Dear Sir—The construction of the 72-inch pipe line which the Department intends to place from Clear Stream, L. I., to the county line of Nassau, between Massapequa and Amityville, will complete a very important work in connection with Brooklyn's water supply system. By July next, under the first installment of this work (authorized by my predecessor), there will have been laid about eight and a half miles of this pipe line, from Ridgewood to Clear Stream.

There is yet to be procured the property between Clear Stream and Amityville to accommodate this line, and, in addition, a new contract must be awarded for the laying of the 72-inch steel riveted pipe between these locations. Figuring on the prices awarded on condemnation proceedings on land already acquired for this improvement and on the bid under which the present eight and a half miles of pipe was furnished, the Acting Chief Engineer of the Borough of Brooklyn estimates that four million dollars will be required, this to cover the cost of the entire strip of land between Ridgewood and Amityville, and the furnishing and laying of the pipe line in the unfinished section.

The inclosed map is submitted for the purpose of assisting your Engineers in determining the amount of money necessary for this work, and should not be considered as being before your Board for approval, as the Department has not yet pre-

pared its official map with all its many details as to exact area of parcels, owners'

names, etc.

An additional appropriation of \$400,000 is requested for the purpose of building a new pumping station at Wantagh Infiltration Gallery, to consist of a new building, high lift, high duty pumping machinery, boilers and all appurtenances complete. The present pumping plant at this location is operated by the City under a lease with the New York Continental Jewell Filtration Company, who have developed the water supply at that point by the building of an infiltration gallery. At the expiration of one year, if the Department has not provided for its own plant and machinery, it will become necessary to negotiate with these contractors for the purchase of the present plant, which is entirely inadequate for the purposes of this Department, or for a renewal of the present lease. In the opinion of the Acting Chief Engineer, this plant should not be held in service by the City any longer than is absolutely necessary. sary

Another item of appropriation desired is \$450,000 to replace the present pumping station built by M. J. Dady, who has constructed the infiltration gallery at Massapequa. The present plant is equipped with low lift machinery, and is only capable of delivering water into the masonry conduit, and as the 72-inch steel pipe line is to practically replace the old Brooklyn Conduit, and through which water will be forced under a heavy pressure, the water from the Massapequa gallery cannot be utilized until improved machinery has been placed and a proper station constructed.

The above remarks regarding the advisability of discontinuing the services of the pumping station built in connection with the New York Continental Jewell Filtration Company's contract with this Department applies also to the station at Massapequa.

1. I would report that it is proposed to purchase a strip of land to continue the 72-inch line from Clear Stream to the Suffolk County line (a short distance east of Massapequa); the land, furnishing pipe, laying same a distance of about fifteen and one-half (15½) miles, is estimated at \$4,000,000.

2. It is proposed to erect a building, including high duty pumping engines at Wantagh infiltration to take the place of the plant now being operated for the City by the New York Continental Jewell Filtration Company; this plant is estimated at

\$400,000.

3. An appropriation of \$450,000 to erect a building containing high duty pumping engines at Massapequa to take the place of the low duty plant.

I have gone over the matter in detail with the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, the Deputy Commissioner and the Acting Chief Engineer for the Borough of Brooklyn, and while the amount requested will eventually be needed for the work specified, it is my opinion that \$3,000,000 will be sufficient to carry on the work properly for at least one year.

I would therefore suggest that if the financial condition of the City warrants the expenditure, I think the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, pursuant to the provisions of section 178 of the Greater New York Charter, may authorize the Comptoller to issue Corporate Stock to the amount of \$3,000,000, to provide means for the improvement of the water supply system of The City of New York in the Borough of improvement of the water supply system of The City of New York in the Borough of

Gentlemen—A request of mine for the issue of \$500,000 of Corporate Stock for the construction of the new men's prison and administration building and the alteration and partial reconstruction of the men's prison in Raymond street, in this borough, was referred, on March 1, to the Comptroller. His report was submitted to the Board on April 26, and with it was transmitted a report of the Chief Engineer of his department. In the report he suggests that for the present the new women's prison be constructed, together with the administration building, that the cells and interior walls of the men's prison be painted and that certain alterations be made in the civil prison, all the work to be done at a cost of \$360,000, including the architect's fees.

Sir—Hon. Bird S. Coler, President of the Borough of Brooklyn, in communication under date of February 15, 1907, requests the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York to the amount of \$500,000, the proceeds to be used for the purpose of constructing a new Women's Prison and Administration Building, and the alteration and partial reconstruction of the present Men's Prison, in Raymond street, Borough of Brooklyn.

