Minutes of Meeting of Board of Estimate and Apportionment, Held in Room 16, City Hall, Friday, May 20, 1910.

(FINANCIAL AND FRANCHISE MATTERS.)

The Board met in pursuance of an adjournment.

The minutes (Financial and Franchise Matters) of meeting held May 13 were approved as printed in the CITY RECORD May 18, 1910.

FRANCHISE MATTERS.

Electric Protection Company of New York.

In the matter of the petition of the Electric Protection Company of New York for a franchise to construct, maintain and operate suitable wires or electrical conductors under the streets, avenues and highways of The City of New York for the purpose of maintaining burglar and fire alarm systems for the protection of premises of subscribers.

At the meeting of March 18, 1910, a report was presented from the Engineer in Charge of the Division of Franchises, together with a proposed form of contract to govern the grant.

At the meeting of April 1, 1910, a report was presented from the Engineer in Charge of the Division of Franchises stating the form of contract had been approved by the Corporation Counsel, and the matter was laid over awaiting the receipt of a communication from the Fire Commissioner.

The Secretary presented the following:

Hon. WILLIAM J. GAYNOR, Mayor, and Chairman Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—With reference to the application of the Electric Protection Company of New York for a franchise, which is now before your Board, I desire to invite your attention to the general situation with reference to companies furnishing auxiliary fire alarm service.

The following companies now have a wire connection into the Fire Alarm Telegraph Bureau of the Fire Department:

In Manhattan and The Bronx.

Automatic Fire Alarm Company.....	1,233 subscribers
Consolidated Fire Alarm Company.....	346 subscribers
Manhattan Fire Alarm Company.....	3,322 boxes
National District Telegraph Company.....	241 subscribers

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In Brooklyn and Queens.

Consolidated Fire Alarm Company.....	311 subscribers
Manhattan Fire Alarm Company.....	1,008 boxes

Of these, the Manhattan Fire Alarm Company (4,334 boxes) furnishes connection from the premises of the subscriber to the nearest Department box, and from that point use the wires and apparatus of this Department without any recompense to the City. They rent these boxes for fifty dollars (\$50) a box. This free use of City property for the purpose of revenue by a private company is regarded as being entirely an improper procedure. There are also 25 private boxes in Manhattan and The Bronx and 245 in Brooklyn and Queens which are connected with Department wires, for which privilege the users pay nothing to the City.

Auxiliary fire alarms are necessary in large buildings. They cannot be operated efficiently except by co-operation with the Fire Department. It is therefore believed that they should be owned and controlled by the City.

In the installing of the new telegraph system for this Department, the necessary funds for which have been requested from your Board, additional wires could be provided to handle the auxiliary circuits at a comparatively small cost. The City could rent auxiliary appliances to individuals requiring the same. Sufficient funds could be obtained from this source to pay the interest on the cost of the proposed telegraph system, as well as the cost of maintenance.

If, however, the proposition of control by the City of this service is not regarded favorably by your Board at this time, and it is desired to continue the private control of these systems for the present, the following is then recommended for your consideration:

Any Company which shall have at least five hundred (500) subscribers shall be allowed by the Fire Commissioner to install their instruments in the Telegraph Bureau at Fire Headquarters, under proper restrictions and provided that they shall pay to the City the sum of ten dollars (\$10) for each box installed, the minimum to be paid to be five thousand dollars (\$5,000) per annum; and that the City shall reserve the right to cancel this privilege at any time that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment may see fit.

There are now before the Fire Commissioner applications from other Companies who have franchises requesting permission to bring their wires into Fire Headquarters, but their requests have not been acted on for the reason that it is believed that this matter should be the subject of uniform action with regard to all applicants.

GENTLEMEN—On a recent occasion when I called at the office to see Mr. Nichols in reference to a report that some one claimed to have the right to supply the Aero Automatic Fire Alarm, in connection with some other service to the City, for which they were seeking wire franchise, I stated verbally that those proposing this matter had no authority to offer the Aero system, and that any infringement on the patent rights would be vigorously prosecuted. At the same time I promised to send copies of the Aero patents, but, owing to some delay in receiving them from Washington, I have not been able to do so until now. I therefore enclose herewith the copy of the “American Patent,” which fully exhibits the Aero principle, and request that you make record of the fact that the Electric Protective Company of New York, incorporated June 1, 1909, which company I understand offers to install and operate a fire alarm made under this patent, have no authority for such procedure, and any and all infringements on the rights of the owners of these patents will be dealt with effectively.

Mr. NELSON P. LEWIS, Chief Engineer:

Sir—Under date of May 12, 1910, Mr. T. H. S. Cone, agent for the Aero Fire Alarm, Ltd. (American rights), addressed a communication to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, in which he requests that record be made of the fact that the Electric Protection Company of New York has no authority for the installation of a fire alarm system employing the Aero system, and that all the infringements upon the rights of the owners of the Aero patents will be vigorously prosecuted.

The Electric Protection Company of New York, under date of September 15, 1909, applied to the Board for the right to maintain wires and other conductors within the streets and avenues of The City of New York; the wires to be used in the operation of electric call boxes in connection with telephone, telegraph and other systems of providing calls and signals for the Electric Protection Company.

At the meeting of the Board held March 18, 1910, a report of this Division was presented upon the application, setting forth the purposes for which the Company desired the franchise, giving a description of the apparatus proposed to be installed by the Company, and submitting a form of contract for the proposed franchise. At that meeting the matter was referred to the Chief Engineer to confer with the Fire Commissioner, and also to the Corporation Counsel for approval as to the form of the contract.

Upon consultation with the Fire Commissioner, it was found that he was opposed to granting any franchise of this character, for the reason that he believed that all fire alarm service should be directly under the supervision of the City, and he requested that the Board delay action for the present, and stated that he would address a communication to the Board in regard to the same. The matter was, therefore, on April 1, 1910, laid over awaiting the receipt of a communication from the Fire Commissioner.

The contract has subsequently been approved as to form by the Corporation Counsel, but no communication has as yet been received from the Fire Commissioner.

