Dear Sir—I send you herewith certified copy of resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, October 4, 1907, consenting to the conveyance to the Pennsylvania Tunnel and Terminal Railroad Company, of property owned by The City of New York at Skillman and Rapelje avenues, Queens, in consideration of a conveyance by said railroad company to the City, of property on Skillman and Foster avenues, Heiser and Gosman streets, Queens, etc., etc.

Whereas, The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at a meeting held September 20, 1907, adopted the following resolution:

Resolved, That the resolution adopted by this Board at meeting held June 5, 1907, authorizing a conveyance to the Long Island Railroad Company of property owned by the City, situated at the junction of Skillman and Rapelje avenues, Long Island City, Borough of Queens, in consideration of a conveyance by the Long Island Railroad Company to The City of New York of property on the block bounded by Skillman and Foster avenues, Heiser and Gosman streets, in the Borough of Queens, be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

Whereas, The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at meeting held May 15, 1907, adopted the following resolutions:

Whereas, The Board of Education at a meeting held February 13, 1907, did adopt a resolution surrendering to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for sale as property not required for City use, premises owned by it and heretofore used as Public School 3, in the Borough of Queens, located at the junction of Skillman and Rapelje avenues, Long Island City, and bounded and described as follows:

All that certain piece or parcel of land lying and being situated in the Town of Newtown, County of Queens and State of New York, as surveyed November 26, 1864, by P. G. Van Alst, City Surveyor, Brooklyn, and which said piece of ground is described as follows:

Beginning at a point on the northeasterly side of the highway opposite the town landing at Dutch Kills, in the said Town of Newtown, and running thence south seventy-five (75) degrees and fifteen (15) minutes east, one hundred and seventy-one (171) feet nine (9) inches, along land of William Bragaw, to the northwesterly side of the old road leading to the Village of Newtown; thence north fifty-two (52) degrees and forty-one (41) minutes east, ninety-five (95) feet one (1) inch, along the northwesterly side of said old road; thence north seventy-five (75) degrees fifteen (15) minutes west, three hundred and twenty-three (323) feet, along land of Mrs. Aletta Burnett, to the northeasterly line of said first mentioned highway; thence south thirty-six (36) degrees eighteen (18) minutes east, one hundred and nineteen (119) feet three and one-half (3½) inches, along the northeasterly side of said highway to the point or place of beginning, containing eighteen thousand five hundred and fifty-three square feet of land, including the site of the old school house as shown by the annexed diagram colored red, being the premises which were conveyed by Conrad Diestel, of the Town of Newtown, County of Queens, and State of New York, and Elizabeth, his wife, to John Bragaw, John W. Paynter and Titus M. Evans, Trustees of School District No. 4, in said town and county, by deed dated April 29, 1865, and recorded in the Queens County Clerk's Office in Liber 227 of Deeds, page 243, June 2, 1865; and

Whereas, The said Board requested the acquisition of other land not owned by The City of New York, mentioned in said resolution as being bounded and described as follows:

Beginning at a point formed by the intersection of the southerly line of Skillman avenue with the easterly line of Gosman street, and running thence southerly along the easterly line of Gosman street 398 feet; thence easterly and parallel, or nearly so, with Foster avenue 182 feet to the former easterly boundary line of the Gosman farm; thence northerly 410 feet along said line to the southerly line of Skillman avenue; thence westerly along the southerly line of Skillman avenue 92.94 feet more or less to the easterly line of Gosman street, the point or place of beginning, be the said several dimensions more or less, together with all the right, title and interest of the owners of said premises of, in and to the streets in front thereof to the centre thereof. It being the intention to convey all the property owned or controlled by the railroad company lying within the area of this block; therefore be it

Resolved, That, in accordance with the provisions of section 205a of the Greater New York Charter as amended, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund determine that the land turned over by the Board of Education, and hereinbefore described, is no longer needed for departmental or public purposes, and do further determine that the lands of private owners herein in this resolution described are needed for a public purpose; it is therefore

