations, maps and plans showing dimensions of blocks and grades of streets and avenues were progressed on sections which are not interfered with, the proposed railroads through the Borough.

The fixture sheets, which show the relation between the new street system and existing street lines and property lines by dimensions and co-ordinates, were progressed.

Computations were also made for all the changes or establishing of new street lines, grades, etc., which has been before the Local Boards and for which maps were forwarded to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for adoption and filing.

Calculations, in accordance with United States Coast and Geodetic Survey Triangulation, were completed for Section 48 of the Final Maps and a map for adoption was forwarded March 4, 1908, to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment; the boundaries of this section are as follows: Bounded by Bronx River, Randall Avenue, Morrison Avenue, Seward Avenue, Metcalf Avenue, Lafayette Avenue, Story Avenue, St. Lawrence Avenue, Ludlow Avenue, White Plains Road, Story Avenue, Pugsley Avenue, Seward Avenue, White Plains Road, Randall Avenue, Leland Avenue, Lacombe Avenue, St. Lawrence Avenue and the East River.

Three copies for filing of Section 49 of the Final Maps were forwarded to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, March 31, 1908.

A second tentative plan of the Street System, easterly of Fort Schuyler road and the Eastern boulevard, called the Throgg's Neck District, was completed and submitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment February 20, 1908.

Miscellaneous studies and maps for a street system are in progress for those portions of the district east of the Bronx River, for which no plans have been submitted as yet to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

During the quarter, the Assistant Engineer in charge of Street Opening work and the Assistant Engineer in charge of Grades were subpoenaed on various street opening proceedings and on claims for damage in account of change of grade and court cases, which occupied considerable of their time.

The President of the Borough directed that all applications for erection or moving of buildings shall be submitted to the Topographical Bureau for examination as to their proper location before the Building Department and the Permit Clerk issue permits and three hundred and thirty-five (335) applications were attended to. This work occupied very considerable time of one Assistant Engineer.

III. TO MAKE EXAMINATIONS, MAPS AND REPORTS ON MISCELLANEOUS MATTERS REFERRED BY THE CHIEF ENGINEER OF THE BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

During the quarter, 246 communications were referred for report to the Topographical Bureau by the Chief Engineer and the Secretary of the President of the Borough of The Bronx and 257 reports and letters were written on these subjects.

Numbering of Houses in the Borough.

The Board of Aldermen on April 20, 1904, resolved, that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and is hereby requested to authorize the Comptroller to issue special revenue bonds to the amount of \$5,000 in accordance with the provisions of subdivision 8, section 188 of the amended Greater New York Charter, the proceeds thereof to be applied to the cost and expense of renumbering and naming the streets and avenues in the Borough of The Bronx, and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on April 7, 1905, approved and concurred in the above resolution of the Board of Aldermen.

This work was assigned to the Topographical Bureau and a system was established for this purpose.

A map showing the house numbers for the Borough of The Bronx was prepared and has been photo-lithographed for distribution.

Notices of the change of house numbers were delivered to the occupants of houses westerly of the Bronx River, and fifty (50) notices were sent out upon request.

The notices and maps for the delivery of the house numbers, east of the Bronx River are ready for distribution.

A record of the new house numbers is kept on atlases on file in the Topographical Bureau.

Miscellaneous.

During the quarter the correcting and bringing up to date the atlases of the street system, west of the Bronx River, in the offices of the President of the Borough of The Bronx, Chief Engineer, Topographical Bureau, Bureau of Highways and Bureau of Sewers, was kept up.

The card index of street improvements in the Borough of The Bronx for the President of the Borough and the Chief Engineer was kept up.

Plotting and drafting of record maps, fixture sheets, maps for adoption, office sets and black prints of the sections east of the Bronx River was continued.

During the quarter work to bring up to date and to reproduce the lithographed sections of the Final Maps west of the Bronx River, which was printed in 1895, was progressed.

Work on the mounted sheets of sections of the Final Maps was progressed.

The Topographical Map, on a scale of 150 feet to the inch, being a reduction of the original eighty-foot sheets, was continued.

The correcting of the tax maps of the Borough of The Bronx and in use in the Topographical Bureau was continued.

Maps showing the proposed fixtures preparatory to computing block dimensions in accordance with the United States Triangulation were progressed.

Instruction sheets for the computers of the sections of the Final Maps, east of the Bronx River, were progressed.

During the quarter, the various buildings in the care of the President of the Borough of The Bronx were measured for the purpose of determining the amount of wall space and of glass which has to be cared for and cleaned.

Three vaults of the Topographical Bureau were kept in order.

423 maps or plans on file in said vaults were given out for examination and returned.

Work on indexing survey notebooks of field parties, which were incomplete, was progressed.

Examinations of the 80-foot scale sheets of the topographical survey, east of the Bronx River, are in progress in order to determine which field books refer to the respective sheets. This work is very laborious and requires great care.

The work of rearranging the weekly time reports since 1896 was progressed.