I would report that preliminary plans for the work above outlined have been prepared, and have received the approval of the Municipal Art Commission.

In my opinion, the cost of the work contemplated (including architects' fees) will be nearer \$800,000, instead of \$500,000 requested, but all of the work I do not consider an urgent necessity at the present time. The alterations, completed recently, in the plumbing of the Men's Prison have made it possible to keep it in a sanitary condition.

I would suggest for the present the construction and completion of a new Women's Prison, and in connection therewith the erection of the Administration Building, cells and interior walls of the Men's Prison to be painted, and certain alterations to the civil prison; this will probably cost \$350,000, including architects' fees.

If these suggestions meet with your approval, I would advise that this request, with the above recommendations, be returned to the President of the Borough of Brooklyn for his consideration and action in the matter.

The Committee on Salaries and Offices, to whom was referred on March 26, 1907 (Minutes, page 740), the annexed resolution in favor of fixing salaries of positions in the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, respectfully REPORTS:

REPORTS:

Before taking final action upon the accompanying resolution affecting the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity the Committee desires its amendment in certain respects by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. It is represented to the Committee that it is the intention of the Commissioner to appoint to the position of Chief Clerk and Auditor, at \$4,000, when created, Mr. Beardsley, who is now the general Bookkeeper, at a salary of \$3,000, and that in addition to his present duties Mr. Beardsley will assume those of Chief Clerk. This arrangement would result in the combination of two positions, with salaries of \$3,000 and \$2,700, respectively, involving a saving of \$1,700. It may well be doubted whether in case Mr. Beardsley ceases to hold the position the same arrangement could be maintained as to his successor. The Committee thinks, therefore, that the resolution should be framed so as to cover Mr. Beardsley only. Similarly it has been demonstrated to the Committee that Mr. Cozier, the Deputy Commissioner of the Borough of Brooklyn, is an exceptional official and is deserving of an increase from \$4,500 to \$5,500. The Committee thinks that as a general rule \$5,000 would be a proper maximum salary for the position, but is willing to have the salary of \$5,500 made to apply to the present incumbent only. The Committee desires also that the resolution should be amended so that it should take effect when approved by the Mayor. The mere omission of the date as now stated would be sufficient.

Gentlemen-I am in receipt of the resolution passed by your Board on May 21,

"Whereas, A general demand has long existed for public shelters upon the Williamsburg plaza of the Williamsburg Bridge; and

"Whereas, For three years this demand has remained unheeded by the Commissioner of Bridges, and waiting passengers are exposed to sun and rain; and

"Whereas, The said plaza is being disfigured by the erection of unsightly shanties and structures which are special privileges accorded corporations and individuals for which the City receives no revenue; and

"Whereas, The Alderman of the district affected, on the 13th inst., addressed a communication to the Corporation Counsel, requesting an opinion as to the powers of the Bridge Commissioner in granting said special privileges; and

"Whereas, No response has been received by the aforesaid Alderman to his request for an early opinion; therefore be it

"Resolved, That the Corporation Counsel be requested to render such opinion to this Board at as early a date as possible."

The following communication was received from Alderman Peters:

"Some few weeks ago a news-stand was erected upon the Brooklyn Plaza of the Williamsburg Bridge. For a year past I had been refusing permits to all applicants for privileges on this plaza (which is in my Aldermanic district), believing that special privileges at this point should not be given to anyone. When this stand was erected I wrote to the Bridge Commissioner about it. I to-day had a talk with Mr. Stevenson, and in reply to my inquiry as to what compensation the City was receiving from this privilege, and under what authority he granted the privilege, he gave negative or uncertain answers. I would like to ask for your official opinion on this question, covering answers to the following queries: Has the Commissioner the right

to give this valuable privilege without any return to the City? Has the Commissioner the right to commit the City to charity or philanthropy for the benefit of a single individual at the expense of the whole community? The beneficiary under this privilege is a blind man already enjoying two valuable privileges without cost on account of his affliction. His fellow unfortunates, jealous of his monopoly, are making it very interesting for me. Kindly favor me with your answer before noon tomorrow, as I wish the Board of Aldermen to take action on this matter. Please send answer in care of City Clerk."

In my opinion the Commissioner of Bridges has no power to authorize the erection of a news-stand upon the Brooklyn Plaza of the Williamsburg Bridge, nor has he the right to commit the City to charity or philanthropy for the benefit of a single individual at the expense of the whole community.

I know of no provision of law which would authorize the Commissioner of Bridges to permit the use of the plaza for the purpose of vending merchandise, and in the absence of such provision no such authority can be presumed.

