## APPROVED PAPERS.

FOR WEEK ENDING SATURDAY, MARCH 29, 1913.

No. 332.

AN ORDINANCE to provide the necessary means for the support of the government of The City of New York and the Counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, and for other purposes, and to levy taxes on the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation in The City of New York, pursuant to law, in and for the year 1913.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. There shall be and hereby is imposed and levied upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation of and within The City of New York, the sum of one hundred and forty-four million eight hundred and ninety-four thousand seven hundred and eighty-seven dollars and eighty-four cents (\$144,894,787.84), to pay the expenses included in the Budget for the year 1913, for conducting the public business of The City of New York in each Department and branch thereof, including principal and interest of the City debt, and an amount provided for deficiencies in taxes, pursuant to chapter 209 of the Laws of 1906, amounting in the aggregate to one hundred and ninety-two million seven hundred and eleven thousand four hundred and forty-one dollars and sixteen cents (\$192,711,441.16), remaining after deducting therefrom the sum of six million two hundred and thirty-four thousand six hundred and sixty-one dollars and eighty-six cents (\$6,234,661.86), being the aggregate of the county charges and expenses of the Counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, included therein, which sum is hereinafter levied and imposed upon said counties in the matter provided by section 902 of the Greater New York Charter; and after also deducting the sum of forty-one million five hundred and eighty-one thousand nine hundred and ninety-one dollars and forty-six cents (\$41,581,991.46), supplied by the General Fund for the Reduction of Taxation, as stated by the Comptroller of The City of New York in a communication dated February 21, 1913, transmitting his certificates of the amount of the appropriations made for the year 1913, copies of which communication and certificates and of the said Budget are as follows:

City of New York, Department of Finance, Comptroller's Office, February 21, 1913.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen—Section 900 of the amended Greater New York Charter provides as follows:

"Sec. 900. For the purpose of enabling the board of aldermen to impose the annual taxes it shall be the duty of the comptroller of said city to prepare and submit to said board, at least one week before the first day of March in each and every year, a statement setting forth the amounts by law authorized to be raised by tax in that year, on account of the corporation of the city of New York, as hereby constituted, or for city purposes within said city as created by this act, and purposes for which said city is liable, and on account of the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, and also an estimate of the probable amount of receipts into the city treasury during the then current year from all the sources of revenue of the general funds, including surplus revenue from the sinking funds of the mayor, aldermen and commonalty of the city of New York and of any of the municipal and public corporations, or parts of municipal and public corporations by this act consolidated with the municipal corporation known as the mayor, aldermen and commonalty of the city of New York, other than the surplus of revenues of any such sinking funds for the payment of interest on the city debt of the municipal corporation known as the mayor, aldermen and commonalty of the city of New York, or the like debts of the municipal and public corporations by this act consolidated as aforesaid, and the said board of aldermen is hereby authorized and directed to deduct the total amount of such estimated receipts from the aggregate amount of all the various sums which, by law, it is required to order and cause to be raised by tax in said year, for the purposes aforesaid, and to cause to be raised by tax such sum as shall be as nearly as possible but not less than the balance of such aggregate amount after making such deductions, by fixing a tax rate in cents and hundredths of a cent upon each dollar of assessed valuation."

Section 902 of the amended Greater New York Charter provides as follows:

"In the statement submitted by the comptroller to the board of aldermen, as above provided in this chapter, he shall each year include and state specifically the sum or sums necessary to be raised to pay during the current year the salaries of the county officers and the other county charges and expenses in the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, respectively, and the board of aldermen is hereby authorized and directed to levy upon and collect from the taxable property within each of said counties, respectively, the sum or sums so necessary to be raised to pay the salaries of county officers and other county charges and expenses of such county; to the end that each of said counties shall ultimately bear and pay all expenses necessary to be incurred within the county for county as distinguished from city purposes."

In pursuance of the foregoing provisions of law I have the honor to submit to your honorable body statement as follows:

First. The Budget in detail for the year 1913.