Representatives of the Electric Protection Company of New York stated that it was their intention to operate throughout the United States a system employing the Aero principle, referred to in the communication of Mr. Cone, and that the Aero system has been much improved and adapted to different classes of service. These improvements, it was claimed, were fully covered by patents.

It would appear that the question of patent rights to be employed by companies seeking franchises is one which must be determined between the parties interested. Should the applicant Company exceed its patent rights and infringe upon the rights of any other company or patentees, then no doubt it can be restrained from operation, and the rights of the Aero Fire Alarm, Ltd., fully protected.

I do not see that this is a matter in which the City need take any consideration in reaching a determination as to whether or not it shall grant a franchise to the applicant company and it is therefore suggested that the communication in question be filed and a copy of this report be transmitted to Mr. Cone.

Edward M. Grout, of counsel for the petitioner, appeared in favor of the proposed grant.

The following was offered:

Whereas, The Electric Protection Company of New York, in a petition dated September 15, 1909, made application to this Board for a grant of the right, privilege and franchise to lay, erect, construct and maintain wires and other conductors with the necessary poles, pipes, conduits and appliances in, over and under the streets, avenues and highways within The City of New York, for the operation of electrical call boxes in connection with telephone, telegraph and other systems for providing wires and signals for protection service; and

Whereas, Sections 72, 73 and 74 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapters 629 and 630 of the Laws of 1905, provide for the manner and procedure of making such grants; and

Whereas, In pursuance of such laws, this Board adopted a resolution on October 8, 1909, fixing the date for a public hearing thereon as October 29, 1909, at which citizens were entitled to appear and be heard, and publication was had for at least two days in the "New York Herald" and the "Morning Telegraph," newspapers designated by the Mayor, and in the City Record for ten days immediately prior to the date of hearing, and the public hearing was duly held on such date; and

Whereas, This Board has made inquiry as to the money value of the franchise or right applied for, and proposed to be granted to the Electric Protection Company of New York, and the adequacy of the compensation proposed to be paid therefor; now therefore it is

Resolved, That the following form of the resolution for the grant of the franchise or right applied for by the Electric Protection Company of New York containing the form of proposed contract for the grant of such franchise or right be hereby introduced and entered in the minutes of this Board as follows, to wit:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby grants to the Electric Protection Company of New York the franchise or right fully set out and described in the following form of proposed contract for the grant thereof, embodying all of the terms and conditions, including the provisions as to rates and charges, upon and subject to the terms and conditions in said proposed form of contract contained, and that the Mayor of The City of New York be and he hereby is authorized to execute and deliver such contract in the name and on behalf of The City of New York, as follows, to wit:

This contract, made this _____ day of _____, 19____, by and between The City of New York (hereinafter called the City), party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City (hereinafter called the Board), and the Electric Protection Company of New York (hereinafter called the Company), party of the second part, witnesseth:

In consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained, the parties hereto do hereby covenant and agree as follows:

Section 1. The City hereby grants to the Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the right and privilege to lay, construct, maintain and operate suitable wires or other electrical conductors in conduits under the streets and avenues within the Borough of Manhattan and the portion of the Borough of The Bronx lying west of the Bronx River, for the purpose of electrically connecting, detecting and signalling apparatus to be located upon the premises of subscribers with signal recording apparatus located at some suitable point or points where such signals are to be received and thereby maintaining and operating burglary and fire alarm systems for the protection of the premises of subscribers and for no other purpose whatsoever.

Sec. 2. The grant of this privilege is subject to the following conditions, which shall be complied with by the Company:

First—The said right and privilege to lay, construct, maintain and operate wires or other electrical conductors in conduits for the purpose aforesaid shall be held and enjoyed by the Company, for the term of fifteen (15) years from the date when this contract is signed by the Mayor, with the privilege of renewal of said contract for a further period of ten (10) years upon a fair revaluation of said right and privilege.

If the Company shall determine to exercise its privilege of renewal it shall make application to the Board, or any authority which shall be authorized by law to act for the City in place of the Board. Such application shall be made at any time not earlier than two (2) years and not later than one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract. The determination of the revaluation shall be sufficient if agreed to in writing by the Company and the Board, but in no case shall the annual

rate of compensation to the City be fixed at a less amount than the sum required to be paid during the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract.

If the Company and the Board shall not reach such agreement on or before the day one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract, then the annual rate of compensation for such succeeding ten (10) years shall be reasonable, and either the City (by the Board) or the Company shall be bound upon request of the other to enter into a written agreement with each other fixing the rate of such compensation at such amount as shall be reasonable, but in no case shall the annual rate so fixed be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, and if the parties shall not forthwith agree upon what is reasonable, then the parties shall enter into a written agreement fixing such annual rate and at such amount as shall be determined by three disinterested freeholders selected in the following manner:

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board; one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Company; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder, and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluation aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six (6) months prior to the expiration of this original contract, and their report shall be filed with the Board within three (3) months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations, without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine any of the books of the Company and its officers under oath. The valuations so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties, but no annual sum shall, in any event, be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year of this original contract. If in any case the annual rate shall not be fixed prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, then the Company shall pay the annual rate theretofore prevailing until the new rate shall be determined, and shall then make up to the City the amount of any excess of the annual rate then determined over the previous annual rate. The compensation and expenses of the said appraisers shall be borne jointly by the City and the Company, each paying one-half thereof.

Second—The Company shall pay to the City for the privilege hereby granted the following sums of money:

(a) The sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) in cash within three (3) months after the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the privilege hereby granted.

(b) During the first term of five (5) years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than twelve hundred dollars (\$1,200), and which shall be equal to two (2) per cent. of its gross annual receipts if such percentage shall exceed the sum of twelve hundred dollars (\$1,200).

During the second term of five (5) years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than twenty-five hundred dollars (\$2,500), and which shall be equal to two and one-half (2½) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of twenty-five hundred dollars (\$2,500).

During the remaining term of five (5) years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than forty-five hundred dollars (\$4,500), and which shall be equal to three (3) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of forty-five hundred dollars (\$4,500).

The annual charges shall commence from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor.

All annual charges as above shall be paid into the treasury of the City on November 1 of each year and shall be for the amount due to September 30 next preceding. Provided that the first annual payment shall be only for that proportion of the first annual charge as the time between the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor and September 30 following shall bear to the whole of one year.

