The Board considered the expert's report, and Mayor Grant stated in reference to it that he would communicate with the Fire Department in relation to its lines and wires.

The Board heard statements from Mr. Jackson, President of the United Electric Light and Power Company; Mr. Emerick, Superintendent of the Postal Telegraph Cable Company, and Judge Kelly, of counsel for the East River Electric Light Company, concerning the condition of their respective pole lines in the First Proscribed District, and the prospect of their removal by the 1st of June; Judge Kelly stating in reference to the Thirty-fourth street subway that its completion had been too recent to enable the East River Company to occupy it as early as June the first.

From an interview with the Manager of the Postal Telegraph Cable Company and the Superintendent of the Fire Alarm Telegraph of New York City, I learned that the pole lines on Second and Third avenues are the property of the Fire Department, and while the Postal Company will remove all of its wires from these lines and expresses itself as willing to remove the poles, the letter hereto attached from the Superintendent of Fire Telegraph, dated April 25, will explain why they cannot be removed at present.

It is necessary for the Postal Company to transfer its cables crossing the Harlem river at Second avenue to Third avenue where they come out of the subway, and their overhead lines connecting with this cable now being on Lincoln avenue, which is an extension of Second avenue, to Rider avenue, which is the nearest pole line. There are twenty-two of these overhead wires that the Company asks to transfer, and to add eight more—part of the addition being for the Fire Department service of New York City.

I have to recommend that this request, which seems reasonable and just, be granted, and that the Board authorize the transfer and increase of number of overhead wires north of the Harlem river, on condition that the Postal Company remove all its overhead wires on Third and Second avenues south of Harlem river.

The pole line on Lexington avenue is the property of the American Rapid Telegraph Company, and is being operated by the Postal Company under lease, which prevents removal by Postal Company.

In reference to the application of the Postal Telegraph Cable Company for 6 new wires on the Southern Boulevard and Hunt's Point road to a branch of the New Haven Railroad, laid over some time ago pending the removal of poles on Lincoln avenue by the Postal Telegraph Company, I have to report that the Postal Company has complied with every request made by the Board and should be granted its application.

The Board discussed and considered the foregoing report and communications, and after hearing the Engineer, Mr. Emerick, Superintendent of the Postal Telegraph Cable Company, and Mr. Lauterbach, on behalf of said company, unanimously adopted the following resolution, moved by Mayor Grant:

Resolved, That the applications of the Postal Telegraph Cable Company, recommended in the report of Engineer H. S. Kearny, under date of April 27, be and the same are hereby granted, and a permit issued therefor, upon condition that the company agrees to take down all poles upon which it has wires and poles erected by it within the Proscribed District, that is, between Eighth and Fifty-ninth streets, Third and Eighth avenues, before the first of June, and will take down within thirty days one hundred other poles.

The following report of the Engineer, recommending subway and subsidiary construction, together with accompanying letters submitted therewith, was read and considered:

TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number, of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereafter liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act: When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.

WE, THE UNDERSIGNED COMMISSIONERS of Estimate and Assessment in the above-entitled matter, hereby give notice to all persons interested in this proceeding, and to the owner or owners, occupant or occupants, of all houses and lots and improved or unimproved lands affected thereby and to all others whom it may concern, to wit:

First—That we have completed our estimate and assessment, and that all persons interested in this proceeding, or in any of the lands affected thereby, and having objections thereto, do present their said objections in writing, duly verified, to us at our office, No. 200 Broadway (fifth floor), in the said city, on or before the 1st day of June, 1891, and that we, the said Commissioners, will hear parties so objecting within the ten week day next after the said 1st day of June, 1891, and for that purpose will be in attendance at our said office on each of said ten days at 3 o'clock P. M.

Second—That the abstract of our said estimate and assessment, together with our damage and benefit maps, and also all the affidavits, estimates and other documents used by us in making our report, have been deposited with the Commissioner of Public Works of the City of New York, at his office, No. 31 Chambers street, in the said city, there to remain until the 2d day of June, 1891.
