DEPARTMENT OF PARKS.

BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

Quarterly Report for the Three Months Ending March 31, 1905.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor of The City of New York:

SIR—The following is a report of the work accomplished and finances of the Department of Parks, Borough of The Bronx, for the first quarter ending March 31, 1905:

Bronx Park.

The work on the construction of the bridge over the Bronx river at the crossing of the Bronx and Pelham parkway is practically completed, only the work of cleaning up remaining, and final estimate will be rendered in the course of a week or two.

Contract for addition to the green house in this park was let to Louis Wechsler, and work will be commenced under the contract on April 3.

On the entrance to the Botanical Garden from Mosholu parkway the abutment work is completed, all the fill has been placed, and asphalt roadways and walks have been laid.

Under the terms of the contract for erecting the five-arch stone bridge in the Botanical Garden, just north of the Blue Bridge, work was discontinued between December 15 and April 1; therefore no work has been done since my last report was submitted. The work will now be resumed, and the bridge will probably be completed not later than August of this year.

The contract for the one-arch stone bridge in the Botanical Garden, just north of the Museum Building has been let to Joseph Gallo; work has been started, and nearly all the excavating has been completed. Both abutments and the wing walls on both sides of the approaches are practically finished. The turning of the arch will probably be commenced in the course of two or three weeks.

On the bird house, in the Zoological Park, the carpenter work is completed, the plastering is finished, and the work is progressing satisfactorily.

On the pheasants' aviary, in the Zoological Park, the walls are completed, the wooden frame-work above is finished, and the pipes for the plumbing are laid. The aviary will be ready for the cages during the month of April.

In the green house the work of cultivating and propagating flowers and plants for the various flower-beds in the different parks and squares was carried on. Hot-beds were made, and soil and fertilizer carted for the cultivation of pansies, daisies and other early-flowering plants.

Dead trees were removed.

Horses were cared for in the stables.

In the workshops tools were sharpened and repaired for use in all the parks, and signs, carriages, wagons and sprinkling carts were painted and repaired.

Pelham Bay Park.

The wooden bridge extending from the mainland to Hunter Island has been completed, and has been in use for the past four weeks. The only work remaining to be done is the removal of the old causeway, and this has been started.

Many dead trees were removed from this park.

Washouts were repaired.

About 200 yards of fill was removed and used for grading on the Shore road.

About 600 feet of old stone wall was torn down and broken by the stone crusher for use on the roads.

Mosholu Parkway.

The work of improving this parkway, which is being done under R. C. Hunt, contractor, is only about half completed to date. Owing to the severe weather which has prevailed all winter, progress on the work has been very slow.

On the bridges over the railroad tracks and Webster avenue, the asphalt pavement is being laid. All the fill has been placed. The work will be completed by May 1 of this year.

Macomb's Dam Park.

The filling of the low lands is nearly completed, and we now propose to lay out some athletic fields there, including a quarter-mile running track.

It was decided not to let at public letting the contract for strengthening the dyke in this park, as arrangements have been made with the Astor estate and with the tenant of the property at the junction of Cromwell's creek and One Hundred and Sixty-first street, by which the creek will be filled and the railroad drawbridge eliminated, and no repairs for the dyke will be required. Hence, the bids received for strengthening the dyke were rejected.

Van Cortlandt Park.

The steam heating plant in the Tremper house, in this park, has been completed, and final estimate rendered.

The golf house, which is used by the skaters during the winter season, was cared for and properly heated.

The lake was kept in fine condition for skating, the snow being removed after every snowstorm, and the ice planed when necessary. There were fifty-two days of skating on this lake during the winter.

Work on the new golf links has progressed rapidly. All tree stumps and old stone walls have been removed, trees and briars cut down, and the ground prepared for use this spring.

Crotona Park.

The lake and new skating park were kept clear of snow and in good condition for skating. There were fifty days of skating in this park.

General Work.

In all parks and squares and on the parkways the usual general work was carried on; roads, paths and gutters were cleared of snow after each storm; culverts and basins were kept free, and when necessary, sand or ashes was strewn on the walks and roads. Comfort stations were cared for.

In the early spring washouts were repaired and fertilizer removed from the lawns.

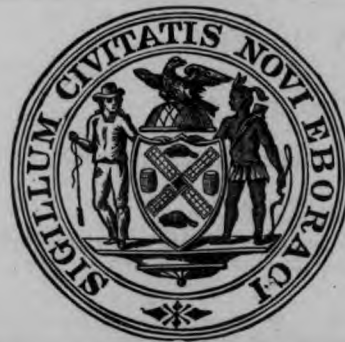

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done.
