Hon. LOUIS F. HAFFEN, President of the Borough of The Bronx:

The correspondence of this office, including resolutions sent to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, letters requesting reports on various petitions, complaints, etc., and letters which originated from the office of the President of the Borough of The Bronx and the Local Boards, amounted to ten hundred and eighty-three pages. Besides this correspondence three hundred and fifty circular letters inclosing blank petitions were sent to property owners notifying them that the local improvement they had petitioned for prior to January 1, 1902, having failed of passage in the former Board of Public Improvements and the Municipal Assembly, it would be necessary for the property owners to file with the President of the Borough a new petition, in accordance with the opinion of the Corporation Counsel rendered to the Local Boards, Borough of The Bronx.

There were presented to the Local Boards of Morrisania and Chester, after due advertisement as required by law, eighty-six petitions for various local improvements, for acquiring title to lands necessary for streets, etc., and for changing the map or plan of The City of New York, as follows:

Hon. LOUIS F. HAFFEN, President:

In compliance with your request, I beg to submit the following report of work done in this borough during the quarter ending March 31, 1902:

The reports, communications, etc., on various matters made by me during the quarter number 1,276.

The work in the bureaus has been conducted with despatch, and while in field work and actual construction only moderate results are shown, this is usually the case at this season of the year, because much of the time the weather forbids the progress of certain kinds of work, which retards the whole.

Topographical Bureau.

This bureau has made good progress in the laying out and monumenting of the new streets east of the Bronx river, so far as they are finally determined.

All streets on which proceedings to acquire title are pending have been pushed as rapidly as possible, with results as follows: There have been completed 16 draught damage maps, representing 233 plots, or 416.5 city lots, and 26 draught benefit maps, representing 7,932 plots.

Final copies of damage and benefit maps have been furnished in 28 proceedings, with a total of 1,162 maps.

3 preliminary maps have been furnished.

13 miscellaneous maps were made. For items see the detailed reports.

Sewer Bureau.

On January 1, 1902, there were seventy-two sewer contracts in force, seven new contracts were executed, six of which were ordered ahead; thirteen contracts were completed during the quarter, which leaves seventy-eight contracts in force at end of quarter, including the thirteen contracts completed and under six months repairs.

The total length of sewers in the Borough January 1, 1902, was 181.73 miles; built during quarter, 1.292 miles, making a total in the borough at end of the quarter of 183.022 miles.

Preliminary surveys for fifteen contracts, covering five miles of sewers, were completed.

Estimates of cost and assessed valuations were made in connection with ten petitions for sewers. A large amount of work has been done by the maintenance force in cleaning, etc., sewers, basins and drains.

In this bureau there were forty-nine contracts in force January 1, 1902; one was completed during the quarter, leaving forty-eight in force March 31, 1902.

The construction work has been carefully supervised and lines and grades were furnished on all contracts in progress.

Preliminary surveys, estimates of cost and assessed valuations were made for thirty-nine works.

WORK DONE IN THE TOPOGRAPHICAL BUREAU DURING THE QUARTER ENDING MARCH 31, 1902.

The Topographical Bureau of the President of the Borough of The Bronx is charged with the following duties:

- I. To make the topographical surveys.
- II. To prepare the design for the street system and to make the maps for adoption and filing.
- III. To define on the ground by stones and bolts the lines of the adopted street system and to protect the said monuments when improvements are being made in the streets.
- IV. To prepare the design for the drainage and sewerage system and determine the grades of streets and sewers.
- V. To make surveys, searches, technical descriptions and maps for the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessments in the matter of acquiring title to avenues and streets.
- VI. To keep in custody the records and maps of all matters pertaining to the above-mentioned five items.
- VII. To make examinations, maps and reports of miscellaneous matters referred by the Chief Engineer of the Borough of The Bronx.

I. To Make the Topographical Surveys.

The topographical survey of the Borough of The Bronx, west of the Bronx river, was begun under the jurisdiction of the Central Park Commission in 1867, and was partially done by contract and partially by the Topographical Bureau.

The territory east of the Bronx river was annexed under chapter 934 of the Laws of 1895, and the topographical survey was begun under the Commissioner of Street Improvements, Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, in January, 1896, and is completed with the exception of some details relative to the shore lines and water courses, which, on account of inaccessibility, were accepted from the surveys of the Department of Docks.

Surveying is, however, continually going on in connection with proceedings to acquire title to streets, with defining the location of monuments and with establishing grades in the borough; such surveys will be specially mentioned under their proper heads.

II. To Prepare the Design for the Street System and to Make the Maps for Adoption and Filing.

The final maps of the district west of the Bronx river were completed in 1895; a number of additions, however, were made since.

For the territory east of the Bronx river, a tentative plan was adopted by the Board of Public Improvements August 31, 1898, and sections 29, 30, 31, 32, 33, 34, 36, 41, 42, 43, 44, 45, 49, 52 were filed prior to January 1, 1902.

The territory east of the Bronx river was subdivided into thirty-five sections, numbered from 29 to 64, of which the above-mentioned fifteen sections were filed, and of which calculations for sections 37, 38, 39, 40, 46, 47, 48, 50, 51 and 55 are fairly advanced. These ten sections could be submitted for adoption within a short time were it not for contemplated alterations of the tentative plan.

The filed sections show all the necessary dimensions and grades required to monument and stake out avenues and streets, and are prepared to render more definite and complete the tentative map or plan, which does not give dimensions and grades.