Whenever the percentage required to be paid shall exceed the minimum amount as above, then such sum over and above such minimum shall be paid on or before November 1 in each year for the year ending September 30 next preceding.

Any and all payments to be made by the terms of this contract to the City by the Company shall not be considered in any manner in the nature of a tax, but such payments shall be made in addition to any and all taxes of whatsoever kind or description now or hereafter required to be paid by any ordinance of the City, or resolution of the Board, or any law of the State of New York.

Third—The annual charges or payments shall continue throughout the whole term of this contract (whether original or renewal), notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other company providing for payment for similar rights or franchises at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or sublease of the rights or privileges hereby granted (whether original or renewal), or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions of this contract; and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said conditions as to payments, anything in any statute or in the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof or otherwise exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this contract.

Fourth—The rights and privileges hereby granted shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall the title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the Company or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in anywise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Fifth—Upon the termination of this original contract, or if the same be renewed, then at the termination of the said renewal term, or upon the termination of the rights hereby granted for any cause, or upon the dissolution of the Company before such termination, the wires and equipment of the Company constructed pursuant to this contract within the streets and avenues shall become the property of the City without cost, and the same may be used or disposed of by the City for any purpose whatsoever, or the same may be leased to any company or individual.

If, however, at the termination of this contract as above, the Board shall so order by resolution, the Company shall, upon thirty (30) days' notice from the Board, remove any and all of its wires and other equipment constructed, pursuant to this contract and the said streets and avenues shall be restored to their original condition at the sole cost and expense of the Company.

Sixth—The Company shall construct, maintain and operate its protection system, subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of the City who have jurisdiction in such matters under the Charter of the City, and in strict compliance with all laws or ordinances, now in force or which may be adopted, affecting companies operating electrical conductors in the city.

Seventh—All cables and wires of the Company laid pursuant to this contract shall be placed in ducts, conduits or subways (referred to in this paragraph as subways). Such subways shall be leased from the company or companies having control thereof under the provisions of law, or from the City should it succeed to the rights of such company or companies. If the City shall construct or acquire subways for electrical conductors in the Borough of Manhattan, and the portion of The Bronx west of the Bronx River, or in any portion thereof, the Company hereby agrees to lay its wires and conductors in such subways and the City agrees to lease to the Company such space as may be required for the operation of the signal and alarm systems hereby authorized.

Eighth—The Company shall, upon request from any individual or corporation occupying or owning premises in the territory in which the Company is operating, not in arrears to it for service already rendered, extend its wires to such premises and furnish protection service to such individual or corporation, provided that such premises are not more than one-half mile from any other premises in which the Company has its apparatus installed at the time such request is made.

Ninth—The Company shall file with the Board on the first day of November in each year a map or plan upon which shall be plainly indicated the number of wires which are in use by the Company on that date, and the streets in which the same are located, and also those which were put in use during the preceding year.

Tenth—It is agreed that the Board shall have absolute power to regulate all charges or rates for fire or burglar alarm services rendered by the Company to subscribers, pursuant to this contract, and it is further agreed that the charges or rates for certain classes of service furnished by the Company shall be limited as follows:

(a) For automatic fire alarm protection of five-story double tenement houses, or tenement houses of less dimensions, the annual charge for service shall not exceed fifty dollars (\$50), where there are sufficient subscribers within the same city block to require the protection of not less than ten tenements in the same city block, and the Company shall make no charge for installation of equipment in such buildings.

(b) For interior manual fire alarm protection, installed according to the requirements of the National Board of Fire Underwriters, the annual charge for service shall not exceed the sum of twenty-five dollars (\$25) for the first manual fire alarm box, and the sum of five dollars (\$5) per annum for each additional manual fire alarm box in the same building, where there are sufficient subscribers within the same city block to require not less than fifty manual fire alarm boxes, and the Company shall make no charge for installation of equipment in such buildings.

Eleventh—The Board may, by resolution and notice to the Company, direct the Company to install manual fire alarm apparatus in any or all offices or buildings used by the City, situated in the portion of the City in which the Company shall operate at the time when such notice shall be given. The Company, upon receiving such notice, shall install such apparatus, free of charge, and shall furnish service at rates not exceeding fifty (50) per cent. of the rate charged by the Company for similar service to any corporation or to any other individual.

Twelfth—The Company shall not require nor receive from its subscribers any deposit or advance payment in excess of what is reasonably necessary to insure payment of current bills, and on such amounts so paid the Company shall pay interest at the statutory rate whenever such money is held for more than one month. Unpaid bills, unless due from its owner, shall never be charged against property, and no person not himself in arrears shall be denied service because any previous occupant of the same premises is in arrears to the Company for service.

Thirteenth—The wires of the Company shall be employed for no other purposes than those explicitly set forth herein, and the Company binds itself not to lay, use, lease or operate wires for illegal purposes or to illegal places.

Fourteenth—The Company shall assume all liability to persons or property by reason of the construction or operation of the system authorized by this contract, and it is a condition of this contract that the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property on account of the same, and the Company hereby agrees to repay to the City any damage which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or defaults of the Company.

Fifteenth—It is a condition of this contract that the Company shall bear the entire expense of all work undertaken by reason of this grant.

Sixteenth—If the Company shall fail to give efficient public service at the rates herein fixed, or fail to maintain its structures and equipment as herein provided in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, the Board may give notice to the Company specifying any default on the part of the Company, and requiring the Company to remedy the same within a reasonable time; and upon failure of the Company to remedy such default within a reasonable time, the Company shall, for each day thereafter during which the default or defect remains, pay to the City the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100) as fixed or liquidated damages, or the Board, in case such structures or equipment which may affect the surface of the streets shall not be put in good condition within a reasonable time after notice by the Board as aforesaid, shall have the right to make all needed repairs at the expense of the Company, in which case the Company shall pay to the City the amount of the cost of such repairs, with legal interest thereon, all of which sums may be deducted from the fund hereinafter provided for.

Seventeenth—If for a period of twelve consecutive months, the fire alarm and burglar alarm systems of the Company shall not be operated, or if the same shall not be operated for a period of eighteen months out of any consecutive twenty-four months, the Board may declare the right and franchise and this contract terminated without further proceedings at law or in equity.