Resolved, That to determine the value of the land of the City hereinbefore described and the land of private owners to be exchanged therefor, the said Commissioners of the Sinking Fund do hereby appoint George J. Ryan, George E. Clay and William Richensteen, three discreet and disinterested appraisers, residing in the Borough of Queens, who are hereby authorized and directed to appraise the value of the two parcels of land hereinabove described and to report their appraisals within ten days to this Board; and

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 205a of the Greater New York Charter, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, by unanimous vote, subject, however, to the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, hereby authorize a conveyance to the Pennsylvania Tunnel and Terminal Railroad Company of the hereinabove described property owned by The City of New York, in consideration of a conveyance by the Pennsylvania Tunnel and Terminal Railroad Company to The City of New York of the property owned by the Pennsylvania Tunnel and Terminal Railroad Company, in the Borough of Queens, which is also hereinabove described, free and clear of all encumbrances, including taxes and assessments, water charges and sales for the same; and be it further

Resolved, That when these resolutions and action of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorizing such exchange have been approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the Corporation Counsel be and is hereby requested to prepare the legal instruments on the part of The City of New York to effect such exchange, and upon said instruments having been prepared and approved as to form by the Corporation Counsel and approved by the Comptroller of The City of New York, it shall be the duty of the Mayor of The City of New York to execute, and the City Clerk to attest and deliver to the Pennsylvania Tunnel and Terminal Railroad Company the deed of the property owned by The City of New York, upon receiving at the same time the deed of the property owned by the Pennsylvania Tunnel and Terminal Railroad Company; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, in accordance with the provisions of section 205a of the Greater New York Charter, hereby approves of the above resolutions and the action of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, and consents to the exchange of the above described property.

Hon. Board of Aldermen, New York City:

Gentlemen—I find that the appropriation granted to the Bureau of Highways of this department, titled Labor, Maintenance and Supplies for the year 1907, is inadequate, and that sufficient balance remains to carry the work forward about two and one-half weeks more. Unless additional funds are secured it will be necessary to close down all work in that important bureau.

In the past it has been customary to reduce the time of the working force one-half at this season of the year, but owing to the great amount of work necessary, in order to place our roadways in proper condition after the havoc wrought by the recent severe rainstorms, this is impracticable, working alike a hardship on the employees and depriving the roads of proper care.

To the end that our work may be continued and the roads placed in condition to withstand the heavy winter weather, I respectfully request that the Board recommend to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment an issue of Special Revenue Bonds to the extent of fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000), proceeds thereof to be used for the maintenance and repair of streets in the Borough of Queens, and I would request that the enclosed resolution be given early consideration.

Dear Sir—I respectfully make application to the Board of Aldermen to authorize the issuance of Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of \$1,000, for the purpose of buying new furniture for the courtroom for the Court of Special Sessions, Second Division, in the Bank Building, at St. George, Borough of Richmond.

On July 12, 1907, request was made to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the issuance of Corporate Stock for \$1,000, believing that as all the furniture for the Borough Hall had been paid for by Corporate Stock as betterments, the same method should be followed in the case of the furniture required for the Court of Special Sessions. However, the Comptroller reported to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that funds for this purpose should be provided out of Special Revenue Bonds rather than from an issue of Corporate Stock, and request is therefore made to the Board of Aldermen for the issuance of Special Revenue Bonds for the purpose above named.

Hon. HENRY S. THOMPSON, Commissioner of Public Works:

Dear Sir—I wish to advise you of the absolute necessity of making an immediate request upon the Board of Aldermen for the appropriation of \$30,000 from Revenue Bonds in order to meet the expenses of the Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices for the remainder of the year.

The appropriation at this writing is practically exhausted, and, in order to perform the necessary work of making needed repairs to the steam plants and plumbing systems and maintaining the same at the proper standard, all of the money above mentioned will be required.

