DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS,
346 and 348 Broadway.

At meetings of the Board governing this Department, held during week ending 18th April, 1874, inclusive, all the Commissioners present, (except on the 16th inst., when Commissioner Gardner was absent) the following action was had:

Rules and Orders Adopted.

APRIL 16.

Superintendent of Docks notified that a strict enforcement so far as possible, of rules 9, 10 and 11 of the manual will be required on and after this date, on their respective districts, and that the instructions heretofore given whereby they were required to report to this office, before taking action under said rules, are hereby declared annulled and void.

Applications for Leases, etc.

April 16.—From Smith & Co., for bulkhead foot of Corlear street, E. R., for 10 years, with privilege to erect a pier thereat 75 feet by 40 feet. Granted, if terms and rent of \$500 per annum are agreed to; the pier to be built at their own cost and expense, and to revert to the city, free of all cost or damage, at the termination of the lease.

Application for Permits, etc.

April 16.—From R. E. Allen & Co., to use dumping board, at foot of Lighthouse street, N. R. Granted, provided assent of Board of Police is first obtained.

Repairs, etc., Ordered.

April 13.—Supt. Turner directed to extend pier 55, E. R., the full width, out to the established line, a distance of say 65 feet.

April 16.—Lessee of westerly half of pier 2, E. R., notified to make necessary repairs to that half without delay, so that the work may be finished and completed at the same time as that being done on the easterly half.

Dredging Ordered.

April 16.—Harlem River and Port Chester R. R. Co., granted permission to dredge in front of their property on Harlem River.

Miscellaneous.

April 13.—The resolution adopted March 19, 1874, directing the Engineer-in-Chief to construct the foundation of sub-piers of new pier 1, N. R., from sub-pier No. 8, to and including the pier head of rip-rap stone, rescinded, and the Engineer-in-Chief directed to construct said foundation of the crib plan heretofore adopted.

April 13.—Report of operations and action of the Department during the three months ending March 31, 1874, as prepared by the Secretary, approved and adopted, and ordered transmitted to his Honor the Mayor, in compliance with his request of the 27th ult.

April 15.—Eight proposals for furnishing 5000 white or yellow pine or spruce piles, were received and publicly opened and read in the presence of the Comptroller, and the award of the contract deferred for further consideration.

April 16.—Certificate of the Board given to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, that the granting of the ferry franchise for the following ferries, for the terms stated, will not in any manner be likely to interfere with or hinder the improvement of the water front at the several locations designated; and the Comptroller notified that leases for the wharf property belonging to the Corporation, occupied by the said ferries, will be given for said terms, at the rents named below, to wit:

Ferry from 23d street, E. R., for a term of 5 years from May 1, 1874; premises will be leased at \$5,000 per annum.

Ferry from Piers 32 and 33, E. R., for a term of 3 years from May 1, 1874; premises not owned by the Corporation.

Ferry from foot Grand street, E. R., for a term of 5 years from May 1, 1874; premises will be leased at \$15,000 per annum.

Ferry from north of Grand street, E. R., for a term of 5 years from May 1, 1874; premises not owned by the Corporation.

Ferry from foot Houston street, E. R., for a term of 5 years from May 1, 1874; premises will be leased at \$6,500 per annum.

Ferry from foot 92d street, E. R., for a term of 5 years from May 1, 1874; premises will be leased at \$500 per annum.

Ferry from Barclay street, N. R., for a term of 2 years from May 1, 1874; premises not owned by the Corporation.

Ferry from Chambers street, N. R., for a term of 1 year from May 1, 1874; premises will be leased at \$15,000 per annum.

Ferry from Desbrosses street, N. R., for a term of 1 year from May 1, 1874; premises will be leased at \$6,000 per annum.

April 16.—Comptroller notified that certain bulkhead and wharf property, owned by the Corporation, at the foot of Whitehall street, E. R., has been leased to the North Shore Staten Island Ferry Company for 10 years, from May 1, 1874, at a rent of \$10,000 per annum, and at the foot of Christopher street, N. R., to the Hoboken Land and Improvement Company for ferry purposes, for 10 years, from date of completion of present improvements thereat, at a rent of \$15,000 per annum, and that the said leases contain an agreement, that the said annual rents are to cover, and be in full of, all claims of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty, of the City of New York, for the franchise, license, right and wharfage of the said ferries, during their respective terms.

April 16.—Statement of claim directed to be presented for payment to the Erie Railway Co. for \$1,416 for cost of and damage to property sunk in North River September 4, 1873, consequent upon said Company's Ferry Boat Delaware, colliding with a scow having property on board, off Pier 30.

April 16.—Wm. H. Payne & Co's claim, amounting to \$192, for storage on timber, etc., removed to their yard in April, 1872, directed to be transmitted to the Second Ave. R. R. Company, with a notice to protect said property, it being understood that the said Company is the owner thereof.

Whereas, It is painfully evident that these midnight excursionists have become greatly emboldened to continue their diabolical entertainments by the rapturous encouragement bestowed upon professional imitators in divers places of public amusement; and

Whereas, The season is rapidly approaching, when our vast population, awestruck from the cares and trials of busy life, will require that repose which "nature's sweet restorer, balmy sleep," alone can furnish; and

Whereas, This Board is fully impressed with the responsibility of the situation, and desirous of taking prompt action, tending to remedy the evil at the earliest possible moment, does adopt the following:

Resolved, That on and after the 30th inst., all members of the genus-felis, otherwise known as cats, belonging to the masculine persuasion, and having arrived at mature age, shall be required to pay, (or have paid for them), an annual tax of three dollars (\$3), and in addition thereto, shall be required to provide themselves, (or have provided for them), a suitable throat-latch or muzzle, as per pattern, to be furnished (or approved) by the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals; said contrivance or apparatus, as the case may be, to be properly adjusted at sunset of each day, and to be worn without cessation until sunrise of the following morning; and be it further

Resolved, That on and after the above date, it shall be the duty of the Police and Fire Departments, and the Insurance Patrol, to detain all cats found running at large, or assembling with riotous intent in any street or avenue, within the City limits, and convey them forthwith to the place recently provided by the Common Council for the imprisonment of goats; and be it further and finally

Resolved, That no exemption shall be permitted from the requirements of this ordinance, excepting for those cats belonging, at the time hereinbefore specified to, or becoming within twenty days thereafter members of the neuter gender.