Eighteenth—The Company shall at all times keep accurate books of account and shall, on or before November 1 in each year, make a verified report to the Comptroller of the City of the business done by the Company for the year ending September 30 next preceding. Such report shall contain a statement of the gross receipts received from the operation of the systems hereby authorized from all subscribers served by the Company, together with such other information and in such form and detail as the Comptroller may require. The Comptroller shall have access to all books of the Company for the purpose of ascertaining the correctness of its report and may examine its officers under oath.

Nineteenth—The Company shall submit to the Board a report not later than November 1 of each year for the year ending September 30 next preceding, and at any other time, upon request of the Board, which shall state:

1. The amount of stock issued, for cash, for property.
2. The amount paid in as by last report.
3. The total amount of capital stock paid in.
4. The funded debt by last report.
5. The total amount of funded debt.
6. The floating debt as by last report.
7. The total amount of floating debt.
8. The total amount of funded and floating debt.
9. The average rate per annum of interest on funded debt.
10. Statement of dividends paid during the year.
11. The total amount expended for same.
12. The names of the directors elected at the last meeting of the corporation held for such purpose.
13. Location, value and amount paid for real estate owned by the Company as by last report.
14. Location, value and amount paid for real estate now owned by the Company.
15. Number and location of premises served by the Company.
16. Total receipts of the Company for each class of business.
17. Amounts paid by the Company for damage to persons or property on account of construction and operation.
18. Total expenses for operation, including salaries, and such other information in regard to the business of the Company as may be required by the Board.

Twentieth—This grant is upon the express condition that the Company, within ninety (90) days after the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred hereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of the City the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000), either in money or securities, to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance by the Company of all of the terms and conditions of this contract, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charges for the privileges hereby granted, in default of which payment of the annual charges the City shall collect the same, with interest, from the said fund after ten (10) days' notice to the Company.

In case of failure of the Company to comply with the terms of this contract relating to the filing of annual statements, furnish service to applicants as herein provided or its neglect or refusal to comply with any demand or direction of the Board or other municipal officials, made pursuant to the terms of the contract, or under the authority of any laws or ordinances now or hereafter in force, in such case and in any of these events, the Company, except as herein otherwise provided, shall pay to the City a penalty of fifty dollars (\$50) for each violation.

The procedure for the imposition and collection of the penalties in this contract shall be as follows:

The Board, on complaint made, shall give notice to the Company, directing its President or other officer to appear before the Board on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why the Company should not be penalized in accordance with the foregoing provisions. If the Company fails to make an appearance, or after a hearing appears in the judgment of the Board to be in fault, said Board shall forthwith impose the prescribed penalty, or where the amount of the penalty is not prescribed herein, such amount as appears to the Board to be just, and without legal procedure direct the Comptroller to withdraw the amount of such penalty from the security fund deposited with him. In case of any drafts made upon the security fund the Company shall, upon ten (10) days' notice, in writing, pay to the City a sum sufficient to restore said security fund to the original amount of five thousand dollars (\$5,000), and in default thereof this contract shall be cancelled

and annulled at the option of the Board, acting in behalf of the City. No action or proceeding or right under the provisions of this contract shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to the City.

Twenty-first—In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained, this contract may be forfeited by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel, on notice of ten (10) days to the Company, or at the option of the Board by resolution of said Board, which said resolution may contain a provision to the effect that the system constructed and in use by virtue of this contract shall thereupon become the property of the City without proceedings at law or in equity. Provided, however, that such action by the Board shall not be taken until the Board shall give notice to the Company to appear before it on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why such resolution declaring the contract forfeited should not be adopted. In case the Company fails to appear, action may be taken by the Board forthwith.

Twenty-second—If at any time the powers of the Board or any other of the authorities herein mentioned or intended to be mentioned, shall be transferred by law to any other board, authority, officer or officers, then and in such case such other board, authority, officer or officers shall have all the powers, rights and duties herein reserved to or prescribed for the Board or other authorities, officer or officers.

Twenty-third—The words "notice" or "direction," wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean a written notice or direction. Every such notice or direction to be served upon the Company shall be delivered at such office in the City as shall have been designated by the Company, or if no such office shall have been designated, or if such designation shall have for any reason become inoperative, shall be mailed in the City, postage prepaid, addressed to the Company at the City. Delivery or mailing of such notice or direction as and when above provided shall be equivalent to direct personal notice or direction, and shall be deemed to have been given at the time of delivery or mailing.

Sec. 3. Nothing in this contract shall be construed as in any way limiting the present or future jurisdiction of the Public Service Commission under the Laws of the State of New York.

Sec. 4. The Company promises, covenants and agrees on its part and behalf to conform to and abide by and perform all the terms, conditions and requirements in this contract fixed and contained.

In witness whereof, the party of the first part, by its Mayor, thereunto duly authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City, has caused the corporate name of said City to be hereunto signed and the corporate seal of said City to be hereunto affixed; and the party of the second part, by its officers, thereunto duly authorized, has caused its corporate name to be hereunto signed and its corporate seal to be hereunto affixed, the day and year first above written.

Resolved, That the results of the inquiry made by this Board as to the money value of the franchise or right proposed to be granted and the adequacy of the compensation proposed to be paid therefor, and of the terms and conditions, including the provision as to rates and charges, are as hereinbefore specified and fully set forth in and by the foregoing form of proposed contract for the grant of such franchise or right.

Resolved, That these preambles and resolutions, including the said resolution for the grant of a franchise or right applied for by the Electric Protection Company of New York and the said form of proposed contract for the grant of such franchise or right containing said results of such inquiry, after the same shall be entered in the minutes of this Board, shall be published for at least twenty (20) days immediately prior to Friday, June 24, 1910, in the City Record, and at least twice during the ten (10) days immediately prior to Friday, June 24, 1910, in two daily newspapers to be designated by the Mayor therefor and published in The City of New York, at the expense of the Electric Protection Company of New York, together with the following notice, to wit:

Notice is hereby given that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, before authorizing any contract for the grant of the franchise or right applied for by the Electric Protection Company of New York, and fully set forth and described in the foregoing form of proposed contract for the grant of such franchise or right, and before adopting any resolution authorizing any such contract, will, at a meeting of said Board, to be held in the Old Council Chamber, City Hall, Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, on Friday, June 24, 1910, at 10.30 o'clock a. m., hold a public hearing thereon, at which citizens shall be entitled to appear and be heard.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Deputy Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond—16.

