Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested within therein, and, if no other reason can be interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud; and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, as well as may become interested directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the motto thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a surety or surety company duly authorized by law to act as such, and shall contain the matter

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms provided and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contracts, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application thereto at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