Second. The amount of county charges and expenses in the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, respectively, included in said Budget, as well as the amount of county charges and expenses paid during the year 1912 from the proceeds of special revenue bonds, which amounts together are to be raised respectively by levy upon taxable property within each of said counties, as provided by section 902 of the Charter.

Third. The estimated receipts of the General Fund of The City of New York applicable to the reduction of taxation.

Concerning the receipts of the General Fund for the Reduction of Taxation, the following statement shows the items of my estimate:

I further certify that included in the aggregate amount of said Budget are the following amounts appropriated for "County Charges and Expenses" in each of the counties hereinafter named, namely:

## CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS.

*Fixed Charges and Contributions.*  
Care of Dependents in Private Institutions.  
Conditions Governing Payments to Charitable Institutions.  
Preamble.

All appropriations made in this budget to charitable institutions are hereby declared to be subject to the following regulations:

1. The accounts and records of all such institutions shall be kept so as to show their receipts and expenditures pertaining to all institutional activities, and a record shall be maintained in which their expenses shall be recorded under the following classifications:

A. Expenses incurred in the operation of institution as follows:

- Food stuffs.
- Clothing.
- Linen and bedding.
- Fuel.
- Magazines and newspapers.
- Education (Instruction and Educational Supplies).
- Other supplies.
- Salaries and wages.
- Professional services.
- Light.
- Forage and care of animals.
- Telephone.
- Printing, stationery and advertising.
- Postage and telegrams.
- Hospital and sanitarium charges.
- Funerals.
- Recreation expense.
- Miscellaneous expenses.
- Expense for boarded-out children.

B. Expenses incurred in the maintenance of plant and equipment, as follows:

- Repairs and renewals of plant and fixed equipment.
- Repairs and renewals of furniture and movable equipment.
- Interest on bonds and mortgages on corporate real estate, used exclusively for the charitable purposes of the institution, taxes and water rates, if any, thereon, fire insurance premiums on buildings on such real estate, together with their contents.

In all other respects such accounts and records shall be in the form required by the Comptroller of The City of New York, and as far as practicable such accounts shall be kept on an income and expense basis.

2. All payments made to charitable institutions in pursuance of the said appropriations shall be used by such institutions only for expenses incurred by the institution for the care, support, maintenance and education of inmates duly committed by the courts or the Commissioner of Charities or accepted by said Commissioner as public charges, but they shall not include any expense for improvements or additions to plant or equipment, except as stated, or any payments on account of principal of mortgages. Expenses for education shall be taken to mean expenses incurred in providing suitable education for properly committed or accepted inmates, and shall include the salaries of instructors and expenses incurred for supplies for use in instruction.

3. All institutions receiving funds by appropriation from The City of New York and their books of record and account, so far as they relate to institutional activities, shall be open at reasonable times to the visitation, inspection and examination of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the Department of Finance and the Department of Public Charities by their duly authorized Commissioners, officers or inspectors, excepting, however, that the accounts pertaining to the activities of any religious order which may be in charge of any such institution shall be segregated from the other accounts and shall not be subject to this regulation.

4. All such institutions shall prepare and file with the Department of Finance as of a date to be fixed by said department, a report of the condition of the institution and its operations during the previous fiscal year upon forms prescribed and furnished for the purpose under the provisions of these regulations by the Department of Finance.

5. Upon its appearing to the satisfaction of the Comptroller that it would be to the public interest to withhold payments out of any appropriation made to any charitable institution, he may, in his discretion, withhold the same, immediately giving written notice thereof to such institution and of his intention to apply to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for authority to cease further payments. Upon the determination of said board that such payments shall terminate, the right of any such institution to receive payment from any such appropriations shall thereupon end.