During the past quarter the following maps were prepared and submitted for adoption.

1. Map or plan showing the extension of West Two Hundred and Forty-fourth street, from Malcolm place to Cayuga avenue, and showing the discontinuing and closing of Cayuga avenue, from Waldo avenue to West Two Hundred and Forty-fourth street, and of Tibbett avenue, from West Two Hundred and Forty-second street to West Two Hundred and Forty-fourth street, in the Twenty-fourth Ward.

2. Map or plan showing change of grades in Ryer avenue, from Burnside avenue to about 300 feet north of East One Hundred and Eighty-first street, in the Twenty-fourth Ward.

3. Modified plan of drainage showing location, size and grade of sewer in Sewerage District, 42-M, in the Twenty-fourth Ward.

4. Map or plan showing proposed changes of railroad lines, avenues and streets at Kingsbridge and Spuyten Duyvil, Borough of The Bronx, prepared under authority of chapter 516 of the Laws of 1901, which is an act to authorize the abolition of certain grade crossings in The City of New York.

5. Plan and profile showing change of grades in Perry avenue, Hull avenue and Norwood avenue, from Mosholu Parkway North to Woodlawn road, and in Mosholu Parkway North, from Webster avenue to Perry avenue.

The calculations for the co-ordinates of monuments and the dimensions of blocks are under the charge of an Assistant Engineer, with 1 Assistant Engineer, 2 Levelers, 1 Computer, 3 Draughtsmen, 1 Axeman and 1 Laborer.

III. To Define on the Ground by Stones and Bolts the Lines of the Adopted Street System and to Protect the Said Monuments When Improvements are Being Made in the Streets.

About two-thirds of the territory west of the Bronx river are monumented, 4,155 monuments having been set. These monuments have to be taken care of in such cases where contracts for regulating and grading and sewers have been given out, and where there is a liability that said monuments will be disturbed by the improvement.

During the quarter twenty-eight orders were received, of which fifteen have been attended to, and the remaining thirteen are under way.

These orders relate to referencing, testing and resetting monuments on the following streets:

1. Northeast corner of One Hundred and Eighty-seventh street and Valentine avenue.
2. Northeast corner of Bryant street and One Hundred and Eightieth street.
3. Northeast corner of Vyse street and One Hundred and Eightieth street.
4. Gun Hill road (Olin avenue), from Jerome avenue to Bronx river.
5. Park avenue, from Pelham avenue to Tremont avenue.
6. Cambreling avenue and East One Hundred and Eighty-seventh street.
7. Two Hundred and Sixty-first street, from Broadway to Riverdale avenue.
8. Walton avenue, from Belmont street to Rockwood street.
9. East One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street and Trinity avenue.
10. Webster avenue and Clay avenue.
11. Kingsbridge road, between Webster avenue and the Harlem river.
12. West Farms road, from Bronx street to Morris Park avenue.
13. Southern Boulevard, from St. Joseph's street to East One Hundred and Forty-second street.
14. Southern Boulevard, from East One Hundred and Seventy-fifth street to Boston road.
15. East One Hundred and Ninety-second street, from Old Croton Aqueduct to Aqueduct avenue.
16. East One Hundred and Eighty-seventh street, from Valentine avenue to Ryer avenue.
17. White Plains road, from Fifteenth avenue to Demilt avenue.
18. Boston road, from Tremont avenue to Kingsbridge road.
19. West Farms road, from Edgewater road to East One Hundred and Sixty-seventh street.
20. West Farms road, from Edgewater road to East One Hundred and Sixty-seventh street.
21. Bryant street, from Home street to West Farms road.
22. East One Hundred and Eighty-seventh street, from Valentine avenue to Ryer avenue.
23. East One Hundred and Ninety-second street, from Old Croton Aqueduct to Aqueduct avenue.
24. Aqueduct avenue, from East One Hundred and Ninety-second street to Kingsbridge road.
25. Kingsbridge road, between Old Croton Aqueduct and Tee Taw avenue.
26. Southern Boulevard, between East One Hundred and Forty-second street and St. Joseph's street, and between East One Hundred and Forty-ninth street and Longwood avenue.
27. Andrews avenue.
28. One Hundred and Eighty-second street and Crotona avenue.

In the territory east of the Bronx river only One Hundred and Sixty-seventh street monuments are in the ground at the present time, and two monumenting parties are engaged in continuing this work.

Investigations of apparent discrepancies in the establishment of stations in the traverses on Westchester turnpike, from St. Peter's Church to the Bronx river, were made.

On section 13 of the final maps, along the New York and Harlem Railroad, from Pelham avenue to Bronx Park, investigations and corrections had to be made in consequence of acquiring title of land for the elevated road.

The office force has been engaged in preparing instructions for setting monuments, running traverses, indexing monument records and working up field notes.

The monumenting is in charge of an Assistant Engineer, with 2 Assistant Engineers, 1 Assistant, 1 Transitman, 1 Leveler, 2 Computers, 3 Draughtsmen, 10 Chainmen and Rodmen, 5 Axemen, 1 Assistant Foreman, 1 Sounder and 5 Laborers.

IV. To Prepare the Design for the Drainage and Sewerage System and Determine the Grades of Streets and Avenues.

The following plans were made during the quarter:

1. Sewerage District 42-M Bronx River Watershed, showing East One Hundred and Seventy-eighth street sewer, between Prospect avenue and Southern Boulevard; also rearrangement of basins.

