GENTLEMEN—I have the honor to submit the following report of work done under my supervision for the quarter ending October 31, 1892.

NORTH RIVER.

SECTIONS SOUTH OF WEST FOURTEENTH STREET.

Battery Section—Resolution of the Board, July 3, 1884.

PIER "A," N. R.

The window awnings were removed and stored away and storm sashes are being cleaned and placed in position.

BETWEEN PIER "A" AND VESEY STREET.

The pavement on new made land between the above points is being cleaned and sprinkled between Fulton and Vesey streets, under resolution of the Board, May 12, 1892.

PIER, NEW 1, N. R.

A trench was excavated and wooden drain box built and placed in same to drain new made land at the above point.

West Washington Market Section—Resolution of the Board, July 9, 1891.

BULKHEAD-WALL PROPER.

DREDGING.

Mud was excavated and removed from north side of Pier, new 14, by Morris & Cumings Dredging Company.

STONE FILLING.

Rip-rap and cobble were discharged on wall foundation and between caps by J. A. Bouker, Brown & Fleming and P. H. Sheridan, under Treasurer's orders therefor.

PILING AND WOODWORK.

Piles were driven, regulated and staylathed; bracing piles were driven and regulated, piles were sawed off to grade, foundation piles were located, 7 binding frames were made and sunk to place, longitudinal and cross-caps were placed and fastened, deck planking was laid and fastened, 10 concrete blocks were set on wall foundation and chain-holes in concrete blocks were filled with concrete in bags, 164 pieces of granite were set on bulkhead-wall and same were backed up with 432 batches of concrete.

REMOVING OLD WORK.

The old crib and timber work is being torn up and removed from south end of section.

EARTH FILLING.

2,275 loads of earth filling were received and placed in rear of bulkhead-wall south side of Pier, new 14, making a total received to date of 20,530 loads on tickets and 657 loads without tickets.

PIER, NEW 14, N. R.

The above pier is being widened under resolution of the Board, April 28, 1892. In progress.

BUILDING SHED FOUNDATION.

523 foundation piles were driven, regulated and staylathed and caps on decking are being placed and fastened, under Secretary's Order No. 12018.

REMOVING ROCK.

The rock on south side of Pier, new 14, North river, is being removed by Mr. E. R. Lowe, under Treasurer's Order No. 16208. In progress.

CLEANING AND SPRINKLING PAVEMENT.

The pavement on new made land at various points on this section is being cleaned and sprinkled under resolution of the Board, May 12, 1892.

Chambers Street Section—Resolution of the Board, November 21, 1878.

BULKHEAD-WALL PROPER.

STONE FILLING.

Rip-rap was discharged on wall foundation by Brown & Fleming and P. H. Sheridan, under Treasurer's orders therefor.

MASONRY.

92 pieces of granite were set in wall foundation and same were backed up with 267 batches of concrete.

EARTH FILLING.

740 loads of earth filling were received without tickets and placed in rear of wall foundation, making a total received of 49,008 loads up to date.

Jay Street Section—Resolution of the Board, August 30, 1892.

BULKHEAD-WALL PROPER.

DREDGING.

Mud and crib were excavated and removed by the Morris & Cumings Dredging Company, under Treasurer's orders therefor.

STONE FILLING.

Rip-rap and cobble were discharged on wall foundation by Brown & Fleming and J. A. Bouker, under Treasurer's orders therefor.

PILING AND WOODWORK.

297 vertical piles were driven, regulated and staylathed; 24 bracing piles were driven and regulated; 67 piles were sawed off to grade; foundation piles were located; 2 binding frames were made, sunk to place and chocked; 22 transverse and 13 longitudinal caps were placed and fastened and deck planking was laid and fastened.

MASONRY.

4 concrete blocks were set on wall foundation; chain-holes were filled with concrete in bags and 29 pieces of granite were set and backed up with 65 batches of concrete.

EARTH FILLING.

905 loads of earth filling were received without tickets and placed in rear of wall.

CLEANING AND SPRINKLING PAVEMENT.

The pavement on new made land at various points on this section was cleaned and sprinkled, under resolution of the Board, May 12, 1892.

Franklin Street Section—Resolution of the Board, November 13, 1890.

EARTH FILLING.

1,644 cart-loads of earth filling were received without tickets from Brown & Fleming and same were placed in rear of bulkhead-wall, making a total received to date, 43,244 cart and 286 truck loads.

PIER, NEW 24, N. R.

