First—When any member of the force is charged with contracting a debt under false or fraudu-lent pretences, it shall be the duty of the Chief Clerk to take the affidavit of the complainant setting forth such false pretences; such affidavit shall be sent to the Superintendent, who shall thereupon prefer charges against the officer so complained of, for a breach of discipline; any conviction for such breach of discipline shall be punished by dismissal from the Police force. Second—Repeated complaints against any member of the Police force for incurring debts, and evidence of continued and persistent neglect or refusal to pay just debts, shall be deemed conduct unbecoming an officer, and will be cause of dismissal of such member from the Police force.