2. Sewerage District 33 WWW, Ryer avenue, from Burnside avenue to East One Hundred and Eighty-second street; East One Hundred and Eighty-first street, from Ryer avenue to Anthony avenue.

3. The plan of drainage for the Barretto Creek Watershed is in preparation and is expected to be submitted for adoption in the next quarter. This watershed drains part of Unionport, the Catholic Protectory grounds, Park Versailles, Mapes estate, Van Nest, etc., covering an area of 1,100 acres, having its outlet on Avenue C and the East river.

4. Map or plan showing change of grades in Ryer avenue, between Burnside avenue to a point 300 feet north of East One Hundred and Eighty-first street.

Preliminary map of Baychester avenue, from Pelham Bay Park to West Fourth street.

Preliminary draft map showing the properties located within the public place at the intersection of Tremont avenue and Westchester avenue and included in the proceeding for acquiring title to Tremont avenue, from Bronx river to the Eastern Boulevard.

Preliminary draft damage map of that part of East Two Hundred and Thirty-third street extending from the Bronx river to Kingsbridge road.

In addition, I wish to report that the Assistant Engineer in charge of this work is subpoenaed quite frequently by the Bureau of Street Openings to give testimony in street opening matters.

"f." Damage Map Surveys.

This work could only be carried on for about two months on account of the inclement weather.

1. Tremont avenue, from Eastern Boulevard to and including public place at Westchester avenue.

2. Morris Park avenue, from West Farms road to Bear Swamp road.

3. Oakland place, from Belmont avenue to Prospect avenue.

4. Morris street, from Bronx river to Boston Post road.

The preparation of the work pertaining to street opening matters is under the charge of an Assistant Engineer, with 1 Assistant Engineer, 2 Computers, 2 Transmitters, 9 Draughtsmen, and 3 Chainmen and Rodman.

VI. To Keep in Custody the Records and Maps of all Matters Pertaining to the Above Mentioned Five (5) Items.

Prior to January 1, 1902, the majority of the maps and records of the five boroughs of the City were kept in the main office, in the Municipal Building, One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street and Third avenue.

The revised charter giving jurisdiction over the boroughs to the respective Borough Presidents, the maps and records relating to the boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, Queens and Richmond, had to be assorted and indexed before they could be delivered to the different Presidents.

The maps, records, atlases, surveying instruments and tools for the different boroughs were delivered as follows:

Borough of Manhattan, on March 11, 1902.

Borough of Brooklyn, on January 31, 1902.

Borough of Queens, on January 28, 1902.

Borough of Richmond, on March 25, 1902.

The maps, records, etc., in the custody of the Topographical Bureau, relating to the Borough of The Bronx are being examined for the purpose of making a new index.

This work is under the supervision of an Assistant Engineer.

VII. To Make Examinations, Maps and Reports on Miscellaneous Matters Referred by the Chief Engineer of the Borough of The Bronx.

During the quarter 180 communications were referred for report to the Topographical Bureau by the Chief Engineer and the Secretary to the President of the Borough of The Bronx.

Draughting.

The following maps relating to miscellaneous subjects in the Topographical Bureau were made:

1. Map showing the extension of West Two Hundred and Forty-fourth street, and the closing of parts of Cayuga avenue and Tibbett avenue.

2. Map showing change of the Spuyten Duyvil and Port Morris Railroad and intersecting streets at Kingsbridge.

3. Change of the street system between Palisade avenue and Hudson river, and from Spuyten Duyvil Creek to West Two Hundred and Forty-fourth street.

4. Map showing the depression of the Port Morris Branch Railroad, south of One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street.

5. Two atlases containing the printed final maps of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, in the office of the President, were corrected and additions placed thereon.

6. The topographical sheets, Nos. 77, 79, 80, 81, 83 and 88 (east of the Bronx river), were finished.

7. Sheets Nos. 86 and 87, covering Pelham Bay Park area, are under way.

8. Office copy of final section No. 52 has been completed and Nos. 41, 44 and 29 are under way.

9. Miscellaneous work on following record maps was done during the quarter, thereby completing sections Nos. 29, 30, 31, 32, 33, 34, 35, 36, 37, 38, 41, 42, 43, 44, 45, 49 and 52.

10. The topographical map, on a scale of 300 feet to an inch, of the territory east of the Bronx river has been commenced and is well under way.

11. Map, on a scale of 150 feet to an inch, for proposed revision of street system in sections 37 and 40, and one for the territory east of Westchester creek, were made.

12. Copies of tax map, volumes 13, 14, 15, 16 and 18 (east of the Bronx river), were corrected.

13. Eight index maps, showing topographical sheets, monument districts, etc., were prepared during the quarter.

The above drafting work was under charge of an Assistant Engineer with eight Draughtsmen.

DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES.

Transactions of the Department of Docks and Ferries for Week Ending August 21,
1902.

The following permits were granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief:

Knickerbocker Steam Towage Company, to make certain alterations and additions in the offices on Battery Place Pier South No. 1, North river, and to inclose the space under the stairway on the north side of said pier so as to permit the use of the inclosure as a baggage room.

D. Greime Coal Company, to raise the office and coal pockets on the bulkhead between Forty-seventh and Forty-eighth streets, North river, to the grade of Twelfth avenue.

Joy Steamship Company, to replace fender piles on the northerly side of Catharine Street Pier East No. 27, East river, within existing lines.