The above pier has been extended under resolution of the Board, May 12, 1892.

SILT-BASINS.

The silt-basins on new made land between Franklin and Vestry streets were cleaned out from time to time, under resolution of the Board, November 13, 1890.

Canal Street Section, Resolution of the Board, December 10, 1891.

BULKHEAD-WALL PROPER.

STONE FILLING.

Cobble was discharged on wall foundation by Brown & Fleming, under Treasurer's orders therefor.

PILING AND WOODWORK.

80 vertical piles for standard blocks and 33 piles for special foundation blocks were driven, regulated and staylathed; 21 bracing piles were driven and regulated, 58 foundation piles were sawed off to grade, and 2 binding frames were placed, fastened and chocked.

BUILDING SEWER.

A new sewer is being built at the foot of Canal street.

CLEANING AND SPRINKLING PAVEMENT.

The pavement on new made land at various points on this section is being cleaned and sprinkled, under resolution of the Board, May 12, 1892.

SILT BASINS.

The silt basins on new made land, between Spring and West Tenth streets, have been cleaned out from time to time, under resolution of the Board, June 2, 1886.

CRIB-BULKHEAD BETWEEN WEST TENTH AND CHARLES STREETS.

Repairs are being made to the crib-bulkhead between West Tenth and Charles streets, under Contract No. 416. In progress.

PIER, NEW 40, N. R.

The above pier is being extended, under resolution of the Board of October 6, 1892. In progress.

SECTIONS NORTH OF WEST TWENTY-THIRD STREET.

West Twenty-third Street Section, South End—Resolution of the Board, November 5, 1880.

BULKHEAD-WALL PROPER.

DREDGING.

Mud was excavated and removed from bulkhead-wall area between West Twenty-third and West Twenty-fourth streets by the Morris & Cumings Dredging Company, under Secretary's Orders Nos. 12016 and 12245.

WEST THIRTIETH STREET.

Sewer barrel was built of creosoted timber under inner end of Pier, new 60, and connected with temporary sewer at West Thirtieth street. The sewer under outer end of pier was repaired, earth filling in rear of wall was replaced and inner end of pier was repaired.

PIER, NEW 60, N. R.

The inner end of Pier, new 60, North river, was resheathed, under Contract No. 418. Completed September 22, 1892.

PIER, NEW 61, N. R.

The inner end of the above pier was raised and blocked up.

PIER, NEW 63, N. R.

The inner end of the above pier was raised and blocked up.

EARTH FILLING, WEST TWENTY-SEVENTH AND WEST TWENTY-EIGHTH STREETS.

The northerly half of West Twenty-seventh street and the southerly half of West Twenty-eighth street are being filled in by William W. Rossiter, under permit of the Board.

EARTH FILLING, WEST TWENTY-EIGHTH AND WEST THIRTIETH STREETS.

Filling is being placed between West Twenty-eighth and West Thirtieth streets, east of Thirtieth avenue, and streets and avenues are being built by Robert Ray and John A. King, executors of Cornelius Ray.

EARTH FILLING, WEST THIRTY-SEVENTH AND WEST THIRTY-EIGHTH STREETS.

The work of building retaining structures to retain earth filling and the placing of earth filling in rear of bulkhead-wall between West Thirty-seventh and West Thirty-eighth streets, by the Pennsylvania Railroad Company, has been suspended.

DUMPING-BOARD AT WEST THIRTY-FIFTH STREET.

The dumping-board at the foot of West Thirty-fifth street was removed by Department labor, under Secretary's Order No. 12143.

West Forty-third Street Section—Resolution of the Board, September 3, 1891.

BULKHEAD-WALL PROPER.

STONE FILLING.

Cobble and rip-rap were discharged on wall foundation by J. A. Bouker and Brown & Fleming, under Treasurer's orders therefor.

PILING AND WOODWORK.

Bracing piles were sawed off to grade; 180 longitudinal and 24 cross caps were placed and fastened; 550 square feet of deck-planking were also placed and fastened.

MASONRY.

8 pieces of granite were set on wall foundation.

EARTH FILLING.

Piles were driven and crib built at north end of section to retain earth filling.

PIER AT WEST FORTY-FOURTH STREET.

The inner end of the above pier is being rebuilt.

CRIB-BULKHEAD BETWEEN WEST FORTY-SEVENTH AND FORTY-EIGHTH STREETS.

The work of building a crib-bulkhead between West Forty-seventh and West Forty-eighth streets by Bradish Johnson is in progress.

