Sir-I have your letter of November 18, inclosing for my consideration and advice six communications from the Heal h Department, dated November 17, 1897, in relation to certain expenses incurred under chapter 57 of the Laws of 1897, in relation to the removal of certain rear tenements, and asking to be advised whether authority exists under said act to issue bonds for the payment of said expenses.

The expenses in question appear to be of two classes, being, first, the amount paid in each case to Thomas E. Tripler, for the actual expense of removing the condemned buildings, and, second, amounts paid to the owners of certain condemned buildings as compensation for the damages

suffered by them.

The act, chapter 57 of the Laws of 1897, amends section 659 of the Consolidation Act, and, thus amending it, provides a complete system for the condemnation and destruction of unsanitary tenements in this city.

It provides in certain cases that it shall be the duty of the Board of Health to condemn the building and order it removed, and that in any such case the owner of the building may demand

building and order it removed, and that in any such case the owner of the building may demand a survey; whereupon proceedings shall be commenced in the Supreme Court for the condemnation of said property.

I may remark in passing that the words condemn and condemnation are evidently used in this section in two senses; where the Board is authorized to condemn and cause to be removed a building, it evidently means that the Board shall pass a judgment of condemnation upon the building as an unfit habitation for human beings. Where the section provides for the condemnation of property in the manner provided by the Code of Civil Procedure, the word condemnation evidently has its special meaning as the act of acquiring private property for public purposes.

The act further provides that awards made by the Commissioners in the condemnation proceedings and their compensation and that of their employees, and all expenses incurred in the said proceedings herein authorized, shall be paid out of the proceeds of bonds, as provided in the section.

I cannot doubt that it was the intention of the Legislature to include in the proceedings, for the expense of which bonds were to be issued, the cost of tearing down or removing unsanitary tenements, since clearly that was one of the proceedings authorized by the act.

As to the payment to owners, the Code of Civil Procedure requires, as a foundation for condemnation proceedings, that an offer be made to the owner and an attempt made to agree upon a

In the cases submitted the owner appears to have accepted the offer of the Department. I consider the offer and acceptance an integral part of the condemnation proceeding, and the amount agreed upon is therefore payable out of the same bonds.

In conclusion, therefore, I have to advise you that the expense covered by the six communications transmitted to me should be paid out of the issue of bonds provided by chapter 57 of the Laws

of 1897.

DEAR SIR—On July 9, 1897, a contract was made with the Warren-Scharf Asphalt Paving Company, in pursuance of the resolution of your Board, for paving with asphalt and stone block pavement the carriageway of Park avenue, from Fifty-sixth to Ninety-sixth street. Among other items, this contract provided for 18,060 lineal feet of abutting stone, adjoining and surrounding the coping walls of the parks in the centre of the avenue, of a quality and workmanship required for new curb-stones of North river blue stone and to be set in concrete.

In providing for such abutting stone, it was intended to reset the coping stone which had been placed by the Department of Public Parks around the small parks, but that Department refused permission to have the coping stone reset so as to place the abutting stone under it. The consequence was that the proposed blue stone abutting stones could not be fitted to the coping and the rubble masonry underneath it. An immediate change of the plans and specifications in regard to this abutting stone became necessary, and it was concluded to substitute artificial stone of Portland cement of the same dimensions and facing as had been prescribed for blue stone.

At the time this change became necessary your Board had adjourned its meetings for the summer season, and it was against public policy and interest to suspend the entire work, awaiting your authorization of the change.

The artificial stone has now been put in place and answers fully all the purposes of the original ification for blue stone. It has been placed at the price fixed in the contract for blue stone, specification for blue stone. viz., fifty cents per lineal foot.

Second-That the Department of Public Parks be and it is hereby authorized and requested, Second—That the Department of Public Parks be and it is hereby authorized and requested, at the time and in the manner provided in chapter 556, Laws of 1897, to remove the reservoir, now occupying a portion of Bryant Park, in the City of New York, and to erect, construct maintain, equip, and turnish in said Bryant Park a suitable and appropriate fireproof building, in accordance with the plans approved this day by this Board, such building to be used and occupied as a public library and reading-room by the said the New York Public Library, Astor, Lenox and Tilden Foundations, and to be constructed either of marble or Indiana limestone, or of such other stone as may hereafter be suggested by the architects and approved by the Trustees of the New York Public Library, Astor, Lenox and Tilden Foundations, and by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Third—That the Department of Public Parks be authorized and requested to employ Messrs. Carrere & Hastings, the authors of the said plans for the new library building, as architects, to prepare the detailed drawings, forms of contract and specifications for said building, pursuant to section 2 of said act, and to superintend the erection of said building; said employment of such architects to be in accordance with a contract to be prepared by the Counsel to the Corporation, which contract shall contain a provision fixing the compensation to be paid to the said architects at the customery fees, as declared by the American Institute of Architects.

