Since the date of the last quarterly report, measures have been taken to abolish the Second, Third, and Twenty-eighth Precincts, by which the territory and force of those precincts were disposed of as follows:

The Second Precinct was divided between the First and Fourth Precincts.  
The Third Precinct was divided between the Fifth and Twenty-seventh Precincts; and the Twenty-eighth Precinct was divided between the Eighth and Ninth Precincts. A small section of the area of the Eighth Precinct, bounded by Bleeker and Houston, Broadway and Hancock streets, was transferred to the Fifteenth Precinct. This arrangement will not reduce the number of posts, nor of members of the force on duty as patrolmen, nor in any degree interfere with the efficiency of the service, while its results in point of economy will prove to be of no small value. Be these measures there will be an annual saving in salaries of—

Whereas, This Board has declared the district known as the Harlem Flats to be in a condition dangerous to the public health, and has ordered the same to be properly drained and filled, and orders to such effect have been duly entered by this Board; and

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment has transferred the sum of \$21,067.43 from the unexpended balances of this Department for the years 1872 and 1873 for this purpose; and

Whereas, This Board has employed suitable agents to execute the said orders and perform the necessary work under its direction; and

Whereas, Questions have arisen as to the legality of this action, by which the execution of the work is seriously retarded; therefore

Resolved, That the Corporation Counsel be and hereby is respectfully requested to inform this Board at his earliest convenience—

First. Whether the Board of Estimate and Apportionment did legally transfer the necessary funds.

Second. Whether the Board of Health is empowered to execute its own orders in such behalf under the several acts conferring power upon said Board, and especially under section 7 of chapter 636 of the Laws of 1874.

Third. Whether in so doing, the Board of Health is authorized to do the work in such manner as it may deem the best adapted to abate all nuisance and protect the public health.

That the Attorney and Counsel be directed to commence an action against the following-named person for a violation of the Sanitary Code:

J. Youngs, at 411 Canal street.

Whereas, This Department has expended its balances for 1872, 1873, and 1874, in the care of small-pox patients and in disinfection; and

Whereas, The prevalence of small-pox makes it necessary to continue the Extra Corps for gratuitous vaccination for another month; therefore

Resolved, That the Board of Police be respectfully requested to consent to the transfer from the unexpended balance of the Police Department for 1874, the sum of \$2,000 to the Health Fund of 1875, to enable the Health Department to continue gratuitous vaccination for one month.

That a permit be granted to drive five cows to pasture from One Hundred and Forty-second street, westerly one block, and thence to One Hundred and Forty-third street, three times each day, provided they are driven in a drove by two responsible persons, and not allowed to graze.



That copies of the reports of Sanitary Inspectors, on the dangerous condition of certain buildings, be forwarded to the Department of Buildings, for the necessary action, as follows: No. 1036 Third avenue; No. 1030 Third avenue, and 129 West Thirtieth street.

That the Sanitary Superintendent be directed to discontinue the disinfection of street gutters, and to discharge as many laborers and carts as possible.

That Dr. August Assenheimer be dropped from the roll of Temporary Vaccinators.

That leave of absence of three weeks be granted to Dr. A. B. De Luna, on account of sickness.

#### Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed by the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending July 31, 1875: The number of inspections made by the Inspectors was 1,943, as follows: 1 public building, 1,069 tenement houses, 114 private dwellings, 89 other dwellings, 13 manufactories and workshops, 11 stores and warehouses, 70 stables, 50 slaughter-houses, 4 public sewers and drains, 1 dangerous building, 9 other nuisances, 16 sunken and vacant lots, 70 yards, courts, and areas, 50 cellars and basements, 44 waste-pipes and drains, 150 privies and water-closets, 110 street gutters and sidewalks, 11 dangerous stairways, 1 cistern and cesspool, 3 dangerous and smokey chimneys, together with 56 visits of the Inspectors to cases of contagious diseases.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 702.

During the past week 158 complaints have been received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

64 permits were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

153 permits were granted to scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 75 dwellings where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 64 houses, together with clothing, bedding, etc. They have also disinfected 1,040 privy-sinks, 152 cellars and basements, 314 yards, courts and areas, and 175 miles of street gutters.

48 persons sick with small-pox were removed to the Hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

The following number of cases of contagious disease were reported during the past week: Typhoid fever, 11; scarlet fever, 16; measles, 18; diphtheria, 50; and small-pox, 70.

5 tanks and 3,667 cans of night-soil were removed by the scavengers from the privy-vaults of the city during the week ending July 31, 1875.

The following amount of meat and fish was condemned by the officers as unfit for human food during the week ending July 31, 1875: Cattle, 1 carcass; lambs, 4 carcasses; beef, 140 pounds; poultry, 150 pounds; and 3,360 pounds of fish.

#### Bureau of Vital Statistics.

During the week ending July 31, 1875, there were issued from this Bureau 815 burial permits for city deaths, 41 for bodies in transitu, and 50 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 815 deaths, 112 marriages, 403 births, 50 still-births, 41 applications for transit permits, and 62 returns from Coroners. There were 31 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths, and 2 transcripts of birth-record, 7 of marriage, and 29 of death were issued from this Bureau. 4 cases of death were referred to the Coroners.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH of the Health Department, of the City of New York, held at its office, on the 16th day of July, 1875, the following resolutions were adopted:

Resolved, That section 29 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended to read as follows: Sec. 29. That no meat, fish, birds or fowl, fruit or vegetables, nor any milk, not being then healthy, fresh, sound, wholesome, and safe for human food, nor any meat or fish that died by disease or accident, shall be brought within said city, or offered or held for sale in any public or private market, as such food, anywhere in said city.