This work was anticipated when the Budget for this year was prepared and was provided for, and, had the amount asked for been approved, contracts would have been let and emergency repairs made in order to provide for the strain that always exists in the public buildings during the winter season. Most of the steam plants in the larger buildings are extremely dilapidated from old age and long years of service, and require renewal in all of the vital parts. The Criminal Courts Building, for instance, will require the rehabilitation of all of the boilers, the same having been in service continuously for over ten (10) years. The same condition exists in the West Fifty-fourth Street Court House, where we were reduced to the extremity of using insulation tape in order to prevent the steam pipes from leaking.

The situation in regard to the public baths in reference to plumbing work is in about the same condition as the steam plants above mentioned, and, owing to the continuous and hard usage given these buildings, must have constant attention to keep them in operation.

The smaller plants in the public buildings will also require repairs at an early date to stand the strain that will arise during the cold weather.

After this matter is presented to the Board of Aldermen and referred to the Finance Committee I will prepare an estimate in detail for their information, showing the amounts that will be expended in the public buildings.

The amount requested in the annual Budget for this year for supplies and repairs was \$471,000, and the amount received was \$234,656, so you will readily see the limitations that were placed upon us in meeting the demands of the Bureau.

I trust this matter will receive your prompt action.

Sir—In regard to the request of Commissioner Bensel of the Department of Docks and Ferries that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment recommend to the Board of Aldermen the fixing of the salary of the position of Cashier in his Department at \$4,000 per annum, referred by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to a Select Committee, consisting of the Comptroller and President of the Board of Aldermen for report, and by you referred to the Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics for examination, I beg to report as follows:

Silas Strauss, the Cashier of the Department of Docks and Ferries, has held that position since February 4, 1904. His present salary is \$3,000 per annum.

The duties of the position have greatly increased during the past three years; a conspicuous feature of this increased work being that connected with the establishment and operation of two Municipal ferries. The daily receipts of the Staten Island and South Brooklyn ferries are received and deposited by him. He also receives all moneys collected by the twenty-one Dock Masters. In fact, all moneys paid to the Department of Docks and Ferries for leases, permits and privileges are received by him. The revenues of the Department from all sources amount to between \$4,500,000 and \$5,000,000. With the completion of the new docks now in course of construction the revenues of the Department and the duties of the Cashier will be correspondingly increased. Commissioner Bensel states that Strauss's position is one of the most responsible and important in the Department, and that he is justly entitled to a salary of \$4,000.

The request of the Commissioner of Docks and Ferries would seem to be reasonable and just, and it is therefore recommended that the salary of the Cashier of the Department of Docks and Ferries be fixed at \$4,000 per annum.

The sides of the said parcel of land which are parallel to Course No. 3 are distant 25 feet measured in a normal line from the said centre line and continue to their intersection with the sides of the said parcel which are parallel to Course No. 2 and to their intersection with the southerly side of the said Eagle avenue; containing within said bounds seven and four-tenths (7.4) acres, be the same more or less, as is more particularly shown and set forth on the attached map or plate No. 3312, filed in D-7, entitled "Location of Eagle avenue and proposed new road through property belonging to The City of New York, Town of Hempstead, Nassau County, N. Y.," and the land described is understood and agreed to be all that strip of land as delineated on said map and limited by the lines B-E and F-G.

Said agreement shall recite:

1. That The City of New York by a resolution of its Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted at a meeting held July 22, 1904, having appropriated the sum of \$5,000 and authorized the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock in accordance with the provisions of section 169 of the Revised Charter for the construction of said road, that the Town of Hempstead shall complete the road with the sum of \$5,000 heretofore appropriated and shall forever keep and maintain said road as a public highway at its own expense, and that the construction of said road shall be performed under the supervision of the Engineer of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity of said City, according to a map or plan to be furnished by said department, together with proper specifications therefor.

2. That the Town of Hempstead shall deduct from the total assessed valuation of the property of The City of New York the assessed value of the strip included in this roadway, and shall forever exempt The City of New York from assessment for highway labor upon the road so laid out.

