Resolution to Authorize the Police Commissioner to Purchase Bicycles and Motorcycles Without Public Letting.

Resolved, That, pursuant to the authority conferred upon it by the provisions of Section 419 of the Greater New York Charter, the necessary funds being available, the Board of Aldermen hereby authorizes and empowers the Police Commissioner of The City of New York to purchase in the open market, instead of by contract at public letting, bicycles at a cost not exceeding \$25 each and motorcycles at a cost not exceeding \$200 each, for the equipment and use of the Police Department, the total expense not to exceed \$12,000 for bicycles, and \$13,000 for motorcycles.

Resolution to Authorize the Committee on Supplies of the Board of Education to Purchase an Automobile Without Public Letting.

Resolved, That, in pursuance of the provisions of section 419 of the Greater New York Charter, the Committee on Supplies of the Board of Education be and hereby is authorized and empowered to purchase in the open market, without public letting, an automobile for the use of the President of the Board of Education at a cost not to exceed two thousand dollars (\$2,000).

Section 1. Subdivision 1 of Section 2 of Article 1 of Chapter 11 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of New York relating to "Fire-arms" is hereby amended by adding at the end thereof the following words: the sub-basement of the premises of the Citizen's Central National Bank at 320 Broadway.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Resolved, That, in pursuance of the provisions of Subdivision 8 of Section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and it is hereby requested to authorize the Comptroller to issue Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of one hundred and sixty-five thousand dollars (\$165,000), the proceeds whereof to be used by the Police Department for the purpose of meeting deficiency in the appropriation for the uniformed force.

All obligations contracted for hereunder to be incurred on or before December 31, 1915.

An Ordinance Providing for an Issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York to an Amount Not Exceeding Six Thousand Dollars (\$6,000) to Provide Means for the Construction of Two Additional Stairways at the East End of Outside Platforms of the Trolley Station on the Brooklyn Approach of the Williamsburg Bridge, Under the Jurisdiction of the Department of Bridges.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. The Board of Aldermen hereby approves of and concurs in the following resolution, adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment March 26, 1915, and authorizes the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York to the amount and for the purposes therein specified:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, pursuant to the provisions of Section 47 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, hereby approves of the issue of corporate stock of The City of New York to an amount not exceeding six thousand dollars (\$6,000) to provide means for the construction of two additional stairways at the east end of outside platforms of the trolley station on the Brooklyn approach of the Williamsburg Bridge, under the jurisdiction of the Department of Bridges, and, when authority therefor shall have been obtained from the Board of Aldermen, the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized to issue said corporate stock of The City of New York in the manner provided by Section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, maturing not more than fifteen (15) years after date of issue, the proceeds thereof to the amount of the par value of the stock to be applied to the purposes aforesaid; provided, however, that no encumbrance or expenditure by contract shall be made against the proceeds of corporate stock herein authorized, nor shall bids upon such contracts be advertised for, until after approval by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the plans, specifications, estimates of cost and forms of such contracts which shall be submitted to said Board by the Commissioner of Bridges, nor shall any architect, engineer, expert or departmental employee be engaged or employed as a charge against such proceeds, except after approval by said Board of such employment and of the fee or wage to be paid by preliminary and final contract, voucher or budget, which are to be similarly submitted, unless in the case of departmental employees, such employment is in accordance with schedules approved by said Board.

An Ordinance Providing for an Issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York to an Amount Not Exceeding Seven Hundred and Eighty-six Thousand Dollars (\$786,000), Being the City's Share (Three-quarters) of a Total of One Million and Forty-eight Thousand Dollars (\$1,048,000), to Provide Means for Acquiring Lands and Interests Therein and Defraying Expenses Incidental Thereto by The Bronx Parkway Commission in Connection with Preserving the Waters of the Bronx River from Pollution.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. The Board of Aldermen hereby approves of and concurs in the following resolution, adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment March 26, 1915, and authorizes the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York to the amount and for the purposes therein specified:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 594 of the Laws of 1907, as amended by chapter 757 of the Laws of 1913, hereby approves of the issue of corporate stock of The City of New York to an amount not exceeding seven hundred and eighty-six thousand dollars (\$786,000), being the City's share (three-quarters) of a total of one million and forty-eight thousand dollars (\$1,048,000), to provide means for acquiring lands and interests therein and defraying expenses incidental thereto by the Bronx Parkway Commission in connection with preserving the waters of the Bronx River from pollution, and that when authority therefor shall have been obtained from the Board of Aldermen the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized to issue said corporate stock of The City of New York in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, maturing not more than fifteen (15) years after date of issue, the proceeds thereof to the amount of the par value of the stock to be applied to the purpose aforesaid.