Resolved, That section 34 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended to read as follows: Sec. 34. That no decayed or unwholesome fruit or vegetables shall knowingly be brought into said city to be consumed or offered for sale for human food, nor shall any such articles be kept or stored therein.

Resolved, That section 37 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended as follows: Sec. 37. That no meat, fish, fruit, vegetables, or milk, or unwholesome liquid, shall knowingly be bought, sold, held, offered for sale, labeled, or any representation made in respect thereof, under a false name or quality, or as being what the same is not, as respects wholesomeness, soundness, or safety for food or drink.

Resolved, That section 38 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended to read as follows: Sec. 38. That every person, being the owner, lessee, or occupant of any room, stall, or place where any meat, fish, fruit, or vegetables, designed or held for human food, shall be stored or kept, or shall be held or offered for sale, shall put and keep such room, stall, and place, and its appurtenances, in a cleanly and wholesome condition; and every person having charge, or interest, or engaged, whether as principal or agent, in the care, or in respect to the custody or sale of any meat, fish, fruit, birds, fowl, or vegetables, designed for human food, shall put and preserve the same in a cleanly and wholesome condition, and shall not allow the same, or any part thereof, to be poisoned, infected, or rendered unsafe or unwholesome for human food.

Resolved, That section 40 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended to read as follows: Sec. 40. That it shall be the duty of every person knowing of any fish, meat, fowl, birds, fruit, or vegetables being bought, sold, or offered, or held for sale as food for human beings, or being in any market, public or private, in said city, and not being sound, healthy, or wholesome for such food, to forthwith report such facts, and the particulars relating thereto, to this Department, or to one of its officers or inspectors.

Resolved, That section 42 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended to read as follows: Sec. 42. That upon any cattle, meat, birds, fowl, fish, fruit, or vegetables being found by any inspector, or other officer of this Department, in a condition which is, in his opinion, unwholesome and unfit for use as human food, or in a condition of a weight or quality in this code condemned or forbidden, he shall cause the same to be examined by two reputable persons, reasonably competent to judge in respect thereto, whom he may conveniently find; and if both said persons agree with him in opinion in respect thereto, he shall take no action, and give no order, relative to the same, till he has been instructed by the Sanitary Superintendent; and if one or both of said persons agree with him in respect to said articles, then such inspector or officer may forbid the same being offered or exposed for sale, or being sold, for human food, till the owner or party in charge or other proper person has obtained the consent of the Sanitary Superintendent, or of this Board, to their being so offered, used, or sold. And if both such persons agree with him in opinion, he may order the same to be removed; and thereupon, or if this Board shall have approved the judgment of said inspector, it shall be the duty of the owner and party in charge to speedily remove such article from any market, street, or public place, and not to sell or dispose, or offer to sell or dispose thereof for the purpose of human food. And in default of such removal, and also in case of disobedience to such order, and also in all cases where, in his opinion, such articles, by reason of their being in a decayed or offensive condition, would, if allowed longer to remain, be dangerous to health, the same (as this Board may provide) may be caused to be removed by any inspector, police officer, or officer of this Department, to some suitable place, at the expense of the party who should have removed the same, and the owner and party in interest must take notice thereof.

APPLICATIONS FOR EXEMPTIONS WILL BE heard here, from 9 to 4 daily, from all persons hitherto liable or recently serving who have become exempt, and all needed information will be given.

Those who have not answered as to their liability, or proved permanent exemption, will receive a "jury enrollment notice," requiring them to appear before me this year. Whether liable or not, such notices must be answered (in person, if possible, and at this office only) under severe penalties. If exempt, the party must bring proof of exemption; if liable, he must also answer in person, giving full and correct name, residence, etc., etc. No attention paid to letters.

When possible and legal, serving jurors will be allowed to select a convenient season—if application be made in time.

Persons "enrolled" as liable must serve when called or pay their fines. No mere excuse will be allowed or interference permitted. The fines, received from those

who, for business or other reasons, are unable to serve at the time selected, pay the expenses of this office, and if unpaid will be entered as judgments upon the property of the delinquents.

The Commissioner will receive applications for relief from those jurors who have served continuously and promptly for several years, or have done excessive jury service in the State Courts.

All good citizens will aid the course of justice, and secure reliable and respectable juries, and equalize their duty by serving promptly when summoned, allowing their clerks or subordinates to serve, reporting to me any attempt at bribery or evasion, and suggesting names for enrollment. Persons between sixty and seventy years of age, summer absentees, persons temporarily ill, and United States and District Court jurors are not exempt.

Every man must attend to his own notice. It is a misdemeanor to give any jury paper to another to answer. It is also punishable by fine or imprisonment to give or receive any present or bribe, directly or indirectly, in relation to a jury service, or to withhold any paper or make any false statement, and every case will be fully prosecuted. No fees of any kind exist or are allowed in regard to jury notices, and any one asking, receiving, or giving any such "fee" or "present" will be arrested, and, if possible, punished to the full extent of the law.
