Proposed alteration is unlawful. See section 142 of the Code.

That the building is at present 5 feet above the curb level, and sets back 11 to 14 feet from the building line, and we proposed to only increase the building 8 feet in height, making the lowest story 13 feet in height at the front and 9 feet in height at the rear.

That the majority of the buildings on the above block are frame and at a point 100 feet from this location an entirely new building of this construction could be built.

That we be allowed to raise the building in order to have the lowest story 13 feet in height.

The building is just 100 feet inside the fire limit and the block upon which this building is located is occupied almost exclusively by frame buildings.

Mr. L. C. Vaneck appeared before the Board.

On motion, appeal approved.

Appeal 40, New Building 937 of 1905, premises Nos. 119 and 121 East Nineteenth street, Manhattan; George B. Post & Sons, appellants.

3. The building exceeds twelve stories in height and should conform to all the requirements of section 105 of the Code as to fireproofing.

The plans comply with the spirit of the Building Act if not with its letter; that in the rear there are twelve stories and in the front part a basement story and six stories of studios with mezzanines for bedrooms, the upper mezzanine story making a thirteenth story for a distance back from the front large enough only to contain a row of bedrooms and the connections therefrom to the elevator. The building is but 143 feet high above the curb, and we respectfully submit that inasmuch as the upper mezzanine does not add to the fire risk, and inasmuch as the upper studios would have greatly decreased value without the mezzanine, that an exception be made and that this building shall be subject to the requirements only of buildings not more than 150 feet or twelve stories in height.

That the building is practically a twelve-story building and considerably below 150 feet in height.

That the value of the building as an investment will be greatly impaired if the upper mezzanine bedrooms on the street front are removed, and will be destroyed if its expense is increased by using nothing but fireproof material in its finish and trim throughout.

Mr. George B. Post appeared before the Board.

TAXPAYERS WHO DESIRE TO OBTAIN their bills promptly should make immediate written requisition (blanks may be procured in the borough offices), stating their property by Section or Ward, Block and Lot or Map number, making copy of same from their bills of last year.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.