Z. O. Nelson & Son, to repair the bulkhead at the foot of Thirty-ninth street, Brooklyn, within existing lines.

Merritt & Chapman Derrick and Wrecking Company, to repair their piers at Stapleton, S. I., within existing lines.

Marine Construction and Dry Dock Company of New York, to improve their water front property at Mariners' Harbor, Borough of Richmond, by the construction of docks and marine railway and dredging a basin for small boats thereat, the work to be done in accordance with plans submitted as amended.

Permission was granted John Gallagher to use and occupy for the storage of sand and other building material a space not to exceed thirty-five feet in width in the rear of bulkhead immediately adjoining the northerly line of the foot of East Sixtieth street, East river, Borough of Manhattan, the privilege to continue only during the pleasure of the Commissioner, but not longer than May 1, 1903, and compensation to be paid therefor at the rate of \$300 per annum, payable quarterly in advance to the Cashier; this rental not to include wharfage on boats berthed thereat.

The following Commissioner's orders were issued:

No. 21799, to T. G. Sellew, for one revolving chair, one flat-top dark oak desk, one light oak table and one oak desk, at a cost of \$74.25.

No. 21780, to Gerry & Murray, for 500 signs for Dockmaster's offices, at a cost of \$20.

The Deputy and Acting Commissioner on August 15, 1902, agreed to lease, assign and to farm-let unto the Knickerbocker Steamboat Company, all and singular, the right to collect and retain all wharfrage which may arise, accrue or become due in the manner and at the rates prescribed by law, for the use and occupation of the West One Hundred and Thirty-first Street Pier No. 121, on the North river, in the Borough of Manhattan, for a term of five years, at a rental of \$3,500 per annum, to be paid quarterly in advance at the office of this Department; said company to have the privilege of a renewal term of five years upon the expiration of the first term at an advanced rental of 5 per cent. per annum on the rental for the first term; it being understood and agreed that not more than the legal rate of wharfrage shall be charged for any use of the pier under the lease; the said company to have the privilege of erecting a shelter shed and to lay the necessary water supply pipes, lights, etc., on the pier; this Department to drive the necessary spring and mooring piles on the north and south sides and at the outer end of the pier, and to cut the necessary gangways in the end of the pier; the Department of Docks and Ferries to have the use of the slips adjoining the said Pier at the foot of West One Hundred and Thirty-first street when necessary in connection with the construction of a bulkhead wall on both sides of said pier, and the lessee to have no claim against the City by reason of such occupation of the slips by the Department. It being further understood that this agreement to lease shall be of no force or effect unless accepted by the Knickerbocker Steamboat Company and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, and that the said Knickerbocker Steamboat Company shall agree to execute a lease containing the usual covenants and conditions at present embodied in leases of wharf property now used by this Department; this offer to take the place of the proposition made to said Company under date of August 11, 1902.

A communication was received from the Knickerbocker Steamboat Company accepting the terms and conditions of the offer of August 15, 1902, to lease to said company the West One Hundred and Thirty-first Street Pier, on the North river, in the Borough of Manhattan, which communication was placed on file; and the president of the said company was requested to call upon the Commissioner in relation to the offer of the Department to lease the said pier.

A notice of application to be made by William S. Van Clief for a grant of land under water on the Kill Von Kull, westerly of Ferry street, in the Third Ward of the Borough of Richmond, was transmitted to the Corporation Counsel.

A communication was received from the Chief Clerk and Auditor recommending that a franchise to operate a ferry be granted the American Committee of the Statue of Liberty at a nominal rental of \$200 per annum; and the said Committee was, on August 21, 1902, notified that the Commissioner is prepared to recommend to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund the establishment of a ferry and the granting of a franchise to the said Committee for the operation of the ferry between the Battery and Liberty Island at a rental of \$200 per annum, provided the said Committee agrees to pay to this Department therefor at the rate of \$200 per annum from May 1, 1808.

A communication having been received from the Long Island Railroad Company claiming that the tug "Long Island" did not damage the outer end of the Grand Street Pier, East river, in the Borough of Manhattan, and disclaiming re-

sponsibility for the cost of repairs made, the claim against the said company for \$149.16, the cost of repairing the pier, was transmitted to the Corporation Counsel for collection.

A report was received from the Superintendent of Docks that the Albany Day Line entered into occupation of the outer end of the West One Hundred and Twenty-ninth Street Pier, on the North River, on May 28, 1902, and in accordance with his recommendation rental was fixed for the use of said premises by the Albany Day Line at the rate of \$3,000 per annum for the period from May 28, 1902, to July 1, 1902, the date of commencement of the lease to E. E. Olcott, that being the same rate as is charged under the lease of the premises to E. E. Olcott.

In accordance with the recommendation of the Engineer-in-Chief, the President of the Borough of Brooklyn was requested to remove the free public bath from the berth at the Pier foot of Noble street, in the Borough of Brooklyn, in order to permit the contractor to proceed with the repairs to said pier under Contract No. 742.

A communication having been received from the Riverside and Fort Lee Ferry Company, requesting that electric lights be placed along the bulkhead between One Hundred and Twenty-ninth and One Hundred and Thirtieth streets, North river, pending the completion of the ferryhouse thereat, the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity was requested to place the necessary arc lights thereat as desired by the said company.

