### MESSAGES FROM HIS HONOR THE MAYOR.

The President laid before the Board the following message from his Honor the Mayor:

City of New York—Office of the Mayor, }  
December 12, 1904. }

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

Gentlemen—I have the honor to return, without my approval, an ordinance passed by your Honorable Body December 6, 1904, entitled:

AN ORDINANCE to authorize payment of wages to per diem employees of The City of New York for all public or designated holidays.

The reason of my failure to approve this is that I am advised that it constitutes, in substance, the giving away of the City's money without compensation. The essence of a contract for per diem employment is that the employee should be paid for such time only as he actually works.

In view of this fact it is manifestly improper that he should receive compensation for any other time.

1. That on public or specially designated holidays, the per diem employees of The City of New York shall, equally with salaried officers and employees, receive their full daily compensation.

2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

### COMMUNICATIONS FROM CITY, COUNTY AND BOROUGH OFFICERS.

The President laid before the Board the following communication from the Police Commissioner:

To the Honorable Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen—The Police Commissioner this day directed the following:

Whereas, The appropriation made to the Police Department for the year 1904, for account "Police Fund—Salaries of Police Commissioner, Deputy Police Commissioners, Inspectors, Surgeons, Captains, Sergeants, Detective Sergeants, Roundsmen, Patrolmen, Doormen, Matrons, Telegraph Bureau and Steam Boiler Squad Employees, etc.," together with transfers to such account and additions thereto from the sale of Revenue Bonds, amounted to the sum of eleven million forty-eight thousand five hundred and sixty-four dollars and fifty-five cents; and

Whereas, Such amount is insufficient to pay the salaries of members of the police force now actually employed, as appears from the pay-roll of December 1, 1904, amounting to eleven million seventy-two thousand four hundred and thirty dollars and nine cents (including therein the amount of fourteen thousand two hundred and seventy-five dollars and fifty-seven cents paid to members of the police force who have been restored to duty by the Courts, and whose salaries were not included in the departmental estimate for the year 1904), leaving an estimated deficit of twenty-three thousand eight hundred and sixty-five dollars and fifty-four cents;

Ordered, That the Board of Aldermen be and are hereby respectfully requested to authorize the Comptroller to issue Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of twenty-three thousand eight hundred and sixty-five dollars and fifty-four cents to provide for the deficiency in salaries of members of the police force for the year 1904.

Ordered, That a statement of such accounts be respectfully submitted to the Board of Aldermen in connection with these proceedings, and also to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Ordered, That whenever the Board of Aldermen have authorized the issue of Revenue Bonds in the amount of twenty-three thousand eight hundred and sixty-five dollars and fifty-four cents for the payment of such deficit by the Police Commissioner as salaries to members of the police force, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and are hereby respectfully requested to authorize the Comptroller to issue Revenue Bonds for such purpose.

Hon. J. W. STEVENSON, Deputy Comptroller and Secretary of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, No. 280 Broadway, City:

My Dear Mr. Stevenson—I have this moment learned over the telephone that at the last meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment the matter of the

creation of the position of Secretary to the First Deputy Commissioner of this Department was referred back to me in order that I might place before the Board of Estimate and Apportionment the facts which in my opinion render the creation of such an office desirable.

Some time ago this matter was heard before the Municipal Civil Service Commission and I explained to them at some length why the position should be created, and they were of the opinion that it should be, and believing that it would be created by your Board and its creation concurred in by the Board of Aldermen, they acted in the matter classifying the position for Civil Service purposes as in the exempt class.

The reasons which I gave and which seem to have influenced the Municipal Civil Service Commission are as follows: The First Deputy Commissioner is and has been since the creation of the Department the general executive officer, having under his immediate supervision the work of the Department in the Borough of Manhattan. A proper discharge of this work required that he shall visit the different bureaus in the Department and keep under his personal observation the work of the very large number of employees at present employed in the Manhattan office of the Department. The clerical work and work appertaining to correspondence is work which is personally done by the First Deputy Commissioner and requires that he spend the greater part of his time in his own room dictating letters to a Stenographer. The performance of such work deprives him of a proper opportunity to watch and keep under his personal supervision the general work of the Department. The only way to relieve the First Deputy Commissioner from the work incident to such correspondence is by giving him an opportunity to select and appoint, subject to the approval of the Commissioner, a trusted and competent person to act as his Secretary, and who as such can take charge of such correspondence and aid the First Deputy Commissioner in the discharge of this branch of his work. I would therefore recommend that the position of Secretary to the First Deputy Commissioner be created and placed in the exempt class as above suggested.