6. The names and ages of inmates with a statement of the period for which payment is claimed must be placed on all bills rendered by such institutions for their care, support and maintenance prior to the presentation of such account for payment to the Department of Finance. The certificate of the Commissioner of Public Charities under regulation two hereof must also be attached to such bills. Except in emergency cases the Commissioner of Public Charities shall not accept as proper charges persons capable of paying for their own support or for whose care adequate provision can be made in the public hospitals. No case shall be regarded as an emergency case unless there shall have been made a certificate to that effect by a properly authorized and informed representative of the institution by which such case was received.

7. The City shall not be liable for any claim by any charitable institution which shall be in excess of the amount apportioned to such institution in this budget, notwithstanding the acceptance of the Commissioner of Public Charities or any per capita rates of payment that may have been fixed for various classes of inmates thereof.

8. No money shall be paid to any institution which  
pays any salary to,  
gives any consideration for services (financial or otherwise) by,  
has any business dealing with, or  
secures goods or merchandise (directly or indirectly) from

any officers or trustee or member of its board of managers, or where any such person otherwise receives any pecuniary profit from the operation of such institution.

9. Child-caring institutions not sending their inmates to the public schools, and not sharing in the corporate school fund, and not receiving teachers and school supplies from the Board of Education, but giving in their own buildings secular education to the children resident in the institution for five (5) hours daily for a period equal to the public school year, shall be paid a per capita of 7 cents per day for five (5) school days in the week, for each child of five years of age and over receiving such instruction, except that for abnormal or atypical children a special rate in excess of this amount may be made by the Comptroller. Institutions receiving a per capita allowance for the education of their inmates shall be under the general supervision of the Board of Education, as required by the general conditions relating to institutions re-



ceiving corporate school money, provided in Section 1154 of the Charter of The City of New York.

10. No dependent child under 16 years of age shall be accepted as a proper charge upon the City, and no money shall be paid for the care, support, maintenance or education of such child unless it shall have been lawfully committed to a suitable private charitable institution having its own plant and equipment for the proper protection and care of children and being under the supervision of the State Board of Charities and which has been placed in this budget by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

11. The Department of Health shall maintain in all child-caring institutions receiving funds by appropriation from The City of New York for each inmate accepted as a public charge under the rules of the State Board of Charities, and as herein provided, a complete physical and health record in which shall be recorded the name, age, sex, height and weight, time of admission, general physical condition, including the presence or absence of defects in eyesight, breathing, teeth, or any organic defect, in a manner to conform as nearly as practicable with the records maintained by the Department of Health for children in the public schools in The City of New York. It shall also record the dietary actually employed in such institutions for the feeding of its inmates. Such statistics and records shall be made and revised by the Board of Health once in each six months.

12. Each institution shall give to the Comptroller on forms prescribed by him notice of the reception or discharge of any person for whose care City or County funds are to be received within twenty-four hours after his arrival at or discharge from the institution.

13. The rates of payments to private charitable institutions, unless otherwise specifically provided for, are fixed for the various classes of inmates as follows: Provided that where the Comptroller finds, after proper investigation, that any per capita rate hereinafter stated is too high, he is hereby authorized, on the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, to reduce such per capita rate for any or all institutions.

## Resolutions for Cost Data Budget for the Bureaus of Street Cleaning, Sewers and Highways.

Resolved, That the following terms and conditions shall govern the administration of the cost data budget and supporting schedules for the Bureau of Highways, Bureau of Sewers, Bureau of Street Cleaning, Office of the President, Borough of Richmond, for the year 1913. (1) The nature of all expenditures shall fall within the scope of the work classifications specified in the supporting schedules. (2) The total cost allowances shown therein for any quarter shall not be exceeded within that quarter. (3) The total allowance for capital investment shall not be exceeded during the year. At the end of each quarter of the year there shall be presented to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment a detailed statement of all the operations of the above mentioned bureaus and the cost thereof, together with a reconciliation schedule showing the relation between total costs of work and total expenditures, in such form as may be



prescribed by the Board. At the same time requests for modifications of the remaining schedules may be presented for consideration and action of the Board. The Board shall be notified in advance of the commencement and cessation for all regular work covered by the supporting schedules. The quantity of any item of work performed in a given quarter shall not exceed or underrun by more than 10 per cent. the quantity specified for that item in the supporting schedules, without advance notification to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Be it further

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby recommends to the Board of Aldermen, in accordance with Section 56 of the Greater New York Charter: That the positions and grades of positions and rates of compensation therefor appearing in the following schedules be established respectively in the Bureau of Highways, Bureau of Sewers and Bureau of Street Cleaning, Office of the President of the Borough of Richmond, for the number of incumbents specified therein.