West Fifty-second Street Section, South End—Resolution of the Board, February 6, 1889.

BULKHEAD-WALL PROPER.

MASONRY.

Granite set in bulkhead-wall was pointed.

West Fifty-second Street Section, North End—Resolution of the Board, February 6, 1889.

BULKHEAD-WALL PROPER.

DREDGING.

Mud was excavated and removed from bulkhead-wall area by the Morris & Cumings Dredging Company under Treasurer's orders therefor.

MASONRY.

Mud was pumped from wall foundation; 472 batches of concrete in bags were placed on wall foundations; 71 batches of concrete were mixed and placed on top of concrete in bags; 10 concrete blocks, 11 base and 10 sub-base blocks were set on wall foundation; 126 pieces of granite were set on wall foundation and backed up with 188 batches of concrete.

STONE FILLING.

Rip-rap stone was discharged in rear of wall by Brown & Fleming under Treasurer's orders therefor.

PIER AT WEST FIFTY-FIFTH STREET.

The inner end of the above pier is being rebuilt.

West Fifty-seventh Street Section—Resolution of the Board, August 1, 1889.

STONE FILLING.

Rip-rap stone was discharged on wall foundation by Brown & Fleming under Treasurer's orders therefor.

MASONRY.

13 pieces of coping were set on top of wall and holes were drilled in coping for backing logs.

EARTH FILLING.

343 loads of earth filling were received from the Columbus Monument Association, under Secretary's Order No. 12104, and same were placed in rear of wall. Total received, 962 loads. 2,354 loads of earth filling were received under Secretary's Order No. 10590. Total, 36,661 loads. Total on section, 129,842 loads.

EAST RIVER.

East Twenty-fourth Street Section—Resolution of the Board, April 25, 1889.

BULKHEAD-WALL PROPER.

PILING AND WOODWORK.

472 square feet of 4-inch deck planking were placed on the caps in rear of masonry.

MASONRY.

23 pieces of granite were set and backed up with 68 batches of concrete, and the joints in granite were cleaned out and pointed.

REMOVING OLD WORK.

The old pier at the foot of East Twenty-fifth street was removed to make way for building a new pier and the bulkhead-wall. The old temporary approach leading to the Pier foot of East Twenty-fourth street was also removed.

EARTH FILLING.

1,398 loads of earth filling were received from Thomas Smith, and same were placed in rear of wall. Total received to date, 40,186 loads.

BUILDING FENCE.

A fence was put up on the new made land between East Twenty-fourth and East Twenty-fifth streets to enclose area for new Department Yard and same is being painted.

BUILDING OFFICE.

Foundation piles were driven on new made land between East Twenty-fourth and East Twenty-fifth streets and an office is being erected upon them.

CEMENT SHED.

Foundation piles on which the shed is to be erected are being driven.

PIER AT EAST TWENTY-FIFTH STREET.

Resolution of the Board, September 22, 1892.

DREDGING.

20,493 cubic yards of mud and 3,023 cubic yards of crib-work were excavated and removed by the Morris & Cumings Dredging Company from site of pier.

East Ninety-fourth Street Section—Resolution of the Board, April 25, 1889.

BULKHEAD-WALL PROPER.

STONE FILLING.

554 cubic yards of rip-rap stone were delivered and deposited on wall foundation by Brown & Fleming, under Treasurer's orders therefor; also rough stone and boulders removed from slip at north end of the East One Hundred and Twenty-fifth Street Section were transferred to and deposited in rear of the wall at this section.

MASONRY.

12 pieces of coping stone were set on the "E" course of the bulkhead-wall, and joints in the granite were cleaned and pointed and holes were drilled in the coping to receive ahlsstrom bolts for securing backing logs.

REMOVING OLD WORK.

Old facing timbers in the old bulkhead were removed to make way for the earth filling.

EARTH FILLING.

7,613 loads of earth filling were received from Thomas Smith and same were placed in rear of the wall under resolution of the Board, October 6, 1892. Total received to date, 8,933 loads.

TEST PILING.

Test piles were driven to ascertain the nature of the river bottom for the purpose of preparing plans and specifications for building a new pier.

East Ninety-sixth Street Section—Resolution of the Board October 31, 1889.

STONE FILLING.

758 cubic yards of cobble stone and 1,130 cubic yards of rip-rap stone were delivered and deposited on wall foundation by Brown & Fleming under Treasurer's orders therefor.

PILING AND WOODWORK.

