PROCLAMATION.

\$1,000 REWARD.

MAYOR'S OFFICE,
NEW YORK, September 6, 1875.

Whereas, JAMES H. NOE was brutally assaulted at his place of business, at No 275 Greenwich street, in this city, on the 22d day of August, 1875, by one or more persons attempting a burglarious entry of his premises, and died from the effect of the wounds then received, on the 26th day of August, 1875; now,

I, WILLIAM H. WICKHAM, Mayor of the City of New York, do hereby offer a reward of one thousand dollars for the discovery and conviction of the party or parties who may have committed the deed, the said reward to be paid on the conviction of the said party or parties, and the certificate of the District Attorney that such conviction was had upon the testimony of the person or persons claiming the reward. But all claims not presented to the Mayor within twenty days after such conviction shall be disregarded.

York, as provided by existing laws, and shall be set apart and constitute a distinct fund to be known as the fund for gratuitous vaccination, and shall be subject to the requisition of this Board, for the purposes of said act; and

Whereas, The sum of \$825.83 has been so accounted for and paid to the City Chamberlain;

Resolved, That requisition be and is hereby made upon the Comptroller and City Chamberlain, for the sum of \$825.83, being the entire amount of said fund for payment of salaries of the Vaccinating Corps, for services performed during the month of August, 1875, and that the President and Secretary be authorized to sign the same in behalf of this Board.

That the Sanitary Superintendent be authorized to grant permits to drive milch cows to pasture in special cases, upon report and recommendation of Sanitary Inspectors whenever the circumstances in each case in his opinion justify such action.

That the Sanitary Superintendent be directed to cause an investigation to be made, as to each case of typhoid fever that occurs, and report the result to this Board.

That a copy of the affidavit of C. Godfrey Gunther, in respect to the throwing of offal in the Lower Bay, and of the statement of Swift & White, in relation thereto, be forwarded to the Board of Health of Brooklyn for the necessary action.

That Order No. 2,706 on premises northwest corner Park avenue and Fortieth street, be modified as recommended by Sanitary Superintendent in his report upon application for the modification of said order.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed by the Sanitary Bureau during the week ending August 28, 1875: The number of inspections made by the Inspectors was 1,995, as follows: 2 public buildings, 1,066 tenement houses, 113 private dwellings, 65 other dwellings, 14 manufactories and workshops, 22 stores and warehouses, 95 stables, 2 markets, 22 slaughter-houses, 2 fat-rendering establishments, 1 public ground, 2 uninhabitable dwellings, 1 rag house, 3 public sewers, 2 roadways, 62 sunken and vacant lots, 81 yards, courts, and areas, 78 cellars and basements, 80 waste-pipes and

drains, 159 privies and water-closets, 36 street-gutters and sidewalks, 37 dangerous stairways, 1 cistern and cesspool, 3 dangerous chimneys, 22 other nuisances, together with 22 visits of the Inspectors to cases of contagious diseases.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 765.

During the past week 100 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Inspectors for investigation and report.

79 permits were issued to consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

138 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 27 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have fumigated and disinfected 26 houses, together with clothing, bedding, etc. They have also disinfected 2,464 privies and water-closets, 364 yards, courts and areas and 142 cellars and basements.

14 cases of small-pox were removed to the Hospital, and 3 dead bodies to the Morgue, by the Ambulance Corps.

The following number of cases of contagious diseases were reported during the week ending August 28, 1875: Typhus fever, 1; typhoid fever, 23; scarlet fever, 16; measles, 7; diphtheria, 39; small-pox, 26; and cerebro-spinal meningitis, 5.

4 tanks and 3,592 cans of night-soil were removed from the privy-vaults of the city, by the night scavengers, during the week ending August 28, 1875.

The following amount of meat and fish was condemned by the officers as unfit for human food during the week ending August 28, 1875: Cattle, 1 carcass; beef, 173 pounds; veal, 30 pounds; poultry, 135 pounds; and fish, 375 pounds.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

During the week ending August 28, 1875, there were issued from this Bureau 592 burial permits for city deaths, 37 for bodies in transit, and 41 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 592 deaths, 111 marriages, 460 births, 41 still-births, 37 applications for transit permits, and 53 returns from Coroners. There were 23 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths, and 5 transcripts of birth record, 2 of marriage and 18 of death were issued from this Bureau. 2 cases of deaths were referred to Coroners.