Fourth—That the contract presented by the said the New York Public Library, Astor, Lenox and Tilden Foundations, a copy of which is hereto annexed, be and the same hereby is approved, and that the same be executed on behalf of the City and delivered as soon as the same is executed by or on behalf of the said the New York Public Library, Astor, Lenox and Tilden Foundations.

Lease and Agreement for the Occupation of the Building of The New York Public Library, Astor, Lenox and Tilden Foundations.

This Agreement, made and concluded this day of December, in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-seven, by and between the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said city, party of the first part, and the New York Public Library, Astor, Lenox and Tilden Foundations, party of the second part, witnesseth: second part, witnesseth :

first part, and the New York Public Library, Astor, Lenox and Tilden Foundations, party of the second part, witnesseth:

Whereas, The land now occupied by the reservoir upon Fifth avenue, between Fortieth and Forty-second streets, in the City of New York, has been made a portion of a public park, and by an act of the Legislature of the State of New York, passed May 19, 1897, entitled "An Act to provide for the construction of a public building in Bryant Fark, in the City of New York, to be occupied by the New York Public Library, Astor, Lenox and Tilden Foundations," the Department of Public Parks was authorized to remove the said reservoir occupying a portion of said Bryant Park, and to erect, construct, maintain, equip and furnish in the said Bryant Park, or some portion thereof, a suitable and appropriate fire-proof building in accordance with plans to be made and prepared by the party of the second part, and to be approved by the party of the first part, such building to be used and occupied as a public library and reading-room by the said party of the second part for the purpose of carrying out the objects and purposes of the said corporation and of its consolidation; and

Whereas, The said party of the first part, in and by the said act, was authorized at any time after the passage of said act to enter into a contract with the said party of the second part for the use and occupation by the said party of the second part and its successors of the building so to be erected, constructed, equipped and furnished, for the purpose of maintaining therein a public library and reading-room and carrying out the objects and purposes of the said corporation as provided by its agreement of consolidation, and any amendments to be hereafter authorized to the same, and which contract by the terms of said act was to provide for such use and occupation so long as the said party of the second part shall maintain such public library and reading-room therein and shall use said building so to be erected for the purposes thereof;

Whereas, The said party of the second part has made and prepared plans for such library building so to be erected, which said plans provide for a building to be erected in said Bryant Park, facing Fifth avenue, at a distance of about 75 feet therefrom, and being about 350 feet in width, front and rear, and about 250 feet in depth; and

Whereas, The said Board of Estimate and Apportionment has duly approved the said plans pursuant to the terms of said act, and has requested the Department of Public Parks to remove the reservoir now occupying a portion of Bryant Park, and to erect, construct, maintain, equip and furnish in said Park a fire-proof building, in accordance with said plans; such building to be used and occupied as a public library and reading-room by the said the New York Public Library, Astor, Lenox and Tilden Foundations, and to be constructed either of marble or Indiana limestone, or of such other stone as may hereafter be suggested by the architects and approved by the Trustees of the New York Public Library, Astor, Lenox and Tilden Foundations, and by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment; and

Whereas, It is the intention of the party of the second part to arrange to dispose of certain real estate and property owned by it, and in other respects to prepare for the occupation of the said building, and the carrying on of the public purposes of said corporation therein;

Now, therefore, it is agreed by and between the parties hereto as follows:

Now, therefore, it is agreed by and between the parties hereto as follows:

First—The party of the first part has granted, demised and let, and doth by these present grant, demise and let, unto the party of the second part and its successors the said library building so to be erected within or upon said Bryant Park upon the site now occupied by said reservoir, grant, demise and let, unto the party of the second part and its successors the said horary building so to be erected within or upon said Bryant Park upon the site now occupied by said reservoir, together with the appurtenances thereunto belonging, to have and to hold the same unto the party of the second part and its successors so long as the said party of the second part shall continue to maintain such public library and reading-room therein, and so long as the said party of the second part shall use and occupy such building for the purpose of maintaining therein a public library and reading-room and carrying on the objects and purposes of the said corporation, as provided by its said agreement of consolidation and the several acts incorporating the Trustees of the Astor Library, the Trustees of the Lenox Library and the Tilden Trust, respectively, and any amendments to be hereafter authorized to the same, and so long as the party of the second part shall faithfully keep, performed and observed the covenants and conditions herein contained on its part to be kept, performed and observed.