Communication from the Twenty-fourth Ward Board of Trade, Brooklyn, requesting that the Library Committee of said board be granted a hearing in the matter of the purchase of the plot selected by the Library Board on the northeast corner of Brooklyn avenue and Eastern parkway, Brooklyn.

Which were referred to the Comptroller.

(On March 11, 1910, the request of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn for the acquisition of property, etc., for a new Borough Hall was laid over for the corporate stock budget.)

Which were ordered filed.

The Secretary presented the following resolution of the Board of Aldermen requesting, and report of the Comptroller recommending, an issue of \$10,000 special revenue bonds (subdivision 8, section 188, of the Charter), to provide for the compensation of temporary Clerks to be employed in recording and copying marriage licenses, under the jurisdiction of the County Clerk of New York County.

(On May 6, 1910, the resolution of the Board of Aldermen requesting the above issues was referred to the Comptroller.)

In the Board of Aldermen.

Resolved, That, in pursuance of the provisions of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and it is hereby requested to authorize the Comptroller to issue special revenue bonds to the amount of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000), the proceeds whereof to be used by the County Clerk, New York County, for the purpose of employing temporary Clerks to copy and bring up to date marriage records now in arrears.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen April 12, 1910, three-fourths of all the members elected voting in favor thereof.

Received from his Honor the Mayor, April 26, 1910, without his approval or disapproval thereof; therefore, as provided in section 40 of the Greater New York Charter, the same took effect as if he had approved it.

To the Honorable Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

GENTLEMEN—In relation to a resolution of the Board of Aldermen, adopted April 12, 1910, requesting an issue of special revenue bonds to the amount of \$10,000, the proceeds whereof to be used by the County Clerk, New York County, for the purpose of employing temporary Clerks to copy and bring up to date marriage records now in arrears, referred to me for report, I report as follows:

An examination of the records in the County Clerk's office shows that there were 37,000 marriage licenses unrecorded on May 4, 1910. In addition to recording and indexing these instruments, the County Clerk is mandatorily required to prepare and forward a copy of the same to the State Department of Health three months after the licenses are filed in his office, under penalty of a fine of one hundred dollars for failure to do so. The County Clerk states that upon assuming the duties of the office on January 1, 1910, he found the following condition existing as to marriage licenses:

Marriage licenses of 1908, unrecorded.....	20,000
Copies of 1908, to be made for State Board of Health.....	15,000
Marriage licenses of 1909, unrecorded.....	31,597
Copies of 1909, to be made for State Board of Health.....	31,597

By keeping a large part of the staff of the office at work on recording and making copies of the marriage licenses, very much at the expense of the current work of the office, the County Clerk has succeeded in reducing the number of copies to be recorded by about 11,000, and the number of copies for the State Department of Health by 14,000.

During the year 1909 there were issued by the City Clerk 31,597 marriage licenses, calculating about the same number of licenses for 1910 as for 1909, would, with the arrears, make a total of 70,000 marriage licenses to be recorded and 70,000 copies to be made for the State Department of Health. There are at the present time only five employees in the office designated as Recording Clerks and assigned to do the marriage license work. Owing to illegible writing and foreign names it is extremely difficult for any of the Clerks engaged on this work to record daily over forty licenses or to prepare copy for the State Health Department of over twenty-five. The preparation of the copy requires about one-third more writing than that of the recording.

The law in relation to recording and copying marriage licenses is as follows:

Consolidated Laws, Chapter 14, Article 3, Section 20.

"The county clerk of each county shall record and index in a book kept for that purpose each statement, affidavit, consent and license, together with the certificate thereto attached, showing the performance of the marriage ceremony filed in his office. During the first twenty days of January, April, July and October of each year the county clerk shall transmit to the state department of health at Albany, New York, a copy of all affidavits, statements, consents and licenses with certificates attached, filed in his office during the three months preceding the date of said report, also copies of all contracts of marriages made and recorded in his office during said period entered into in accordance with subdivision 4 of section 11 of this chapter."

Consolidated Laws, Chapter 14, Article 3, Section 22.

"Any town, city or county clerk, who shall violate any of the provisions of this article or shall fail to comply therewith shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and shall pay a fine not exceeding the sum of one hundred dollars on conviction thereof."

Commencing on May 15, 1910, the present force employed by the County Clerk on marriage license work would be able to complete for the balance of the year of 191 days, of which 33 days are Saturday half holidays, leaving 175 full working days, the following:

Marriage licenses recorded.....	14,000
Copies of marriage licenses.....	12,600

This would leave a balance of 56,000 marriage licenses to be recorded and about 57,400 copies to be made for the State Department of Health.

It is proposed by the County Clerk to employ fourteen Temporary Clerks at a compensation of 10 cents for each license recorded and 10 cents for each copy of license made. This force of temporary clerks should be able to record about 49,000 licenses and 40,000 copies. The plan proposes that the Clerk copying the license records the same. The earning capacity of the Clerks would be a little less than \$100 per month each, providing they were rapid workers. The regular force of the office when not otherwise employed are to be employed on marriage license work, and the County Clerk hopes by this means to have the records up to date on or before December 31, 1910.

The County Clerk proposes with the consent of the State Civil Service Commission to select these employees himself, in the event of the State Civil Service Commission being unable to furnish him with an eligible list of Clerks suited to work of this character.

In view of the facts herein stated, I would recommend concurrence in the resolution of the Board of Aldermen in accordance with the resolution hereto appended.

The Secretary presented a report of the Comptroller referring to the petition of George W. Walters for release from the payment of a judgment amounting to \$509.55, entered against him in favor of The City of New York, pursuant to chapter 601, Laws of 1907, and stating that from the facts set forth in the attached report of

the Division of Law and Adjustment of the Department of Finance, this claim does not come within the purview of chapter 601, Laws of 1907.

