DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS, 346 and 348 Broadway.

At meetings of the Board governing this Department, held during week ending 18th April, 1874, inclusive, all the Commissioners present, (except on the 16th inst., when Commissioner Gardner was absent) the following action was had:

Rules and Orders Adopted.

APRIL 16.

Superintendent of Docks notified that a strict enforcement so far as possible, of rules 9, 10 and 11 of the manual will be required on and after this date, on their respective districts, and that the instructions heretofore given whereby they were required to report to this office, before taking action under said rules, are hereby declared annulled and void.

Applications for Leases, etc.

April 16.—From Smith & Co., for bulkhead foot of Corlear street, E. R., for 10 years, with privilege to erect a pier thereat 75 feet by 40 feet. Granted, if terms and rent of \$500 per annum are agreed to; the pier to be built at their own cost and expense, and to revert to the city, free of all cost or damage, at the termination of the lease.

Application for Permits, etc.

April 16.—From R. E. Allen & Co., to use dumping board, at foot of Laight street, N. R. Granted, provided assent of Board of Police is first obtained.

Repairs, etc., Ordered.

April 13.—Supt. Turner directed to extend pier 55, E. R., the full width, out to the established line, a distance of say 65 feet.

April 16.—Lessees of westerly half of pier 2, E. R., notified to make necessary repairs to that half without delay, so that the work may be finished and completed at the same time as that being done on the easterly half.

Dredging Ordered.

April 16.—Harlem River and Port Chester R. R. Co., granted permission to dredge in front of their property on Harlem River.

Miscellaneous.

April 13.—The resolution adopted March 19, 1874, directing the Engineer-in-Chief to construct the foundation of sub-piers of new pier 1, N. R., from sub-pier No. 8, to and including the pier head of rip-rap stone, rescinded, and the Engineer-in-Chief directed to construct said foundation of the crib plan heretofore adopted.

April 13.—Report of operations and action of the Department during the three months ending March 31, 1874, as prepared by the Secretary, approved and adopted, and ordered transmitted to his Honor the Mayor, in compliance with his request of the 27th ult.

April 15.—Eight proposals for furnishing 5000 white or yellow pine or spruce piles, were received and publicly opened and read in the presence of the Comptroller, and the award of the contract deferred for further consideration.

April 16.—Certificate of the Board given to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, that the granting of the ferry franchise for the following ferries, for the terms stated, will not in any manner be likely to interfere with or hinder the improvement of the water front at the several locations designated; and the Comptroller notified that leases for the wharf property belonging to the Corporation, occupied by the said ferries, will be given for said terms, at the rents named below, to wit:

Ferry from 23d street, E. R., for a term of 5 years from May 1, 1874; premises will be leased at \$5,000 per annum.

Ferry from Piers 32 and 33, E. R., for a term of 3 years from May 1, 1874; premises not owned by the Corporation.

Ferry from foot Grand street, E. R., for a term of 5 years from May 1, 1874; premises will be leased at \$15,000 per annum.

Ferry from north of Grand street, E. R., for a term of 5 years from May 1, 1874; premises not owned by the Corporation.

Ferry from foot Houston street, E. R., for a term of 5 years from May 1, 1874; premises will be leased at \$6,500 per annum.

Ferry from foot 92d street, E. R., for a term of 5 years from May 1, 1874; premises will be leased at \$500 per annum.

Ferry from Barclay street, N. R., for a term of 2 years from May 1, 1874; premises not owned by the Corporation.

Ferry from Chambers street, N. R., for a term of 1 year from May 1, 1874; premises will be leased at \$15,000 per annum.

Ferry from Desbrosses street, N. R., for a term of 1 year from May 1, 1874; premises will be leased at \$6,000 per annum.

April 16—Comptroller notified that certain bulkhead and wharf property, owned by the Corporation, at the foot of Whitehall street, E. R., has been leased to the North Shore Staten Island Ferry Company for 10 years, from May 1, 1874, at a rent of \$10,000 per annum, and at the foot of Christopher street, N. R., to the Hoboken Land and Improvement Company for ferry purposes, for 10 years, from date of completion of present improvements therat, at a rent of \$15,000 per annum, and that the said leases contain an agreement, that the said annual rents are to cover, and be in full, of all claims of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty, of the City of New York, for the franchise, license, right and wharfage of the said ferries, during their respective terms.

