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## MAYOR'S COMMITTEE ON LIBERTY LOAN.

### SUBSCRIPTIONS BY CITY AND COUNTY OFFICIALS AND EMPLOYEES.

#### STANDING OF THE CITY AND COUNTY DEPARTMENTS.

The figures below are based upon subscriptions received up to 2 o'clock P. M. yesterday at the Comptroller's office, Room 851, Municipal Building, having been in the first instance turned in to the heads of the respective departments and by them transmitted to the Comptroller, as the Chairman of the Mayor's Committee. The Comptroller files a summary statement daily with the Commissioner of Accounts, as Chairman of the Executive Committee of the Mayor's Committee, and the latter calculates the departmental percentages upon the basis of one \$50 bond to the total payroll of each department, as provided in the 1917 budget, thereby fixing the base percentage for each department. In the interest of fairness the smaller boards, commissions, etc., have been grouped together for scoring purposes. Similarly certain county offices of each county have likewise been combined.

## ART COMMISSION.

### Minutes of Meeting of Art Commission Held in Its Offices, Third Floor, City Hall, on Monday, May 14, 1917, at 4 P. M.

Present—Vice-President Healy, presiding; Commissioners Crittenden, MacNeil, Wheeler, Stokes, Sherrill, Bacon, N. L. Britton, Director in Chief of the New York Botanical Garden, in respect to the designs for the shelter for the New York Botanical Garden, and Hon. Cabot Ward, Commissioner of Parks, Manhattan and Richmond, in respect to the designs for the music pavilion for Central Park and the Butterfield Monument.

On communications from Commissioners de Forest and Guerin, explaining their absence, they were excused.

Minutes of meeting of April 17 were presented and approved.

The President's report was presented, stating that the following Committees had been appointed since the last meeting, April 17:

The following resolutions were adopted in accordance with the recommendations of the respective Committees:

*Submission 2231. Music Pavilion, Central Park. Certificate 2142.*

Resolved, That the Art Commission hereby disapproves the designs for a music pavilion for the proposed location on the Mall in Central Park, represented by Exhibits "668-N," "668-O," "668-P," "668-Q," and "668-R," of record in this matter.

*Submission 2238. Lutheran Chapel, Blackwell's Island. Certificate 2143.*

Resolved, That the Art Commission hereby disapproves the designs for the Lutheran Chapel in the City Home District, Blackwell's Island, represented by Exhibits "241-AK," "241-AL," "241-AM," "241-AN," and "241-AO," of record in this matter.

*Submission 2241. Eastern S. S. Sheds, Piers 18 and 19. Certificate 2144.*

Resolved, That the Art Commission hereby approves the designs for the extensions to the sheds for Eastern Steamship Line at Piers 18 and 19, North River, represented by Exhibits "936-D" and "936-E" of record in this matter.

*Submission 2242. Mallory S. S. Sheds, Piers 37 and 38. Certificate 2145.*

Resolved, That the Art Commission hereby approves the designs and locations of Lincoln Highway markers for W. 42nd st., Manhattan, represented by Exhibits "939-A," "939-B" and "939-C" of record in this matter.

*Submission 2240. New York Botanical Garden Shelter.*

The Committee recommended that the designs be approved with the suggestion that the balustrades be made more open and the pedestals narrower.

The report of the Committee was adopted and the following resolution passed:

Resolved, That the Art Commission hereby approves the designs and location of a shelter for the School Garden in the New York Botanical Garden, represented by Exhibits "938-A," "938-B," "938-C" and "938-D" of record in this matter.

*Submission 2246. Cumberland Street Hospital, Brooklyn.*

The Committee recommended that the designs be approved with the understanding that a minor cornice be placed at the attic story around the entire building, as indicated by the pencil marks on the designs.

The report of the Committee was adopted and the following resolution passed:

Resolved, That the Art Commission hereby approves the designs and location of the Cumberland Street Hospital on Auburn pl., between North Portland ave. and North Elliott pl., Brooklyn, represented by Exhibits "940-A," "940-B," "940-C," "941-D," "940-E," "940-F," "940-G," "940-H," "940-I" and "940-J," of record in this matter.

*Submission 2247. Prints, Public School 3, Manhattan.*

The Committee reported that the Chairman of the Committee and the Assistant Secretary had visited the Ullman Manufacturing Company and inspected the prints, and the Committee recommended that fourteen of these prints be approved and that one, representing "Barbara Frietchie," be disapproved.

The Chairman presented a communication from John Colt, Secretary of the Citizens' Union of the City of New York, referring to the Tilden Statue. The letter was ordered placed on file.







The extensions must be made and footed up, as the bids will be read from the total and awards, if made, made to the lowest bidder on each item or class, as stated in the schedules.

## NOTICE TO BIDDERS AT SALES OF OLD BUILDINGS, ETC.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of the City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 will be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances, between the time of the sale thereof and the time of delivering possession to the purchaser, after being properly vacated of all tenants. The sale and delivery to purchaser will be made as nearly together as the circumstances of vacating the structures of their tenants will permit.

All the material of the buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations, and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area, shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw all abandoned water taps and old service mains, and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street and the openings of the main sewer in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture

of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances or portions as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidders assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the date of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials or labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers. Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furlings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beam holes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the Contractor.