3. That when this road is opened it shall not be used for any other purpose than for vehicle traffic and for pedestrian or equestrian purposes.

4. Hon. JOHN R. DAVIES, Chairman of Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen, No. 100 Broadway, New York City:

Dear Sir—Confirming my statement of Monday in relation to the need of an automobile for the use of the office of the District Attorney of Queens County, and in accordance with your suggestion, I desire to state:

The County Court House in this County was destroyed by fire in November, 1904. The work of rebuilding same was commenced in May of this year, and the building will probably not be finished and ready for occupancy within the next two years according to present indications.

The trials of indictments for murder in the first degree are held at the old Town Hall in the former Village of Flushing, six miles from my office and about one hour removed therefrom by trolley.

All other indictments are tried in the County Court House, held temporarily on the third floor of the Police Station in Fourth street, Long Island City, something more than one mile from my office.

The City Magistrates' Court at Flushing, Far Rockaway, twenty-two miles distance, and at Fifth street, Long Island City, as well as the Coroner's Court and Court of Special Sessions at Jamaica, demand constant daily attention from myself or assistants.

I have endeavored, so far as it has been possible with the limited number of assistants at my disposal, to attend all preliminary hearings in the Magistrates' Courts in cases that must be tried at the Court of Special Sessions or presented to the Grand Jury, but of course you will understand that it has not been possible for me to be absolutely thorough in this line of work with one Assistant, one Deputy Assistant and one Chief Clerk, who devotes himself almost exclusively to court work.

Every week there is the greatest need of either myself or one of my assistants being in attendance at two courts widely removed the same forenoon; to be followed by attendance at the Coroner's Court in the afternoon of the same day, involving the necessity of crossing and recrossing the County several times and the necessity of waiting for cars and transfers, and very frequently causing us to default in attendance in cases of real importance.

The greatest hardship to which the office is subjected, however, is in the question of immediate investigation of serious crimes in order to enable us to interview witnesses while the facts are fresh in their minds, and before they have been advised to keep still and avoid annoyance in being called to testify.

While of course the courts are all reasonably convenient to steam and trolley transportation lines, more frequently than otherwise the scene of crimes is greatly removed from the nearest steam railway station as well as the nearest trolley line.

It is important that my office should be represented by myself or an Assistant, one of the Detectives attached to my office and a Stenographer, in order that we may get legal evidence before it is too late.

Without meaning to criticize the investigation by the precinct Police, whom I have found diligent and capable, I find that they do not have the comprehensive knowledge of the effect of evidence, and are unable to handle the preliminaries in such a way as to result to the best advantage to the people.

We usually find it necessary to go direct to the Police Station House, get in touch with the local officer most familiar with the facts, and then to go from place to place and interview the witnesses.

While of course I do not want to seem to be extra anxious to secure convictions or to prosecute people accused of crime, I do feel that the evidence ought to be thoroughly sifted and that the guilty should be made to suffer for the protection of the innocent.

My plea for an automobile is not made upon the ground that I can save the City expenses which have been paid out in the past for cab hire and automobiles, for the reason that it is almost impossible for me to obtain or hire conveyances in my trips about the County.

My argument is that the efficiency of my office can be very greatly increased by enabling us to do work which must otherwise be left largely undone because of our physical inability to cover the necessary ground.

Our County covers an area of something more than twenty-five miles north and south by the nearest lines of travel and something more than twelve miles east and west.

While I am strongly prejudiced in favor of the higher-priced automobiles, upon the theory that they are better built and operated at less expense for repairs, and are less likely to break down frequently, I am willing to accept your judgment, in view of the fact that your committee has investigated the matter very carefully, and if you say that I can obtain for \$3,000 a fully equipped automobile of genuine merit, that will be entirely satisfactory to me.

I hope that the amount suggested by you will be sufficient to provide a cover, lanterns, speedometers, aprons and other necessary accessories, and avoid the necessity of purchasing the same from the Supplies and Contingencies Fund.

