DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH.

REPORT FOR THE WEEK ENDING MAY 23, 1914. TO PHYSICIANS.

The Department frequently experiences considerable difficulty in finding cases of infectious diseases reported by physicians. For example, in one day recently, out of twenty reported cases of diphtheria and ten cases of scarlet fever, five of the former and one of the latter, after diligent inquiry, could not be found by the nurses. To a considerable extent this is due to illegible writing and to the inaccuracy of the information furnished by physicians. The Department feels sure that the mere statement of these facts will lead physicians to exercise greater care in future in reporting their cases.

ANTI-TYPHOID VACCINATION.

The Department desires to promote the practice of anti-typhoid immunization and calls attention to the free distribution of the typhoid vaccine to physicians for use

In the presence of any illness suspected of being an early stage of typhoid fever, prompt immunization of other members of the family is of great advantage. According to the Department's records most of the secondary or direct contact cases become infected while the physician is waiting for more definite symptoms in the original case. Those who develop the disease after immunization invariably show evidence of having contracted the infection before the immunizing injection. With very rare exceptions, such cases run a milder course than cases not immunized.

Typhoid vaccine may be obtained by personal application to the Department of Health, 149 Centre st., or if the physician will telephone or write, the vaccine will

be forwarded directly by mail.

VISITORS TO THE HOSPITALS OF THE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH. Early in the present administration, the New York City Visiting Committee of the State Charities Aid Association, which has been extremely useful in the past to the Department of Charities and to Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, was invited by the Commissioner of Health to extend its work to Willard Parker, Riverside and Kingston Avenue Hospitals. The invitation was promptly and cordially accepted.

REMOVAL OF BROOKLYN ANTI-RABIC CLINIC. The Brooklyn Anti-Rabic Clinic now conducted at the Brooklyn Borough Office, will be transferred on June 1, 1914, to 29 3d ave., Brooklyn. It will be open on week days from 10 a. m. to 1 p. m., and on Sundays and holidays, for all cases from all Boroughs, from 10 a. m. to noon.

The present quarters at the Brooklyn Borough Office, Fleet and Willoughly sts., are entirely too small. The waiting room cannot accommodate the large number of patients that attend on Sundays and holidays, when patients from all Boroughs are referred to this clinic.

MODEL DAIRY AT OTISVILLE SANATORIUM.

In connection with the Sanatorium at Otisville, the Department of Health maintains a model dairy in which all the cattle are high grade Holsteins and tuberculin tested. With the establishment of a bacteriological laboratory at the Sanatorium, arrangements have been completed for regular weekly examinations of the milk supplied to the patients. The first bacterial count showed that the milk dispensed from the Sanatorium dairy contained less than 10,000 bacteria per cubic centimeter.
HOW TO WRITE PROPER DEATH CERTIFICATES.

(Article No. 3.)

Importance of Attention to Details.

In writing death certificates, great care should be exercised in seeing that the name is properly spelled and legibly written. The deceased's correct age is a matter of considerable importance. We are repeatedly confronted with applications for the correction of age as given upon the original certificates of death on file in this office. Such applications entail considerable trouble for the family of the deceased, for, in order to obtain any such correction, documentary evidence must be produced as to the correct age of the deceased. In some instances, this is extremely difficult to obtain.

Trade organizations who pay death benefits insist upon the production of a transcript of the certificate of death, and refuse such transcript if the data thereon are at all incompatible with the statements made by the deceased at the time of his entrance into the association. If a man's occupation is that of a bricklayer, it should be so stated upon the certificate of death, otherwise there is a possibility of the refusal of the transcript by the organization with which deceased has been affiliated in his lifetime.

In some of the foreign countries, especially Germany and France, the most careful attention is paid to the accuracy of the information given upon transcripts of certificates of death. We have often had transcripts returned to us with requests for correction as to the name of the parents, and very often as to the birthplace of the deceased and of his parents.