Ordered, That the said certificate be filed among the records of the Board of Health of the Health Department of the City of New York, and that duplicates thereof, duly signed by the said Sanitary Superintendent and City Sanitary Inspector, be forwarded to the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York, for their designation of the Department to do the work required under and pursuant to the provisions of section 1 of chapter 549 of the Laws of 1875; and it is further

Ordered, And directed pursuant to the provisions of the acts hereinbefore recited, that the following-named parts and parcels of land within the corporate limits of the city and county of New York shall be drained by other means than by sewers, by and under the direction of the Department of said city and county hereafter authorized and empowered to do such work by the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City and County of New York, pursuant to section 1 chapter 549, of the Laws of 1875, said parts and parcels of land being situate as follows, viz.: lands lying between Morris street, Fordham avenue, Fitch street and Madison avenue.

Whereas, The Sanitary Superintendent and City Sanitary Inspector has certified under and pursuant to the provisions of chapter 566 of the Laws of 1871, and chapter 549 of the Laws of 1875, amendatory thereof, that it is necessary for the protection of the public health that the parts and parcels of land lying within the corporate limits of the City and County of New York, hereinafter described, need to be drained by other means than by sewers; it is hereby

Ordered, That the said certificate be filed among the records of the Board of Health of the Health Department of the City of New York, and that the duplicates thereof, duly signed by said Sanitary Superintendent and City Sanitary Inspector, be forwarded to the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York for their designation of the department to do the work required under and pursuant to the provisions of section 1 of chapter 549 of the Laws of 1875; and it is further

Ordered and directed, pursuant to the provisions of the acts hereinbefore recited, that the following named parts and parcels of land within the corporate limits of the City and County of New York shall be drained by other means than by sewers, by and under the direction of the department of said city and county hereafter authorized and empowered to do such work by the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York, pursuant to section 1, chapter 549 of the Laws of 1875, said parts and parcels of land being situated as follows: lying between Quay road, Central avenue, Morris street, and Fordham avenue.

That the President and the Chairman of the Sanitary Committee be authorized to contract with John D. Crimmins to fill One Hundred and Sixth street, between Madison and Fourth avenues, in a manner that will be satisfactory to this Board, and to agree to pay for said work the sum of \$2,750, said work to be completed on or before the 1st day of October, 1875.

That copies of the reports of the Sanitary Committee and Inspector Lockwood, upon the sanitary condition of Ludlow Street Jail, be forwarded to the Department of Public Works for the necessary action.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed by the Sanitary Bureau during the week ending September 4, 1875. The number of inspections made by the Inspectors was 1,818, as follows: 2 public buildings, 867 tenement houses, 196 private dwellings, 80 other dwellings, 10 manufactories and workshops, 16 stores and warehouses, 89 stables, 32 slaughter-houses, 2 rag houses, 5 fat rendering establishments, 2 swamps, 1 public sewer, 1 manure dump, 48 sunken and vacant lots, 76 yards, courts and areas, 77 cellars and basements, 48 waste-pipes and drains, 149 privies and water-closets, 66 street gutters and sidewalks, 14 dangerous stairways, 7 cisterns and cesspools, 3 dangerous chimneys, 15 other nuisances, 1 violation of the Sanitary Code, and 11 visits of the Inspectors to cases of contagious diseases.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 722.

During the past week 107 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Inspectors for investigation and report.

42 permits were issued to consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of this Port; 115 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 45 dwellings where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 30 houses, together with clothing, bedding, etc. They have also disinfected 2,877 privy vaults, 626 yards, and 338 cellars. 7 persons, sick with small-pox, were removed to the hospital, and 1 dead body to the morgue, by the Ambulance Corps. The following number of cases of contagious diseases were reported during the week ending September 4, 1875: Typhus fever, 1; typhoid fever, 17; scarlet fever, 12; measles, 3; diphtheria, 72; small-pox, 13; and cerebro-spinal meningitis, —.

5 tanks and 3,306 cans of night soil were removed by the night scavengers from the privy vaults of the city during the week ending September 4, 1875.

