BOARD OF ALDERMEN.

THURSDAY, November 19, 1874,

The Board met in their chamber, No. 15 City Hall.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

MOTIONS AND RESOLUTIONS.

By Alderman Gilon—

Whereas, The "Military Code" of the State of New York makes it imperative upon the commanding officer of a regiment, battalion, or separate troop, or battery, to appoint a suitable person to take charge of the armories, or places of deposit for the arms, uniforms, and other property of the State, who shall receive a compensation not to exceed two (2) dollars per day, which shall be a county charge upon the county in which said armory is situated, and shall be levied, collected, and paid in the same manner as other county charges are levied, collected, and paid; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Provisional Estimate for conducting the business of the City and County of New York for the year 1875, be and is hereby rectified by inserting under the heading "Miscellaneous Purposes" the following item: "For payment of compensation to armorers appointed by the commanding officers of regiments, battalions, or separate troops, or batteries which are situated in the City and County of New York," \$15,000.

Which was referred to the Committee of the Whole.

Alderman McCafferty moved that the Committee on Salaries and Offices be discharged from the further consideration of a resolution from the Board of Assistant Aldermen to appoint Jacob Shipsey a Commissioner of Deeds in place of William B. Avery.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said motion.

Which was decided in the affirmative.

He then moved the adoption of the resolution.

Alderman Morris moved that the Committee on Public Works be discharged from the further consideration of a resolution from the Board of Assistant Aldermen, as follows:

SPECIAL ORDER.

The Board here, pursuant to permission granted yesterday, and on motion of Alderman Cooper, resolved itself into Committee of the Whole, for the further consideration of the special order of business, being the Provisional Estimate for con-

ducting the public business of the City and County of New York for the year 1875.

Alderman Billings was called to the chair. After some time spent therein, the Committee arose, and the President resumed the chair.

Alderman Billings, Chairman of the Committee of the Whole, reported as follows:

The Committee of the Whole have had under consideration the Provisional Estimate for the year 1875, for conducting the public business of the City and County of New York, have made thereto the following amendments, which I am instructed to report to the Board for adoption, viz.:

AT THE MEETING OF NOVEMBER 18, 1874.

Mayoralty—

Increased to \$59,500, as follows:

Contingencies..... \$10,000 00
Salaries..... 32,000 00
Salaries—Bureau of Permits..... 15,000 00
Contingencies—Bureau of Permits, 2,500 00

Miscellaneous Purposes—Armories and Drill-rooms. Board of Estimate and Apportionment requested to ascertain the amount needed to pay rent for, and to appropriate the same.

Support of Prisoners—County Jail... \$8,000 00
Sheriff's Fees, etc.—Board of Estimate and Apportionment requested to ascertain the amount necessary, and to appropriate the same.

Law Department—

Contingencies—Law Department, reduced from \$100,000 to..... \$50,000 00

Bureau of Corporation Attorney—

Increase salaries of clerks and assistants, from \$6,000 to..... 7,500 00

Department of Public Works—Salaries, Department of Public Works, increase appropriation from \$140,000.00 to..... \$150,000 00

When the Committee arose, reported progress, and was permitted to sit again.

Supplies, increased from \$80,000 to..... 90,000

Chief of Department, pay-roll increased from \$30,000 to..... 35,200

Board of Education—Salaries of teachers, increased \$186,500—in all..... 2,686,500

Miscellaneous Purposes—Clerks, Commissioners of Accounts, increased from \$6,000 to..... 10,000

Asylums, Reformatories, etc.—Asylum for Idiots increased from \$220 to \$270.

Strike out appropriation of \$3,000 for contesting street openings.

Salaries clerks and officers of Board of Aldermen, increased from \$15,000 to \$25,000.

Alderman Monheimer moved the adoption of the report made by the Chairman of the Committee of the Whole.

Alderman Van Schaick moved to postpone the consideration of the report until the next meeting of the Board.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said motion.

Which was decided in the negative by the following vote:

Affirmative—Aldermen Falconer, Koch, McCafferty, Ottendorfer, and Van Schaick—5.

Negative—Aldermen Billings, Cooper, Flanagan, Gilon, Kehr, Lysaght, Monheimer, Morris, and Reilly—9.

The President then put the question whether the Board would agree with the motion of Alderman Monheimer.

Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote:

Affirmative—Aldermen Billings, Cooper, Falconer, Flanagan, Gilon, Kehr, Lysaght, Monheimer, Morris, and Reilly—10.

Negative—Aldermen Koch, McCafferty, Ottendorfer, and Van Schaick—4.

MOTIONS AND RESOLUTIONS RESUMED.

Alderman Cooper moved that when the Board adjourn it do so to meet again on Thursday, the 3d proximo, at 3 P. M.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said motion.

Which was decided in the affirmative.

By unanimous consent, Alderman Van Schaick offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Commissioner of Public Works be and he is hereby directed to remove the office of Commissioners of Accounts from the basement of the brown stone building to the basement of the City Hall; and further

Resolved, That the Commissioner of Public Works be and he is hereby directed to fit up in a suitable manner the easterly portion of the basement of the brown stone building, and to excavate an area-way and new windows, for the exclusive occupancy of the Grand Jury, so as to give to the Grand Jury apartments equal area to the apartments lately occupied by them on the upper floor.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the negative by the following vote:

Affirmative—The President, Aldermen Billings, Cooper, Falconer, Koch, Morris, and Van Schaick—7.

Negative—Aldermen Flanagan, Gilon, Kehr, Lysaght, Monheimer, Ottendorfer, and Reilly—7.

Alderman Reilly moved that the Board do now adjourn.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said motion.

Which was decided in the affirmative.

LAW DEPARTMENT.

OPINION OF THE COUNSEL TO THE CORPORATION.

Where a certificate of election was given to one person, who entered upon and performed the duties of a Civil Justice in the City of New York, and the rival candidate obtained a judgment at a Special Term of the Supreme Court that he was the actual person elected to the office; held, after an affirmance at a General Term, that the latter was entitled to receive the salary awarded by law to the office from the date of the judgment at the Special Term.

Hon. ANDREW H. GREEN, Comptroller:

SIR—In your letter of the 10th instant, you enclose a certified copy order of affirmance in the case of the People, *ex rel.* John A. Stemmler vs. Joseph McGuire, being a suit for the determination of the right to the office of Civil Justice. It appears that the certificate of election was awarded to McGuire, who entered upon the duties of the office, and became *ex officio* Judge. The Court, however, determined that Stemmler was the person actually elected. An appeal from this judgment was taken to the General Term of the Supreme Court, where the judgment was affirmed, and the right of the plaintiff, John A. Stemmler, to the office was adjudged. You state that Mr. Stemmler applies for payment of his salary as Justice of the Seventh Judicial District Court, and you request my opinion as to the claim.

There is no doubt that Mr. Stemmler is entitled to receive salary as Justice of the Court in question, from the 24th of November, 1873, when he obtained his original judgment at the Special Term of the Supreme Court. From that date he has been such Justice, and so continues at the present time.