Taking these points into consideration it will be seen that the physician owes it as a duty to his clientele as well as to the community, to prepare a certificate that will be correct in all its details.

REJECTED SANATORIUM APPLICANTS.

In order to determine the ultimate disposition of applicants who are refused admission to tuberculosis sanatoria, and thereby to arrive at an approximate estimate of any bearing such cases may have upon the spread of tuberculosis, the following data concerning 165 rejected applicants who sought admission to the Otisville Sanatorium have been collected.

Of the total of 165 cases, 66 had negative sputum and do not play an important part in the spread of tuberculosis. A majority of these negative sputum cases were rejected because careful and repeated examination showed that they either did not have any clinical tuberculosis or were suffering from some other disease which overshadowed an insignificant tuberculous lesion

The remaining 99 rejected cases all had positive sputum and were too far advanced to be admitted to Otisville (although Otisville accepts more advanced cases than are usually admitted to other sanatoria). All of these sputum-positive cases were urged by the physician in charge of the Tuberculosis Hospital Admission Bureau to enter the hospital, but only 62 of the 99 entered hospitals, or said they would enter. The actual number who found their way into a hospital within one month after being rejected was sixty-two.

Thirty-seven out of ninety-nine positive-sputum cases remained at large, at home in streets, in cars and in parks-known active distributers of tubercle bacilli. Only nine of the number could be induced to attend day camps, where a moderate degree of control could be exercised. Nothing but an increase in the infirmary capacity of our sanatoria will provide for and protect the community from cases of this class.

OUTFITS OF CLOTHING FOR OTISVILLE PATIENTS. In a communication recently addressed to the Department, the Charity Organization Society, the United Hebrew Charities and the New York Association for Improving the Condition of the Poor jointly call upon the City to assume the duty of supplying outfits of clothing for needy patients admitted to the Otisville Sanatorium. This function was voluntarily assumed by the societies named some years ago, and they now propose to relinquish it. Their reasons for desiring to discontinue the work are stated in the communication which follows:

"New York, May 13, 1914. "Hon. S. S. Goldwater, Commissioner, Department of Health, New York City: Dear Sir-May we respectfully call your attention to the fact that each year the Charity Organization Society, the United Hebrew Charities and the New York Association for Improving the Condition of the Poor are together spending approximately \$5,000 for special clothing outfits used by patients while undergoing treatment at the New York Municipal Sanatorium for Tuberculosis, Otisville, New York. The societies have willingly carried this burden during the seven years that Otisville has been in operation, believing it a field for private societies to do all in their power to assist the municipal authorities in thoroughly establishing the need and the efficacy of such an experiment. That stage is of course now passed and we feel that the City should assume the full burden of caring for patients admitted to Otisville, the necessary clothing being considered as part of the treatment administered, and that the amount of money necessary for this should be included in the appropriation allowed by the City for the maintenance of the institution. This will release for other purposes such expenditure from our budgets, which are being increasingly hard pressed to meet

"As you probably know, the Department of Charities is already supplying such necessary clothing to all of the patients admitted to the institutions under its jurisdiction such as Sea View, Raybrook, the Metropolitan Hospital. etc., and our societies are no longer being required to meet these needs.



The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., pur-chased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

All the material of the buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurte-nances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foun-dations and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from demolition shall be allowed to re-main on the premises, except old mortar or plas-ter only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their founda tions shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains, and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regu-lations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street and the openings of the main sewer in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the

work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances, or portion as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed, and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the day of possession, and the suc-cessful bidder will provide and furnish all materials of labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery,

any improper or detective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furrings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beamholes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the Contractor.

The Comptroller of The City of New York reserves the right on the day of sale to withdraw from sale any of the buildings, parts of buildings and machinery included therein, or to reject any and all bids; and it is further

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according

to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or con sideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State of Na-tional banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or cor-porate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the pro-posals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or esti-mate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.
