OPINIONS OF THE COUNSEL TO THE COR-PORATION.

Where any of the wharves, piers, bulkheads, slips, docks and basins constructed under the provisions of chapte 574, of the laws of 1871, are open to public use, the Dock Department may appropriate either of them to the sole use of special kinds of commerce, and may lease such property for a term not exceeding ten years.

The proper mode of exercising the power conferred by that act stated.

GENTLEMEN :- Your letter of the 28th ultimo states that you have under consideration a petition from the Hoboken Land Improvement Company for the building of new piers 43 and 44 North River and the extending of the intermediate bulkhead westerly to the new bulkhead line, and for the lease of the said bulkhead and the slip for ferry purposes similar to those enjoyed by the company at the existing bulkhead foot of Christopher street. You ask to be advised whether you have the power to appropriate the premises in question for the special commercial interests petitioned for, and to make a lease thereof at public auction

You also submit to me the resolution of your Department providing for a lease for the term of ten years (with renewal of five years) of piers Nos. 44 and 45 North River, with adjacent bulkhead, to the Oceanic Steam Navigation Company, in respect to which similar questions arise.

The counsel of the last named company has submitted to me a form of preamble and resolutions in reference to the lease proposed to be made to that company, which I have considered in connection with the questions presented by

Subdivision 6 of the sixth section, of chapter 574, of the Laws of 1871, provides in express terms that when any of the wharves, piers, bulk-heads, slips, docks and basins, constructed under the provisions of that act shall be opened to public use, the Board of the Department of Docks shall regulate the charges for wharfage, etc.; also that the Board may appropriate any of such wharves, piers, bulkheads, etc., to the sole use of special kinds of commerce, and may, in the name and for the benefit of the Corporation of the City, lease any or all of such property for a term not exceeding ten years; also, that leases other than for districts appropriated by the Board to special commercial interests shall be made at public auction.

Under these provisions there is no doubt that the Commissioners are clothed with power to contract with proper parties to lease the piers to be constructed under the act.

In order properly to conform to the directions of subdivision 6, it is advisable that in every case where the piers, etc. are appropriated to the sole use of special kinds of commerce, such appropriation should be made by resolution of the Department, and I approve of the form herewith transmitted as appropriate for any case in which your Board sees fit to make such special appropriation. The recitals contained in the accompanying form relate to the case of the Oceanic Steam Navigation Company, but may be made applicable to any

NOTE .- The following is the form of the preamble and resolutions referred to in the foregoing opinion.

Whereas, This Board, with the consent and approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, are now constructing new piers, Numbers 44 and 45, North river, with adjacent bulkheads, under the provisions of law authorizing such construc-

And whereas, the Oceanic Steam Navigation Company have applied for a lease of said piers 44 and 45, with bulkhead between, together with one-half of the bulkheads between piers 45 and 46, adjoining pier 45, when the same shall be opened to the public use :

And whereas, in the judgment of this Board, it is for the public interest that said piers and bulkheads be appropriated to the sole use of the special kind of commerce in which said Oceanic Steam Navigation Company is engaged, to wit: the business of regular steam packets, plying between this port and foreign ports, and the despatch of Board. vessels from this port to foreign ports, by corporations or firms maintaining regular lines of communication between this port and foreign ports; and said piers and adjacent bulkheads are hereby appropriated by this Board, and shall be a district for the special commercial interest hereinbefore described.

Therefore, be it resolved, that this Board will, when said piers and bulkheads above named shall be opened to the public use, lease the same for the term of ten years to the said Oceanic Steam Navigation Company at the yearrent of forty-five thousand (\$45,000) dollars, payable on the usual days at a proportionate rent, when either of the said piers shall be ready for occupancy. The said company to have the option, at the expiration of said term of ten years, of an extension of said lease at an additional rent of \$500, and the further considerations hereinafter named.

Said company agreeing to erect on said piers, under the supervision of this Department and in conformity with the fire laws of this city, and in accordance with plans to be filed in this Department, suitable sheds for the protection of freight; and in case said company shall, after the expiration of the term of ten years, determine to lease the premises above referred to for the further term, then and in that case all the sheds, buildings and other improvements erected by said company shall revert to the city for its use, free of all charge, at the expiration of said extended term. The said extended term shall be five years from the expiration of the first term.

