

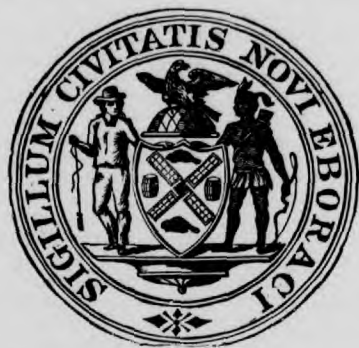

The weekly reports of Assistant Sanitary Engineers on the plumbing and drainage of houses in course of erection, were received and ordered on file.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending November 4, 1882.

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1647, as follows, viz.:

2 public buildings, 720 tenement-houses, 135 private dwellings, 60 other dwellings, 17 manufacturing and workshops, 15 stores and warehouses, 59 stables, 60 slaughter-houses, 4 lodging-houses, 1 pottery, 1 lard-rendering establishment, 35 sunken and vacant lots, 55 yards, courts and areas, 79 cellars and basements, 158 waste-pipes and drains, 197 privies and water-closets, 23 streets, gutters and sidewalks, 6 dangerous stairways, 8 smoky chimneys, 6 cesspools, and 6 other nuisances.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 501.

During the past week 157 complaints have been received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

71 permits were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

94 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy vaults.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 60 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 57 houses, 57 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

3 cases of contagious disease were removed to hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 536 births, 66 still-births, 240 marriages, and 579 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, November 4, 1882. This shows an increase of 99 births and 21 still-births, a decrease of 17 deaths, and the same number of marriages, when compared with the number received during the preceding week; but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1881, there was an increase of 8 still-births, a decrease of 85 marriages and 94 deaths, and the same number of births. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from scarlatina decreased 3; diphtheria, 9; whooping cough, 3; erysipelas, 1; typhus fever, 1; typhoid fever, 2; cerebro-spinal fever, 1; malarial fevers, 2; puerperal diseases, 5; diarrhoeal diseases, 10; inanition, 1; alcoholism, 5; phthisis pulmonalis, 17; pneumonia, 2; heart diseases, 4; meningitis and encephalitis, 7; apoplexy, 2; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 2; cyanosis and atelectasis, 1; surgical operation, 1; while the deaths from croup, increased 1; rheumatism and gout, 2; cancer, 1; bronchitis, 4; aneurism, 1; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 11; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 3; convulsions, 7; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 4; Bright's disease and nephritis, 5; suicide, 3. The number of deaths from measles, gastritis, enteritis, and peritonitis, premature and preterm births, and drowning, was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

The ages of 133 of the persons who died during the week were reported to be under one year, 166 under two years, 201 under five years, and 50 seventy years and over, which shows that the deaths of children under five years of age was 9 less than the number reported during last week, and represent 34.72 per cent. of the total weekly mortality.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 140 were in institutions, 291 in tenement-houses, 135 in houses containing three families or less, 5 in hotels and boarding-houses, 8 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 5 were on the basement floor, 86 on the first, 151 on the second, 121 on the third, 47 on the fourth, 21 on the fifth, 0 on the sixth; 573 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 6 non-residents; 60 were stated to be single, 149 married, 79 widowed, and the condition of 291 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 579; still-births, 66; bodies in transitu, 17; of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births 85 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 536 burials; 240 marriages; 66 still-births; 579 deaths; 17 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated, 60 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 7 transcripts of the birth record, 5 of marriage, and 38 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending November 4, 1882, was 51.4 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 30.101, the mean humidity was 75, saturation being 100, the number of

miles traveled by the wind was 843, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.05 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph.D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 556 deaths and still-births, or 86.20 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 12; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 220; City pauper burial ground (undenominational), 97; Greenwood (undenominational), 36; Lutheran, (undenominational), 81; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 20; Evergreen (undenominational), 30; Woodlawn (undenominational), 23; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 5; Union (Methodist Protestant), 2; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 12; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 6; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 6; Washington (undenominational), 6.

The distribution of deaths (actual mortality) for the week ending October 28, 1882, was in the following wards, viz.: First, 9; Second, 1; Third, 6; Fourth, 7; Fifth, 12; Sixth, 13; Seventh, 21; Eighth, 25; Ninth, 21; Tenth, 17; Eleventh, 30; Twelfth, 55; Thirteenth, 10; Fourteenth, 12; Fifteenth, 5; Sixteenth, 25; Seventeenth, 44; Eighteenth, 20; Nineteenth, 98; Twentieth, 36; Twenty-first, 41; Twenty-second, 50; Twenty-third, 17; Twenty-fourth, 8.

The actual mortality for the week ending October 28, 1882, was 583; this is 99 less than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1881, and 69.6 more than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 23.47 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,291,624.

The annual death-rate per 1,000 persons living, of the estimated or enumerated population, according to the most recent weekly returns of Philadelphia was 18.29; Brooklyn, 21.15; Baltimore, 21.23; New Orleans, 25.80; Charleston, 32.81; Erie, 23.15; Savannah, 30.64; Worcester, 13.87; Cambridge, 18.73; Fall River, 14.85; Lynn, 13.58. Monthly returns—Boston, 22.70; New Haven, 15.2; Salt Lake, 31.20.