I would most respectfully urge that, although the next meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment is not to be held to consider financial matters, but merely public improvements, that this matter be taken up and passed on for the reason that action by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and by the Board of Aldermen is requisite as a condition precedent to action by the State Civil Service Commission, and that Commission will, as I am informed, meet on December 17 next. It is very desirable that this matter should be acted upon at the next meeting of the State Civil Service Board.

Gentlemen—The President of the Borough is now making extensive improvements upon Atlantic avenue, in this borough, and, in order that the work may be properly done, he is advised by his engineers that the curb-line should be established 40 feet on each side of the centre of the avenue, between Flatbush avenue and the line of the boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, so as to provide an 80-foot roadway from curb to curb, less that portion of the street occupied by the railroad tracks in the centre. As the property owners along the line of this street are much interested in the improvement, he requests therefore that the attached resolution be adopted without delay.

Sir—In order to obviate the necessity of the fire-boat berthed at pier at foot of Ninety-ninth street, East river, proceeding to a distance for coaling purposes, thereby leaving unprotected the district assigned to be covered by it, I have the honor to request that your Honorable Board, pursuant to the authority conferred by section 419 of the Greater New York Charter, authorize the purchase of coal for said boat to an amount not exceeding four thousand dollars (\$4,000) in the open market, instead of by contract at public letting, thus permitting coaling the vessel at a point or points convenient to its present station.

I inclose draft of resolution designed to accomplish the object in view, the adoption of which would be in the public interest, and early and favorable action thereon will be appreciated.

The Board of Aldermen, Hon. CHARLES V. FURNES, President, City Hall, New York City:

Gentlemen—The Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals have the honor to submit herewith a resolution prepared by the Corporation Counsel, providing for the purchase, without public letting, of four Ducker portable buildings to relieve the overcrowding at Bellevue Hospital. The Ducker building is a patented article, and the inclosed resolution has been drawn up to cover this point. If the Trustees are permitted to make this contract without public letting, the Ducker Company will have the buildings ready for use by January 1. If bids were advertised for in the regular way, the buildings could not be completed until the end of March. The Trustees therefore beg to ask that the Board of Aldermen concur in the resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment December 9, appropriating \$15,000 for the purchase of the buildings, and that the Board authorize the Trustees to make the contract therefor without public letting.

Whereas, A resolution has been duly passed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment permitting the purchase of four Ducker portable buildings for use by the Board of Trustees of the Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, in accordance with the specifications hereto annexed; and

Whereas, It is deemed advisable because of the approach of the cold weather and the necessity for acquiring additional accommodations for the use of possible patients in the near future; therefore be it

Resolved, That, pursuant to the power given to this Board by section 419 of the Greater New York Charter, the said Trustees are hereby authorized and empowered to purchase without contract let after public advertisement the Ducker portable buildings, four in number, at an expense not to exceed fifteen thousand dollars.

Specifications for Four Ducker Portable Buildings.

Material—The entire building, with the exception of the cover to the roof sections, to be made of thoroughly seasoned and carefully selected yellow pine. The roof sections are to be covered with galvanized metal, laid on sheet asbestos. Between the clap-

boards and the inner lining of the building heavy builders' felt must be used, which is also to be used between the double floors. Seven-eighths-inch siding to be used for the outside of the building, and lining to consist of 1/2-inch narrow, tongued, grooved and beaded yellow pine.

Construction—The entire building to be made up in strong sectional frames of 2 foot 9-inch, joints absolutely air and water tight, everything to be fitted and finished before leaving the factory, and to be erected on posts to be furnished by contractor, building to be erected without the use of nail or screw so as to be easily taken down, moved and re-erected if necessary.