Any person over the age of sixteen years, who desires to be possessed of a pistol, revolver or other firearm, of a size which may be concealed upon the person, to be used for the sole purpose of protection to his or her household or other premises only, may apply to the City Magistrate sitting within the jurisdiction of his or her household or other premises, or to the Police Commissioner, or the Inspector of Police or Precinct Commander having jurisdiction, when so designated by the Police Commissioner for that purpose, for a permit to possess such a pistol, revolver or other firearm, each of which said officers may, if satisfied, upon due and sufficient recommendation that the applicant is a proper and law-abiding person, issue a permit to the said person to be possessed of such a pistol, revolver or other firearm to be used for the protection of his or her household or other premises only. Every person to whom a permit shall be granted, as herein provided, shall pay therefor the sum of one dollar (\$1), which shall be applied in aid of the Police Pension Fund, and a return, in detail, shall be made to the Comptroller or the Police Commissioner monthly, under oath, of the amount so received and credited.

Sec. 434B. Every person selling a pistol, revolver or other firearm of a size which may be concealed upon the person, whether such seller is a retail dealer, pawnbroker or otherwise, selling such a pistol, revolver or other firearm to a person to whom a permit has been issued hereunder, shall keep a register in which shall be entered at the time of sale the date of sale, name, age, occupation and residence of every purchaser of such a pistol, revolver or other firearm, together with the calibre, make, model, manufacturer's number or other mark of identification on such pistol, revolver or other firearm.

Every person to whom a permit is issued hereunder shall possess himself or herself of such pistol, revolver or other firearm within twenty-four hours after such permit shall have been issued, otherwise such permit shall be deemed void and of no value. Every person becoming the lawful possessor of a pistol, revolver or other firearm under the provisions of this ordinance shall be free from apprehension during the period required to carry the same from the place of purchase to his or her household or other premises.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

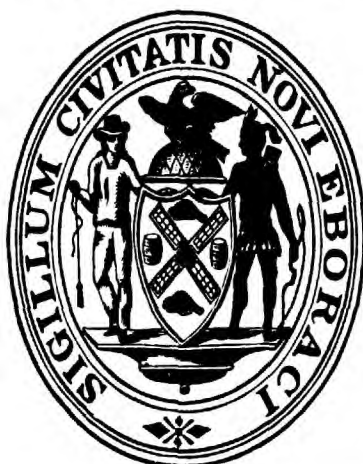

## Amendment to Sanitary Code.

At a meeting of the Board of Health of the Department of Health of The City of New York held in the said city on the twenty-fifth day of March, 1913, the following resolution was duly adopted:

Resolved, That section 37a of the Sanitary Code be and the same is hereby adopted so as to read as follows:

Section 37a. Contractors or builders shall provide or cause to be provided temporary privies for the use of the men employed during construction work, at some convenient place upon the premises or which shall be readily accessible, and the same shall be properly screened to prevent the entrance of flies therefrom. The contents of such privies shall be disinfected and removed and shall not be allowed to accumulate thereat. Contractors, builders or other persons having the management and control of construction work shall prevent the commission of any nuisance by workers, employees or other persons in and about such work or premises connected therewith, and require workers and employees to use the privies so provided.

It is hereby made the duty of each owner or occupant of any premises on which a privy is located or used to cause the same to be properly screened so that flies shall not have access thereto or to the contents thereof.

#### NOTICE TO BIDDERS AT SALES OF OLD BUILDINGS, ETC.

**TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.**

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all person interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement, to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.
