So vertical piles for standard blocks and 33 piles for special foundation blocks were driven, regulated and staylathed; 21 bracing piles were driven and regulated, 58 foundation piles were sawed off to grade, and 2 binding frames were placed, fastened and chocked.

MASONRY.

8 pieces of granite were set on wall foundation. EARTH FILLING.

MASONRY.

Mud was pumped from wall foundation; 472 batches of concrete in bags were placed on wall foundations; 71 batches of concrete were mixed and placed on top of concrete in bags; 10 concrete blocks, 11 base and 10 sub-base blocks were set on wall foundation; 126 pieces of granite were set on wall foundation and backed up with 188 batches of concrete.

STONE FILLING.

Rip-rap stone was discharged in rear of wall by Brown & Fleming under Treasurer's orders therefor. PIER AT WEST FIFTY-FIFTH STREET.

13 pieces of coping were set on top of wall and holes were drilled in coping for backing logs.

EARTH FILLING.

343 loads of earth filling were received from the Columbus Monument Association, under Secretary's Order No. 12104, and same were placed in rear of wall. Total received, 962 loads. 2,354 loads of earth filling were received under Secretary's Order No. 10590. Total, 36,661 loads. Total on section, 129,842 loads.

BULKHEAD-WALL PROPER.

Mud was excavated and removed from bulkhead-wall area between West Twenty-third and West Twenty-fourth streets by the Morris & Cumings Dredging Company, under Secretary's Orders Nos. 12016 and 12245.

WEST THIRTIETH STREET.

Sewer barrel was built of creosoted timber under inner end of Pier, new 60, and connected with temporary sewer at West Thirtieth street. The sewer under outer end of pier was repaired, earth filling in rear of wall was replaced and inner end of pier was repaired.

PIER, NEW 60, N. R.

The inner end of Pier, new 60, North river, was resheathed, under Contract No. 418. Completed September 22, 1892.

PIER, NEW 61, N. R.

The inner end of the above pier was raised and blocked up.

PIER, NEW 63, N. R.

The inner end of the above pier was raised and blocked up.

DREDGING

20,493 cubic yards of mud and 3,023 cubic yards of crib-work were excavated and removed by the Morris & Cumings Dredging Company from site of pier.

Fast Ninety-fourth Street Section-Resolution of the Board, April 25, 1889.

BULKHEAD-WALL PROPER.

STONE FILLING

554 cubic yards of rip-rap stone were delivered and deposited on wall foundation by Brown & Fleming, under Treasurer's orders therefor; also rough stone and boulders removed from slip at north end of the East One Hundred and Twenty-fifth Street Section were transferred to and deposited in rear of the wall at this section.

MASONRY.

12 pieces of coping stone were set on the "E" course of the bulkhead-wall, and joints in the granite were cleaned and pointed and holes were drilled in the coping to receive ahlstrom bolts for securing backing logs.

REMOVING OLD WORK.

Old facing timbers in the old bulkhead were removed to make way for the earth filling.

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EARTH FILLING.

7,613 loads of earth filling were received from Thomas Smith and same were placed in rear of the wall under resolution of the Board, October 6, 1892. Total received to date, 8,933 loads. TEST PILING.

Test piles were driven to ascertain the nature of the river bottom for the purpose of preparing plans and specifications for building a new pier.

East Ninety-sixth Street Section-Resolution of the Board October 31, 1889.

STONE FILLING.

758 cubic yards of cobble stone and 1,130 cubic yards of rip-rap stone were delivered and deposited on wall foundation by Brown & Fleming under Treasurer's orders therefor.

PILING AND WOODWORK.

98 vertical piles were driven, regulated and staylathed; 27 bracing piles were driven and regulated; 2 binding frames were made and sunk and keyed to place; 93 foundation and 60 platform piles were sawed off with the saw cutting machine; bracing piles were sawed off by hand; 20 lineal feet of longitudinal capping and 22 transverse caps were placed; foundation piles were located and 693 feet of 4-inch deck planking were placed on caps.

MASONRY.