The following amount of meat and fish was condemned by the officers as unfit for human food during the week ending September 4, 1875: Cattle, 1 carcass; calves (bob), 1 carcass; calves (case), 2 carcasses; sheep, 3 carcasses; lambs, 1 carcass; beef, 72 pounds; veal, 14 pounds; poultry, 207 pounds; and fish, 3,000 pounds.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

During the week ending September 4, 1875, there were issued from this Bureau, 674 burial permits for city deaths, 39 for bodies in transit, and 29 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 674 deaths, 120 marriages, 424 births, 29 still-births, 39 applications for transit permits, and 56 returns from coroners. There were 32 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths, and 7 transcripts of birth record, 2 of marriage, and 25 of death, were issued from this Bureau; 3 cases of deaths were referred to the coroners.

CORPORATION SALE OF FERRY FRANCHISES.

SEALED BIDS WILL BE RECEIVED AND publicly opened at the Comptroller's office, on Thursday, September 23, 1875, at 2 o'clock P. M., for Leases of Franchise or right to maintain and operate several ferries around the City of New York for the terms and on the conditions hereafter set forth.

The leases will be made to conform to the requirements of the laws relative to ferries, and subject to such regulations, ordinances, or by-laws, as now are or hereafter may be made or passed by the Common Council or State Legislature, and the leases will also provide that the lessees shall take and assume at their own costs and charges all or any responsibilities and liabilities of the Corporation of the City of New York to the present lessees of ferries in relation to boats, fixtures, etc., belonging to such lessees at the respective ferries.

The minimum rate for which the ferry franchise or license to operate ferries shall be used or enjoyed, has been appraised and set by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at two and one-half per centum of the gross receipts for ferrage that shall hereafter accrue at each separate ferry, to be paid quarterly to the Corporation, and a covenant will be contained in each lease requiring the lessees to make and deliver to the Comptroller of the City of New York, quarterly, a statement in writing verified by oath or affirmation of the lessee or of such proper officer of the lessee as may be designated by the Comptroller of the actual total gross receipts for ferrage received by such lessee during the preceding three months, and also that the lessees shall keep regular books of account showing the daily gross receipts of the ferry leased, and allow said Comptroller or any person designated by him to examine such books.

The Department of Docks of the City of New York has fixed and established the rent for which it will lease the property in wharves, piers, slips, and lands under water belonging to the Corporation, at the several ferries to be leased to the parties or persons to whom the lease of the ferry franchise shall be awarded by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, for the term specified for the lease of the franchise, at the rates set forth hereafter, and no deviation will be made from the same, and covenants will be contained in such leases for construction, maintenance and surrender of all necessary fixtures and appurtenances to the wharf and pier property belonging to the city used by such respective ferries.

Proposals for the lease or license to use the ferry franchise at the respective ferries, to state the maximum percentage on gross receipts which the person or parties offering to take each ferry will pay in addition to the rent fixed by the Department of Docks for the use of the pier or wharf property belonging to the city, but no lease will be given at less than the minimum rate of 2½ per cent. on the gross receipts.

Security satisfactory to the Comptroller will be required for the punctual performance by the lessees of the covenants of the lease of the franchise in their behalf.

The several ferries at which the franchise only is to be leased are as follows:

1st. The ferry from the foot of Tenth street, East river, to Greenpoint, Long Island, for the term of five years from October 1, 1875.

2d. The ferry from the foot of Barclay street, North river, to Hoboken, in the State of New Jersey, for the term of two years from October 1, 1875.

The several ferries at which the franchise is to be leased, with use of pier and wharf property belonging to the City of New York, are as follows:

3d. The ferry from the foot of Grand street, East river, to Grand street, Brooklyn, E. D., including such wharf property as shall have been heretofore used by the ferry run from these points, for the term of ten years from October 1, 1875, subject to payment of \$2,000 per annum for the first five years and \$3,000 per annum during the second five years, rent payable quarterly to the Department of Docks.

4th. The ferry from the north side of Twenty-third street, East river, as now occupied, to Greenpoint, Long Island, for the term of five years from October 1, 1875, subject to \$2,000 per annum rent, payable as last mentioned.

5th. The ferry from the foot of Desbrosses street, North river, to Jersey City, New Jersey, for the term of one year from October 1, 1875, subject to \$3,000 per annum rent, payable as last mentioned.

6th. The ferry from the foot of Chambers street, North river, to Pavonia, New Jersey, for the term of one year from May 1, 1875, subject to \$15,000 per year rent, payable as last mentioned.