A communication having been received from the Department of Parks stating that an opinion has been requested from the Corporation Counsel as to what steps it will be necessary to take in order that the said Department may assume control over the recreation ground in rear of bulkhead between Seventeenth and Eighteenth streets, East river, in the Borough of Manhattan, and requesting that no action be taken by this Department relative to the removal of the railing now located along the bulkhead thereat, the Engineer-in-Chief was directed to hold in abeyance the order for the removal of the railing pending the receipt of the opinion of the Corporation Counsel by the Department of Parks.

The following orders were issued to the Engineer-in-Chief:

To examine and report as to the most available site for the construction of a graving dock of sufficient capacity to accommodate the largest vessels frequenting this port, and also as to the most available site for the construction of a floating dry dock of the same capacity.

To order dredging to a depth of thirty-five feet at mean low-water under Contract No. 730, in the slips between Piers 51 and 52, and in the half slip adjoining the south side of Pier 51, North river, as requested by the Cunard Steamship Company.

To repair the East Twenty-sixth Street Pier.

To repair the East Twenty-ninth Street Pier.

To repair the East Sixtieth Street Pier and the sheathing on the platform in front of said pier.

To repair the bulkhead platform between Sixtieth and Sixty-first streets, East river.

To repair the Pier foot of East Sixty-first street.

To repair the bulkhead platform between Sixty-first and Sixty-second streets, East river.

To repair Pier foot of East Sixty-second street.

To repair the dock on the easterly side of Blackwell's Island, near the Nurses' Home at Metropolitan Hospital, as requested by the Department of Public Charities.

To repair the bulkhead at the foot of Harris avenue, Borough of Queens.

To repair the Pier at the foot of Broadway, Borough of Queens.

To examine and report as to the most available place for the construction of a pier in the vicinity of Bay Ridge avenue or Seventy-ninth street or at the foot of some other street in South Brooklyn.

The compensation of Francis J. Ryan, Clerk, was, on August 21, 1902, fixed at the rate of \$2,100 per annum, subject to the approval of the Municipal Civil Service Commission, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Board of Aldermen.

In accordance with a recommendation of the Engineer-in-Chief, the compensation of Isaac J. Stander, Draughtsman, was, on August 21, 1902, fixed at the rate of \$1,800 per annum, subject to the approval of the Municipal Civil Service Commission, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Board of Aldermen.

In accordance with a recommendation of the Engineer-in-Chief, the compensation of William C. Crosby, Draughtsman, was, on August 19, 1902, fixed at the rate of \$1,350 per annum, subject to the approval of the Municipal Civil Service Commission, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Board of Aldermen.

A report having been received from the Engineer-in-Chief stating that Lawrence J. Welch, Ship Caulker, was injured while in the service of the Department, his compensation was fixed at the rate of \$18 per week from August 16, 1902.

John T. H. Kenny and Nelson K. Townsend, having been certified by the Municipal Civil Service Commission as eligible, were, on August 19, 1902, appointed as Locomobile Engineers in the Department, on probation, with compensation at the rate of \$2.50 per day each, including Sundays, while employed.

John Birmingham, having been certified by the Municipal Civil Service Commission as eligible, was, on August 15, 1902, appointed Painter in the Department, with compensation at the rate of forty-four cents per hour while employed.

Charges were preferred against John E. Anderson, Recreation Pier Attendant, on August 21, 1902, for assaulting a visitor on the Recreation Pier, and he was notified to appear before the Commissioner on Wednesday, August 27, 1902, at 11 o'clock a. m., at which time an opportunity would be given him to make an explanation in relation to said charges.

The Deputy and Acting Commissioner, on August 18, 1902, issued the following order dismissing the charges against John R. Powers, Dockmaster:

"John R. Powers, a Dockmaster in the Department of Docks and Ferries of The City of New York, having been duly notified to appear before me at my office in the said Department of Docks and Ferries at Pier A, North river, in The City of New York, on the 12th day of August, 1902, at 12 o'clock noon, when he would be afforded an opportunity of making an explanation of the charges preferred against him, the specifications of which charges were as follows:

"In that you failed to make return or pay to this Department the sum of fifty cents collected by you for wharfage on or about July 7, 1901, from the captain of the boat 'None Such,' for which wharfage you issued Department Ticket No. 12332.

"In that you failed to make return or pay to this Department the sum of one dollar collected by you for wharfage on or about the 8th or 9th day of January, 1901, from the captain of the boat 'None Such,' and for which you issued Department Ticket No. 12343.

"In that you made no return to this Department during the year 1901 on or at any time of the No. 1 tickets in the book containing tickets numbers 12300 to 12399 inclusive."

"And the said John R. Powers having appeared before me at the time and place above mentioned, and the said Powers having presented his explanation to me in regard to said charges and specifications, now, upon the consideration of the same, I hereby dismiss said charges.

"(Signed) JACKSON WALLACE, Deputy and Acting Commissioner."

A hearing was given Dockmaster Thomas Brady August 15, 1902, in the matter of charges preferred against him of failing to account to the Department for certain moneys paid to him for wharfage on the scow "Isabel," and after hearing the witnesses in the case the hearing was adjourned until Monday, August 18, 1902, on which date said hearing was resumed. On the same date, August 18, 1902, the Deputy and Acting Commissioner issued the following order discharging Dockmaster Thomas Brady from the service of the Department:

"Thomas Brady, a Dockmaster in the Department of Docks and Ferries of The City of New York, having been duly notified to appear before me at my office in the said Department of Docks and Ferries at Pier A, North River, in The City of New York, on the 31st day of July, 1902, at 11 o'clock in the forenoon, when he would be afforded an opportunity of making an explanation of the charges preferred against him and with which he had been served, the specifications of which charges were as follows:

"That you failed to make return or pay to this Department the sum of one

dollar collected by you for wharfage on or about April 14 and 15, 1901, from Captain Bunce for the 'Mary Isabel,' and for which you issued ticket No. 46664.