Which was ordered on file and the Secretary directed to transmit a copy thereof to the petitioner.

(On January 7, 1910, the above matter was referred to the Comptroller.)

The Secretary presented the following communication from the Commissioner of Bridges submitting for approval form of contracts, specification and plans for laying and relaying water and gas pipes and for repaving and for adjusting the street grades about the new Municipal Building, together with a report of the Committee, consisting of the Comptroller and the Chief Engineer of the Board, to which, on March 11, 1909, said communication was referred, stating that the Corporation Counsel has advised the Commissioner of Bridges that this work can properly be done and paid for from the appropriation for the new Municipal Building. The plans have been prepared in great detail, after conference with the President of the Borough of Manhattan, the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity and the Consolidated Gas Company. The total expense is estimated to be \$60,000, and recommending the approval of the plans and specifications:

To the Honorable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

GENTLEMEN—I have the honor to transmit herewith form of proposals for bid or estimates, the bid or estimate, bond, contract and specifications, and contract drawings Nos. 234 to 245, inclusive, for laying and relaying water and gas mains, and grading and paving streets adjacent to the Municipal Building, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 670 of the Laws of 1907, entitled An Act to authorize the erection, furnishing and equipment of a municipal building at the Manhattan terminal of the New York and Brooklyn Bridge, in the City of New York, and an opinion of the Corporation Counsel, dated October 8, 1909, a copy of which is attached, that the expenses for this work may be paid out of the proceeds of the corporate stock authorized under chapter 670 of the Laws of 1907.

The rearrangement of these street mains is made necessary by and is incidental to the construction of the Municipal Building at the location authorized by the act, and was contemplated in the general plans for the building heretofore approved by your Honorable Board. The plans and specifications for this work received the approval of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity on February 17, 1910.

The paving called for, excepting a small total area, is incidental to closing pipe trenches required for laying and relaying street mains; the grading called for and the small total area of paving, excepted above, are included in this contract in order to carry out the changes in street lines and grades adopted by your Honorable Board on November 19, 1909, which changes were designed to make the street lines in the neighborhood of the Municipal Building conform with the conditions which will exist after the construction of this building. The plans and specifications for this work received the approval of the President of the Borough of Manhattan on February 8, 1910.

The expense for all the work called for under this proposed contract will be paid out of the unexpended balance of the proceeds of the sale of corporate stock heretofore authorized for the purposes of construction of the Municipal Building.

I desire the approval of your Honorable Board, pursuant to chapter 670 of the Laws of 1907, of the form of contract and specifications and the plans herewith submitted.

SIR—I am in receipt of your communication, dated August 17, 1909, which reads as follows:

"In accordance with chapter 670 of the Laws of 1907, the Commissioner of Bridges is authorized and empowered to construct, erect, equip and furnish, with the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, a Municipal Building on the site acquired for the extension of the Manhattan terminal of the New York and Brooklyn Bridge, and for the purposes of this act the issue of corporate stock is authorized.

"I understand that under section 6, chapter 4 of the Laws of 1891, as amended, known as the Rapid Transit Act, all expenses incidental to the work of reconstructing and readjusting and supporting any duly authorized subsurface structure shall be borne and paid for by the company having the franchise to construct and operate a rapid transit railway.

"That portion of the Municipal Building below the level of the curb is designed for use and will be used as the southerly part of the Brooklyn Bridge station of subway route 9-O-1, the northerly part of which station is being constructed by the Public Service Commission, under the provisions of the Rapid Transit Act.

"Please advise me as to whether expenses for the work of reconstructing, readjusting and supporting gas mains, electric ducts, surface railway tracks and appurtenances and mail tubes, all of which are property of public service corporations, and the removal or disturbance of which will be caused by the erection of the Municipal Building, may be paid for out of the proceeds of said corporate stock authorized under chapter 670 of the Laws of 1907."

Section 1 of chapter 670 of the Laws of 1907 provides:

"The commissioner of bridges of the city of New York is hereby authorized and empowered to construct and erect, with the approval of the board of estimate and apportionment, upon the site acquired or to be acquired by the city of New York for the construction and extension of the Manhattan terminal of the New York and Brooklyn Bridge * * * and upon and as a part of any building or structure which may be erected thereon, a municipal building."

Section 5 provides:

"For all expenses to be incurred under the authority of this act, including the furnishing and equipment of the building herein provided for, the said commissioner of bridges is hereby authorized to require, upon the approval of the board of estimate and apportionment, the comptroller to issue corporate stock of the city of New York, from time to time, and in the manner provided by law in such amount as shall be necessary to carry out the purposes of this act and of the proceeds of said corporate stock there shall be paid out, from time to time, upon requisition of the said commissioner of bridges, the amount by him from time to time certified to be due for any of the purposes of this act."

In my opinion the expenses mentioned in your letter may be properly paid out of the proceeds of the corporate stock authorized under chapter 670 of the Laws of 1907.

Hon. WILLIAM J. GAYNOR, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—At the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held on March 11, 1910, a communication from the Commissioner of Bridges, submitting for approval form of contract, specifications and plans for laying and relaying water and gas mains and for regrading and repaving the streets adjacent to the proposed new municipal building, was referred to the Comptroller and the Chief Engineer of the Board for consideration and report.

The work which the Bridge Commissioner proposes to do is necessitated by the inclusion of the present Chambers street in the site for the new municipal building and the changes in the grades of the streets adjacent thereto, which have already been authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. The Corporation Counsel, in an opinion dated October 8, 1909, advised the Commissioner of Bridges that it would be proper for him to do this work and pay for the same from the appropriation for the municipal building which has already been provided. The work consists in:

1. The changes in the grades of the adjacent streets and the necessary adjustment of the sidewalks and the modification of the coping around the Hall of Records.
2. The rearrangement of the water mains necessitated by the scanty head room over the subway now being built in Centre street and their diversion from the present Chambers street, which will be carried under the new building.
3. The rearrangement of gas mains for the same reasons which necessitate the changes in the water mains.