Letter from the Society of Architectural Iron Manufacturers, dated 23rd inst., enclosing copy of resolutions adopted at the meeting of the Society held on the 22nd inst., presented and read; on motion ordered on file.

Letter from Alfred Ludwig, Superintendent of Buildings, even date, in re Appeal 44 of 1913. After lengthy discussion, on motion, laid over for further consideration.

Gentlemen—We read some time ago reports in the newspapers criticising your Board, but it did not occur to us to write to you to express our extreme regret that you should be subjected to criticism so manifestly unjust.

In conversation with others it has since occurred to us that it might be a source of gratification to you if architects who have had long experience with your pro-

cedure and rulings, were to write and inform you of their good will and their appreciation of the just and disinterested way in which you have performed your duties.

We consider that no building laws can be so formulated that a board with power to interpret and modify such laws, could be dispensed with. No laws, unless of such a voluminous and intricate a nature as to be impractical, could possibly cover all cases of building construction, and the modern tendency of the formulation of City Codes is rather in the direction of simplicity and shortness, by which the necessity of a Board with power becomes greater.

We are glad to say that in the many cases in which we have had occasion to appeal to you for rulings, such appeal has always been given due consideration, and though by no means have all our requests been granted, we have no reasons to criticize the actions of the Board, which we believe have been rendered in a spirit of justice and in the interests of the public, yet without forgetting the interest of the property in whose behalf the appeal has been made by us.

We can also state that no member of your Board has ever executed, or so far as we know, been interested in any contract for a building for us.

We are entirely willing to have you make any use of this letter that you may see fit. Yours respectfully,

Report dated February 27 recommending that the promotion list of Transitman, Grade C, containing one name, and the promotion list of Transitman, Grade D, for the Bureau of Design and Survey, be certified to the Commissioner of Public Works, Borough of Manhattan, from which to make one promotion to the position of Transitman at \$1,500 per annum.

The recommendations were adopted.

Each candidate must offer at least two of the above foreign languages, in addition to Yiddish, and no candidate will be permitted to offer more than two of these languages. The languages offered by the candidate must be specified on his application blank, and candidates will not be examined in any languages other than those specified by them on their applications.

On the first day of the examination, candidates will be given a written test in Yiddish, and will be required to write a letter in English on an assigned subject.

Only those candidates who receive 70 per cent. on their written test in Yiddish and 70 per cent. on their letter will be summoned for the subsequent tests of the examination.

The oral and the written tests in each of the other languages will be held on the same day, but the examination in all of the languages may not be held on the same day.

An eligible list will be prepared for each of the three specified Boroughs.

Applicants must be residents of the Borough for which application is made, at the time it is made, and their names will not be transferred to any other Borough list.

For the purpose of certification to the Municipal Courts, the eligible list for the Borough in which the vacancy exists will be certified.

For the purpose of certification to the Magistrates' Courts of the 2nd Division, the eligible lists for the Boroughs of Brooklyn, Queens and Richmond will be merged.

The minimum age is 21 years. A physical examination will be held. Those who fail to pass the physical examination will not be summoned for the mental examination. Candidates who receive less than 70 per cent. in any test of the examination will not be summoned for the subsequent tests.

The form of advertisement was approved.

A report dated March 1 was presented from the Secretary to the Advisory Board, submitting a form of advertisement for the examination for Engineer, with Knowledge of Sewage Disposal, reading substantially as follows:

Applicants must be citizens of the United States and residents of the State of New York.

The duties of the Engineer, Bureau of Sewer Plan, will involve the organization of a staff to utilize to the best possible advantage the vast heritage of documentary information, material records and investigations bearing on harbor pollution. He will continue the work of the recently disbanded Metropolitan Sewerage Commission and institute such constructive work as may be determined upon for the purification of the waters surrounding the city. The active duties of the Engineer will not involve the design of tanks, the application of processes of local treatment, bacteriological research or the planning of sewer systems, as they constitute the primary elements of the problem. To cope with the situation the candidate must show an extended study of municipal problems of sewage disposal and an experience of ten years as Sanitary Engineer, five years of which should have been in sewage disposal work.

