The request of Commissioner Waldo of November 22 is amended by his letter of December 6, stating that no buildings are to be erected on the pier within twenty feet of its outer end.

The amended resolution regarding this Fire Department lease sent to your Honorable Board by the Commissioner of Docks and Ferries under date of December 2, 1910, a copy of which is attached hereto, says:

The Fire Department shall have the privilege of erecting a fence and constructing such buildings and appurtenances as are necessary for the purposes of said Department, on the following described area:

For comparison as to the justness and fairness of the rent asked, it may be pointed out that while the McElroy Transportation Company is to pay \$1,800 a year for 125 feet on the northerly side of Pier 18, the City is to pay only \$1,000 a year for 130 feet on the same side. Also the fact that the City has been paying \$1,000 a year rent for the past five years for the berthing of this fireboat "Abram S. Hewitt" at the foot of Main st., East River, Borough of Brooklyn.

The Fish Dealers' Association has consented that the rent be made payable quarterly instead of monthly, as mentioned in Commissioner Waldo's letter; the lease to be signed by C. M. Prankard, President of the Association.

The Committee to whom this matter was referred at the last meeting presented the following report:

December 29, 1910.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, City of New York: Gentlemen: Referring to the proposed lease for use of the Fire Department, at the rate of \$1,000 per annum, from the New York Wholesale Fish Dealers' Association, being 130 feet of the old Pier 18, we desire to say that, in our opinion, the bulkhead privileges are worth two and a half times as much as the pier accommodations. On the bulkhead the Wholesale Fish Dealers' Association have erected a two-story concrete building covering the entire width of the bulkhead. The pier is about 539 feet long, and the northerly half thereof, leased by the New York Wholesale Fish Dealers' Association, that association would, therefore, be able to lease about four berths of the size allotted to the Fire Department.

Basing the rent at the same rate which the City is asked to pay, namely, \$1,000 per annum, would result in a sum of \$4,000.

The New York Wholesale Fish Dealers' Association are paying for the year 1911, \$14,850 for the pier and bulkhead. This would leave as a rent for them to pay of \$10,850 a year.

Believing the rent to be reasonable and just, we therefore recommend that the lease from the New York Wholesale Fish Dealers' Association to the City of New York, for use of the Fire Department, be authorized for the term of one year from January 1, 1911, at the rate of \$1,000 per annum. 