The specifications and plans have been prepared in great detail, after conferring with the President of the Borough of Manhattan, with the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity and the Consolidated Gas Company. The largest item of expense is that connected with the changes in the high pressure water mains. The paving is almost entirely that which is required in connection with the changes in the underground structures, although in several instances the trenches cover so large a proportion of the roadway that it has been necessary to repave practically the entire street, but no new paving is contemplated.

The relative cost of the different classes of work is as follows:

Raising the street grades, sidewalks and adjustment of coping around the Hall of Records	\$8,930 00
Readjusting and relaying high pressure and low pressure water mains....	42,037 00
Readjusting and relaying of gas mains	9,033 00
Total	\$60,000 00

Some of this work would under ordinary circumstances be done by the Public Service Commission, but when it was determined to proceed with the construction of the new municipal building the Mayor of the City, on May 12, 1908, addressed a communication to the Public Service Commission, asking them to suspend work upon that portion of the Centre street subway which was included in and adjacent to the site of the new municipal building and covered by contract 9-O-1, and on May 14, 1908, the Commission replied, saying that the request of the Mayor would be complied with.

It seems, therefore, reasonable that the Commissioner of Bridges, who is charged with responsibility for the erection of the new municipal building, should include the adjustment of subsurface structures over the proposed subway, as well as about the building. The expense of rearranging and readjusting the gas mains has in all subway work been assumed by the Public Service Commission, and the Commissioner of Bridges is following the same policy. It is desirable that this work be placed under contract and completed during the coming summer, and we would recommend that the plans and specifications be approved by the Board, the expense to be paid from the appropriation now available for the construction of the new municipal building.

The Secretary presented the following communication from the Public Service Commission requesting approval of the Board to a change in the contract plan for the section known as Manhattan Bridge Extension No. 1, of the Fourth avenue subway, and making requisition for an issue of corporate stock in the sum of \$30,458, to meet the cost of the proposed changes, together with a report of the Committee, consisting of the Comptroller and the Chief Engineer of the Board, to which, on May 6, 1910, said communication was referred, stating that the nature of these changes was described at length in a communication submitted to the Board by the Comptroller at the meeting of April 29, 1910, in which it was requested that the Public Service Commission submit to the Board the proposed changes in the contract plans for this section. The change is believed to be a desirable one, which will facilitate the operation of trains across the Manhattan Bridge, recommending that it be approved and that the issue of corporate stock covered by the requisition of the Public Service Commission be authorized:

To the Honorable Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

GENTLEMEN—The contract plans for the section of the Fourth avenue subway in Brooklyn known as Manhattan Bridge Extension No. 1, extending under Flatbush Avenue Extension, from Nassau street to Willoughby street, provide for a station between Tillary and Johnson streets and for five tracks from Willoughby street to a point near Tillary street just beyond the station and for four tracks from that point. These four tracks may be connected with tracks passing over the north side of the Manhattan Bridge for the purpose of carrying trains to and from the projected Canal street subway in the Borough of Manhattan, and with tracks passing over the south side of the Manhattan Bridge for the purpose of carrying trains to and from the Manhattan sections of the Brooklyn and Manhattan Loop Lines.

The routing of trains from the Fourth avenue subway to the Canal street subway, or the Loop Lines, as the case may be, cannot be accomplished on the Manhattan side of the bridge as was originally planned without grade crossings. The routing must, therefore, be provided for on the Brooklyn side, but under the present plans no provision can be made for routing on Manhattan Bridge Extension No. 1 without grade crossings at Chapel and Concord streets, crossings which would, moreover, have to be made on a three per cent. grade and at the foot of a five and four-tenths per cent. grade.

To relieve the situation the Commission proposes to modify the present plans for the section referred to by placing the station at Myrtle avenue instead of between Tillary and Johnson streets, and by constructing five tracks from Johnson street to Concord street, and four tracks from Willoughby street to Johnson street. These changes will not only do away with the necessity for grade crossings but will also permit of much greater flexibility in operation than is possible under the present plans. The attainment of this flexibility in operation is a matter of the utmost consequence in order that trains approaching the bridge on the Fourth avenue subway may be routed through to their destination in accordance with any plan that may hereafter be adopted by the proper authorities for the use and operation of the tracks on the bridge.

The Commission has taken up the matter of the proposed changes with the Contractor for this section, who has offered to do the extra work involved for the

sum of \$30,458 over and above the contract price. The Commission is advised by its Chief Engineer that this is the reasonable value of the additional work.

The Commission therefore asks your approval of the proposed change, and, in pursuance of section 37 of chapter 4 of the Laws of 1891 as amended, known as the Rapid Transit Act, and of chapter 429 of the Laws of 1907, hereby makes requisition upon you for the authorization of corporate stock of The City of New York, to be issued and sold by the Comptroller to provide means to meet the requirements of extra work under the contract for the construction of Section Manhattan Bridge Extension No. 1, to the amount of \$30,458.

Hon. WILLIAM J. GAYNOR, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—At the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held on May 6, 1910, a communication was presented from the Public Service Commission of the First District, dated April 27, 1910, requesting the Board to approve of proposed changes in the plans of the section known as Manhattan Bridge Extension No. 1 of the Fourth avenue subway, with a requisition for an issue of corporate stock in the sum of \$30,458 to meet the expense of extra work, which communication was referred to the Comptroller and the Chief Engineer of the Board.

The circumstances which prompted this communication from the Public Service Commission are fully described in a communication from the Comptroller dated April 19, 1910, and submitted to the Board on April 29, 1910, which communication related to a request of the Public Service Commission for the First District for an authorization of corporate stock to the amount of \$250,000 to provide means to pay for extra work which under the Fourth avenue subway contracts may be ordered from time to time. It was pointed out that while the extra work which it was proposed to do was generally incidental to the contracts and plans which have been made with the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, it was proposed to make some modifications of the plan for the construction of the first section, known as Manhattan Bridge Extension No. 1, and in his communication the Comptroller advised that the Public Service Commission should first ask the Board to approve of the modification of the contract plan and make a special requisition for the expense involved in such modification. The nature of the proposed change was also described in the report of the Comptroller already referred to and consists in moving the station which it was proposed to build between Johnson and Tillary streets to a point about 600 feet southeastwardly, thus permitting the routing of trains bound for Manhattan after passing this station and before reaching the heavy grade by which they will rise to the Manhattan Bridge. The original contract plans provide for five tracks from a point just north of Tillary street to Willoughby street, while under the modified plan the five-track section would extend from Concord street to a point just south of Johnson street, the five-track section being of approximately the same length, but in a somewhat different location.