The subjects and weights are:

Experience, 5; 70 per cent. required. Technical, including a report, 5; 75 per cent. required.

A qualifying physical examination will be given.

Applications for this examination must be filed on a special blank, Form C, with insert. * * * Candidates failing to receive 70 per cent. on the Experience paper will not be summoned for the physical examination. Candidates failing to pass the physical examination will not be summoned for the mental test.

The candidate must be thoroughly familiar with the particular problem of New York City and the plans heretofore offered for its solution; should have an intimate knowledge of the different methods of sewage treatment which are generally recognized as most successful; should know the general methods of solution adopted by other tidal water cities, as Baltimore, Boston, etc.; and should be reasonably acquainted with the main drainage systems of foreign cities, as London, Birmingham, Dublin, etc.

The technical examination will consist of a searching test along the lines indicated above, together with the writing of a report or discussion of some phase of the problem of river or harbor pollution as applied to the surrounding waters of this city.

The form of advertisement was approved.

Report dated March 5 recommending that James H. Rooney be marked "Qualified" on the eligible list of Inspector of Repairs and Supplies.

Report dated March 8 recommending that Harvey S. Brown, Jr., be marked "Qualified" on the eligible list of Inspector of Repairs and Supplies.

Report dated March 5 recommending that Raymond R. Chambers of 195 Newtown Avenue, Astoria, Long Island, be marked "Qualified" on the eligible list of Foreman Asphalt Worker.

Report dated March 5 recommending that David Gottenberg be marked "Qualified" on the eligible list of Medical Inspector.

The recommendations were adopted.

After consideration of a report dated March 5 from the Examiner in Charge of the Bureau of Investigation, the Secretary was instructed to mark Henry E. A report (F-1040) dated March 2 was presented from Leonhard Felix Fuld, Assistant Chief Examiner, relative to the keeping of efficiency records in the various city departments and recommending that the Compiling Clerk be directed to withhold promulgation of promotion lists for the departments which had not submitted satisfactory efficiency records for the second quarter of 1914. The recommendation was adopted.

The recommendations were adopted.

A report, dated March 4, was presented from the First Assistant Chief Examiner, transmitting a report of Mr. Leonhard Felix Fuld, Assistant Chief Examiner, dated March 2, relative to the efficiency reports of the Coroners' Office, Borough of The Bronx, on which reports all employees were given a rating of "A." The First Assistant Chief Examiner recommended that the Board of Review be informed that it had the power to change the ratings if it was of the opinion that such ratings were not warranted. The recommendation was adopted.

A memorandum, dated March 6, was presented from M. B. Upshaw, Assistant Chief Examiner, relative to the appointment of Miss Estelle Riba, as Clerk, Second Grade, Female, for a temporary period, in the office of the Commission. The Secretary was instructed to note on the records the appointment of Miss Riba as of February 8, 1915, with salary at the rate of \$50 per month, under the provisions of clause 1 of Rule XII.

A communication, dated March 4, was presented from the Chief Payroll Clerk requesting to be informed whether or not the name of Edwin J. Cooley should be restored to the preferred list of Inspector of Regulating, Grading and Paving. The Secretary submitted a memorandum dated February 25, relative to the case of John H. Briscoe of Brentwood, Long Island, who had been suspended from the position of Licensed Fireman in the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity as of January 1, 1914, and whose name had been dropped from the preferred list on December 31, 1914. Slade of 42nd Street and Broadway, Manhattan, employed as Consulting Engineer in the Department of Street Cleaning at \$25 per day, and his total compensation for the year beginning November 16, 1914, is hereby fixed at an amount not to exceed \$1,500.

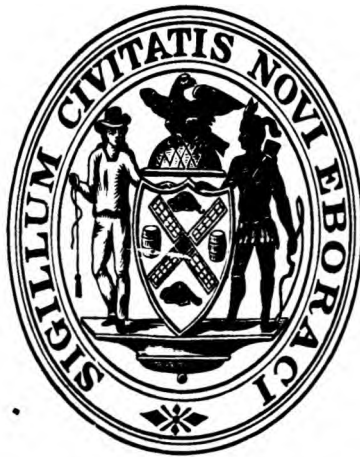

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.