Size of Building—20 feet by 100 feet by 9 feet 6 inches by 15 feet to ridge, and to be made to accommodate thirty (30) patients each. There is also to be in each building toilet-room, bathroom and closet. This building must furnish thirty-two thousand (32,000) cubic feet of air space, or about one thousand and sixty-six (1,066) cubic feet to each patient.

Sanitary Equipment—Each building is to have bath, lavatory, water-closet and urinal.

The President laid before the Board the following communication from the President, Borough of Brooklyn, transmitting ordinance:

No. 1244.

The City of New York,  
Office of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn,  
Brooklyn, December 12, 1904.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

Dear Sirs—The Coney Island and Brooklyn Railroad Company occupy with surface railroad tracks a portion of Coney Island avenue in this borough. The tracks are now approximately three feet from the westerly curb line of the thoroughfare. The Board of Estimate and Apportionment approved some time ago a Local Board resolution authorizing the regulating, grading, curbing and laying of sidewalks on Coney Island avenue, from a point near the Park plaza to Kings highway, and there is now before that Board another resolution providing for the paving of the avenue. These improvements are much needed and earnestly desired by property-owners and residents along the line of the avenue. They will, however, be of little effect if the railroad tracks are allowed to remain in their present position. A contract for the regulating, grading, curbing and laying of sidewalks has been awarded, but the President of the Borough desires, before contracting for the paving of the avenue, to have the tracks removed to the centre of the roadway. He wrote to the Coney Island and Brooklyn Railroad Company, under date of June 30, 1904, directing that company to remove forthwith all these surface railroad tracks, ties and other materials used by them in the operation of their railroad, from the westerly side of Coney Island avenue to the centre of that avenue. The railroad company has refused to comply, and their refusal was made the subject of a communication addressed to the Corporation Counsel, who advised the President of the Borough that under section 50 of the Revised Charter it is within the power of your Honorable Board to direct, by ordinance, the removal of the surface railroad tracks of the Coney Island and Brooklyn Railroad Company from the westerly side of the avenue to the centre thereof.

The President of the Borough directs me, therefore, to submit to your Honorable Board and request immediate passage of the attached ordinance.

Whereas, It is desirable for the purpose of the improvement of Coney Island avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn, between the Park plaza and Kings highway, that the tracks of the Coney Island and Brooklyn Railroad Company and the railroad ties and other appurtenances now occupying a position on the westerly side of said avenue, some three feet, more or less, from the curb line of said avenue, be removed to a position in the centre of said avenue; it is hereby

Ordained, under section 50 of the Revised Charter of the Greater New York, That the Coney Island and Brooklyn Railroad Company be and hereby is directed to remove forthwith from the westerly side of Coney Island avenue, between the Park plaza and Kings highway, to the centre of the roadway of said avenue, all surface railroad tracks, ties and other materials used in the operation of its railroad along said avenue; and the President of the Borough of Brooklyn is hereby authorized in the event of the refusal of the said railroad company to comply with the terms of this ordinance, to treat said railroad tracks, ties and other materials as obstructions and incumbrances of the public highway, and to take the steps prescribed by law for the removal of such obstructions and incumbrances.

Be it Ordained, by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. Section 189 of the Revised Ordinances of The City of New York of 1897 is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Section 189. Awnings of tin or other light metal, or canvas, may be erected across the sidewalk of any of the streets of The City of New York, except Broadway, Fifth avenue, Madison avenue, the Bowery and those portions of Lexington avenue which are distant 200 feet from any intersecting cross street upon which a surface car is operated, provided any and every awning shall not be higher than the floor of the second story of the building, the first floor being the ground floor, but in no case to be covered with wood; and every such awning that may be built on Lexington avenue shall be constructed of steel with glass roof, and every awning or watershed of any kind covering one-half or more than one-half, or less than the full width of the sidewalk, shall have connected therewith a gutter and leader of material and size sufficient for conducting the water from the same to the outer line of the curbstone, under a penalty of five dollars for each day such awning or watershed shall remain without such appurtenances.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 440 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