The Committee on Supplies, acting for the Committee on Care of Buildings in the matter of the purchase of an automobile for the Department of Education, respectfully reports that it caused the usual advertisement to be inserted in the CITY RECORD for bids for said machine.

Four bids were received on seven machines. Three of the machines offered, the prices being under \$4,000, did not comply with the requirements, in the opinion of the Comptroller's expert. The prices of the other machines offered were considered too high. Many reputable makers, who claimed they could furnish first-class machines, refused to bid because of what they considered the red tape involved in the submission of regular bids.

After due investigation by the Committee on Supplies, in conjunction with the Committee on Care of Buildings, it was decided to reject all bids, for the reason that the machines offered for less than \$4,000 would not meet the requirements of the Department, and those over \$4,000 were considered excessive in price.

The Committee on Supplies believes that the best interests of the Department and the City would be subserved if the Board of Aldermen would consent to the purchase by the Board of Education of an automobile in the open market at a price not to exceed \$4,000.

Dear Sir—The Department of Public Charities is probably the only Department in the City which is without automobiles. The Commissioner has never applied for any, for the very good reason that the Department has never had sufficient funds until the present time to permit of purchasing them.

The need of an automobile for Manhattan and one for Brooklyn and Queens in the Department of Public Charities is very evident to any one who will give the subject just a little study. The Manhattan Central Office is located on the dock or pier at the foot of East Twenty-sixth street. To reach this office from the surface cars, the elevated trains or the subway, it is necessary to walk several blocks, and a wagon is always kept at the dock to take the office employees to the cars. There are also three other offices of the Department: One at Third avenue and Eleventh street, Manhattan; another at No. 327 Schermerhorn street, Brooklyn, and another at St. George, Staten Island. George, Staten Island.

The Commissioner is also, ex-officio, a member of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue Hospital, which Board has charge of Bellevue Hospital, Fordham Hospital, Harlem Hospital, Gouverneur Hospital and the Emergency Hospital on East Twentysixth street.

The Commissioner and the First Deputy Commissioner look after the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond. The Second Deputy Commissioner is in charge for the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens.

Under section 661 of the Charter, no payment shall be made by the City to any charitable, eleemosynary or reformatory institution, wholly or partly under private control, for the care, support, secular education or maintenance of any child surrendered to such institution, or committed to, or received or retained therein, except upon the certificate of the Commissioner of Public Charities.

Linder this section the Commissioner of Public Charities passes on all hills from

Under this section the Commissioner of Public Charities passes on all bills from private institutions, and certifies the same to the Comptroller before payment can be made. Disputes often arise, and it is frequently found necessary to visit these institutions to straighten out complaints.

Under the Charter sections 663, 664, 665 and 666, the Commissioner of Public Charities has to investigate the circumstances of every person admitted to an institution under his charge, and the near relatives of such person. This necessitates the sending of investigators all over The City of New York, and often the Commissioner has to send a personal investigator to examine into complaints made as to the treatment received by the City wards in the various institutions. As these institutions are scattered all over the various boroughs, an automobile would often be the means of saving considerable time and would greatly expedite the transaction of the work of the Department

responsibilities, and the need of an automobile for his use in Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond is evident. There should also be one for the use of the Department in the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens. The provisions of the Charter above stated apply equally to the duties of the Deputy in charge of these boroughs, and in order to give your Committee an idea of the various public offices the Deputy has to visit on departmental business, the following are mentioned:

on departmental business, the following are mentioned:

The Manhattan office of the Charities Department, foot of East Twenty-sixth street; the Department of Finance; the State Board of Charities, No. 287 Fourth avenue, Manhattan; the Corporation Counsel's offices in Brooklyn and in Long Island City; the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children, No. 105 Schermerhorn street; the District Attorney's offices in Kings County and in Queens County; the Children's Court, No. 102 Court street; the Court of Special Sessions, No. 171 Atlantic avenue; the County Court of Kings County, and the County Court of Queens County. The Department also prosecutes abandonment proceedings in all the Police Courts in Brooklyn and in Queens; also brings actions in the various Municipal Courts in Brooklyn and in Queens on the bonds furnished to the Commissioner of Public Charities in bastardy and abandonment cases. bastardy and abandonment cases.

Under the rules of the Department, the Deputy in charge for Brooklyn and Queens is also required to make frequent inspections of the following institutions under the jurisdiction of the Department:

The County Buildings at Flatbush, the Cumberland Street Hospital, the Bradford Street Hospital, the Coney Island Hospital and the Kings County Morgue on Willoughby street.