This Department to dredge the slips adjacent to said pier so as to give a depth of twenty-five (25) feet below water; and said company when in possession of said premises and until the expiration of their lease to do all necessary dredging at their own cost and expense and keep in order the surface planking, string pieces and mooring piles

The said company also to have the privilege ot erecting and maintaining on any part of the demised premises, or the slips adjacent thereto, any structure necessary for their business, which may lawfully be erected and maintained;

The Honorable the Commissioners of the Police Department :

GEGTLEMEN:-In a communication received from the Department of Police on the 22d instant, my opinion is asked as to the proper construction of a law authorizing that body to inspect steam boilers in this city.

The act referred to (Chapter 68, Laws of 1862,) provides as follows:

Section 1.- Every owner of a steam boiler or boilers in use in the Metropolitan Police District, shall annually, and at such convenient times, and in such manner and form as may by rules and regulations to be made therefor by the Metropolitan Police Board be provided, report to the said Metropolitan Police Board at its headquarters the location of such steam boiler or boilers, and thereupon, and as soon thereafter as practicable, the Metropolitan Sanitary Company or such member or members thereof as may be competent for the duty herein prescribed, and may be detailed for such duty by the Metropolitan Police

The authority given in this act to the Metropolitan Police Force, has by subsequent legislation been fully vested in the present Police

This law was, in my judgment, enacted to enable the Police Department to inspect boilers connected with steam engines wherever used in manufactories or other buildings in the city, and did not contemplate the inspection of steam boilers connected with heating apparatus either in public edifices or in private dwelling houses. It is well known that at the present time agreat many private residences in the city are heated with steam, and that in every such case a boiler is a necessity.

Should any other construction be given to the law, it would involve the inspection of the steam heating apparatus in every building public and private. I am of the opinion that the framers of this act had no such object in view, and that all inspections should be confined to cases where boilers are used to generate steam for other than heating purposes.

Where land in the City of New York lies too low to be drained by the ordinary sewers, the Commissioner of Public Works is authorized by law to direct the conprocure the proper drainage; and reasonable charges for earth fillings along such drains, although not expressly mentioned in the act of the Legislature on this subject, may be included in the cost.

SIR:-A communication from you states that requisitions have been drawn upon the Finance Department by the Department of Public Works for underground drains in Ninety-sixth and One Hundred and Eleventh streets, between Tenth and Eleventh avenues, and in Seventy-fourth and Ninety-second streets, between Eighth Ninety-second streets, and Tenth avenues, under authority of chapter 566 of the Laws of 1871. inform me that in these requisitions a large amount of earth filling is mentioned, none of which appears to you to be allowable under the act; and you remark that the law seems merely to provide for a blind drain to be carried along duly certified by the Secretary, be communicated the natural water course to the sewer until the

You request me to inform you whether the acceptance shall be and constitute an agreement act, and whether any amount paid therefor can be legally computed in the assessment for the

The act in substance provides that whenever it shall appear to be necessary for the protection constructing said piers, including bulkhead, is be effected by the Department of Public Works. upon which surface water remains stagnant, or through which water courses run, may, under quiry relative to the same.

the act, be so drained by a properly constructed blind drain carried along such natural water course until it can be made to enter any sewer at its proper level; or when such sewer cannot be reached, it can be carried to the adjacent river.

In constructing the underground drains mentioned in the requisitions to which you refer, I am informed by the engineer in charge of sewers in the Department of Public Works, that large quantities of earth filling have been necessarily resorted to. While it is true that the statute does not in express terms authorize what is called earth filling, yet the power given to the Department of Public Works to construct the drains in question must be legally held to carry with it authority to take such steps as to make them useful for the purposes of their construction. The Engineer, who has been before me, explains that unless large amounts of earth filling had been used on both sides of the drain, no effective drainage of the lands in question could have been accomplished.

The intention of the act was to provide for the drainage of lands lying too low to be properly drained by the sewers. Often this cannot be done without such earth filling as has been performed by the contractors for this work. These charges are, therefore, in my opinion, manifestly authorized by the law.

The third section of the act provides that all lands directly or indirectly benefited by such drains between the adjacent streets and avenues, shall be liable to assessment pro rata in proportion to the direct or indirect benefit derived from the construction of the drain; and that assessments shall be made and collected as other assessments for public benefits are provided for, and the assessments are to become a lien upon the property benefited.

It follows that assessments may be made for the several works mentioned in your letter, not only for the drains themselves, but also for the earth fillings included in the accounts. (See Laws of 1871, Volume II., page 1203.)