April 16.—Statement of claim directed to be presented for payment to the Erie Railway Co. for \$1,416 for cost of and damage to property sunk in North River September 4, 1873, consequent upon said Company's Ferry Boat Delaware, colliding with a scow having property on board, off Pier 30.

April 16.—Wm. H. Payne & Co's claim, amounting to \$192, for storage on timber, etc., removed to their yard in April, 1872, directed to be transmitted to the Second Ave. R. R. Company, with a notice to protect said property, it being understood that the said Company is the owner thereof.

April 16—Union Ferry Co., notified to remove fence now erected on westerly half of pier 2, E. R., within 10 days, and that a fine of \$50 per day will be imposed for each and every day thereafter, during which said fence shall remain.

April 16—Supt. of Docks for the district, directed to cause the immediate removal of all chains, anchors and other property, encumbering the westerly half of pier 2, E. R.

April 16—Captain of the Port respectfully requested to transmit copy of all rates and orders regulating the loading and discharging of vessels and governing the duties of the harbor masters of the Port of New York.

April 16—Board of Police informed in compliance with the request of the Supt. of Police, that the extent in miles of the water front of the city, including the 23d and 24th wards, is 41 miles 1,521 2-3 yards, as completed by the Engineer-in-Chief of the Department.

April 16—Supt. of Docks for the district directed to stop the discharge of scrap iron from the Brig "Constance" on to pier 49, E. R., until

that on the pier already, shall have been removed, the N. Y. Floating Dry Dock Co. having reported that the safety of the pier is endangered by the large quantity of iron thereon.

April 16—Offer of Bently, Gildersleeve & Co., to sell propeller "Middlesex" to the Department declined, services of said boat not being required.

April 16—Wm. H. Webb informed that immediate and final action is required on the subject of repairs necessary to pier at foot of 37th street, N. R., consequent upon damage caused by him in filling in property adjoining the southerly side thereof; and that, unless a satisfactory settlement of the amount due from and payable by him, for the damage sustained, shall be had on or before the 1st day of May next, that the claim as estimated by this Department will be placed with the Counsel to the Corporation for immediate collection.

April 16—Offer of American Photo-Lithographic Co., to print in colors, 500 full scale copies of map showing high and low water lines, etc., for \$900, approved and accepted.

STREET OPENINGS.

We, the undersigned Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment of the above-entitled matter, hereby give notice to the owner or owners, occupant or occupants, of all houses and lots and improved or unimproved lands affected thereby, and to all others whom it may concern, to wit:

I.—That we have completed our estimate and assessment in the above-entitled matter, and that all persons whose interests are affected thereby, and who may be opposed to the same, do present their objections in writing, duly verified, to the undersigned Commissioners, at our office, No. 150 Broadway (Room 10), in the said city, on or before the 26th day of May, 1874, and that we, the said Commissioners, will hear parties so objecting within the ten days next after the said 26th day of May, 1874, and for that purpose will be in attendance at our said office on each of said ten days, at 2 o'clock.

II.—That the abstract of the said estimate and assessment, together with our maps and also all the affidavits, estimates and other documents which were used by us in making our report, have been deposited in the office of the Department of Public Works, in the City and County of New York, there to remain until the 6th day of June, 1874.

III.—That the limits embraced by the assessment aforesaid are as follows, to wit: All those certain lots, pieces or parcels of land situate in said City and bounded by and included and contained within the centre lines of the following named streets, that is to say: Beginning at the point formed by the intersection of the centre line of Hudson street with the centre line of Vestry street, and running thence westerly along the centre line of Vestry street to the centre line of West street; thence northerly along the centre line of West street to the centre line of Watts street; thence easterly along the centre line of Watts street to a point where if said Watts street were extended would intersect the centre line of Sullivan street; thence northerly along the centre line of Sullivan street to the centre line of Broome street; thence easterly along the centre line of Broome street to the centre line of Broadway; thence southerly along the centre line of Broadway to a point distant two hundred and forty-five feet, or thereabouts, southerly from the southerly line or side of Grand street; thence westerly along a line drawn parallel or nearly so with Grand street to the centre line of Sullivan street; thence southerly along the centre line of Sullivan street to the centre line of Canal street; thence northwesterly along the centre line of Canal street to the centre line of Vestry street; and thence westerly along the centre line of Vestry street to the point or place of beginning.

IV.—That our report herein will be presented to the Supreme Court of the State of New York, at a special term thereof, to be held in the new Court House at the City Hall, in the City of New York, on the 22d day of June, 1874, at the opening of the Court on that day, and that then and there, or as soon thereafter as Counsel can be heard thereon, motion will be made that the said report be confirmed.