98 vertical piles were driven, regulated and staylathed; 27 bracing piles were driven and regulated; 2 binding frames were made and sunk and keyed to place; 93 foundation and 60 platform piles were sawed off with the saw cutting machine; bracing piles were sawed off by hand; 20 lineal feet of longitudinal capping and 22 transverse caps were placed; foundation piles were located and 693 feet of 4-inch deck planking were placed on caps.

MASONRY.

5 standard and 1 special block were set on the wall; chain-holes between the blocks were filled with concrete in bags; 65 pieces of granite were set and backed up with 172 batches of concrete and joints in granite were cleaned out and pointed.

BETWEEN NINETY-NINTH AND ONE HUNDREDTH STREETS.

Borings were taken with the "Woodcock" borer to ascertain the nature of the river bottom between the above streets.

East One Hundred and Second Street Section—Resolution of the Board, July 17, 1890.

BULKHEAD-WALL PROPER.

DREDGING.

5,778 cubic yards of mud and 6,034 cubic yards of sand were excavated and removed from site of bulkhead-wall by the Atlantic Dredging Company, under Treasurer's orders therefor.

STONE FILLING.

958 cubic yards of cobble stone were deposited on wall foundation by Brown & Fleming and P. H. Sheridan, under Treasurer's orders therefor.

PILING AND WOODWORK.

424 vertical piles were driven, regulated and staylathed; foundation piles were sawed off, and 3 binding frames were made, sunk and keyed to place.

MASONRY.

13 special concrete blocks were set in the wall, and chain holes between the blocks were filled with concrete in bags; 60 pieces of granite were set and backed up with 84 batches of concrete in bags, and joints in the granite were cleaned out and pointed.

East One Hundred and Twenty-fifth Street Section—Resolution of the Board, March 28, 1889.

BULKHEAD-WALL PROPER.

MASONRY.

Joints in the granite were cleaned out and pointed, 76 lineal feet of backing log were placed and secured to the new bulkhead-wall with ahlsstrom bolts; also placed 1 galvanized iron cleat on backing log for mooring purposes.

GENERAL CHARGE.

Holes were drilled in bed rock on river bottom in slip at north end of section with drilling machine, operated with steam from 12-ton derrick, charged with explosives and blasted; mud, sand and gravel were pumped from, and loose stone and boulders removed from rock bottom with 12-ton derricks Nos. 1 and 2.

DEPARTMENT YARDS.

West Fifty-seventh Street Yard.

The blacksmith has done ironwork for the different sections of the work; for floating property and for general repairs.

Molds and cores were stripped and set up, and 22 concrete blocks, containing 836 cubic yards, and 19 special sub-blocks, containing 500.44 cubic yards, were made; 5,000 barrels of Portland cement were received under Treasurer's orders therefor, and were stored for Department use, after tests were made; sand, cement and broken stone were issued to the various sections of the work. The yard has been maintained in good order.

East Seventeenth Street Yard.

Ironwork was made and repaired by the blacksmith for work on construction on the East river, for the East Seventeenth Street Yard and for the Canal Street Section on the North river.

Concrete molds and cores were set up and taken down, as required, and 16½ standard, 8 1-6 special "B" blocks for the East One Hundred and Second Street Section, 1 special block for the East Ninety-sixth Street Section and 1 special block for the West Washington Market Section were made, containing about 880 cubic yards of concrete.

3,994 barrels of Portland cement were received under Treasurer's orders and stored for Department use, and samples sent to West Fifty-seventh Street Yard to be tested; 495 barrels issued from the West Fifty-seventh Street Yard; total, 4,489 barrels.

The yard has been maintained in good order and condition.

CANAL STREET SECTION EXTENDED.

Resolution of the Board, December 10, 1892.

Bulkhead-wall Proper.

MASONRY.

Molds and cores were made, set up and taken down, as required, and the following blocks were made, C 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9 and ½ of 10, containing 287 cubic yards of concrete. 10 pieces of granite were set in blocks C 6, 7, 8, 9 and 10.

SEWER.

Molds and cores were made, set up and taken down, as required, and the following blocks were made for the sewer, A' 1 to A 29, CC 1 to 3, E 1 to 4 and E' 1 and 2 (38 blocks), containing 174 cubic yards of concrete.

Rock-drilling machine with ways, 19 feet high.

The 100-ton derrick has handled foundation blocks for the various sections of the bulkhead-wall, as required. Various repairs have been made by the crew and the same has been kept in good order and condition.