Second—Neither the party of the first part, its successors or successor, nor the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, nor their successors, shall be chargeable or liable for the preservation of said building or the property of the party of the second part therein, against fire, or for any damage or injury to be caused by fire to the said property; but it is agreed that, the damages aforesaid excepted, the said party of the first part shall, on reasonable demand, at all times maintain and keep the said building in repair.

Third—As soon after the completion and equipment of said building as practicable, the said party of the second part shall transfer to, place and arrange in said building, its library and collections, and shall have and enjoy the exclusive use of the whole of said building, subject to the provisions herein contained and the rules and regulations herein prescribed, during the continuance of

inuance of the term hereinbefore granted.

Fourth—The said library shall be accessible at all reasonable hours and times for general use, free of expense to persons resorting thereto, subject only to such control and regulation as the party of the second part, its successor or successors, from time to time may exercise and establish for general convenience; provided, however, that one or more reading rooms in said library shall be open and accessible to the public upon every day of the week except Sundays, but including all legal or public holidays, from at least nine o'clock A. M. until at least nine o'clock P. M., and on Sundays from one o'clock P. M. until nine o'clock P. M., under such rules and regulations as the said Board of Trustees shall prescribe from time to time; and provided that there shall at all times be established and maintained in the said library a free circulating branch, and that the same shall be opened for the use of the public during the day time on Sunday and during the evening of each other day of the week for such time as may be prescribed by the said Board of Trustees in control of said library, the hour for closing said branch of the library, however, on each evening to be not earlier than ten o'clock.

Fifth—The said library collections and all other property of the said party of the second part which shall or may be placed in said building shall continue to be and remain absolutely the property of said party of the second part, and neither the party of the first part, nor said Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, nor their successors, shall, by reason of said property being placed in the said building, or continuing therein, have any right, title, property or interest therein, nor shall the party of the second part, by reason of its use and occupation of this building under said agreement, acquire or be deemed to have acquired, any right, title, property or interest in the said building and the appurtenances, or the land on which the same is erected, except in so far as expressly granted by this agreement.

Sixth—The said party of the second part shall, on or before the 31st day of December in ea free of expense to persons resorting thereto, subject only to such control and regulation as the party of the second part, its successor or successors, from time to time may exercise and establish

and about the care of the building, and the library and collections therein contained, excepting the regular policemen on duty within the building or grounds, if any, and the employees of the Park Department engaged in gardening or construction.

Eighth—The City shall annually provide funds for the maintenance and repair of the building, and the City authorities, or Department of Public Parks acting under its direction, shall, at all times, provide and care for the roads, walks, fences, grading and general care of the grounds and appurtenances attached thereto. The City, in addition, shall, at all times, furnish a supply of water and adequate police patrol and protection. With the limitations already defined, the party of the second part shall exercise entire direction and management over all the affairs of the library building and the books, collections and appurtenances.

Ninth—It is further expressly understood and agreed by and between the parties hereto that this agreement may be wholly cancelled and annulled, or from time to time altered or modified, as may be agreed upon in writing between the said parties or their successors, anything herein to the contrary in anywise notwithstanding.

In Witness Whereof, the party of the first part has caused this Agreement to be executed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, pursuant to a resolution of the said Board adopted at a meeting held on the day of , in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-seven; and the said party of the second part has caused the same to be executed by its president and its official seal affixed thereto, pursuant to resolution of the trustees of the New York Public Library, Astor, Lenox and Tilden Foundations, and adopted at a meeting held on the day of December, in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-seven.

The southerly side of this pier will intersect the bulkhead-line established by the Board of Docks May 20, 1897, and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund June, 14, 1897, at a point distant 1,080.93 feet northerly from the intersection of the southerly side of West Eleventh street extended, with said bulkhead-line, and will extend westerly 717.93 feet to the pierhead-line, as modified and established by the Secretary of War May 18, 1897; the northerly side of the pier will be parallel with and distant 110 feet northerly from the said southerly side, and will extend from the said bulkhead-line westerly 713.66 feet to the said pierhead-line; the sides of this pier will make an angle of 90 degrees with the said bulkhead-line.