SIR:—William J. Sharkey, a prisoner who is convicted of murder, escaped from City Prison this afternoon at about fifteen minutes after one o'clock. A woman named Sarah Allen called this afternoon at about fifteen minutes after one o'clock. A woman named Sarah Allen called to see Sharkey. She received a ticket from the keeper in warden's office when she passed into the prison (which ticket she should have been instructed by the keeper to safely keep and return to him when she would leave the prison). Sharkey was in cell 40 on second tier of male prison. His iron door was locked. At this time Keeper Phillips was in charge of the second tier, and all visitors to male prison had to pass through the gate of which he had the key, and which is always to be kept locked. Keeper Finnin was

which he has charge. Keeper Falconer was in charge at the warden's office gate giving tickets to visitors to the prison.

All the above named keepers (Phillips, Finnin, and Falconer) have instructions to inform each visitor to be careful of their tickets, and to give them to no person, except the keeper in Wardens office from whom they were received.

At two o'clock this afternoon the woman named Sarah Allen presented herself at the gate in the Wardens office, to be passed out and stated that she had lost her ticket. I was sitting in my office and Mr. Finley went into the prison to inquire if any prisoner had escaped, and he was informed by keeper Phillips that his tier was all right, that he had his cells examined and all his prisoners were safe.

were safe.

But Mr. Finley ordering the cells to be examined again, keeper Dwyer discovered that Sharkey was missing, when the woman Allen reported in the office that her ticket was lost, and as Mr. Finley was passing, keeper Falconer to go into the prison, keeper Falconer told him that a person who was dressed in womans clothes had passed out on a ticket some time before, that the person walked like a man, and that he had sent Keeper Finnin after the person to investigate. The police officer who was stationed in front of the office observed the person passing out of the warden's office, and stated that he called the attention of keepers in the front office to the fact, but that they said it was none of their business, that the keepers inside of the prison were responsible.

sible.

The above mentioned keepers, Phillips, Finnin, and Falconer, were well acquainted with the features of said Sharkey. He had to pass through the gate of which they had charge. They should have examined his ticket and his features. They should have known that no such visitor passed into the prison, and they should have detected him immediately when he was escaping from them. They can have no excuse for permitting him to escape. When Keeper Finnin's attention was called to the person passing out of the office by Keeper Falconer, it was his duty to instantly arrest the person. Keeper Falconer, of course, could have caught him himself. He could either have prevented him passing through the gate, or, when he discovered the suspicious movements, he could have caught him instantly, as there was a police officer in front of the door; and by his own statement Keeper Finnin was present to assist him. Or, if he even gave the alarm, both myself and Mr. Finley were inside of the railing in another part of the office, and we would have caught him before he could escape. Keeper Phillips had charge of the second tier, from which Sharkey escaped. He must have permitted Sarah Allen to pass out of the prison without showing her ticket, or else he had information from her that her ticket was lost, and he neglected to give, an alarm instantly to the office (the bell being at his hand for the pursible. The above mentioned keepers, Phillips, Fin the prison without showing her ticket, or else he had information from her that her ticket was lost, and he neglected to give, an alarm instantly to the office (the bell being at his hand for the purpose of giving an alarm.) And if he had no knowledge of her ticket being lost, why did he inform Mr. Finley, who had ordered him to examine his cells, that he had his cells examined, and his prisoners were all right, when it was at that instant the first information was received in the office of the loss of the ticket. I have Sarah Allen in custody on the charge of aiding Sharkey to escape, and I would respectfully request that the above mentioned keepers be instantly removed by the Honorable Board, and that the matter be placed before the District Attorney to investigate, to see if some of the keepers could not be held for aiding the prisoner to escape.

To the Secretary of the Board of Health: SIR:—In the week that ended on Saturday, the 22d inst., 519 deaths were reported in this city, against 525 reported and 535 that actually occurred in the previous week. There were fewer deaths from pneumonia, marasmus and old age last week than in the preceding week. There were only 15 deaths charged to diarrhoeal diseases last week, a number much below the average of the corresponding week in previous years. But the mortality by acute pulmonary diseases, membraneous croup and diphtheria is now in excess and most fatal in crowded tenements.

There were 79 deaths in public institutions during the week, 217 in tenement houses and 223 in other classes of dwellings.

The mean temperature in the week was 33-9 degrees Fahr., the range of temperature was 27-5 degrees, and the lowest point marked was 20-5 degrees on Thursday morning. SIR :- In the week that ended on Saturday, the

Brussels, 22; in Berlin, 26; and Vienna 23 per 1,000 yearly. The rates of mortality in American cities vary more widely than these in Europe during the month of October. From 16 per 1,000 in Philadelphia, 15 per 1,000 in Rochester Cleveland, to 100 and upwards per 1,000 in Memphis, 17 per 1,000 in St. Louis and 26 per 1,000 in San Francisco the variations of the deathrate correspond with local and domiciliary sanitary conditions. After December we shall be able to compare these records every month.