12-ton Derrick No. 1—This derrick has been in commission during the quarter, and has been repaired and used on the various sections of the work.

12-ton Derrick No. 2—This derrick has been in commission during the quarter, and has been repaired and used on the various sections of the work.

12-ton Derrick No. 3—This new derrick was completed in August last, and has been in commission since August 25, 1892, and has been used on the various sections of the work.

The 10-ton Derrick—This derrick has been in commission during the quarter and used on the various sections of the work.

The tug-boats of the Department, "Manhattan" and "Pier," have been employed in the necessary towing of the Department.

The tug "Manhattan" was loaned to the Health Officer of the Port, during the emergency occasioned by the appearance of the cholera.

Naphtha-engine Launch—This launch was loaned to the Health Officer of the Port at Quarantine on August 31, 1892, and on October 25, 1892, the Department sent for and received said launch at Quarantine and brought it to West Fifty-seventh Street Yard, where it was put in good order and condition. It has been used since from time to time for examinations of the water-front, for carrying small parcels, tools, etc., to the different parts of the work.

Steam-launch "Inspector"—Various repairs have been made from time to time to the steam launch and she has been kept in use during the quarter.

Diver's scows "A," "G," "N," and "S"—Have been kept in good order.

The deck scows have been in almost constant use.

The small boats, skiffs, etc., have been kept in good order and condition.

Materials and Supplies.

Various materials and supplies for the use of floating property have been received and expended in part and the remainder has been stored for future use, as required.

Miscellaneous.

Various pieces of work have been done at West Fifty-seventh Street Yard for the use of floating property, and for other work, such as hanging fenders for scows, straight edges, ladders, signs, pike-poles, etc. The force of floating property has also been employed in filing saws, spinning oakum, pitch, pumping out scows and in the general care of floating property.

WORK OF CONSTRUCTION NOT UNDER NEW PLAN.

Pier at Third Street, E. R.

The work of removing the existing pier and portions of the crib-bulkhead at the foot of East Third street, East river, and for preparing for and building a new wooden pier, with appurtenances, including a wooden sewer, and for repairing the crib-bulkhead thereat, under Contract No. 415, was completed on October 31, 1892.

Pier at Thirty-third Street, E. R.

The work of building a new wooden pier, with appurtenances, including a sewer box, at the foot of East Thirty-third street, East river, and repairing the crib-bulkhead thereat, and dredging, under Contract No. 420, was completed on October 15, 1892.

Bulkhead One Hundred and Thirty-eighth to One Hundred and Fortieth Streets, H. R.

6,551 loads of filling were received under Secretary's Order No. 11226 and same were placed behind the bulkhead at the above place. In progress.

Surveying Party.

In connection with the construction of the bulkhead, or river wall, and the new piers at the different sections on the North, East and Harlem rivers, base lines and bench marks have been frequently verified, and from them grades, measurements, etc., have been furnished from time to time, as required.

Lines, grades, etc., have also been furnished for the work of repairs under contract.

Surveys of the water-front on the North, East and Harlem rivers, and the structures thereon, have been made at various places, as required, and the same have been plotted and placed on file, and tracings therefrom have been prepared and reported.

11,482 disc soundings to ascertain the depth of water have been taken in 137 slips, and 2,217 rod soundings to ascertain the depth of soft mud have been taken in 25 slips by the surveying and sounding parties, of which 5,077 disc soundings in 65 slips and 588 rod soundings in 16 slips were on the East and Harlem rivers, and 6,405 disc soundings in 72 slips and 1,629 rod soundings in 9 slips were on the North river.

Of the above 2,853 disc soundings in 16 slips and 1,668 rod soundings in 12 slips were for construction, and 8,629 disc soundings in 125 slips and 549 rod soundings in 13 slips were for general repairs and examinations—soundings taken before and after dredging.

Of the soundings above reported, 2,674 disc soundings in 26 slips were taken on the North, East and Harlem rivers.

Most of the soundings have been plotted and placed on file.

All of the dredging done by the Department of Docks during the quarter has been supervised. The dredging done by lessees, claimants and others, under permit or by order from the Board of Docks has been supervised.

Measurements of all materials dredged by the Department of Docks has been made.

Reports, estimates, etc., of work done have been prepared and receipts given.

Work other than dredging by lessees, claimants and others by order or permit from the Board of Docks has been supervised.

The automatic tide gauges on the Harlem river, Port Morris, Pier "A" and West Fifty-seventh Street Yard have been attended to.