5 standard and 1 special block were set on the wall; chain-holes between the blocks were filled with concrete in bags; 65 pieces of granite were set and backed up with 172 batches of concrete and joints in granite were cleaned out and pointed.

BETWEEN NINETY-NINTH AND ONE HUNDREDTH STREETS.

Borings were taken with the "Woodcock" borer to ascertain the nature of the river bottom between the above streets.

BULKHEAD-WALL PROPER.

DREDGING.

5,778 cubic yards of mud and 6,034 cubic yards of sand were excavated and removed from site of bulkhead-wall by the Atlantic Dredging Company, under Treasurer's orders therefor.

STONE FILLING.

958 cubic yards of cobble stone were deposited on wall foundation by Brown & Fleming and P. H. Sheridan, under Treasurer's orders therefor.

PILING AND WOODWORK.

424 vertical piles were driven, regulated and staylathed; foundation piles were sawed off, and 3 binding frames were made, sunk and keyed to place.

MASONRY.

13 special concrete blocks were set in the wall, and chain holes between the blocks were filled with concrete in bags; 60 pieces of granite were set and backed up with 84 batches of concrete in bags, and joints in the granite were cleaned out and pointed.

East One Hundred and Twenty-fifth Street Section-Resolution of the Board, March 28, 1889.

BULKHEAD-WALL PROPER.

MASONRY.

Joints in the granite were cleaned out and pointed, 76 lineal feet of backing log were placed and secured to the new bulkhead-wall with ahlstrom bolts; also placed I galvanized iron cleat on backing log for mooring purposes.

GENERAL CHARGE.

Holes were drilled in bed rock on river bottom in slip at north end of section with drilling machine, operated with steam from 12-ton derrick, charged with explosives and blasted; mud, sand and gravel were pumped from, and loose stone and boulders removed from rock bottom with 12-ton derricks Nos. 1 and 2.

DEPARTMENT YARDS.

West Fifty-seventh Street Yard.

The blacksmith has done ironwork for the different sections of the work ; for floating property

and for general repairs. Molds and cores were stripped and set up, and 22 concrete blocks, containing 836 cubic yards, and 19 special sub-blocks, containing 500.44 cubic yards, were made; 5,000 barrels of Portland cement were received under Treasurer's orders therefor, and were stored for Department use, after tests were made; sand, cement and broken stone were issued to the various sections of the work. The yard has been maintained in good order.

East Seventeenth Street Yard.

East Seventeenth Street Yard, Ironwork was made and repaired by the blacksmith for work on construction on the East river, for the East Seventeenth Street Yard and for the Canal Street Section on the North river. Concrete molds and cores were set up and taken down, as required, and 16¹/₂ standard, 8 1-6 special "B" blocks for the East One Hundred and Second Street Section, 1 special block for the East Ninety-sixth Street Section and 1 special block for the West Washington Market Section were made, containing about 880 cubic yards of concrete. 3,994 barrels of Portland cement were received under Treasurer's orders and stored for Depart-ment use, and samples sent to West Fifty-seventh Street Yard to be tested ; 495 barrels issued from the West Fifty-seventh Street Yard ; total, 4,489 barrels. The yard has been maintained in good order and condition.

CANAL STREET SECTION EXTENDED.

Resolution of the Board, December 10, 1892.

Bulkhead-wall Proper.

MASONRY.

Molds and cores were made, set up and taken down, as required, and the following blocks were made, C 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9 and 1/2 of 10, containing 287 cubic yards of concrete. 10 pieces of granite were set in blocks C 6, 7, 8, 9 and 10.

SEWER.

Molds and cores were made, set up and taken down, as required, and the following blocks were made for the sewer, A' I to A 29, CC I to 3, E I to 4 and E' I and 2 (38 blocks), containing 174 cubic yards of concrete.

FLOATING PROPERTY.

The Floating Property of the Department consists of the following : 100-ton derrick "City of New York," 12-ton derrick No. 1, 12-ton derrick No. 2, 12-ton derrick No. 3, 10-ton derrick. Tug "Manhattan." Tug "Pier."

