

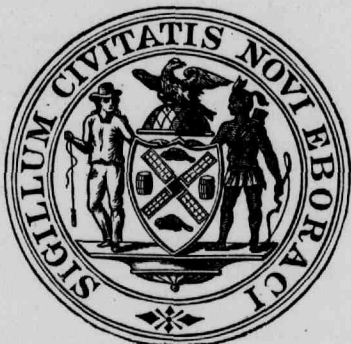

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS.

Abstract of the Proceedings of the Department of Public Parks for the week ending Saturday, October 12, 1878.

MEETING HELD OCTOBER 9, 1878.

Present—Commissioners Wenman (President), Wetmore, Conover, and Lane.

The following resolutions were adopted:

Resolved, That the Secretary be and hereby is directed to publish advertisements for proposals for building a bridge over Harlem river, from the junction of One Hundred and Thirty-ninth street, with the bulkhead on the west side of the river, to the junction of One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, with the bulkhead on the east side of the river; the centre line of said bridge to be on the line extending from the junction of the centre lines of One Hundred and Thirty-ninth street and Madison avenue, on the west side, to the junction of the centre line of One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, with the bulkhead line on the east side.

The bridge to have two fixed spans of 107 feet 6 inches each, and a draw of 200 feet in length. Width of roadway to be 22 feet between the guards, and the sidewalks to be 5 feet in the clear each. The bridge to be built of iron, of the quality and kind best suited for the purpose, and to be proportioned to carry, in addition to its own weight, 80 pounds per square foot of moving load, with a factor of safety, referred to ultimate strength of five.

The draw to be worked by a double cylinder engine of fifteen horse power, with link motion, and with locomotive boiler of same power, and the construction to be such that it will be capable of being opened to its fullest extent in one minute, without jar or injury to the machinery or bridge. The piers and abutments to be constructed in accordance with plans to be approved by the Department.

The height of the top floor of the draw to be 15 feet above mean high tide, and the floor of the fixed spans to slope from the above height at the draw, to 11 feet above mean high tide at the abutments.

The amount of security required to be \$20,000.

The time required for the completion of the work to be eight calendar months, to commence from the date of the contract, under a penalty of \$20 for each day in excess of the period above named.

Parties making proposals to furnish their specifications and plans and to bid a gross sum for the whole work.

Resolved, That James F. Wenman, the President of, and who is also one of the members of the Board of Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks, be and he is hereby designated and directed to certify and file, as provided by law, the three similar maps or plans entitled "Plan and Profiles showing Boston road, from Third avenue to Westchester avenue and Westchester avenue (in West Farms), from Boston road to the Bronx river, in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards of the City of New York, as laid out, established, and classified by the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks, in pursuance of the provisions of Chapter 604 of the Laws of 1874, and Chapter 436 of the Laws of 1876," dated "New York, October 8th, 1878," and signed, "Julius Munckwitz, Superintending Architect, Department of Public Parks," and "E. B. Van Winkle, Topographical Engineer, Department of Public Parks."

Resolved, That all the special patrolmen on the police force be discharged from and after Saturday, the 12th October, 1878.

Resolved, That patrolman Michael C. Meaney, be detailed to act as sergeant until further order, without any increase of pay.

APPLICATIONS FOR EXEMPTIONS WILL BE heard here, from 9 to 4 daily, from all persons hitherto liable or recently serving who have become exempt, and all needed information will be given.

Those who have not answered as to their liability, or proved permanent exemption, will receive a "jury enrollment notice," requiring them to appear before me this year. Whether liable or not, such notices must be answered (in person, if possible, and at this office only) under severe penalties. If exempt, the party must bring proof of exemption; if liable, he must also answer in person, giving full and correct name, residence, etc., etc. No attention paid to letters.

Persons "enrolled" as liable must serve when called or pay their fines. No mere excuse will be allowed or interference permitted. The fines, received from those who, for business or other reasons, are unable to serve at the time selected, pay the expenses of this office, and if unpaid will be entered as judgments upon the property of the delinquents.

All good citizens will aid the course of justice, and secure reliable and respectable juries, and equalize their duty by serving promptly when summoned, allowing their clerks or subordinates to serve, reporting to me any attempt at bribery or evasion, and suggesting names for enrollment. Persons between sixty and seventy years of age, summer absentees, persons temporarily ill, and United States and District Court jurors are not exempt.

Every man must attend to his own notice. It is a misdemeanor to give any jury paper to another to answer. It is also punishable by fine or imprisonment to give or receive any present or bribe, directly or indirectly, in relation to a jury service, or to withhold any paper or make any false statement, and every case will be fully prosecuted.