If my application should meet with the approval of the Finance Committee and the Board of Aldermen, I most respectfully urge that early action be taken. The work of the office is pressing to the last degree. I am working without sufficient Assistants to properly attend to the matters now pending, while new cases arising every day are, of a necessity, neglected.

The conditions which I have outlined have forced me to give up all thought of a vacation, and my time on Sundays and legal holidays is very largely devoted to outside investigations, which could be easily handled during regular working hours if rapid transportation could be furnished to us.

I believe that the conditions that exist in this County in regard to court houses widely separated and without means of rapid transportation, do not exist in any other county within the State of New York.

Hon. ELIAS GOODMAN, Broad Exchange Building, New York:

My Dear Alderman—Knowing your longtime interest in the matter of Recreation Piers and the fact that you were one of the original advocates of them when they were first built, I beg leave to address you, and request your good offices in bringing forward a matter of much importance in reference to this subject.

The writer, as you know, was a member of the Tenement House Commission of 1894, and is a Civil Engineer, and was the Engineering Member of that Commission, and wrote the chapter on Pier Parks which appeared in a report of the Commission, and also drew the first plans for a Pier Park which appeared in that publication.

The recreation piers are unquestionably a great boon and blessing to the poor of the City.

As you are aware, not even in Bombay, Calcutta, or the most crowded sections, are people so congested as in some parts of our East and West Sides, and no people need air and breathing places more than those in congested districts.

Fresh air and sunshine have ever been regarded as among nature's greatest blessings and necessities and a specific for many human ills and evils, but the investigations of science have lately shown that air and sunshine are among the cheapest and most potent factors in the making of health, strength, vitality and power, and many physicians are prescribing them in many cases in place of medicine.

Every member of the Board of Aldermen knows that our recreation piers have done a world of good, but their usefulness is limited to three or four months in the summer.

Suppose we could make them equally attractive and beneficial all the year round. Would it not be worth doing? This can be done and they can be made recreation piers in summer, fall, winter and spring.

The writer has gone into the subject with much care and thought and made plans which he would only be too happy to submit. He finds that by making these piers two stories high instead of one, and utilizing the roofs (the very best part of them) for people instead of simply to turn rain, much can be accomplished. It would not only double the space available, but with slightly increased cost would give room for many improvements and advantages.

There are many periods in the spring and fall when it is delightful to walk out of doors, but we want to walk in the sunshine. Not under a shed or roof, as is now necessary on our pier parks.

In remodeling the piers on the plans outlined, the upper part, in winter, could be covered with glass, in adjustable sectional glass framing, and made into a conservatory, palm garden or solarium and sun parlor, and many of the tropical plants, needing to be housed in winter, could here be stored, and the people could enjoy them throughout the winter.

The structures, while they would be largely heated from the rays of the sun, could have a heating apparatus put in, and a ventilating apparatus, and when completed would make an ideal place for the children and delicate babies of the tenements to go, to say nothing of convalescents as well as people in fair health needing air and sunshine.

Cold and hot, fresh water and salt, shower and tub baths could also be added on the lower deck, practically continuing our system of baths throughout the year, or even a plunge be provided.

A gymnasium, running track and athletic training place could be provided for the boys on the lower deck in winter, and recreation places or kindergartens for household economy for little mothers could be put in on the other part of the lower deck, which could also be enclosed in winter and heated, the whole upper deck being devoted to the Solarium.

Thus the poor in our midst would be able to enjoy hot and cold salt water baths in winter and the sun baths of the porticos of the most expensive hotels of Lakewood and Atlantic City.

In the summer, it would be my idea to use the top of the Pier Parks and turn them into real parks, with flower plots and grass plots, a sand pile in which the children might play and wading pools in which they might wade, or in other words, we would have summer and winter all the advantages, pleasure and conveniences for the young folks as well as for the old that they could get at the seashore and most expensive summer resorts.

In addition to that, how much more delightful it would be on a summer night, to sit out under the stars and moon than to sit under the covered recreation pier, as we now have it.