CORPORATION SALE OF FERRY FRANCHISES.

SEALED BIDS WILL BE RECEIVED TO BE publicly opened at the Comptroller's Office, on THURSDAY, April 30th, 1874, at 2 o'clock, P. M., for leases of Franchise or right to maintain and operate several ferries around the City of New York for the terms and on the conditions hereafter set forth.

The leases will be made to conform to the requirements of the laws relative to ferries, and subject to such regulations, ordinances or by-laws, as now are or hereafter may be made or passed by the Common Council or State Legislature, and the leases will also provide that the lessees shall take and assume at their own costs and charges all or any responsibilities and liabilities of the Corporation of the City of New York to the present lessees of ferries in relation to boats, fixtures, &c., belonging to such lessees at the respective ferries.

The minimum rate for which the ferry Franchise or license to operate ferries shall be used or enjoyed, has been appraised and set by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at two and one-half per centum of the gross receipts for ferrage, that shall hereafter accrue at each separate ferry, to be paid quarterly to the Corporation, and a covenant will be contained in each lease requiring the lessees to make and deliver to the Comptroller of the City of New York, quarterly, a statement in writing verifying by oath or affirmation of the actual total gross receipts for ferrage received by such lessee during the preceding three months, and also that the lessees shall keep regular books of account showing the daily gross receipts of the ferry leased, and allow said Comptroller or any person designated by him to examine such books.

The Department of Docks of the City of New York, has fixed and established the rent for which it will lease the property in wharves, piers, slips and lands under water belonging to the Corporation, at the several ferries to be leased to the parties or persons to whom the lease of the ferry franchise shall be awarded by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, for the term specified for the lease of the franchise at the rates set forth hereafter, and no deviation will be made from the same, and covenants will be contained in such leases for construction, maintenance and surrender of all necessary fixtures and appurtenances to the wharf and pier property belonging to the City used by such respective ferries.

Proposals for the lease or license to use the ferry franchise at the respective ferries, to state the maximum percentage on gross receipts which the person or parties offering to take each ferry will pay in addition to the rent fixed by the Department of Docks for the use of the pier or wharf property belonging to the city, but no lease will be given at less than the minimum rate of $\frac{1}{2}$ per cent on the gross receipts.

Security satisfactory to the Comptroller will be required for the punctual performance by the lessees of the covenants of the lease of the franchise in their behalf.

The several ferries at which the franchise only is to be leased are as follows:

1st. The ferry from the slip, north of and adjoining the foot of Grand street, East river, to the foot of South Seventh street, Brooklyn, for the term of five years from May 1, 1874.

2d. The ferry from James slip, between piers No. 32 and 33, East river, to Bridge street, and to South Sixth street in the City of Brooklyn, for the term of three years from May 1, 1874.

The several ferries at which the franchise is to be leased, with use of pier and wharf property belonging to the City of New York, are as follows:

3d. The ferry from foot of Grand street, New York, to Grand street, Brooklyn, for the term of five years from May 1, 1874, subject to \$15,000 per year rent for pier and wharf property belonging to the city, such rent payable quarterly to the Department of Docks.

4th. The ferry from the foot of Houston street, East River, to Grand street, Brooklyn, for the term of five years from May 1, 1874, subject to rent of \$6,500 per year, payable as last mentioned.

5th. The ferry from northside of Twenty-third street, East River, to Greenpoint, for the term of five years from May 1, 1874, subject to the rent of \$5,000 per year, payable as last mentioned.

6th. The ferry from foot of 92d street, East River, to Astoria, Long Island, for the term of five years from May 1, 1874, subject to the rent of \$500 per year, payable as last mentioned.

7th. The ferry from foot of Chambers street, North River, to Poughkeepsie, N. Y., for the term of one year from May 1, 1874, subject to \$15,000 per year rent, payable as last mentioned.

8th. The ferry from the foot of Desbrosses street to Jersey City, for the term of one year, from May 1, 1874, subject to \$6,000 per year rent, payable as last mentioned.

9th. The ferry from the foot of Whitehall street, East River, to the North shore, Staten Island, for ten years, from May 1, 1874, subject to payment of \$10,000 per annum rent, payable as last mentioned.

10th. The ferry from the foot of Christopher street, North River, to Hoboken, N. J., for the term of ten years, from May 1, 1874, subject to payment of \$15,000 per annum rent, payable as last mentioned.