"That you failed to make return or pay to this Department the sum of one dollar and twenty-four cents collected by you for wharfage on or about June 26 and 27, 1901, from Captain Bunce, for wharfage of 'Mary Isabel,' and for which you issued ticket No. 81595.

"That you failed to make return or pay to this Department the sum of one dollar and twenty-four cents collected by you for wharfage on or about August 1 and 2, 1901, from Captain Bunce, for the 'Mary Isabel,' and for which you issued ticket No. 81554.

"That you failed to make return or pay to this Department the sum of one dollar and twenty-four cents collected by you for wharfage on or about August 6 and 7, 1901, from Captain Bunce, for 'Mary Isabel,' and for which you issued ticket No. 43676."

"And the said Thomas Brady having appeared before me at the time and place above mentioned, and at various dates to which the hearing was adjourned, and McDougall Hawkes, the Commissioner of Docks, being absent on each of said dates, and said Brady having presented his explanation to me in regard to said charges and specifications, and testimony having been taken in support of said charges and in refutation thereof, now, upon due consideration of the same, I hereby adjudge him guilty of the said charges and order his immediate dismissal.

(Signed) JACKSON WALLACE, Deputy and Acting Commissioner."

The following communications were ordered on file:

From the Comptroller, stating that his certificate has been indorsed on Contract No. 746, for repairing Pier at the foot of West Fifty-fifth street, North river.

From the Corporation Counsel, approving form of advertisement for receiving sealed bids or estimates for the privilege of maintaining dumping boards for cellar dirt on the West Forty-seventh Street Pier on the North river, and on the East Sixtieth Street Pier on the East river.

From the President of the Borough of Manhattan, stating that the request of this Department for the lighting of the marginal street along the East river, between Twenty-first and Twenty-third streets, has been referred to the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

From the President of the Borough of Richmond, stating that George E. Tuttle, Assistant Engineer, is not to be transferred from this Department, the Municipal Civil Service Commission having declined to approve such transfer.

From the Commissioners of Accounts, in relation to the collection of wharfage by the Dockmasters.

From the Consolidated Gas Company of New York, accepting the terms and conditions of the proposed lease of the north half of Pier at the foot of East Twenty-first street, East river.

From William H. Harris, attorney for the General Theological Seminary, suggesting that the City make an offer for the purchase of the property of said Seminary, between Twentieth and Twenty-first streets, Tenth and Thirteenth avenues, on the North river. Said attorney notified that an offer to this Department for the sale of the property will receive consideration.

From the Hoboken Ferry Company, protesting against the maintenance of an express office in front of the ferry premises at the foot of Christopher street, North river; with report of the Superintendent of Docks, stating that the express office referred to was placed on the approach to the ferry premises under a permit granted by this Department and that it serves the purpose of diverting the trucking on said approach in the proper direction. Said company notified that this Department does not consider it advisable to order the removal of the express office.

From Frederick M. Shepard, in relation to the improvements now being made along the bulkhead between One Hundred and Thirty-second street and Park avenue, on the Harlem river.

From Richard B. Ross, requesting an increase in salary as Stenographer and Typewriter. Notified that an application made after January 1, 1903, will receive consideration.

DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES.

Transactions of the Department of Docks and Ferries for the Week Ending August 28, 1902.

The following permits were granted, to continue during the pleasure of the Commissioner, but not longer than May 1, 1903:

Consolidated Gas Company of New York, to make general repairs to their gas pipes located on property under the jurisdiction of this Department, from time to time, when required, all repairs to be made under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief, and all pavement necessary to be disturbed to be taken up and relaid by the force of this Department at the cost and expense of said company.

Requa & Duell, to berth the propeller "A. Brearley" at the "L" adjoining the Gansevoort Market Pier, instead of at the Canal Street Pier South, North river, compensation to be paid therefor at the rate of \$5 per day, payable at the end of each week to the Dockmaster.

Frank W. Cumiskey, to maintain a scow on the inside of the "L" adjoining

the Gansevoort Market Pier, North river, and to place a chute to overhang the backing log on said pier, to be used in loading oyster shells on said scow, compensation to be paid therefor at the rate of \$1 per day, payable at the end of each week to the Dockmaster.

Bouker Contracting Company, to use and occupy a berth for unloading stone between Seventy-seventh and Seventy-ninth streets, North river, compensation to be paid therefor at the rate of \$5 per day, payable at the end of each week to the Dockmaster.

D. M. Resiquie, to use and occupy a portion of the bulkhead along the Clinton Avenue extension, extending for a distance of 200 feet from Fleeman street at the Wallabout basin, Borough of Brooklyn, the said bulkhead to be used for the unloading of lumber, but not for storage purposes, compensation to be paid for the privilege at the rate of \$500 per annum, payable quarterly in advance to the Cashier.

The following permits were granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief:

E. E. Olcott, to erect a small canopy roof over the gangway at the outer end of West One Hundred and Twenty-ninth Street Pier, North river, in accordance with plan submitted, the said shelter to remain thereat only during the pleasure of the Commissioner.