Steam launch "Inspector."

Steam faunch "Inspector." Naphtha-engine launch. 29 yawl boats, 2 skiffs, 2 bateaux, 1 rowboat and 5 sounding-boats. 2 sets land ways, one 30 feet high and one 45 feet high. I set 50 feet inclined pile-driver ways. Rock-drilling machine with ways, 19 feet high. The 100-ton derrick has handled foundation blocks for the various sections of the bulkhead-wall, as required. Various repairs have been made by the crew and the same has been kept in good order and condition

repaired and used on the various sections of the work. 12-ton Derrick No. 2 – This derrick has been in commission during the quarter, and has been

repaired and used on the various sections of the work. 12-ton Derrick No. 3—This new derrick was completed in August last, and has been in com-mission since August 25, 1892, and has been used on the various sections of the work. The 10-ton Derrick—This derrick has been in commission during the quarter and used on the

The to-ton Derrick – this derrick has been in commission during the quarter and used on the various sections of the work. The tug-boats of the Department, "Manhattan" and "Pier," have been employed in the necessary towing of the Department. The tug "Manhattan" was loaned to the Health Officer of the Port, during the emergency occasioned by the appearance of the cholera.

Naphta-engine Launch—This launch was loaned to the Health Officer of the Port at Quarantine on August 31, 1892, and on October 25, 1892, the Department sent for and received said launch at Quarantine and brought it to West Fifty-seventh Street Yard, where it was put in good order and condition. It has been used since from time to time for examinations of the water-front, for

and condition. It has been used since from time to time to time to the work. carrying small parcels, tools, etc., to the different parts of the work. Steam-launch "Inspector"—Various repairs have been made from time to time to the steam launch and she has been kept in use during the quarter. Diver's scows "A," "G," "N," and "S"—Have been kept in good order. The deck scows have been in almost constant use. The small boats, skiffs, etc., have been kept in good order and condition.

Materials and Supplies.

Various materials and supplies for the use of floating property have been received and expended in part and the remainder has been stored for future use, as required.

Miscellaneous.

Various pieces of work have been done at West Fifty-seventh Street Vard for the use of floating property, and for other work, such as hanging fenders for scows, straight edges, ladders, signs, pike-poles, etc. The force of floating property has also been employed in filing saws, spinning oakum, pitch, pumping out scows and in the general care of floating property.

WORK OF CONSTRUCTION NOT UNDER NEW PLAN.

Pier at Third Street, E. R.

The work of removing the existing pier and portions of the crib-bulkhead at the foot of East Third street, East river, and for preparing for and building a new wooden pier, with appurtenances, including a wooden sewer, and for repairing the crib-bulkhead thereat, under Contract No. 415, was completed on October 31, 1892.

Surveying Party.

In connection with the construction of the bulkhead, or river wall, and the new piers at the different sections on the North, East and Harlem rivers, base lines and bench marks have been fre-quently verified, and from them grades, measurements, etc., have been furnished from time to time,

as required. Lines, grades, etc., have also been furnished for the work of repairs under contract. Surveys of the water-front on the North, East and Harlem rivers, and the structures thereon, have been made at various places, as required, and the same have been plotted and placed on file,

and tracings therefrom have been prepared and reported. 11,482 disc soundings to ascertain the depth of water have been taken in 137 slips, and 2,217 rod soundings to ascertain the depth of soft mud have been taken in 25 slips by the surveying and sounding parties, of which 5,077 disc soundings in 65 slips and 588 rod soundings in 16 slips were on the East and Harlem rivers, and 6,405 disc soundings in 72 slips and 1,629 rod soundings in 9 slips were on the North river.

Of the above 2,853 disc soundings in 16 slips and 1,668 rod soundings in 12 slips were for construction, and 8,629 disc soundings in 125 slips and 549 rod soundings in 13 slips were for general repairs and examinations—soundings taken before and after dredging. Of the soundings above reported, 2,674 disc soundings in 26 slips were taken on the North, for the deleter slipes.