We believe that the modification proposed is a desirable one, and, in the opinion of the legal staff of the Public Service Commission, it is simply a modification of the contract plan and not such a modification of the general plan or route as to necessitate the same procedure on the part of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment as though it involved a change which would require new consents on the part of the abutting property owners, the general description of the route upon which such consents were secured having provided for the construction of additional trackage and amounting to a quarter of a mile for each mile of roadway.

In view of these facts, we would recommend that the Board approve the proposed changes in the contract plans and assent to an issue of corporate stock in the sum of \$30,458, as covered by the requisition of the Public Service Commission.

The said board shall annually, between the first day of October and the first day of November, meet, and make a budget of the amounts estimated to be required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business of the city of New York, as constituted by this act, and of the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, for the then next ensuing year.

Such budget shall be prepared in such detail as to the titles of appropriations, the terms and conditions, not inconsistent with law, under which the same may be expended, the aggregate sum and the items thereof allowed to each department, bureau, office, board or commission, as the said board of estimate and apportionment shall deem advisable.

In order to enable said board to make such budget, the presidents of the several boroughs, the heads of departments, bureaus, offices, boards and commissions shall, not later than September tenth, send to the board of estimate and apportionment an estimate in writing, herein called a departmental estimate, of the amount of expenditure, specifying in detail the objects thereof, required in their respective departments, bureaus, offices, boards and commissions, including a statement of each of the salaries of their offices, clerks, employees and subordinates.

Duplicates of these departmental estimates and statements shall be sent at the same time to the board of aldermen.

Resolved, That the Secretary request the Presidents of the several Boroughs, the heads of the Departments, Bureaus, Offices, Boards and Commissions of The City of New York and the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, and the officers of institutions entitled by law to receive money from the City Treasury, or to incur expenditures payable therefrom, to send their estimates of expenditures for the year 1911, in conformity with the foregoing provisions of law, in quadruplicate, one copy to the Mayor, as Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, one copy to the Comptroller, one copy to the Board of Aldermen, and one copy to the Secretary of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, on or before July 15, 1910; and be it further

Resolved, That said Presidents of the several Boroughs, heads of Departments, Bureaus, Offices, Boards and Commissions at the same time be also requested to confer with the Comptroller before the 25th day of June, 1910, with a view to devising and adopting for their respective estimates a form so tabulated as to provide adequate information upon which this Board may determine the proper allowances to be granted for specific departmental purposes.

Resolved, That the Secretary be and he is hereby authorized, upon being informed by the Comptroller of the receipt of any estimate which is not made out in the form so devised and adopted, to return the same immediately to the head of the Department, Bureau, Board or Commission transmitting said estimate, directing his attention to the omission of such detail, and requesting the return of corrected estimates in quadruplicate.

As stated in the report of your Select Committee on Salaries, made on March 4, the request of the General Medical Superintendent for assistance in his office seems reasonable, experience having shown that it is a physical impossibility for him to give adequate attention to the work required to be done. The addition of two Assistant Medical Superintendents will enable the General Medical Superintendent to exercise the supervision of hospital work demanded by his position, while his assistants may attend to many business details that are important to effect economical administration of the Department.

The Board of Trustees desires to employ Anaesthetists to properly instruct the house staffs of the different hospitals in the practice of anaesthesia, in order that the lives of patients may not be jeopardized by treatment by inexperienced physicians.

It is stated that there is now no competent supervision of the storehouses in the four hospitals of the Department. With a General Storekeeper to supervise, there would be greater expedition in the performance of the work at the stores and proper distribution and deliveries of supplies. General supplies for this Department cost the City \$450,000 a year, and a competent man should be in charge of their distribution.

The Board of Trustees say of the necessity for the employment of an Egg Candler:

"In past years the eggs, butter and cheese were examined by the Mercantile Exchange, but in the contract for 1910 provision was made to have these supplies passed upon by the Departments' own Inspector. This arrangement will be cheaper and more satisfactory."

The Trustees claim that the appointment of a Typewriting Copyist has become necessary through the constantly increasing work in the Payroll Bureau, and because it is the desire of the Trustees to send out lists of changes in the help more promptly than in the past.

The President of the Board of Trustees states that there is no salary account from which transfer of funds may be made, in order to meet the added expense of the new employees.

In view of the facts stated, I recommend that the resolution of the Board of Aldermen of April 12, 1910, be concurred in to the extent that an issue of special revenue bonds to the amount of \$7,320.82 be authorized to provide means for the payment of the salaries of the following additional employees in the Department of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals for the remainder of the year 1910, beginning June 1:

To meet these requirements it has been found necessary to equip and place in operation a new stable with an increased number of horses, this calling for an increased number of drivers, hostlers and stablemen. It is also found that the number of sweepers allotted to the work in this Borough has been inadequate, and it is estimated that for the balance of this year additional force of at least 50 sweepers will be employed.

It is the opinion of an Examiner of the Finance Department, from investigation of the subject, that the efficient administration of the Department in the Borough of The Bronx requires an additional force of sweepers and drivers and of the necessary force for the equipment of the new stable.

I would recommend that increased appropriation be made to the Department of Street Cleaning to provide for the remaining portion of this year, say from June 1 to December 31, calculated for the increase of employees at an annual basis, as follows:

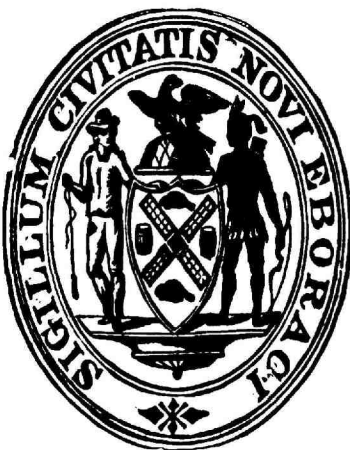

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or her name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures. Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