Kane & Wright, to drive fender piles and to repair the dump between One Hundred and Fourth and One Hundred and Fifth streets, Harlem river, the work to be kept within existing lines.

Bowery Bay Building and Improvement Company, to drive three clumps of piles at the ferry racks on the west side of their pier at North Beach, Bowery Bay, Borough of Queens, the work to be done in accordance with plans submitted.

North Jersey Street Railway Company, to repair the ferry rack at Port Richmond, Staten Island, the work to be kept within existing lines.

New York and Richmond Gas Company, to repair their dock at Clifton, Borough of Richmond, in accordance with plans submitted, the work to be kept within existing lines.

The compensation to be charged Brown & Fleming and Theresa A. S. Sheridan for the berths occupied between Seventy-ninth and Eighty-first streets, North river, was, on August 22, 1902, increased to the rate of \$5 each per day, payable at the end of each week to the Dockmaster of the district.

Commissioner's Order No. 21781 was issued to the Manhattan Time Recording Company for one timeclock, at a cost of \$50.

The Commissioner, on August 27, 1902, issued the following order:

"Section 825 of the Greater New York Charter provides 'when any wharves, piers, bulkheads, slips, docks or basins constructed under the provisions of this chapter shall be opened to the public use, the Commissioner of Docks shall, subject to the provisions of law, regulate the charges for wharfage, craning and dockage of all vessels admitted thereto, and may alter such charges from time to time as the public trade may authorize and the said Commissioner of Docks deem proper.'

"In accordance with the authority conferred upon me by the above quoted section, I have this day fixed the charges for wharfage, craning and dockage of all vessels at all piers owned by the City and erected under the new plan for the improvement of the water front, upon which a shed has been erected, at double the rates specified in sections 859, 860 and 861 of the Greater New York Charter, except that the rates of wharfage on boats navigating the canals of the State shall not be increased beyond the rates in force on April 18, 1871.

"(Signed) McDOUGALL HAWKES, Commissioner."

A communication was received from the Engineer-in-Chief suggesting the advisability of extending Pier No. 7, East river, out to the existing pierhead line, and the Erie Railroad Company was notified that this Department will extend the said pier out to said new pierhead line provided said company would agree to pay to this Department for the said extension the same rate per square foot per annum as is now paid for the existing pier.

A communication was received from the People's Co-operative Ice Company relative to the occupancy of the bulkhead at the foot of West Eighty-first street, and the said company was notified that unless the rental due for the bulkhead under the lease be paid on or before August 26, 1902, all permits granted to said company by this Department would be revoked.

A communication was received from the Department of Street Cleaning requesting that facilities for a covered dump be provided on the East river, and the said Department was requested to advise whether the assignment of a space in front of the bulkhead easterly of Gouverneur Slip, East river, would be satisfactory for the purpose of a covered dump.

The Chief Clerk and Auditor was authorized to draw requisitions for costs as taxed by the Supreme Court in the proceedings for the acquisition of the Old Slip Pier East, East river, as requested by the Corporation Council.

A communication was received from the Metropolitan Steamship Company, protesting against the improvement of the water front north of the Carlisle Street Pier, North river, unless a clause be inserted in the lease to the Central Railroad Company of New Jersey, providing that the water between the Carlisle Street Pier and the new pier to be constructed northerly of said pier shall not be used by the said railroad company, and the matter was referred to the Corporation Council for his opinion as to the rights of the Metropolitan Steamship Company and the Central Railroad Company of New Jersey in the premises.

The plans, specifications and form of contract for rebuilding and extending the Pier at the foot of West Fifty-eighth street, North river, as submitted by the Engineer-in-Chief, on Commissioner's Order No. 435, were approved August 27, 1902, and ordered printed and advertised.

A notice of application to be made by John B. Pierson to the Commissioners of the Land Office for a grant of land under water on Arthur Kill, or Staten Island Sound, in the Third Ward of the Borough of Richmond, was transmitted to the Corporation Council.

The Superintendent of Docks having reported the erection of a fence across the inner end of the East Eleventh Street Pier, East river, without permission, the Quintard Iron Works, the occupants of said pier, were directed to immediately remove the fence, and were notified that in the event of their failure to commence such removal within ten days, the work would be done at their cost and expense by the force of this Department.

In accordance with recommendation of the Engineer-in-Chief, the lessees were directed to make necessary repairs to the northerly half of Pier at the foot of East Eighth street, East river.

The following orders were issued to the Engineer-in-Chief:

To repair and paint the clumps of piles at the Battery Steamboat Landing.

To repair the asphalt pavement in front of Pier No. 28, North river, where necessary owing to the removal of platform from the premises, the cost of the work to be reported for collection from the Pennsylvania Railroad Company.

To order dredging under Contract No. 730 to a depth of twelve feet at mean low water in front of the bulkhead foot of West Seventy-seventh street and between West Seventy-seventh and West Seventy-eighth streets, North river, as requested by James Thedford.

To prepare a berth for a public bath at the foot of West Eighty-second street, North river.

The resignation of William V. Levy as Stenographer and Typewriter was, on August 22, 1902, accepted to take effect as of August 14, 1902.

Frederick T. Ealand was, on August 22, 1902, appointed as Stenographer and Typewriter on probation, with compensation at the rate of \$1,050 per annum, to take effect when he reports for duty.

The compensation of Thomas B. Blyth as Stenographer and Typewriter was, on August 22, 1902, fixed at the rate of \$1,050 per annum, for the purpose of conforming to the classification of salaries as adopted by the Municipal Civil Service Commission.