I will be very glad to present large colored drawings of my plans and what I propose. I also beg leave to hand you, with their permission, a letter from Mr. Richard Watson Gilder, and one from Mr. Jacob A. Riis. Mr. Gilder, as you know, was Chairman of the Tenement House Commission in 1894, and is a deep student of tenement house conditions, and Mr. Riis is the eminent sociologist, and few people understand or can understand better the wants and needs of the people in New York; and their letters of commendation and approval are worthy of serious consideration, as there are few men more competent to judge the approximate value of the plans than they.

I am also handing you a copy of the "Herald" of recent date, containing an illustrated article taken from my recent drawings which will make the matter much clearer than any mere description.

This matter would surely appear to be worthy of your consideration and the advantages, comforts and health that it would give many of our people seem a great advantage, and I believe would many times repay the cost which the City might go to in emptying and keeping empty the beds in our hospitals and other institutions provided for the sick and unfortunate.

Thanking you for anything you may do for me in this matter, and trusting that you may see your way clear to bring it forward, that we may make these Pier Parks a reality, believe me,

MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

Minutes of Meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of The City of New York, held at the Commission's Offices, No. 299 Broadway, on Wednesday, September 11, 1907, at 10 a. m.

Present—President William F. Baker and Commissioners R. Ross Appleton and Frank L. Polk.

The President, Mr. William F. Baker, presided.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the non-competitive classification by including in the heading "Positions in the Department of Public Charities, the Department of Correction, the Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, the New York and Brooklyn Truant Schools, and the Brooklyn Disciplinary Training School," the following: "The New York Parental School."

Mr. Edward B. Shallow, Associate City Superintendent of Schools, representing the Board of Education, and Mr. Elliot H. Goodwin, Secretary of the Civil Service Reform Association, addressed the Commission. There was no opposition and the hearing closed.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of paragraph 2 of Rule XV. (as amended March 8, 1907), by adding after the word "positions" in the eighth line the following: "In Parts III., IV., V., VI. and VII.;" and by adding, after the word "respectively," in the sixteenth line, the following: "For positions in Part II., such examinations shall be open to all persons who have served with fidelity for not less than two years in Grade I, and not less than three years in Grades 2, 3 and 4," so that the same shall read:

"2. Examinations for promotion shall be ordered as often as may be necessary to meet or to anticipate the needs of the higher grades, and, so far as practicable, shall be held periodically. Except where otherwise provided by law, such examinations shall be open, in each case, to all persons who shall have served with fidelity for not less than six months in positions (in Parts III., IV., V., VI. and VII.) of the same group or general character in the grade next lower, in the same department, office or institution; except that, for reasons to be set forth in its minutes, and where permitted by law, the Commission may open such examinations to persons in two or more lower grades who shall have served with fidelity for not less than six months in the positions held by them, respectively. (For positions in Part II., such examinations shall be open to all persons who have served with fidelity for not less than two years in Grade I, and not less than three years in Grades 2, 3 and 4.) And, secondly, the Commission may, in any case, extend eligibility for promotion to persons who, for more than six months, have served in another group in the same office, department or institution, where the Commission shall find that the nature of the duties of the positions held by such persons are such as naturally and properly fit them to perform the duties of the position to which they seek promotion as fully as the duties of the persons holding positions in the next two lower grades in the same group; but no such person shall be eligible to promotion who lacks any of the preliminary requirements for original entrance to the position to be filled by promotion."

Mr. Elliot H. Goodwin, Secretary of the Civil Service Reform Association, addressed the Commission. There was no opposition and the hearing closed.

A public hearing was had on the amendment of the classification of exempt positions, under the heading "Police Department," pursuant to chapter 469 of the Laws of 1907, by changing the line "3 Deputy Commissioners" to read "4 Deputy Commissioners." There were no appearances.

A public hearing was had on the matter of amending the classification of positions in the competitive class, Part I., as follows:

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.