The compensation of Thomas Reardon, Rigger, was, on August 27, 1902, in ac-

cordance with the recommendation of the Engineer-in-Chief, fixed at the rate of \$18 per week, to take effect August 30, 1902.

In accordance with a recommendation of the Chief Clerk and Auditor, the Cashier was directed to close his accounts at 1 o'clock p. m. on each day, in order that the deposits for that day may be made up and transmitted to the bank during banking hours; and William J. Fay, Messenger, was designated as Bank Messenger for the Department, said Fay to file a bond in the sum of \$3,000 for the faithful performance of his duties as such Bank Messenger.

The Municipal Civil Service Commission, in accordance with a recommendation of the Engineer-in-Chief, was requested to furnish a list of persons eligible for appointment as Boat Builders in the Department.

John E. Anderson, Recreation Pier Attendant, against whom charges were preferred of assaulting Sigmund Lissauer, a visitor to the East Third Street Recreation Pier, was given a hearing before the Commissioner on August 27, 1902, and, after hearing the witnesses in the case, said Anderson was reprimanded and ordered transferred to duty on another Recreation Pier.

Charges were preferred by the Engineer-in-Chief against William White, Inspector of Pier Building, of absence from duty without excuse, and he was given a hearing before the Commissioner in relation to said charges on August 27, 1902, after which hearing he was reprimanded and ordered to report to the Engineer-in-Chief.

Charges were preferred by the Engineer-in-Chief against James Lawless, Laborer, of intoxication and neglect of duty, and on August 28, 1902, said Lawless was notified that an opportunity would be given him to be heard before the Commissioner in relation to said charges on September 3, 1902, at 11 a. m.

The following communications were ordered on file:

From the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, transmitting certified copy of resolution adopted August 21, 1902, approving the lease of the easterly half of the Jackson Street Pier West, East river, to John W. Sullivan for a term of five years at a rental of \$500 per annum. Lease ordered prepared for a term of five years from September 1, 1902.

From the Comptroller, stating that a claim has been filed by the Consolidated Gas Company for the sum of \$200,000 for damages to their property between Sixteenth and Eighteenth streets, North river, and requesting to be advised as to any action taken by this Department toward taking possession of the premises. Information furnished.

From the Corporation Counsel:

First—Approving form of advertisement for receiving sealed bids for the privilege of maintaining a dumping board between Forty-third and Forty-fourth streets, North river, and approving form of Contract No. 735 for furnishing anthracite coal.

Second—Transmitting approved forms of renewal leases of the West Twenty-ninth Street Pier North No. 60, North river, to Jefferson Hogan, and of the West Thirty-seventh Street Pier, North river, to the Pennsylvania Railroad Company, and stating that it will be unnecessary to obtain the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for the execution of the said renewal leases.

Third—Approving form of lease of the ferry franchise from the foot of East Forty-second street, Borough of Manhattan, to the foot of Broadway, Borough of Brooklyn.

From the Municipal Civil Service Commission:

First—In relation to appointments and promotions in the Department.

Second—Advising that the title of William J. McPherson may be changed from "Machinist's Helper" to "Flagger."

From the War Department, in relation to the existence of caissons and piling at Riker's Island, East river. Department of Street Cleaning notified that it must remove the piling, etc., if desired.

From the Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company, approving plans and specifications as prepared by this Department for the erection of a new Pier at the foot of West Fifty-eighth street, North River.

From F. E. Owen, requesting to be advised as to when the dumping board now located on the Pier at the foot of Clinton street, East river, is to be removed. Notified that the dumping board will be removed as soon as a new location is obtained for the use of the Department of Street Cleaning.

From Frederick M. Shepard, complaining of inconveniences caused by the work of constructing a crib bulkhead between One Hundred and Thirty-first and One Hundred and Thirty-fifth streets, Harlem river, and of filling in in rear of said bulkhead. Said Shepard requested to advise the Department as to what he desires done in the premises.

From the W. W. Brauer Steamship Company, protesting against interference by the Dockmaster in their use of Pier 33, East River. Said company notified that the action of the Dockmaster in prohibiting the use of the pier for the storage of goods is in accordance with the rules and regulations of this Department.

From Coal Trade Protective Association, requesting that the bulkheads at the foot of Barrow street and at the foot of Perry street, on the North river, be kept open for general wharfage purposes. Notified that it is the intention of the Department to maintain the said bulkheads for general wharfage purposes.

From Lucius C. Higgins, Clerk, requesting an increase of salary. Notified that an application for such increase, made after January 1, 1903, will receive consideration.

From the Central Vermont Railway Company, stating that they will hold the Department responsible for damage to their lighter "Jupiter," caused by a raft of piles in tow of the tugboat "Arthur W. Palmer." Said company notified that any claim for damage should be made upon the owners of the tugboat.

From the Engineer-in-Chief, reporting that the work of repairing the Pier at the foot of West Fifty-fifth street, North river, under Contract No. 746, was commenced by Bernard Rolf, the contractor, on August 21, 1902.

From the Chief Clerk and Auditor, in relation to the proposed leasing of the bulkhead between Sixty-third and Sixty-fourth streets, East river, to the American Malting Company. Said company requested to advise the Department as to what action they propose to take in relation to the offer of this Department of April 24, 1902, for the leasing of the said bulkhead.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable. Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the board of aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter. For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to The City.
